Washington Post. -It cannot definitely be learned what Judge Porter and Mr. Davidge are to receive for their services as special prosecuting officers, but from the hints thrown out it is believed that their fee will not be exaggerated when placed at \$15.000 for each of them including Saturday next in the days of the trial, it will bring the pay of the jurers as follows: For five \$620; for four, \$488; for three, \$369; total, \$1,468. In addition to this comes the hotel board bill, which it is presumed will not exceed \$3.50 per man, with this must also be included the three bailiffs in attendance upon the jurors. This foots up the handsome sum of \$3,213 to be paid to the proprietors of the National Hotel.

For witnesses, including mileage there has been paid out \$8.078 85. 
