The announcement that the M. C. R. authorities had stated their intention of quitting London and dismissing local employes, which was exclusively published in last evening's Anvertiser, has been an extensive of discussion on

It is expected that arrangements will be made with the lessees of the London and Port Stauley Railway, which will enable you to ship and receive freight via St. Thomas, on or about the same terms as heretofore. Instructions were issued all along the road to the same effect.

WHAT ARE THE REASONS?

A great deal of speculation was naturally rife as to the reasons for the action taken by the road. One was that the M. C. R. was in some way behind the present lease. This is absolutely denied by the lessees, and the fact that there were negotiations between the two as to running powers shows that there is no secret understanding. The statement most generally accopted was that that there is no secret understanding. The statement most generally accepted was that those negocitations have been unsatisfactory to the M. C. R. "The demands of the syndicate have not been acceptable to the company," said an M. C. R. official yesterday. "They laid down their terms in a manner that did not suit the Michigan Central, which will not be dictated to by a small corporation. Besides, our company felt that the G. T. R. were being unduly favored by the lessees. They secured privileges which the M. C. R. considered unfair, and the road has shown its independence by promptly withdrawing. No, there is no biuff about it. The company would not go to the extreme measures of dismissing its employes and issuing notices all over the line unless it was a permanent move."

Many thought that the London division Many thought that the London division was not a profitable one, and that the M. C. R. had determined to abandon it if they did not get a reduction in the rate for running powers. At present they pay the G. T. R. \$6 a train, which, at six a day, amounts to about \$11,000 a year. Rent and taxes amount to \$4,000. The expenses of the freight department, including salaries, are \$10,000, and the teaming, wages of trainmen and incidentals amount to another \$10,000, making in round numbers \$35,000 a year.


This morning a dispatch came from M. C. R. headquarters canceling the instructions issued yesterday to the effect that the road would withdraw from London and dismissing the local employes. The rumor spread around the city and caused a good deal of satisfaction while it lasted. A circular was immediately issued by the local freight agent countermanding the previous one, and forming the merchants that the road would continue to handle London freight.

They had no sooner been circulated than they were withdrawn on the strength of subsequent orders from headquarters. The latter gave instructions that the pas-senger business would be discontinued; not a single ticket must be sold after to-night. Local freight, it was intimated, will continue to be handled in the meantime. This means that the M. C. R. will, until definite arrangements are made, only run special freight trains between London and St. Thomas to meet the traffic requirements.

CRUSHED IN THEIR BEDS.

Frightful Chicago Calamity Caused

CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—By the falling of the

by a Falling Building. light People Killed Outright-Fire Adds

CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—By the falling of the sorth wall of the gutted John Yerkes building, 780 Halstead street, this morning the two-story frame building adjoining was crushed and three families wiped out of existence. The dead are: John Kunze, jeweler; Mrs. Kunze, John Smith, saloon-keeper, Dolly Smith, Faith Smith, Hattie Smith, a servant named Pauline and George A. Smith, bartender in Smith's saloon. She wall was shaken by the high wind. When the fall came the frame buildings adjoining were crushed and covered by debris, and those within had no chance to escape. The ruins took fire. It is impossible to get on to the debris to attempt the work of rescue, and the firemen were compelled to throw water on the smoking ruins, knowing that their work might be ending the life of some unfortunate lying half dead in the wreckage. In the building No. 763 was the family of John Kunze, who kept a jewelry store on the ground floor. The family consisted of the father, mother and son. The weight of the wall demolished the little frame structure, and they died in their beds without a sign. Their bodies are still in the wreckage. The building No. 761 was occupied on the ground floor by the saloon of John Smith, with his family, he occupied the second story. In this structure, which received the weight of the top of the wall, the greatest loss of life occurred. The family consisted of John Smith and his wife and their children, Dolly aged 12 years, Faith aged 10, and Hattie 4 years, the servant Pauline and the building became a mass of splinters, brick and mortar. The fire, which broke out from an overturned stove as soon as the wreok occurred, showed through the ruins in tongues of flame and masses of smoke, betraying the destruction beneath. After the fire was under control the work of rescue began. The first person taken out was Frank Kunze, the 21-year-old son of the jeweler. He was pinned down by a heavy door that had fallen across him. Near where Kunze was found they heard groans, and the debris was rapidly cleared away. In door that had fallen across him. Near where Kunze was found they heard groans, and the debris was rapidly cleared away. In a bent position Mrs. Smith was lying beneath a portion of the wall. This made it all the more difficult to extricate her, and it was 15 minutes before she was lifted out. She was carried into a drug store in a dying condition. Her skull was crushed and arm

