For this he considered the Dominion Government responsible, and no one else. If immigrants came here of their own free will they would make good citizens, but for the Government or its agents to offer dishonest inducements was disgraceful. Why shouldn't the workingmen get a chance? He voted for the N. P., but his views were beginning to change. Where the manufacturers were protected, but were their wages protected? No, the Government looked after the manufacturers alone. This resolution could not be too strong. Put the blame where it belonged, without being afraid of treading on any-body's corns.

THE SEWACE PROBLEM.

Disgraceful State of Things at the Donnelly Pond.

The Dryl Earth System by Irrigation
Suggested as the Best Method for
London-Report of the Modical Officer on City

A meeting of the Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon for the purpose of discussing the sewage question, but for a long time it looked as if there would not be a quorum. After a long wait several members dropped in and the business was commenced with the following present: Aldermen Taylor (chairman), Wallace, Boyd Anderson ahd Moule, Col. Moffat, Dr. Gardiner, Health Officer Hutchinson and Scoretary Kingston. The first business taken up was the consideration of a report compiled from the discussion of the Sanitary Convention held recently in the town of Owen Sound. The report deals with the various methods of treating sewage and was presented by Medical Health Officer Hutchinson substantially as follows:

One of the sewage systems now in use in London, England, is to carry the sewage twelve miles, by plops. Tankages is provided for 60,000,000 gallows 10,000 acres are daily irrigated for the sewage systems of eighteen acres. otherwise, and the pipes being much smaller in consequence are easily kept clean and inodorous, an eighteen-inch pipe being sufficient for 18,000 people. This is the system adopted in the town of Brockville.

For the disposal of sewage by an irrigation farm one acre of ground is considered sufficient for 1,000 people. The consensus of opinion with reference to London was that we should enforce the dry-earth system and dispose of sewage by irrigation, with or without the separate system.

sewage by irrigation, with or without the separate system. On motion to file the report, Col. Mossat contended that something more than sliing it should be done. The system of irrigation at the Asylum, he said, did not prevent the drainage of sewage into the creek emptying into Carling's Creek.

Ald. Anderson held that the city had a low death-rate, and the citizens were not like those of Toronto, suffering from the effects of bad water or sewage. He thought it was not a live issue.

Col. Mossat contended that it was, and said that he was sure that the city would be placed under a load of obligation to the Government or anyone that would show what could be done with the sewage now that the city was prevented from draining into Carling's Creek and the river.

Inspector Hutchinson explained in connection with the recent epidemics in Torontc, that the workmen in driving piles had split one of the sewage pipes and that when this was remedied the effects of the malady was remedied the effects of the malady

that the workmen in driving piles had split one of the sewage pipes and that when this was remedied the effects of the malady abated. At another time, when typhoid fever was raging in Toronto it was found that a man had dumped a scowload of night soil at the head of the city's water supply.

Secretary Kingston thought that London West could be purchased outright and the irrigation system in this way put in operation as cheap as any other.

Ald. Boyd suggested that a mill-race be built in the river and that it be floodes as otten as the river became polluted with sewage.

On account of a lack of room many of the closest pits were within a few feet of the windows or doors. They were a frequent cause of litigation between neighbors and were dangerous to health. It is also improper to have but one closet for both sexes as is found to be the case. Some of the employers would make the desired changes if they had the room. The only way to remedy the evil would be to take a certain depth along Dundas and Richmond streets and have closets with sewer connections.

THE SABBATH AND THE LABORING

Whilst the Sabbath is a blessing to all classes it is an especial boon to the laboring man. One of the great hardships of the laborer is found in the fact that from Monday morning until Saturday night he has little if any opportunity for reading and study or any culture of his higher nature. The demands of labor exhaust most of his time and all his energies, and when the week closes he finds himself intellectually and spiritually at a standscill. The man of wealth can shorten his hours of labor, take an occasional holiday and thus make a Sab-bath for himself if he chooses. The laborer, ander present conditions, must be content to give his days to toil and his nights to rest, trusting very largely to the Sunday for the enlargement of his store of know-ledge and the culture of his moral powers. Sunday is the only day of the week that gives the laborer his freedom, lifts him out of the realm of matter into the world of

ground as his employer.

Dr. Blaikie truly says: "The Sabbath is God's special present to the workingman; and one of its chief objects is to prolong his life and preserve efficient his working tone. In the vital system it acts like a compensa-tion "pond;" it replenishes the spirits, the elasticity and vigor, which the last six days have drained away, and supplies the force which is to fill the six days succeeding; and, in the economy of existence it answers the same purpose as in the economy of income is answered by a savings bank."

Sabbath keeping prolongs the life, in-creases the intelligence and exalts the manhood of the laboring man. Every effort made in behalf of a continental Sabbath, every successful attempt in breaking down sanctity of the Lord's day is a virtual war upon all the higher in-terests of the laborer. If the Sabbath is opened for industry and com-merce, such is the competition of to-day, period of mental and moral growth. Nor is the mere opening of the Sunday to what some esteem harmless diversion, such as pienies, excursions and other public recreations, without its real danger to the laborer. In nations where it has been tried—Germany, for example—it has been found immake the Sunday a holiday possible to make the Sunday a holiday without making it to a great extent a day of labor. For the working classes in Germany Sunday is only a half holiday at best, often not that, and the religious element in it is like Gratiano's "two grains of wheat hid in a bushel of chaff." In fact, we cannot introduce the diversions of the continental Sabbath without its accompanying labor and corresponding enslavement of the poor. As a noted writer has well said: "Once take away the sacredness of the Sunday and you only open another day to the avarice and cupidity of man."







A German medical scientist has declared that a form of inebriety due to the excessive use of coffee is on the increase in Germany, and that its worst form is found among the women of the upper working classes, where the wages permit of the purchase at will of coffee. Dr. Mendel says that at a certain stage coffee extract undiluted is the only thing that will satisfy these coffee drinkers, and that the extract is followed by opium and alcoholic stimulants. But even where the excess is confined to coffee a peculiar form of neurosis is occasioned. Dr. Mendel found many women who consumed over a pound of coffee a week. Sleeplessness is the first symptom of the pernicious effects of the stimulant. He thinks that tea leads to similar pernicious habits, and that people of a nervous temperament should watch carefully against the contracting of the coffee and tex habit, and avoid their use three times a day, that being the first step in excess.
