To the Editor of the Maritime Farmer.

Dear Sir.—The Farmer of the 14th came to hand through somewhat late, and who is to blame for that I don't know. However, it is as it may appear almost a stranger. I scarcely knew it with its new and very appropriate frontispiece. If New Brunswick presents such scenes in general I would say it is almost all other provinces. I see that "Water Works" is doing something to stir your people up to a sense of their duty in regard to supplying your city with water. Surely, where people have their property at stake, they should not need any advice about this matter. Only yesterday the people of Chippewa, a town two miles above the Falls, had a lesson on that score; they had 25 or 30 buildings burned down, besides fields of grain and hay, although they had the help of several fire companies, so dry was everything that it was almost impossible to stop the spread of the flames.

I see your Board of Agriculture are pushing ahead in the way of securing to the Province a Stock Farm. I hope it will be a profitable concern to the Province at large, and if properly conducted cannot fail to be so.

We have been having real tropical weather here for some days, and, without any rain in this quarter for nearly three weeks, the thermometer ranging from 90 to 97 in the shade. The wheat harvest is almost over here and the oats are ripening very fast. And how is the weather in New Brunswick? Are the crops good and how far advanced? Is any harvesting done with you yet? Have you any potato bugs? do your farmers use Paris Green?—It is a dead end for them mixed in water. What about the new line of steamships to Liverpool? Has the Board of Agriculture got on their stock this to be imported the sheep known as the Hampshire Downs?

State of the Crops throughout the Province.

Some time ago the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture requested a number of the best informed gentlemen residing in each County to send him a statement of the condition of the crops at the end of July, and their opinion of the probable yield. In response to this request a large number of communications have been received, from which we are permitted to make the following extracts. It will be observed that the whole Province is included, so a very fair estimate for the year can be made.
