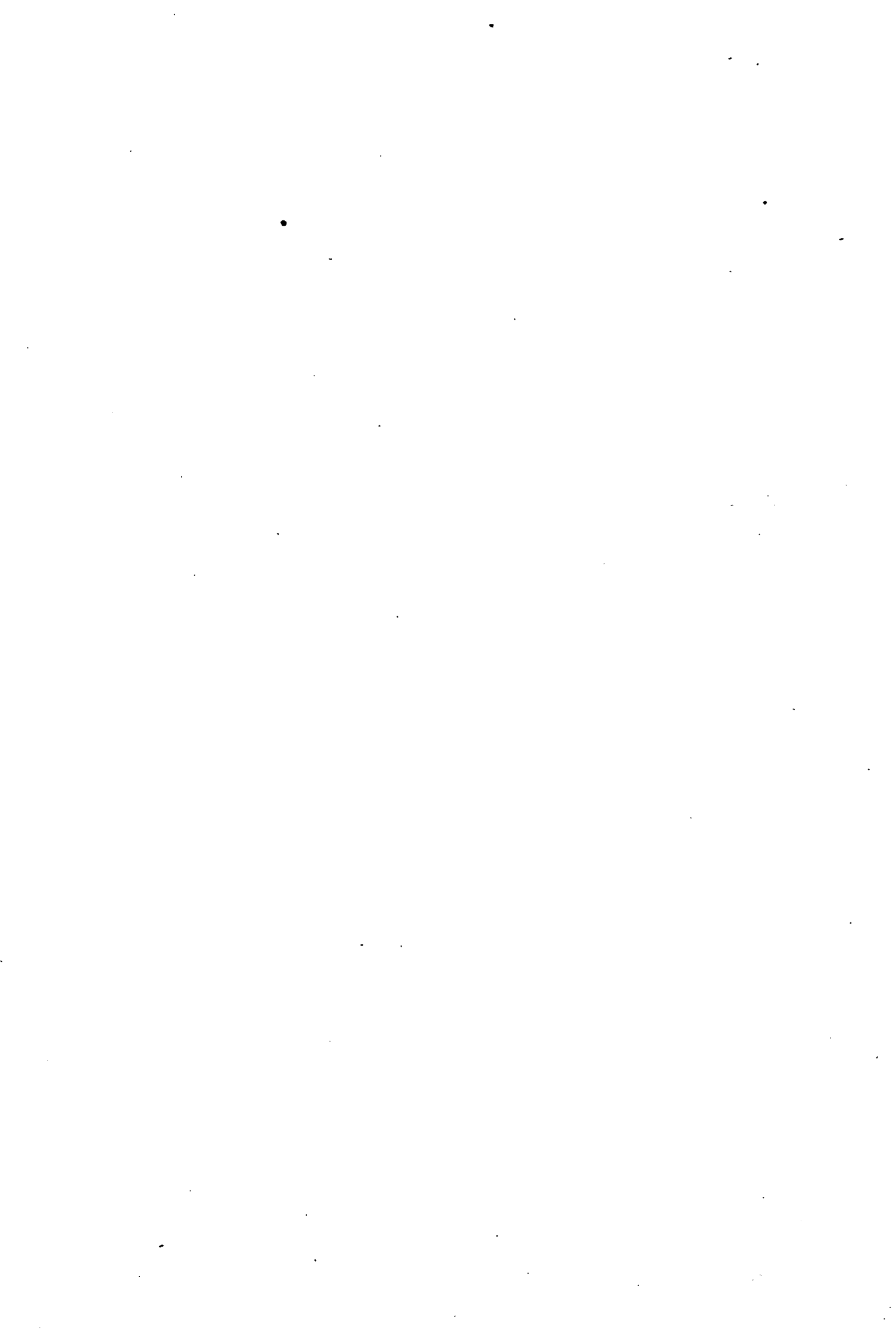

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to the third Tuesday in December instant; I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to Tuesday the twenty eighth day of January next, then to meet at Fredericton for the dispatch of business.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Fredericton, the fifth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, and in the third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. and K. C. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, &c. &c. &c.

