## STREETS PAVED THIS SUMMER

Start Will Be Made as Soon as Frost Leaves Ground—Better Housing.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Clerk's office Friday evening. His Worship Mayor Alexander presiding. There were present Councillors Quinn, McBeath, Currie, Miller, Patterson and Goss.

The clerk read audited M. A. Kelly's report stating that he had audited the Treasurer's books and found them correct. Report received and placed on file.

Clerk read a letter from the publishers of the Municipal Journal, asking for payment of two years subscription to the Journal, one year at \$1.00 and one year at \$2.00 for eight copies to each of the Councillors, \$22.00 in all.

Coun. Currie stated that although he had been a Councillor for nearly a year he had not yet received a copy of this Journal. He asked if the Council derived any benefit from this expenditure.

His Worship and Coun. Miller felt that the Journal kept the Councillors in touch with what is going on in other towns and cities.

Clerk was instructed to write publishers and ascertain why Coun. Currie did not receive copy.

The Clerk read the following letter: The government of New Brunswick intend to introduce at the next session of the legislature an act to provide for better housing, to promote the erection of dwelling houses of modern character, both in urban and rural districts, to prevent overcrowding in houses, to contribute to the general health and well-being of the community by suitable town planning and housing schemes and to put within the reach of all persons, particularly returned soldiers, the opportunity of acquiring their own homes at actual cost of the building and land required.

The details of the act have not yet been fully marked out but it is desirable that cities, towns and municipalities should be informed of the general provision of the proposed act in order that they may make their plans for the coming summer.

The government are also desirous of obtaining any suggestions as to the carrying out of the proposed act and as to the amount of money required by each city, town and municipality.

The province proposes to borrow from the Dominion government the amount allotted to the province, namely \$1,225,000 and in turn to lend this money to municipalities, cities, towns, companies and individuals.

Municipalities, cities and towns, if they so desire, may lay out town planning schemes, under chapter 19, Acts of Assembly, 1912 and may borrow from the "housing fund" at 5 per cent interest such sum as may be necessary to carry out the town planning scheme. The building lots comprised in the town planning scheme may be sold by the municipality, city or town for building purposes or the municipality, city or town may also undertake a housing scheme and may borrow a further amount for the purpose of building houses upon this land or upon any land suitable for the purpose.

These houses, when built, shall be sold to persons desiring the same upon such terms as may be agreed upon by the municipality, city or town and it is suggested that, where a person is desirous of acquiring a house and paying 15 per cent of the cost he shall be entitled to a deed of the property upon giving a mortgage repayable in twenty years with interest at 5 per cent. If the individual has no means with which to make this payment, he may be given an opportunity of renting with an option of purchase, in which case he shall be required to pay a monthly rental that would in twenty years pay the principal and interest in full in addition to making all necessary repairs and paying the taxes and insurance. When 15 per cent of the principal has been paid under these monthly payments, he would then be entitled to a deed of the property upon giving a mortgage for the balance. The monthly payment of \$20 will pay for a \$3,000 property in twenty years. Should the municipality, city or

## TWO KILLED AT ST. ALEXIS STATION

Charles Delaney and Niece Struck by Fast Special at Crossing.

A very sad accident occurred at St. Alexis station Saturday evening whereby Charles Delaney, a very popular fish warden, and guide of Matapedia and his niece, Miss Delaney, daughter of Mr. James Delaney, aged about twelve years were instantly killed.

Mr. Delaney was driving to Matapedia with his niece. An easterly storm was raging with thick snow and this prevented Mr. Delaney from hearing the whistle of the fast special, which was coming down, travelling at express speed. Six cars in the siding and the station also hid a view of the up track so that without a moment's warning the sleigh was struck by the fast train, dashing the occupants to their death.

The driver of the train saw nothing until the sleigh was hit.

The entire community is grief stricken over the sad accident as both the victims were very popular. Mr. Delaney is survived by a widow.

The funeral was held Wednesday and was largely attended.

