Delays are Dangerous.

The ACADIAN has repeatedly called attention to the desirability of having Main street straightened near the "bridge" and the opinion that some action should be taken has been heartily concurred in by many of the citizens. Correspondence on the same matter has frequently appeared in these columns. It has also been pointed out from time to time that the work could be done much more cheaply and satisfactorily now than after the property adjoining the street had become built upon. While it was hardly to be expected that any action would be taken under the old regime we still hope that when the town became incorporated something would be done. We have waited in vain, however, for any move to be made; and now the expected has happened. We are glad to see the laundry started in Wolfville. It will be a convenience and an addition to the industry of the town. We feel that the proprietors should be patronized and encouraged by every citizen. But the erection of their building certainly will be an obstacle to the straightening of the street and the bringing about of an improvement that has been anxiously waited for by our citizens. The adjoining property will next be occupied and added difficulties will be in the way. Surely when the citizens are agreed that the change should be made there is no occasion for delay. The condition of our streets is now the greatest problem before our people, and the "city fathers" should either do their utmost to solve it, or stand aside and let their place be filled by those who can.

Cruelty to Animals.

The ordinary man can protect himself both from want as well as from exposure; not so however with the brute beast. The man who will look after his own comforts and allow his horse to be abused is not worthy the name of man and never could be classed as a Christian. So far so good. But we have in this country—and possibly in this town—persons calling themselves men who will use—rather abuse—their animals and especially their horses, in a most cruel manner. Even in winter weather people will drive miles to church and stand their horses out in the cold, unprotected, for hours, rather than pay a paltry ten cents for the protection of the poor animal that has drawn the man and his family to the place of worship. Again many men cause one of these poor faithful dumb brutes to draw a load almost too much for two horses, and many horses are made to work when it would be even pain for them to lie on a thick bed of straw. In a Christian country like Nova Scotia—our ought to be—such cruelty should not be allowed. We have in this province a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, which has done and is doing good work, and their efforts should be upheld and persons guilty of a breach of the provisions of the act respecting the subject should be reported to this society where, sufficient proof being forthcoming, just and summary punishment should be meted out to them.

The Coming Concert.

What promises to be one of the most interesting musical events held in Wolfville for a long time, will be the Harmonic Quartette Concert, which will appear in College Hall on Friday evening, Dec. 7th under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. of this town, and in which some very noted musicians will take part. In fact there are some among the six composing the company but who are really soloists of a high order. The Toronto Saturday Night in speaking of the world wide reputation of Mr Oscar Newman, First Bass in the Quartette, says: "Mr Oscar Newman, who is now in the city, is a distinguished German vocalist. Mr Newman sang the solos at the funeral of the late Mrs Harrison, the wife of the President. Mr Newman, who formerly resided in Halifax, has been singing a great deal in Canada and the United States. He has studied with Signor Mains in Washington, and has had several offers to go on the stage but prefers solo concert singing. Mr Newman sang a solo at the Grand Liberal Banquet recently held at the Rossin House, Toronto."

Mr William J. Hutchins, the director and instrumental soloist, is also a musician of considerable repute. He has been organist at Temple church, and organist at Alexandra Palace, London, and private organist to most noble Marquis and Marchioness of Breadalbane Taymouth Castle, Scotland.

In reference to Mrs Taylor it is needless to say much. Her name has been spoken in every town in the province. She is truly the favorite contralto. The press notices which appeared in all the St. John papers regarding her appearance there last winter, were enough to convince anyone of her popularity. Nova Scotia should be proud of possessing such a sweet-souled songstress, and our enterprising ladies belonging to the W. C. T. U. should be congratulated on securing such a fine company, which we trust will be liberally patronized.

Wolfville W. C. T. U. Meeting.