Fredericton. Tuesday. 28th January. 1840.

THE House having been by several Proclamations prorogued until this day, then to meet for the despatch of business ; and being met—

A Message was received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned—

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to provide for the Inspection of Flour and Meal in this Province.

Leave granted.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker then reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy ; which he read to the House, and is as followeth :—

“ Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ WHEN I reflect upon the many unequivocal manifestations on the part of the Inhabitants of this loyal Province,—of their anxious desire and firm determination to remain in indissoluble connexion with that Glorious Country, “our Parent State,” under the shadow of whose protecting Power they feel themselves in the enjoyment of a degree of Rational Liberty which has probably never been attained under any other than British Institutions,—it is with, if possible, an increased degree of Pride and Satisfaction, that I again meet you in Provincial Parliament for the purpose of co-operating with you, as the Representative of a Gracious and beloved Sovereign, to whom the Happiness and Prosperity of all Classes of Her Subjects are dear, in the consideration and adoption of such Measures, as may, in our concurrent judgment, tend to increase that Happiness—to promote that Prosperity—and to call forth the varied Resources of this highly favoured Portion of Her Majesty’s Dominions.

“ Upon the actual condition of the Province, I rejoice in being enabled to offer you my hearty congratulations ;—Its Trade and consequently its Revenues and Financial Affairs are flourishing beyond any former Period. The unavoidable increase in the expenditure of the past year, owing to the Proceedings of a Neighbouring State, has been happily met by a corresponding increase of the Revenue ; accordingly I have

have the satisfaction of informing you that every demand upon the Provincial Treasury, arising out of the Emergency to which I have adverted, has been fully met, under your appropriation, by the *Surplus* Revenue of the Current year, without imposing upon me the necessity of disturbing those for other Services. The product of the Harvest though not perhaps quite equalling the sanguine expectations which were at one time entertained, has yet been such as to leave our valuable Agricultural Interests without any reasonable ground of complaint,—in a word, there is nothing in the internal condition of the Province to cause regret, nor any thing in its external Relations to excite uneasiness or alarm.

“ I now proceed to advert to the ordinary business of the Session, and I know not that I can do this better than by recalling to your consideration some of the Topics referred to in my Address to you at our last Annual Meeting,—adding such observations as change of circumstances may appear to render necessary or expedient.

“ With regard to the “ Great Roads,” my impression remains unchanged as to the advantage of committing the care and superintendence of them, if only as an experimental measure, to Salaried Officers, appointed by and responsible to the Executive Government, as the best mode which has occurred, or has been suggested to me, of ensuring uniformity in the System of their Construction and repair, as well as Economy in the outlay connected with this very important branch of the Public expenditure: With regard to that leading to Lower Canada, I invite your attention to the Report from the Supervisor which will be laid before you, and by which you will, I trust, find that the sum which your liberality placed at my disposal for the improvement of that very important Line of Communication, has been usefully and judiciously expended, and the views and recommendations of Her Majesty’s Government, with reference to the proposed improved Post Communication between England, Halifax and Quebec so far carried out:—A further appropriation will, however, be requisite for the completion of this Road, as well as in aid of the passage of the Mails across the Bay of Fundy—which I accordingly recommend to your favourable attention.

“ With reference to the “ Coast and Harbour Fisheries,” I have received from the zealous and intelligent Naval Officers, who have been lately employed in their protection, several valuable practical suggestions, which shall be communicated to you, and I rely upon your extending to this valuable branch of the Provincial Resources, all due encouragement and Protection.

“ A Despatch from Her Majesty’s Colonial Secretary of State will be communicated to you, upon the subject of an Exploration, by a properly qualified Civil Engineer, of the best Line for a Canal to connect the Bay of Fundy with the Gulph of Saint Lawrence. On the subject of the Expense which may attend this Exploration, I am ready to communicate with His Excellency the Governor General and the Lieutenant Governors of the Sister Provinces, should such be your wish.