On the "Seaboard" Mrs. Albert Gallant, Pte. Chas. Gallett, Pte. J. G. Gallett, all for Campbellton, of which he was two years on active service in France and there to see the last hostilities. Pte. Chas. Gallett was in France for nearly a year and was wounded at Arras, France in May, 1918 and was discharged in May, 1918 and returned to his home on the 10th inst.

Returning to France he was with the Canadian Expeditionary Force and was with the 102nd Battalion. He joined up with the 102nd under Col. Price, leaving Canada in Dec. 1916. ### UNFOUNDED CRITICISM.

Under the heading "More Incompetency" the Campbellton Tribune endeavors to place the blame of the mix-up in the Addington and Campbellton Board of Health assessment upon the shoulders of Coun. H. J. Currie.

His statements are entirely at variance with the truth and had Mr. Crockett taken the trouble to look up the minutes of the last session of the Municipal Council a copy of which he has in his possession, he would have seen that exactly the same resolution covering the town of Campbellton's assessment for Poor, Pauper Lunatics and Board of Health was passed as in former years.

Unfortunately Coun. Currie is out of town this week, having left for Gaspe Wednesday noon. He no doubt will answer Mr. Crockett upon his return.

We can only say that Mr. Crockett is entirely wrong in this matter. As official reporter of the Municipal Council the editor of the Graphic has through the courtesy of one of the Councilors been invited to the sittings of the Assessment Committee and has closely followed its work. Last session the work was done in exactly the same way as in previous years. The amount to be assessed was fixed and the percentage of the different parishes worked out.

This year because of the payment in July of something over \$1000 in Board of Health accounts and over \$10,000 in January, a total of about \$12,000 for Board of Health alone, the contingent account out of which fund such accounts are paid, was very large, \$25,000 for the whole county.

When the Assessment was made the Secretary Treasurer was not able to give the exact amount of such Board of Health accounts to that the matter of deducting that portion which would fall upon the town of Campbellton was left, as in previous years to the said Secretary Treasurer.

erning this and duly passed is as follows:

"Provided that in respect to the Parish of Addington no part of the sum required for the expenses of the County Board of Health be assessed and levied on said Town of Campbellton or the ratepayers thereof being exempt from being assessed in respect of such amount under the provisions of Chapter, 113 of the Acts of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, section (1) passed in 1912 and that the warrant to Assessors of the Parish of Addington be made according."

In making up the Warrant for assessment the Secretary Treasurer neglected to carry out this section of resolution and sent the Warrant out for the whole amount. Upon its arrival here Coun. Currie discovered the mistake and immediately took up the matter with the Secretary Treasurer, who sent a corrected Warrant to the Assessors. The question is now being asked has the Secretary Treasurer neglected to attend to this matter in other years since 1912 and was Coun. Currie the first to discover this. The matter will doubtless be taken up at the next session of the Municipal Council.

With regard to the parish of Addington, outside the town of Campbellton it was never intended that the amount exempt on Campbellton ratepayers for Board of Health should be levied on the ratepayers of Addington alone, as now these ratepayers have to pay more than their share. The amount so exempted should be charged to the whole county and paid per ratio by all the parishes. This matter will also be taken up at the next session of the Council.

### A REFUSAL.

Some time ago a delegation composed of representatives from the Restigouche Municipal Council, the Campbellton Town Council, the Board of Trade and the Retail Merchants Association of Campbellton journeyed to Moncton to lay before Gen. Supt. L. S. Brown the need of better railway service in and out of Campbellton, but principally to impress upon the C. N. R. management the urgent need for the restoration of the Suburban between Campbellton and Bathurst.

The delegation, which was a most representative one, placed the matter squarely before the management, showing that by the present train service Campbellton was being discriminated against, to the serious loss of its citizens, and that a large portion of the travelling public between the points named were greatly inconvenienced by the withdrawal of this train. Notwithstanding all this, and the assurance of Gen. Supt. L. S. Brown that he would do what he could to have the matter remedied, word has been received that this train will not be reinstated before May 1st.

Is it possible that the General Superintendent of the C. N. R. is short of all power, that he must go to Toronto to get authority to reinstall a little suburban train. If so it would seem that it was time Mr. Brown resigned his post and go into railway work where he will be more than a mere figure head, a mail box as it were, through whom letters may be transmitted to those higher up.