"One Present" writes: On the evening of the 15th inst., the ladies of the W. C. T. U., of Wolfville, held a meeting in Patterson's hall, Lower Horton. The weather was beautiful and the audience large. The members that went by train were very cordially received by Mrs Thomas Harris and Mrs A. B. Currie, members of the union, and entertained at the beautiful home of Mrs Harris. The object of the meeting was to educate the public mind on woman's suffrage. After prayer, singing and reading of the scriptures, Mrs Crandall, with remarkable tact and felicity, and in language chaste and expressive, stated the purpose of the meeting, called upon Mrs R. Reid to read a paper on the vital subject they met to discuss. Her essay was thoughtful, carefully prepared, and presented very clearly and forcibly the reasons why the franchise should be given to women. Mrs Tufts, the president of the Wolfville branch of the union, was then introduced. The address was no ordinary one. It was full of thought, clear, persuasive and in places pathetic. The speaker manifestly believes in calling a spade a spade. Mrs Tufts spoke under considerable emotion, and at times her voice grew tremulous as she claimed humanity touched her heart. The audience heard with respectful attention her powerful advocacy of woman's ballot. The address will not soon be forgotten. In some minds, we believe, conviction was wrought and prejudice removed. One of the speakers who followed confessed to a change in his views. In fact, the whole audience seemed impressed and enlightened. Thankful for immediate rich results, may we not hope for a much larger harvest hereafter? The addresses by Rev. William Brown, Dr. Chipman and DeWitt, Mr Patterson and Professors Tufts and Jones were beautifully and strikingly corroborative of the ideas and arguments advanced by the chief speakers. Another feature of the meeting must not be omitted—the concert of sweet sounds. The violin under the touch of Miss Mamie Fitch's cunning hand, greatly enhanced the enjoyment of the audience. The solos by Mrs Witter and Mrs Crandall were well rendered and much enjoyed. The meeting was an eminently successful one, and may the meetings that are yet to be held, be equally and even more productive of good results. At the close of the meeting the ladies found at the door a large and comfortable team provided by Mr Harris to convey them to their homes in Wolfville. This is the first of a series of meetings to be held in different places.

Fair Play.

perated a somewhat remarkable article entitled "Fair Play." In it the writer informs us that some of our citizens, a government officer being one of the number, for the sake of saving a few cents, make a practice of sending to the Upper Provinces for their goods instead of patronizing local merchants, a practice which the writer considers unpatriotic and unchristian. The fact that a man whom the local government has considered intelligent enough to fill an office considers that it pays him better to buy his goods in the Upper Provinces and pay a heavy freight, rather than to procure them at home, shows pretty conclusively that the home merchants are deriving too large a profit from their wares, that they are trying to impose upon the citizens of Wolfville. This being the case, the duty of every Wolfvillian for the sake of his fellow citizens and the prosperity of his town is to do all in his power to do away with so great an imposition. There is no more effective method of accomplishing this than for the citizen to withdraw his patronage from the merchant who is so dishonourable. In so doing the individual benefits himself and the community at large. If the merchant is supported in this unjust traffic by the citizens of the town he is allowed to become wealthy at the expense of the individual and the sacrifice of the town's growth. For very few persons would be inclined to come to a town where they were compelled to pay extravagant prices for their merchandise. Instead of insult, the thanks of the town are due to the man who discovering the existence of such a traffic is enterprising enough to exert himself to abolish it.

In his article "Fair Play" the writer lays down some very extraordinary principles in political economy. For example, he states "the imperative duty of the citizen is to deal with the local merchants." Hitherto it has been generally understood that the merchant exists for the citizen not the citizen for the merchant. The merchant is a benefit to a town only as he accommodates and benefits its citizens. If the citizen is compelled to patronize the local merchant when he has to pay him more for his goods than he would the outside dealer, happy is the town without a merchant. But if the writer's political economy is astounding, his contradictory statements surprise us even more. In one paragraph he gravely informs us that the citizen who would patronize an outside dealer is unpatriotic and injurious. In the very next he speaks as follows: "This being the case it is not the duty of all patriotic citizens to spend their money at home and thus build up the prosperity of our town. But if such citizens must do this surely it is a double crime to try to induce others."

