TRAPPED BY FLAMES 22 CHILDREN PERISH SQUABBLE ENDED

This Is What H. S. Clements Protestant School In Mont. the system of having large corridors real Destroyed By

CAUSED BY EXPLOSION

Lady Principal Dies At Her Post After Heroic Effort To Save Children

Montreal, Feb. 27.—Twenty-twe scholars and their teachers are dead from suffocation as the result of a fire which broke out in the Hochelags Protestant School, 59 Prefontaine street, yesterday afternoon.

The school was a brick building, about 15 years old, situate at 59 Prefontaine street, on the east side, above 8t. Catharine street.

The fire broke out at 1.45 o'clock yesterday afternoon, caused by the explosion of the furnace in the basement. It spread very quickly, and the water pressure was very weak.

Flames sprang up to the roof and burned fiercely on the second floor, completely cutting off the retreat of Miss Maxwell and the children in an upper room. Miss Maxwell herself threw half a dozen of her charges out of the window and only gave up when absolutely helpless.

The children were accustomed to fire drill regularly every week. On discovering the fire the gong was at once rung, but for some reason, not yet explained, did not sound. There were 250 pupils in the school at the time. The bigger boys and girls succeeded in escaping from the school, but it was the little children and particularly those of the kindergarten class whe were caught.

Alarmed Older Pupils.

The fire was first seen by one of the scholars, William Gilbert, who had left the class-room to fetch a cake of soap. He saw smoke coming from the cellar and at once ran back to notify Miss Maxwell. The principal gave the alarm in all the class-rooms and ran upstairs to the kindergarten department. There she met her death.

POSTAL REFORM. The Postmaster General boats of

surplus of \$800,000 for his department in the last year's revenue.

The member for Halton, Mr. Honderson, is quite right in saying that

this surplus belongs in the main to the country post masters and the mail carriers. Had they been adequately paid during the last four or five years of great prosperity, those years when the cost of living has advanced, Mr. Henderson questioned whether the postmaster general's sur-plus would not have been cut in

In some of the small offices attendance is expected at all hours of the day to sell postage stamps and receive and deliver mail matter, and possibly the salary does not amount to more than \$25. He thought this country is too big and too rich to ask any man or woman to act as postmaster for such a sum. Mr. Henderson instanced the case of a village in his own county with a revenue of about \$3,000. Mails have to be made up for and sent out to three near-by post offices. The forwarding allowance for this services is \$11 per annum. "It is three cents a day, the former price of a postage stamp," he said.

The hon, member recounted how the large surplus has been accumulated. "We know that when the change was made from three cents to two cents it was only a partial change. The three-cent stamp afterwards became a two-cent stamp, but the city postage remained the same, two cents and all through the country where there was a one-cent stamp system, a onecent postage, it remained one cent. We have often heard it said that the postage was reduced one-third. That is absolutely incorrect. It was only reduced one-third on one class of postage, that is, on the regular postage through the country between post of fice and post office, and to Great Britain. But there was no decrease in the cities where there was a regular two-cent rate, and there was no decrease in the country where there was a one-cent rate.

"Now I wish to draw attention to this fact. The drop letter system in the country is used very much more than it formerly was by business men in rendering their accounts through the post office and in sending out circulars. It is used immensely throughout the country. The post office, I take it, is kept up for the benefit of the people. But why tax the people for a drop letter one-half the rate that you tax a man for sending a letter to Great Britain, or indeed to Hong Kong? I think the Postmaster General can meet the wishes of the prople by reducing that one-cent rate ot half a cent. There is no reason in the world why, with our large revenue from the post office department, that should not be done. The post office department should never be made a revenue producing department, because the moment you do that you make it a tax upon the people, just as much as if you were to put an increased duty on sugar. I do not think the post office department is intended to be a revenue producing department beyond its normal requirements. I think if the Postmaster General will look at it in the same light I do, he will give the people in towns and villages the benefit of a half-cent rate instead of 'a one-cent rate,"

What the Postmaster General should do with his surplus is to improve the postal system by granting mail deliveries where they are most needed. This is something which H. S. Clements, M. P., has advocated ever since his election in West Kent -Free Rural Mail Delivery, and he has only recently pointerd out from the floor of the House that Kent is a very fitting place for the Government to start this much-needed re form. He has also taken up the matter of a mail delivery for Chatham, and it is confidently expected that something beneficial to the people of this county will result from his carnest appeals.

glass was shattered throughout the city by the explosion.



The remarkable growth of tramway traffic in the United Kingdom is indicated in a return issued by the Board of Trade. The following figures show the extent of the progress made since 1878:

Passengers, 1878, 146,000,000; 1908 2,236,000,000. Net receipts, 1878, £220,966; 1906, £3,807,415. Capital expenditure, 1878, £4,207,350; 1906. £58,177,332.

