

He says further, when the independence party's programme is realized all differences between Austria and Hungary will dis-

The interview with Emperor Francis Joseph is regarded in Austria and Hungary as an historical event, he-cause it is believed it will actually lead closer relations between the house of Hapsburg and those Hungarian who have been opposed to the existing double form of government. It hoped that the near future may sec the establishment of a system of international life between Austria and Hungary which ultimately will lead to relations similar to those existing between Norway and Sweden. In substance, the independence party's programme is the complete independence of Hungary from Austria as a nation, any other class of workmen. but Hungary's continuance under the personal sovereignty of the head of the house of Hapsburg and mutual protective unity between the two nations. They marked a great advance toward the goal of universal peace, by providing that "differences of a legal nature or relating to the interpretation of treaties," should be referred to arbitration, without legislative action. Agreements of this nature were negotiated between President Roosevelt and the five powers mentioned. But the Senate, by a vote of 50 to 9, inserted an amendment requiring the sanction of the Senate before the submission any question to arbitration. The amendment reduced the treaties to a sham. Their value lay in the obligatory arbitration of disputes of a certain character, so that these would be



#### NORTH SEA CASE: RUSS AUTOCRACY EVIDENCE ALL IN

Paris, Feb. 13. - The international commission which is inquiring into the North Sea incident today heard the conclusion of the British and Russian agents upon the testimony presented.
