As soon as men are off their centres their eyes show it. There are eves, to be sure, that give no more admission into the man than blue berries. There are liquid and deep wells that a man might fall into; there are asking eyes, and asserting eyes, and prowling eyes, and eyes full of faith, and some of good and some of sinister omen. The power of eyes to charm down insanity or bea ts is a power behind the eyes, and must be a victory achieved in the will before it can be suggested to the organ ; but the man at peace or unity with himself would move through



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
