Petrograd, Oct. 11.—With the an-ouncement of the new cabinet omes the statement emanating from Government source, that prepar-ons for the removal of the Government to Moscow have been stop-ped, as there is no prospect that such removal will be necessary in the near future. No reason for the abandonment or the evacuation plan is forthcoming, but it is generally ned that the improvement in the political outlook is the cause. Petrograd, Oct. 11.-The new Govern ment has begun the task of rebuilding the breaches in the country's economic and military lines created by the political uncertainty since the Bolsheviki uprising in July.

Washington, Oct. 11.—The machinery of the food administration was Washington, Oct. 11.—The machinery of the food administration was set in motion today to complete preparations for Government control by November 1 of twenty of America's principal foodstuffs. Authority to assume supervision over the leading articles of diet is vested in Herbert Hoover by a proclamation of President Wilson issued last night.

Under the terms of the order license will be required for the manufacture of the process of the facture, storage and distribution of flour, bread, meats, potatoes, sugar, milk, butter and dairy products, canned foods, rye, staple vegetables, and other stipulated commodities.

Farmers and small dealers are specially exempted. Decision to extend food control to the foodstuffs mentioned was founded on a determination to prevent unusual profits and eliminate and speculation.

Washington, Oct. 11.—American salling vessels yesterday were forbidden by the shipping board to sail for the war zone. A request of French Government representatives that several ships already loaded be permitted to clear was denied, and all such craft were directed to discharge their cargoes for transfer to steamers soon to be commandeered. The exports council recently decided to issue no further license; for shipments to the war zone on salling vessels, and the war risk insurance bureau for a long time has denied insurance to such ships. Washington, D. C., Oct. 11.—A general conference of the country's coal operators at Pittsburg October 23 has been called by J. D. A. Morrow, secretary of the National Coal Association, for the purpose, it was announced, of helping the fuel administration avert a coal famine.

"We want to insure," said the announcement, "the best work possible on the part of the coal-mining industry during the fall and winter months and throughout the war. The coal producers wish to co-operate with the fuel administration in the most effective manner possible to prevent any serious coal shortage.

ountry points.

Ontario breeders will be particularly interested in the free freight policy included in the minister's announcement. Under this policy female cattle under two years of age and ewes under three years or younger may be shipped from any Canadian stockyards to local points without the payment by the purchaser of freight charges on same. By arrangement with the railway companies 25 per cent of these charges will be rebated by the railroads, and the remaining 75 per cent will be collected by the railway 'companies direct from the Dominion livestock branch. The shipper will be required to make a declaration that he is a bona fide farmer and that the stock so returned is for his own use, or that of his neighbors, and is for breeding purposes only. Representatives of the Dominion livestock branch, who are now employed in connection with other work at the different stockyards, will be prepared to render assistance to shippers in assembling their consignments, if so desired.

Farmers who are in a position to handle additional cattle for feeding purposes this winter or for finishing on grass next summer will receive a rebate of 25 per cent of freight charges paid on any carload shipment which they may purchase on eastern stockyards. This rebate is being granted by the railroad companies following regulations made by Mr. Burrell regulations of the country.

Owing to the scarcity of feed in many parts of Western Canada this fall, there has been a heavy run of stocker and feeder cattle cattle in the Winnipeg yards during the past few weeks. In view of the fact that feed conditions in Eastern Canada are so satisfactory and the demand for feeding is so general, the Dominion department of agriculture has agreed to pay 50 per cent of the freight rate paid on carload shipments of feeding cattle from the Winnipeg stockyards consigned to country points in Eastern Canada. This concession will be applicable to both drovers and farmers alke. Shippers consigning to eastern stockyards from the Winnipeg yards will not be entitled to this reduction, however.

As yet there has been no noticeable As yet there has been no noticeable increase in the mail for overseas troops, and it is expected that the big rush will occur during November.

Many inquiries are being made as to the right time for mailing. In regard to statements appëaring in the press to the effect that all parcels should be in by October 1, postofice officials state that this is not correct. "About the middle of thovember will be the time for the people to send their parcels, although it would facilitate our work tremendously were the people to begin sending parcels now," said an official.

begin sending parcels now," said an official.

Unforeseen transportation difficulties might deter mail from reaching the troops about the end of November, and one is taking a chance by waiting until late to send parcels. Parcels for troops in the United Kingdom must not be over 11 pounds, and are subject to the parcels post rate, which is 12 cents per pound or fraction thereof.

Packages intended for trops in France and Flanders must not weigh over 7 pounds. This is a rigid regulation, and any infringement of it is liable to terminate in the soldier concerned not receiving his parcel. The same rule applies to parcels sent to same rule applies to parcels sent to Egypt and Saloniki. Egypt and Saloniki.