“ The Representations which have reached me from the Sheriffs, as well as the Inmates of some of the Prisons of the Province, have induced me to institute Enquiry, which has satisfied me that their improvement, as well as that of the condition of the incarcerated Debtor, calls for the interposition of a humane Legislature—Documents connected with these views will be laid before you.

“ Persuaded as I am, and as is the Queen’s Government, that in no part of Her Majesty’s North American Colonies are the Interests of the Aboriginal Inhabitants of the Country more humanely attended to than in New Brunswick, it is only necessary for me to remind you, that the present Season has been hitherto adverse to their Pursuits and to recommend them to your Compassionate Protection.

“ I feel that I ought not to refrain from again inviting your attention to those Interests upon which the ultimate Prosperity of New Brunswick appear to me to depend, in a far higher degree than either upon its Timber or Mineral Treasures, valuable and apparently exhaustless as are the latter—I refer to those of Agriculture;—of the most proper mode of giving encouragement to these Interests, you will yourselves be the fittest judges.

“ As intimately connected with this subject, I would request your attention to a Communication which has been addressed to me by an Association composed of Individuals of high station, wealth and influence, called the “ North American Colonial Association of Ireland” (and of London), who profess themselves desirous of acquiring Land in this

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Loyal Province, and of co-operating with its Legislature and its Government in the introduction into it of a valuable Class of Settlers, under fixed and well considered Regulations, and upon receiving from the Province such reasonable aid and encouragement as it may be disposed to offer in promotion of this most important object. The high price of labour, owing to the insufficiency of its labouring Population, which prevails throughout the Province, is confessedly cramping the enterprise and exertions, and otherwise operating most injuriously upon its Commercial and Agricultural Interests, and this consideration would alone appear to me to offer sufficient inducement for entertaining a proposition which I understand to go to the extent of ensuring a regular and adequate supply of that valuable Class of our fellow Subjects, to whom encouragement and assistance is proposed to be given to enable them, whenever so inclined, to settle upon Lands of good quality, to be previously selected and purchased by the Association for that purpose. I cannot too strongly recommend this Proposition, and the subject of "Immigration" generally, to your serious and favorable attention, under the conviction which I feel that by no other measure can the Prosperity of the Province be more certainly and rapidly advanced, than by the judicious outlay of capital in the introduction of a respectable Class of Emigrants.

"I have deemed it to consist with my Duty to the Province to cause several of our Frontier Battalions of Militia to receive a certain degree of Training, during the past Summer, which has been done in a manner highly creditable to the Officer whom I selected for the performance of this useful service.—Five Thousand of our Militia have had the benefit of this Training—and I rely upon your liberality to enable me to continue a System of Instruction which, while it affords satisfaction and confidence to the Militia themselves, has the effect of greatly increasing the efficiency of that loyal, brave and Constitutional force,—for a limited number of which I have also felt it proper to cause Provision to be made of suitable Uniform Clothing of good quality, in order, in the event of any Emergency occurring, to guard against the inconvenience and suffering to which some of them were exposed during the last Winter.

"There are other matters upon which I will communicate with you by Message.

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"I have given directions for full and detailed Accounts of all Receipts of the Public Revenues, as well as of the Expenditure under the Acts of Appropriation and otherwise, to be laid before you, and I rely with unabated confidence upon your disposition to make all due Provision for the Exigencies and probable Contingencies of the Public Service during the ensuing year.

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"I will not conclude this Address without expressing to you the confident expectation which I entertain that the result of the exploration of certain parts of the Disputed Territory which has been recently made by Commissioners appointed by Her Majesty for that purpose, will enable Her Majesty's Government to advance such propositions to that of the United States, as the Basis of the settlement of the momentous question involved, as must lead to its early, amicable and final adjustment. In the mean time I would express my hope that sentiments of moderation and forbearance may prevail on either side."