Yerkes' establishment was burned out Yerges establishmen was but the morning of Jan. 11, entailing a loss of \$285,000. During the fire the three-story brick structure adjoining, owned by Mrs. C.R. Lott, was partly demolished by the falling of the south wall of the Yerkes building.



The bargain entered into by the Nova Scotian Government to secure millions of dollars of United States capital for the working of the coal mines may be either good or bad; it is no business of the Ottawa Parliament or of the Governor-General to interfere with it. Legislatures are not ordinarily made up of babies, to be held in leading strings, or school boys, to be kept in check by pedagogues, however high they may rate their capabilities. The bargain has been put through the Nova Scotia Legislature by a majority of 74 to 9, and there is an Upper House in that Province which passed the measure without a dissenting voice. Under these circumstances, and especially after the snub administered to the intermeddlers by Lord Stanley and by his chief adviser, further interference with this bargain either by members of Parliament or by any other outside persons would savor of impertinence.

The total shipments to Europe for 1892 were 8,541 tous, and towards the end of the year, when a fair demand sprang up in the United fair demand sprang up in the United States for the lower grades, about 2,000 tons of ground material were shipped to lake ports. LEPROSY IN CANADA. The terrible nature of the disease of leprosy, which still lingers in New Bruns-

wick, is made evident by the report of the Dominion Minister of Agriculture, just laid before Parliament. Dr. A. C. Smith, the inspecting physician at the leprosy hospital at Tracadie, states that there are the same number of inmates as in 1891, fourteen being males and eight females. Nine of the patients are in the early stages of the disease, the remainder are in various advanced stages, the disease running its usual course till death supervenes. During the past year three patients died, and three new cases were admitted; one from Nequa, one from Caraquet and one from the vicinity of Tracadie. In the latter district, Dr. Smith reports the disease as having died out, only one suspected case being there to his knowledge. The new admissions are from outlying districts and families who had previously removed from Tracadie. In his report for this year, Dr. Smith does not speak as hopefully as he did last year of stamping out the disease. He says, while on a tour of inspec-tion during 1892, he found leprosy cropping out in unexpected places, and he fears that for years to come new cases will be met with, and that only by permanent deten-tion and isolation can it be kept in check or stamped out, as the disease is now known to spread from centers of contagion and to gain a foothold without attracting atten tion. This shows the necessity for the utmost vigilance on the part of the authorities, and emphasizes the gravity of the statement made by the hospital doctor, to the effect that three persons suffering from leprosy are still at large in the Province. The question is why have they not been compelled to the hospital? If insolation is not compulsory, one need not be surprised to find leprosy hard to suppress, even though it is not indigenous to New Brunswick or any other part of Canada. Dr. Smith urges the necessity of a new building with modern improvements and conveniences for lepers, the present building being 40 years old and inadequate to the requirements of this loathsome disease, principally from its low ceilings and want of means of proper ventilation. He states that more cubic feet should be allowed each patient than is customary in ordinary hospitals, and he points to the necessity of separate wards in which to insolate contagious or infectious diseases from others that constantly occur among the patients, citing in support of this, the outbreak during the past year, of erysipe-las, which for want of such insolation, ran through both male and female wards.