It is particularly necessary that all parcels be securely wrapped, and the name and address of the sender written on the cover. Parcels which do not comply with these regulations will be refused, according to the postmaster.





Meatless and wheatless days have failed up to the present to reduce living expenses to the scale prevailing at the county jail during the past fhree months. Long experience made Gov. Carter an expert at economy, and during the past 90 days he has been able to sustain 168 prisoners, serving sentences totaling 3,033 days, at a cost of a little above \$300. The cost of keeping one prisoner for a day was 1617 cents. With luxuries, such as tea, sugar, milk, tobacco and butter added, the cost increased to 10.45 cents. Half a barrel of salt was used, at a cost of 63 cents.





Practical Housekeeping Hints

Substitutes for Meat

Meat has always been considered the best tissue or flesh building food, and for this reason people have always eaten it a great deal. Most of our meat has come from the Western Provinces, but the tremendously large ranches of twenty years ago are gradually being cut up into small farms and cattle are not being raised in such large numbers any more. This is one reason why meat costs so much. Another reason is the great demand there is for it on the part of our people-who do not know that there are other foods that will supply the needs of the body in just the same way that meat does and which in ordinary times do not cost as much as meat. For instance, we can use fish in place of meat much more than we do.

Other foods that can be used in place of meat are eggs, milk, cream soups, cereals, peas, lentils and nuts.

Eggs should be eaten with foods that are rich in starch, such as bread and potatoes. If so eaten, they will take care of the body just as completely as meat

Milk contains heat-giving, energy-giving and tissue-building properties. Cream soups made with skim milk and the pulp of vegetables can take the place of meat.

Cereals contain in varying proportions all the elements necessary to support life. They contain a great deal of starch, which is valuable as an energy giver. Oatmeal and corn-meal contain more fat than the other cereals, and, therefore, make a good winter food, especially for hard-working people. Ccreaks with cooked fruits are particularly appetising.

Peas, Beans and Lentils are richer in flesh-building elements than any other vegetable and can be used in place of meat. Lentils are more easily digested than either peas or beans. If properly pre-pared, all these make very appetising dishes. A dish of baked beans costing about 20 cents, will furnish a family of six with more nourishment than two pounds of beef costing 50 cents.





OFFICERS URGE ELIGIBLES TO GO UP EARLY TAYLOR DRUGBARGAINS

Military Authorities Recom-Speedy Examination Under Draft Laws.

SELECT REPRESENTATIVES

Militia Men Who Will Appear at Tribunals Are Being Picked Now.

Although the proclamation calling the young men of Canada to the colors will advisable for them to seek a medical examination as soon as possible. This is the substance of the opinion expressed by the military authorities at

militia headquarters.

There are several reasons why a man should endeavor to have his physical condition determined, it is explained. In the first place it enables him to learn his status with regard to the military service act, so that, if he is fit, he may ascertain that fact and apply for exemption. If he finds out that he is unfit he need not make a claim for exemption on any other grounds, and the simple presentation of his "medical history sheet" before the tribunal will dispense with the need of a hearing and obtain the exemption without any further trouble.

Examination Advisable.

Finally, if he considers himself unfit, and puts in a claim for exemption on that ground, he will be required to appear before a medical board anyway, so that he might as well do so now as later. It is not absolutely necessary for him to appear before a medical board before applying for exemption on any grounds, but it is considered advisable.

All the men in the country who come within the classes called out will be required to report for service, for medical examination or to claim exemption, when the proclamation is issued, whether they have been previously examined or not. That is to say, that all men who were examined before the present boards were constituted will be considered liable for service along with the rest. A man may have been considered unfit for service in the early part of the war, or may have been rejected for service then, but he may be considered fit at the present time.

Men Who Went to France Exempt.

The only exception to this is the case of the returned soldier, who has been honorably discharged after serving in France. Those who have not seen service in France must report with the rest.

The decision of the medical boards

rest.
The decision of the medical boards which are examining men at present will be considered as final, and men who are examined now will not be rewill be considered as final, and men who are examined now will not be required to report for examination again, but simply to present their medical history sheet to the exemption tribunal. Those men who are unfit, but who might be made fit by a surgical operation, will not be required to have an operation performed, according to the provisions of the act. Such operations have frequently been performed on men who desired to enlist for overseas service, but there is no provision in the act which compels men to have such an operation performed.

Picking Military Representatives.

The military representatives who will represent the military authorities at the hearings of the exemption tribunals are being selected for this district, according to military headquarters today, and it is expected that the names of the men selected will be announced about the first of next week. These representatives will not be members of the exemption boards, both of whom are civilians, but they will attend the sittings of the tribunals in the interests of the military authorities.