The delegation should not rest content with this refusal but should go to those higher up and endeavor to learn who is responsible for this discrimination against Campbellton.

## MT. ALLISON'S PART IN GREAT WAR

Over Five Hundred have Enlisted  
Sixty Have Made Supreme Sacrifice.

Mount Allison's part in the War is being carefully studied by the Committee of the Alumni and Alumni Societies, which has in charge a campaign for a Memorial to the men and women of the Institution, who have given their lives in the service of the country.

Over 500 have enlisted, over 60 have died or been killed in action and over 200 have been wounded.

Thirty-five have been decorated for distinguished service and word has just been received that Lieut. J. D. McLean, of Campbellton, has been decorated with the Military Cross. Lieut. McLean graduated in 1914 with a fine record as a student and spent a year at the University as an instructor in Physics. He enlisted with the 64th Battalion, served with distinction with the 3rd Pioneer and finally with the 7th Battalion. Lieut. McLean is a son of Mr. John McLean, a well known lumberman of Campbellton.

Several of his Mount Allison friends have been killed and he himself has been seriously wounded, but all his Mount Allison friends are glad to know that he has come through safely and has been decorated for bravery.

The Memorial Library, which is in contemplation, will have tablets to the men who have died, will contain a permanent place for War relics and will contain a complete record of the War history of all who have served. It is estimated that approximately \$50,000 will be required to build the Library and to provide for its maintenance. The campaign will be carried on some time in April and it is confidently expected that old students and supporters of the Institution will unite in making the campaign a success. A landscape architect has been engaged to decide on the location of the building and careful plans for its design are being made by architects.

## MANY SUBJECTS DEALT WITH

Campbellton Board of Trade Pressing for Improved Railway Service.

A meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held in the Town Clerk's office Wednesday evening. President Murray in the chair.

Many important matters were dealt with.

The first matter to come up was that in reference to a boat for the Campbellton-Gaspe service.

Secretary H. R. Smith read a number of letters he had received in reference to the "Elaing" which has been refitted with ten staterooms and is now at Halifax.

Mr. Smith also reported that Mr. P. M. Shannon had phoned him about two steamers which might be available.

Mr. Shannon said he had had a conversation with a Gaspe captain who was deeply interested in this matter. One of these boats was a large one and could make a round trip between Campbellton and Quebec, making all the stops, every week. The other was a smaller boat.

On motion the matter of procuring a boat, and all matters pertaining thereto was left in the hands of the Council of the Board of Trade with power to act.

The matter of the establishment of a Labor Bureau at Campbellton by the government was taken up and after discussion the Board authorized the forwarding of a memorial to Premier Foster and the local representatives.

H. B. Anslow brought up the matter of an Amory for Campbellton. He explained that the returned men, members of the G. W. V. A. had started the matter by passing a strong resolution at a meeting and requested the Campbellton Board of Trade to assist in the undertaking.

Other members spoke in favor of the project and on motion of Mr. Anslow the Board of Trade passed a resolution a copy of which was to be forwarded to Hon. Mr. Carvell and P. Michael, M. P.

Mr. Chas. Goss reported for the delegation which had met Gen. Supt. L. S. Brown at Moncton recently. The members of that delegation Geo. G. McKenzie, D. A. Sewart were both out of town and His Worship Mayor Alexander was confined to his home through illness. Mayor Alexander had given him a written report. This report stated that Gen. Supt. Brown had not been able to have the suburban reinstated until the change of time table late in April. He thought the Board of Trade should not let the matter drop, but should go higher up.

On motion of Mr. Goss the President and Secretary were authorized to forward a strong resolution, to the Board of Railway Managers, the Minister of Railways, Hon. Mr. Carvell, and our representative.

President Murray said that there were many complaints because the station waiting rooms were closed Sunday and those who had gathered to welcome the returning Campbellton boys had to stand out in the cold.

The President was authorized to interview Dist. Supt. Fitzmaurice on the matter and see if on such occasions the rooms could not be opened.

H. B. Anslow said that the Board of Trade should immediately take steps to have the train service on the International improved. There should be a daily express on this line with a daily mail.

