When pulling the weapon for a third time, Leclerc was overpowered by Armand Lavoie, who was nearby, and subsequently handed over to the police.

It was decided at yesterday afternoon's meeting to create a national council, which will carry into effect resolutions that are passed and prepared for a similar congress to be held three years' hence.



The Former U. S. Ambassador Furnishes Details Regarding Conference

WITH AMERICAN OFFICIALS

Declares France and England Did Not Want Peace in 1916.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—Count Johann von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States, who yesterday was the principal before the commit-tee investigating the responsibility of German officials in causing the out-break of the great war, resumes his testimony today

While on the stand yesterday, Count von Bernstorff told of the efforts made by President Wilson in 1914 and 1916 to find a way to bring peace proposals before the allied governments. German peace tentatives, made from time to time, however, handicapped Mr. Wilson, in the opinion of the former ambassador, being construed by the allies as evidence of weakness on the part of Germany. It was Count von Bernstorff's impression that Mr. Wilson intended to propose a temporary peace which would not touch on the territorial issues and would leave major problems connected with peace to a conference of belligerents. In 1916, the witness said, President Wilson was in a position to propose "peace without victory," but he declared, Mr. Wilson deferred action because of the sentiment against Germany in the United States at that time.







Hopes Not Glowing. Hopes of a workable home rule bill are not glowing. The Ulsterites profess to believe that the Government merely expects to launch some scheme to conciliate American and colonial opinion. With Republicans in the majority in southern Ireland they might ignore any British plan for an Irish ignore any British plan for an Irish Parliament as the Sinn Fein members refuse to recognize the British Parliament. A vaccine has lately been discovered by which a child can be made immune to whooping cough. This vaccine consists of dead whooping cough germs which are hypodermically injected into the patient. After this procedure it is believed that a child has one chance out of twelve to contract whooping cough. In fact, it has been found that in time of an epidemic, if there is no vaccination against whooping cough, three out of every four children have contracted the disease.

SUFFERER, London, Ont.: Q.—What can I do for head noises?

A.—An examination must be made to determine whether it is middle ear disease, high blood pressure, wax, hardening of the ear bones or other things. Head noises and deafness may be benefited by a small electric vibrator used in the ear. 




