THE AMERICAN JUBILEE FUND. London, Aug. 10 .- The American jubilee fund, started for the purpose of raising money to establish beds in perpetuity in the chief London hospitals, has been closed. The subscriptions exceed \$21,500. The Queen has written to the secretary of the fund, declaring that she is touched by and grateful for the deeply sensible kindness thus evinced and greatly pleased that the handsome sum realized is to be devoted to such a purpose as endowing beds in hospitals.

THE DEATH OF CANOVAS. London, Aug. 10.-Foreign commen upon the assassination is less occupied with the political than with the anarchist aspects of the case. The press of all countries gives vent to the strongest denunciation of the crime. La Patrie declares that all the plans of such murders have been arranged in London, and suggests that the powers should combine to watch the country that protects these criminals. The Berliner Tageblatt asserts that Golli was chosen by ballot for the deed by the London Central Anarchist Society.

A HOT FIGHT. London, Aug. 10 .- An official dis patch from Simla reports that the British force of cavalry, infantry and artillery, which was sent from Pesha- | the Emperor of Germany, who gave the war yesterday to punish the rebels in the Mohomand country, who, under the Mullah, attacked Fort Shabkadr, eighteen miles from Peshawar, on Saturday, has overtaken them and de feated them after a hard fight. The British, under Col. Woon, were mo-mentarily repulsed, but a brilliant charge by the Bengal cavalry turned the tide of battle. The losses of the British were 12 killed and 48 wounded, the latter including three officers.

Cairo, Aug. 10 .- The column of troops commanded by Col. Hunter, of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition up the Nile, which left Morani on July 29, attacked Abu Hamid at 5:30 a.m. Aug. 7. after eighteen hours' march Some severe house-to-house fighting followed, and the place was captured by the expeditionary force. Two British officers were killed during fighting. Abu Hamid is the first ob-Jective point of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition now operating against Khartoum. The railroad which has been extended along the Nile route from Wady Halfa will now be connected with Abu Hamid, from whence there is open water in the Nile to Berber and Khartoum, near which place the khalifa is concentrating his

CAUTIOUS ABOUT KLONDIKE. London, Aug. 10.-If reports speak true, the British public is not jumping at the Klondike bait with the eagerness expected by the company promoters. No one doubts the abundant richness of the district in gold, but the newspapers counsel caution, owing to the great difficulties of transport. Sir Louis Davies went further. At enby on Saturday he actually warned investors not to place their money schemes for the development of the Klondike gold fields. This official setback is resented in some city quarters. As yet six Klondike compan been advertised, with a total capital of £1,000,000. Most of them are regarded as very speculative. WHEAT DEAR IN AUSTRIA. London, Aug. 10 .- A dispatch from Vienna says that unfavorable harvest prospects in Austria-Hungary, which have been aggravated by the floods. have caused a rapid rise in the prices of cereals, which are now higher than for many years. This is especially the case with wheat, which was freely offered a month ago for autumn delivery at six florins per cental. now purchased at eleven. W view of allaying anxiety, the Hun-garlan minister of agriculture has issued a report to the effect that th ndition of crops is less unfavorable than was supposed. The total wheat yield is computed at 27,000,000 metric centals. This, however, is far below the average, and will leave almost no margin for exports, whereas Hungary usually exports 12,000,000.



Frauds on the Customs Render Change in the Regulations Necessary.



Everyone in Canada knows that the statement that Canada is the place where filled cheese comes from is absolutely without foundation. There is a law in the Dominion prohibiting the manufacture, importation, and export of filled cheese. There is a law preventing the adulteration of cheese. And so great confidence have Canadians in the quality of their dairy products, that at last session of parliament a law was passed making it compulsory that every cheese exported from Canada should be branded "Canadian." dairymen, and those charged with the making and carrying out of our laws. Canada's cheese imports into the United Kingdom are greater than all the rest of the world put together, and the last thing that our people would tolerate would be the destruction of those interests, by the shipment of "filled cheese." Cart and Pack Trail to the Yukon Proposed.

First Discoveries Made by Canadians-Some of the Distances.

Edmonton, N. W. T., Aug. 10.-Public meetings at Edmonton, Fort Sas-katchewan and St. Albert have passed resolutions calling upon the government to take measures this fall to open up a cart and pack trail to the Yukon by Lesser Slave Lake, Peace River, and the valley of the Nelson, Liard and Pelly Rivers. A pack trail now exists to Fort Liard, 500 miles from Edmonton, thence across the mountains to Pelly River, 450 miles by way of the Liard Valley. The boat route is well known and the land is known to be fairly passable as the mountains are but no traveled land route exists The Valley of Pelly is easily passable The total distance to the Klondike by this route is 1,400 miles, and the route could be rushed through this fall if the government acts promptly.