P. M. Shannon strongly advocated this and moved that the President and Secretary draft a resolution in favor of it and forward same to the proper authorities.

The meeting then adjourned.

## NEWSY ITEMS FROM NEARBY PLACES

## DALHOUSIE

Dalhousie, March 5.—That the Foster government intends borrowing from the Dominion government the amount allotted to the province, namely \$1,225,000, and in turn to lend this money to municipalities, cities, towns, companies and individuals, is already being considered by our business men. A rough outline of the housing policy of the provincial government would go to show that in the first place a very favorable arrangement can be made to enable our returned soldiers, who have families, to own their homes. Several returned heroes will no doubt take advantage of such wise and practical legislation. It is up to our town council, for our citizens to profit of the after-the-war developments that are to be offered to the people for their benefit.

With the advantages, that the Co. of Restigouche can offer to "returned" soldiers, and to people generally, who wish to locate here, there should be very careful consideration given to the housing legislation that is to be introduced at Fredericton, during the session that is to open this week.

In so far as the shiretown is concerned, we can offer to our returned soldiers, and to our labouring classes, wonderful advantages. Dalhousie is a very healthy town. Our scenery cannot be surpassed. We enjoy a good market being surrounded by progressive farmers on both sides of the river. Fish in abundance. Our water and electric systems are of the best. Our three churches with each in possession of nice halls for the convenience of our congregation. One of the best harbours in Canada, with all of them to be improved, now that shipping is assured since peace is declared. Schools in which both languages are taught, and in which music, typewriting, elocution can be learned. The presence of city folk during the summer months having in our district the Inn Arran Hotel, which can accommodate three hundred guests at least. Law abiding citizens and an industrious working population with the heritage that has been bestowed upon us by a good Providence, it is up to us to be progressive and unselfish in our future movements for the benefit of all.

The usual weekly meeting was held this week in the town hall, and at least 600 people enjoyed the programme which was one of the best that has been witnessed since the opening of the hall. The views exhibited on the screen were very much appreciated.

The speaker of the evening was Mr. Allan J. LeBlanc, a young barrister of Dalhousie. He gave a very interesting address on education and was frequently applauded. Mr. LeBlanc is a fluent speaker in both languages. The dance given under the auspices of the Dalhousie Athletic Club, in the Rink Rooms, on Monday evening, was a triumphal success. The place was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Miss Hazel Hovatt is spending some time in Dalhousie, N. B. Although mention has already been made of the death of Mr. J. B. Henderson, full particulars have not been given. The deceased who was one of our most esteemed citizens died on February 23rd in his seventy-eighth year, being ailing for a number of years, although he was only confined to his room a few days before his death.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his wife, and truly it can be said of Mrs. Henderson that she patiently waited upon her husband during his long illness, shown none also survive: Blair of Inverness, C. B., Clinton of Montreal, Stanley of Alberta, Sanford of Ontario, Mitchell of Philadelphia, Hedley of Inverness, and Hastie at home. Also one brother Mr. Richard Henderson of this place.

The late Mr. Henderson was for many years an elder of the Presbyterian Church here and also a diligent worker in the Sunday School where he taught a class for some time.

The funeral service was held on Tuesday, the service being conducted by his pastor, Rev. E. J. Rattee, and was largely attended. Interment was made in St. Andrews Presbyterian Cemetery at New Richmond.