The popularity of electric traction, both overhead and conduit, may be gauged from the fact that of the total number of miles open only 246 are not worked by electricity.

Local authorities owning and working their tramway undertakings made a net profit of £2,530,752 on last year's traffic, out of which they applied £663,366 towards the reduction of tramway debt and £205,981 in relief of rates, while carrying £623,817 to reserve and renewal funds.

In regard to the London County Council tramways the total length of line open to March 31 last year was fifty miles on the northern system and fifty-three miles on the southern system. The number of passengers carried was 185,524,689. The cars covered a distance of no fewer than 15,797,562 miles in the course of the year.

The number of miles run by all the tramcars in the kingdom was 244,149,464.

MCLEAN AND FREIGHT RATES

Premier Opposes House Secretary Haldane Outlines Going Into Committee On Bill

AGAINST 2 CENT RATE THE BRITISH ARMY

Ottawa, Feb. 26.—The bill introduc-by W. F. Maclean (South York), amend the Railway Act by estab-

Ottawa, Feb. 26.—The bill introduced by W. F. Maclean (South York), to amend the Railway Act by establishing a minimum passenger rate of two cents a mile, came up in the House last night upon the adverse report of the railway committee.

Mr. Maclean pointed out that during the past week the two-cent fare had been established in seven states of the American Union, and it was in course of adoption by eight other states. In all some twenty Legislatures have had the question up this winter.

winter.

No farmer present made any objection, yet members of Parliament here were constantly moaning, as friends of the farmer, that any reduction in passenger fares would add to the freight rates and greatly injure the farming community.

Duty of Parliament.
They should enjoy the same fare to be fixed by Parliament, effective everywhere in Canada. It was the duty of Parliament to shoulder this responsibility, not to evade it, or to try to hide behind a commission. The people of this country demand relief. The two-cent fare affects every citizen, it affects his pocket, it is a live question.

Admit Discrimination.

Mr. Emmerson said that the bill had been defeated in the railway committee. He admitted discrimination by the G.T.R. against the country east of Toronto, as in favor of the country west of Toronto. The conditions, he said, were different. The company could not afford to carry the traffic east of Toronto any cheaper. It would be unjust to ask' them to carry passengers at two cents a mile. sengers at two cents a mile.

Premier Stands By Committee.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier reminded the
House that the bill had been sent to House that the bill had been sent to the railway committee and that the committee had recommended that the bill be not passed .It was the policy of the Government to sustain and report from a select standing committee. There was no reason to make any exception in this case.

He found no argument in the action of the American States. He compared such legislation to American snelling

of the American States. He compared such legislation to American spelling and declared that the old-fashioned spelling was good enough for him. In a word, he preferred to keep the old-fashioned high fares.

R. L. Borden pointed out that the action of the Government in refusing to permit the House to go into committee was unprecedented.

E. M. Macdonald (Liberal) did not astonish the House by opposing. He moved the six months' hoist. The House divided and it carried, yeas 30, nays 37.

Without debate the House divided upon the resolution of R. L. Borden to appoint a select committee to examine into the labor question and adopted the substitute offered by Ralph Smith, declaring no investigation was needed, but asking for legislation to present strikes and lockouts. Mr. Smith's amendment carried, yeas 78, nays 40.

Mr. Hyman's Resignation.
When Mr. Hyman's sponsors tell
the people of London that Sir Wilfrid
Laurier could not do without him in the Cabinet, they are evidently going

beyond record.

When the House met yesterday Dr.
Sproule brought the matter up, saying: "I find it reported in the newspapers that "Sir Wilfrid Laurier sent a etter to Mr. Hyman insisting that Mr. Hyman should take back his resignation, because the Premier could not do without him in the Cabinet." As the correspondence which has been brought down does not con-tain any such letter, I would ask the right hon. gentleman if there is any

reason why it should not be laid on the table with the others?"

"All the correspondence I had with Mr. Hyman has been brought down," replied Sir Wilfrid.

Many Change To Be Made

London, Feb. 26.-The latest scheme for the reorganization of the British army was unfolded by War Secretary Haldane in the House of Common yesterday.

yesterday.

It contemplates dividing all the forces into two categories, a field force and a territorial or home force.

The former with 180,000 officers and men is to consist of four cavalry brigades and six infantry provisions, with a full complement of horse and field artillery, all to be ready for immediate mobilization on the outbreak of war.

mediate mobilization on the outbreak of war.

The territorial force, totaling 300,-000 men, shall be a complete army in itself, and as nearly as possible of the same pattern as the regular troops.