DISTRESS AMONG STRIKERS.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Great suffering exists in Oldham owing to the prolonged struggle between the master cotton spinners and the operatives. The number out of employment alone at Oldham is 34,000. Thousands of these are destitute of food and shelter, only those who belong to the Operatives' Union receiving union aid. Prolonged cold weather has caused bitter suffering to multitudes of those out of work, and the frost and snow linger with a persuffering to multitudes of those out of work, and the frost and snow linger with a persistence that points to fatal suffering unless relief speedily comes. The relief authorities are over-burdened with demands upon them, and private charity has been exhausted by the continual and increasing drain since last November. Oldham has not seen such misery since the time of the American war, when the scarcity of cotton caused thousands of Lancashire operatives to be thrown out of employment.



Alleged Bogus Masons.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Feb. 27.—Last week an order calling themselves the Ancient and Accepted Scottisk Rite held a meeting at Utica and claimed to be conferring the 33rd degree. John Hodge, of this city, junior grand warden of the Grand Lodge of Masons of New York State, in an interview denounced the organization as a bogus or illegitimate Masonic hody. He held that it was not recognized by either the northern or southern jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite Masons, and had no business to confer the 33rd or any other degree. Mr. Hodge said: "Gen. Henry L. Palmer, of Milwankee, is the commander-in-chief of the northern jurisdiction, and I was appointed deputy commander for this State. This illegitimate body has imposed on a good many, and inasmuch as it has had its election of officers and conferring degrees published throughout the country, it would seem right to expose it."

Taxation Reform in Victoria, B. C.

Some remarkable developments took place at the recent civic elections in Victoria, B. C. For the first time in the history of the Province an avowed single tax man has entered the arena of polities and proclaimed to the people the principles for which he and his fellows contend, and for which they intend to work until the whole people realize that by the present system of axation industry is discouraged, capital driven to other fields for investment, and labor impoverished for lack of opportunity taxation industry is discouraged, capital driven to other fields for investment, and labor impoverished for lack of opportunity to exert itself. As far as possible, the relief from taxation of buildings and other improvements was made a leading issue in the municipal elections in the city of Victoria, and the extent of its success may be judged from the fact that each candidate regarded it as of great importance that some action should be taken towards reducing, if not wiping off altogether, the taxation upon the people's enterprise.

The attainment of this object will depend upon the way in which the new city council of Victoria redeems its pledges to the electors. Eight councilors out of nine are pledged to reform in this direction, whilst a majority, including the mayor, are pledged to total abolition of taxes on buildings and other improvements on real estate. This does not mean that these taxes will be abolished by the council, because the first step



Interesting Address by Rev. Principal Austin, of St. Thomas.

The school room of the Centennial Methodist Church was well filled last night, the occasion being a lecture by Rev. Principal Austin, of St. Thomas, on "Only a Woman." Rev. B. Clement occupied the chair, and called upon Misses Webber and Carrie for a duet, which was ably rendered. The speaker was then introduced in a few brief remarks. In opening his address he referred to the work Dr. Newman has done for the advancement of women. In many places her life was not her own, her property was not her own, and her existence had no pleasure. He gave as one instance the women of Belgium, where, he said, they were hitched to a cart with a dog in order to draw the produce to market. In China they fared no better, and in that country where money could not purchase a boy, girls and women could be bought for a very small sum. The speaker maintained that women's duties are in the household, and no matter what may be done by her outside, at the polls or elsewhere, it was not to be compared with that of the home. As tegards the advancement of women in the United States, at the last census they were engaged in over 300 various occupations, while some 50 years ago these occupations numbered less than 80. Women should be secured the privilege

The speaker then gave several national sayings in regard to women, and considered the Chinese as the worst, which read, "Woman's sword is her tongue, and she never lets it rust." The lecturer referred to the alleged deficiency of women in wit and humor, but before concluding had the audience convinced that they were fully equal to the male sex.

At the conclusion of the lecture a duet was sung by Misses Edgecombe and Crocker.
