Official Who Resigns From Organization Declares That Objects of Association Include Distribution of Foodstuffs for Unemployed, Share in Profits Made by Employers, and a Demand That Work Be Provided for All.

Hamilton, Jan. 21.—The disquieting information that a radical body, known as the International Soldiers' and Workers' Association, which aimed to establish a form of soviet rule in Canada, had been organized and operating here for more than two weeks, leaked out this morning. An official who resigned from the body's executive on Saturday, declared that in two weeks the association had obtained a membership of nearly 300. Its aims include a distribution of foodstuffs for the unemployed, a just share for the workers of all profits made by employers, a demand that employers be compelled to provide work for all, and in case they refused, that the factories be taken and operated by the workers.

Meetings of the association have been held during the past two weeks in a basement in the northeastern section of the city, and have been attended by men of both foreign and British extraction. On securing sufficient funds it is intended to send delegates to every city in the country to organize branches of the association.







German Skagerrak Commander Says London Is Sparring for Time.

WEIMAR, Germany, Jan. 30. - Admire: Scheer, whom at least half the world regards as one of the greatest leaders in naval war history, today for the first time since the signing of peace granted a newspaper interview. For the benefit of American readers I sought and obtained the opinion of





Auto Factory To Employ 3,000 Men

Works Will Be Located on Hale Street—Start Building Soon—Will Assemble Cars at Temporary Plant.

Plans for a large automobile factory that will employ nearly 3,000 men when at its maximum production, and which will be erected on Hale street, near the G. T. R., are practically completed. Work will be commenced as soon as possible. President W. R. Stansell, of London Motors, Limited, which company is developing the new plant, stated that the construction will be rushed as quickly as possible, as there is a great demand for the type of auto which will be turned out by the local factory.

In the meantime the company is preparing to assemble cars in the down-town showrooms at the corner of King and Ridout streets. The service and sales departments will be permanently utilized for the present as an assembly plant.

It is confidently expected that from six to ten cars a day will be turned out from the first. The output will be doubled within a year, and it is anticipated it will increase quickly thereafter. The machinery and equipment necessary for the assembling plant are now on the way to London. As soon as this arrives it will be installed, and actual operations will commence. Then as soon as the east end factory can be completed

In deciding to locate in London Mr. Stansell concluded that this city offered greater advantages than could be found in any other centre of Ontario.



In Toronto, Windsor, Detroit and the other large industrial centres the unemployment situation is "appalling," while London merchants and businessmen generally are finding business well up to the average; and in many instances much above that of previous years. This is pretty strong evidence of the healthy business commences in London.

Work in the down-town factory will commence within a few weeks at the latest. Some alterations are being made to the building to prepare for the machinery that is expected to arrive shortly. Mr. Stansell states that the market is open for the car now, and he does not anticipate any difficulty in selling all that can be turned out. In fact, his only fear is that it may be impossible for the plant to expand quickly enough that the demand for the output may be satisfied.

Speaking generally, Russia's exsources that has remained largely will be handicapped by the lack of transportation facilities, it is expected to grow rapidly. Cotton, flax and hemp are other commodities of which there are large stocks that can be exported. The factories of Russia have been working so slowly since the revolution that they have not begun to absorb the stocks of these raw materials that were produced. It is stated that the Russian cotton factories (excluding those of Poland and the Baltic provinces) are today producing only six per cent of what they were producing before the war. In the warehouses of Turkestan there are eight million poods of cotton today with a yearly surplus of two millions in Turkestan, and an annual consumption by the Russian mills of but three million poods. An export of five million poods would still leave a three years' supply.

The Russian linen industry stated to be in a healthier condition than the cotton industry, although only running at 40 per cent capacity. The fact that the raw material is produced close to the mills accounts for the greater activity in this industry. Before the war the Russian linen factories consumed three million poods of flax per annum, while now they are using just over a million poods yearly. There is thus a surplus available for export, even should there be a revival of the linen industry.

BARBADOS, A JEWEL ISLE, BASKS IN SUN

parts of the world more agreeable as a permanent residence.

It is the ambition of perhaps 90 percent of the Barbadian blacks to take up permanent residence in the United States. And it is the ambition of the Barbadian government to have them do so. A few thousands have managed to raise the price of a ticket to New York, Philadelphia, New Orleans or Boston, and a good many of those that are left are trying to save up enough to emulate their example. American Consul Watson and Mr. Hunt, the vice consul, told me during the 24 hours' stay of the battleship Florida at Bridgetown that hundreds of Barbadian blacks apply for permission to go to the United States as soon as they have raised the price. Newspapers and passengers from the States have brought word of the high wages paid to domestic and unskilled labor in North America.

No Servant Problems.

Reports that common labor, for which the Barbadian is splendidly equipped, is paid as much as \$4 and \$5 a day in the States have naturally had the effect of increasing the desire of the Barbadian black to make his way to the land of promise and profit. of increasing the desire of the Barbadian black to make his way to the land of promise and profit.

Most of the common laborers of Barbados count themselves exceedingly lucky if they can earn \$5 a week. Masons, carpenters, painters and other craftsmen engaged in building ventures receive from \$1 to \$1.40 a day.

Canadian housewives harassed by the scarcity, indolence and high wages demanded by domestic servants, probably will envy their white sisters in the Barbados, who can hire a good cook for \$8 a month and the most competent maid at from \$5 to \$10. A chauffeur earns from \$4 to \$7 a week, takes care of the car he drives and makes most of the repairs. Farm hands receive what the employing planter wants to pay him, which is all the way from a minimum of \$7 to \$15 a month for extra competent help.

Cost of Living Low.

Instead of having to stand in line at an employment agency to obtain a carpenter, a cook, a valet or a maid, a painter, or a farm hand, all of whom are willing to work 10 and even 12 hours a day, a businessman or housewife can go into the picturesque mob of blacks that daily congregate in Trafalgar Square at Bridgetown, make known his needs—and probably have to call in the police to fight off the applicants for the job that he has to offer. 