This plan would unite all the present auxiliary forces, yeomanry, militia and volunteers, with a complement of regular artillery, into one homogeneous body, all to be paid at service rates during the time they are used.

used.
The territorial forces would be The territorial forces would be so trained and organized as to enable their immediate mobilization simul-

their immediate mobilization simultaneously with the field forces.

The present militia principle of the county organization would govern the whole home army organization, with the army council in supreme control.

MAY BE GENERAL STRIKE.

Expiration of Three Years' Agreement Next Week May Result In Cessation of Work In Coal Mines.

Regina, Sask., Feb. 26.—Word has been received here of the prospects of a coal strike and the general tie-up of the mines, which may be ex-pected at the termination of the threeyear agreement between the operators and miners, which expires on March

next. This strike would affect every coal This strike would affect every coal mine in the mountains, Alberta and Saskatchewan. The tieing up of the Crow's Nest would mean the closing down of the supply on which the C. P. R. depends for operating their engines between the mountains and Fort William.



In order to make a special appeal to agriculturists, twenty-five farmers have just arrived from the Northwest. They are to be placed at the service of booking agents throughout the country in order to supply gratis information regarding agricultural conditions and possibilities to anyone thinking of booking passage to the Dominion.

Special attention is also being paid to the emigration of women, for whom the demand in Canada is particularly keen. Mrs. Simpson Hayes, a Western lady journalist, is for the time being in charge of this department, and is kept continually busy answering queries from aspirants to Canadian domestic work, and perhaps also to a future spouse for the lonely swains of the prairie. She has also succeeded in interesting some prominent philanthropists in this special branch of emigration work.

"Those of us who are Imperialists are not so because of a desire for gain, neither is it a desire for militarism, but it is a desire for a closer union, and for a more friendly intercourse among the various dominions and possessions of the Crown," said Principal Gordon of Queen's University when addressing the Empire Club in Toronto recently. Principal Gordon pointed out how little, after all, Canadians knew of the other possessions of Britain, and these possessions probably knew as little of Canada. The ignorance of otherwise fairly well informed people in Britain of Canadian affairs was so well known that it was not necessary to give instances. The Canadian press, excellent as it was, did not supply the information required by Canadian splative to British colonial afexcellent as it was, did not supply the information required by Canadian relative to British colonial affairs. What news the Canadian newspapers had was largely gathered and supplied by agencies which catered to other than British people. What was required to insure a better knowledge of each component part of the empire was, first, an all-British cable service constructed and operated by the Governments interested, and the establishment of bureaus to gather news in Australia, India, New Zealand, South Africs, Canada and other parts of the empire.

DISASTER

Three Passengers Killed

ROLLED DOWN THE BANK

Guelph, Feb. 27.—By the derailment of five cars of G. T. R. train No. 5 from Toronto, in Trainer's Cut, two miles east of this city, at 2.50 yesterday afternoon, three lives were lost and half a hundred passengers more or less injured. A broken rail is held accountable for the accident.

The spot where the derailment control of the co

held accountable for the accident.

The spot where the derailment occurred is about two miles east of Guelph, where there is a steep embankment, 55 feet or more in height. A few hundred yards east of a point where a sharp incline takes the place of the almost sheer declivity and is known as Trainer's Cut.

Had the wreck left the tracks here it is probable that all the passengers would have escaped with a shaking up.

gers would have escaped with a shaking up.

There is but a slight curve at the spot where the run-off happened, the rails inclining slightly to the north and then curving a trifle southward. When the engine reached the break the south rail immediately flattened out, one section or rail being projected about 50 yards to one side.

The coaches jolied along for a few yards until the north rail also spread, and after a stumbling course of about 60 yards along the ties the baggage coach, with two passenger coaches and parlor car, were wrenched away from the express car which clung to the tender, and were precipitated over the bank.

The Grand Trunk Railway issued the following official statement last

the following official statement last night:

"At about 2.50 p. m., No. 5, engine 955, Engineer Thompson, Conductor Woods, two baggage cars, two coaches and parlor car left the track on the embankment near Trainer's Cut, two miles east of Guelph. The entire train, with the exception of the engine and tender, went down the embankment. Three passengers were killed, one seriously injured, and 39 slightly injured, the names of whom are given below. Derailment caused by a broken rail.

"Immediately on advice of accident a special train, conveying surgeons, was despatched from Guelph to the seene of the accident, followed by another special corp of physicians. In addition to this a special train of coaches was immediately despatched from Toronto to take care of the pasengers; the injured were given prompt medical attention and removed to the hospital at Guelph, where everything was done for their comfort."

There were seven white passengers and about 50 negroes.

The great loss of life seemed to have been owing to the negroes having become terror-stricken and neglecting to get life-preservers, of which there were 350 on board.
