

Garbarge Debentures.

The finance committee recommended to the council that the debentures for the \$50,000 garbage incinerator run 30 years instead of 20 years, as now proposed. It was pointed out by Ald. ### WORLD NOT THE DEVIL'S

Is God's World, and Right-Minde Men Who Have a Vision of Jesus Are Needed To De the Work.

"The church of today must serv nore broadly, more faithfully, the fraternalism of men, especially the laboring men, if it would reach the high standard of efficiency that the world of today demands of it," said Prof. Walter G. Fiske, dean of Oberlin College Oberlin, Ohio, in an after-dinner address to the members of the London Ministerial Alliance in the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday night. He strongly favored church union.

Saturday evening Prof. Fiske was
the guest of the Ministerial Alliance at
a banquet at the Y. M. C. A. There
was a large attendance of the local
clergy, and following the address a
short discussion on some of the problems mention by Dean Fiske was held.

Defeat of Reciprocity.
In opening his address, Dean Fiske
made a slight reference to the late reciprocity pact.