I would advise the writer if he wishes in the future to express two such contradictory statements to place them in two distinct articles, for their appearance in the same article seems to cause confusion.

Report of Directors of King's Co. Agricultural Society.

Continued.

Looking at the fruit crop of 1894, it has indeed proved a remunerative season for the fruit growers of this valley. Though the Gravensteins only netted about \$1.50 in the English market, yet the prices for hard winter fruit are likely to be good, with such a short crop in Europe. Some fall fruit has sold in the English market for 20c per barrel. There has never been such a run on the coopers before, it being almost impossible to get any number of barrels, and the stock is about exhausted until more is sawn. The plum crop was a good one, mostly marketed in 10 lb baskets, which brought 40 cents each in Halifax, or at the rate of \$2.40 per bushel. A good many bushels were disposed of in local towns at \$1.00 to \$1.50.

We still feel the necessity of the establishment of a Canning and Jam Factory to take care of the coming surplus of this perishable fruit, for there were about 3000 plum trees set out in this locality this past season, and with a great many more just coming into bearing, to do nothing of the orders taken by agents for plum trees to be delivered next spring.

Prize Play.

At the late exhibition a few of our members were successful exhibitors, more especially in fruit and flowers. There was very little stock shown from here, there seeming to be a lack of interest for some unexplained reason. As some members are interested in poultry and more ought to be, before concluding this let us glance over a report compiled by Mr George Johnson, Stationer at Ottawa, and Mr A. G. Gilbert, manager of Poultry Department, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, and see if we can't increase our revenue by a little more attention to that much neglected part of our farms, the hen house. According to the census of 1891 there were in Nova Scotia \$707,260 worth of hens and chickens, and for the whole Dominion over twelve and a half million dollars worth of hen and chickens alone. We will just confine ourselves to the Canadian hen and her fruit, the egg. In 1892-93 Nova Scotia exported 232,228 dozen of eggs valued at \$32,400, and nearly \$5,000 worth of poultry; so by these figures for that year we see that we have a small export trade already. Ontario takes the lead with a total value of exports of \$582,566 for that year, the markets being Great Britain and the States. France seems to be the greatest exporter to England, and Germany next, sixth place being given to Canada. In 1892 the U. S. imported 4,188,402 dozen of eggs, Canada supplying 95 per cent of them. In this report the estimation of the first cost of a hen is placed at 30 cents, the number of eggs per year at 150, (rather high), and the cost of feed per year 70 cents (rather low). Those contemplating a reform in this department of their farm would do well to procure that report and also must remember that a reasonably warm house is essential for success, also cheap feed, plenty of light, plenty of room and plenty of work at scratching to keep them busy and active. Far too many hens in the country are too fat, especially the Plymouth Rock. You must starve them and keep them at work; different breeds need different food and treatment. Try also to increase the size of the eggs, of course there are twelve in a dozen, but that is not what helps an export trade. The Minorca lay the largest eggs, sometimes 6 eggs to one pound, as this breed can easily be obtained here we hope that improvement will at once begin in that direction.

And now, in conclusion we hope that this winter may see more than one marketing in this hall, and well attended too; and that more good may be forthcoming as in this past year. We hope that the agricultural literature taken by this society, viz. The Canadian Stock Journal and the Country Gentleman will be well circulated and benefit received from their columns. Let us this winter try and work for the interest of our Agricultural Society, for our Creamery and for our special meetings, which we hope to call, and feel it our duty to attend them. They are instrumental in imparting knowledge on the various and aggravated problems in our calling. We don't wish all meat together, let's try and improve our minds, then, surely we can go home wiser!

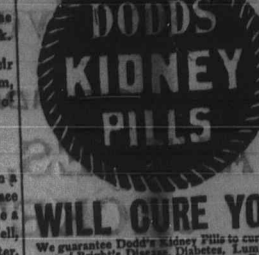