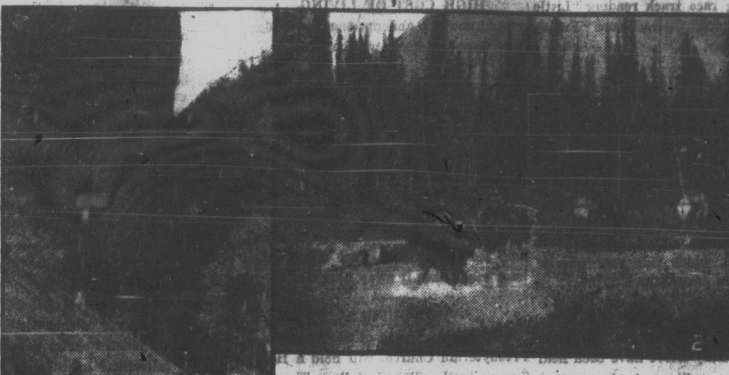

The first trip over the Simpson Pass through the Canadian Pacific Rockies was made by Sir George Simpson, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, in 1841, and formed part of the first recorded overland trip across the North American Continent, and by way of Siberia and Russia, occupying about nine months, and the subject of considerable literature. Jim Brewster, the famous guide and outfitter at Banff, discovered the trail over the Simpson Pass in 1888. Now there is a comfortable little tourist house, much appreciated by motorists who use the excellent Government road through the Upper Columbia Valley.

On our first day's ride we stopped for a swim in the hot sulphur water springs of Sinclair Canyon, where St. John Harnsworth, brother of the famous Lord Northcliffe, and his partner, who was a well-known proprietor of the still more famous Perrier water, built a concrete bathing pool under the springs, which pours its naturally warm water out of the rock. At night we found shelter in a homesteaded cabin, the owner of which was away at the war and hospitable enough to leave the latch loose. ### FLED FROM ARMORED CARS

Bedeau in Wild Confusion When the British Forces Made Use of "Tanks" in Desert.

The appearance of armored cars in the desert struck terror in Senussi hearts, and the whole country was soon covered with men and camels, trekking off to the southwest. On getting through the camp of cars went on independently, shooting all loaded camels and men within reach. Two of these camels carried mixed loads of petrol and high explosive shell. The petrol camels caught fire, and the shells exploded, which made the camels fall on their knees, beat the ground with their foreheads, and call on Allah's aid.

"The Turkish gunners stuck to their guns like good men. When we passed them without killing them they turned round and continued firing at us, so that we had to go back and finish them," one of the officers told me. The cars collected three mountain guns and nine machine guns with a quarter million rounds of small-arm ammunition and several boxes of shell. Two of the cars stood by all night to protect the captures, and the remainder retraced their tracks to Sollum, to find our infantry in occupation. The Senussi did not venture on Aziza again.

No inspection of prison camps under the Borne agreement has yet been made, but it is very probable that conditions there may necessitate more doctors being detained. There are some things in warfare which are harder than actual fighting, and to stay behind in a prison camp tending wounded and maimed men when others joyfully set sail for home or active service requires all the unselfish devotion to duty with which doctors are credited by the laity.

As a result white residents and natives along the river who depend on the run for their winter food talked of salmon famine and the horrors of a fleshless winter.

Petition Sent to Minister of Public Works—Town Council to Help.

At a meeting of the G. W. V. A. held recently the matter of an Armory for Campbellton was discussed and the following resolution unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS the town of Campbellton, and County of Restigouche have given freely of their sons in the great war to fight for the principles of right and justice, giving according to figures which are available, as large, if not larger number, per capita, as any county in the Dominion of Canada;

AND WHEREAS Campbellton's citizens have during the period of the war been foremost in working for and contributing towards the various objects and funds required to assist in caring for our boys, until the generosity of its citizens has become known all over this Dominion;

AND WHEREAS previous to the war, Campbellton was the centre of one company of the 73rd Regiment, a company which has earned undying fame at the front as its organizer and Captain, the late Col. A. E. McKenzie, D. S. O.; Lieut. Ferguson, Lieut. Lockhart, Capt. O. A. Mowat, Lieut. Stewart, McLean, M. C., and many others, all since killed in action, were active either as officers or in the ranks of said company;

AND WHEREAS there is in Campbellton or Restigouche County, no suitable building in which, interest in military matters can be sustained, or where the veterans of the past great war, can congregate with comfort and pleasure;

THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Association of Restigouche ask the department of Public Works to erect in the Town of Campbellton an Armory or suitable building as above outlined with the sincere hope that plans for its erection will be promptly prepared.

The members of the G. W. V. A. are enthusiastic in the matter and are asking the assistance of the Town Council and the Campbellton Board of Trade and any other society which can assist in furthering the matter.

Let every citizen take an interest, and if possible write a personal letter to Hon. F. B. Carvell, Minister of Public Works, favoring the erection of such a building.