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Johnston,

Ordered, That two hundred copies of His Excellency's Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to his Speech.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. L. A. Wilmot and Mr. End, be a Committee to prepare the Address.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Johnston,

Ordered, That the House do on Friday next go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Speech at the opening of the Session.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker informed the House, that he had, during the recess, received a certificate, signed by James Brown, Junior, and George S. Hill, Esquires, two Members for the County of Charlotte, as required by the Act regulating Elections of Members to serve in General Assembly, setting forth that Thomas Wyer, Esquire, a Member for the said County, had been appointed to a seat in Her Majesty's Legislative Council; and that he had, under and by virtue of the said Act, issued his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, requiring a new Writ to issue for the Election of a Member, in place of the said Thomas Wyer, Esquire.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, or his Deputy, do forthwith attend this House, with the Writ issued to the Sheriff of the County of Charlotte for the Election of a Member for the said County, in the room of Thomas Wyer, Esquire, called to Her Majesty's Legislative Council, with the Sheriff's return thereto.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may hereafter arise, that may in any way be supposed to affect the privileges of the House.

Ordered, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Street, Mr. Hill, Mr. Allen and Mr. Weldon, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

Ordered, That the Journals of this House be daily printed, or so soon as a copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk, and that the Printer do furnish two hundred copies thereof for the use of the Legislature.

The Deputy Clerk of the Crown in Chancery attended, in pursuance of the Order of the House, with the Writ issued to the County of Charlotte for the Election of a Member to serve in General Assembly, in the place of Thomas Wyer, Esquire, appointed to a seat in the Legislative Council.

Whereupon it appeared, upon reference to the Sheriff's return thereto, that James Boyd, Esquire, was duly elected.

Mr. Brown then informed the House, that Mr. Boyd was in attendance, and prayed to be admitted to his seat.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown and Mr. Hayward be a Committee to attend the Commissioner with Mr. Boyd and, see him qualified.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Johnston,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed, to take into consideration the state of all the Roads of Communication in the Province, and report the same to the House; and that they also report what sums it may be necessary to grant for repairing and improving as well the Great Roads as the Bye Roads.

Ordered, That the Honorable Mr. Johnston, Mr. Fisher, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Wilson, Mr. End, Mr. Street, Mr. Barberie, Mr. Weldon, Mr. Brown, Mr. Hayward, Mr. M'Leod and Mr. Connell, do compose the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Hanington,

Resolved, That no Petition be received or Bill brought in after the twentieth day of February next, except by special leave of the House.

Mr. Brown, from the Committee appointed to attend the Commissioner with James Boyd, Esquire, the Member returned at the last Election for the County of Charlotte, to see him qualified, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that Mr. Boyd had taken the oaths and subscribed the declaration prescribed by Law.

Whereupon Mr. Boyd took his seat.

On motion of Mr. End,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine and report as to what Laws have expired or are near expiring.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Barberie, be a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Fisher moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to impose a Tax upon all wild Lands in this Province.

Leave

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time; and

On motion of Mr. Fisher,

Ordered, That one hundred copies thereof be printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to whom shall be referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of this Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward, Mr. Stewart, Mr. H. T. Partelow, the Honorable Mr. Crane and Mr. Rankin, do compose the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the state of the Finances of the Province, and report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown, Mr. Partelow and Mr. Woodward, be the Committee for the purpose.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do on Tuesday next go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

On motion of Mr. Jordan,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to whom may be referred all Petitions for allowances to Teachers who have not received any part of the Provincial Grants for Schools, to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Jordan, Mr. End and Mr. Connell, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed, to examine and report upon Public and Private Accounts.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Taylor, Mr. M'Leod and Mr. Boyd, do compose the Committee.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker laid before the House—

Returns from the Commercial Bank, for the periods ending 5th April and 5th October, 1839.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take under consideration all matters relative to Light Houses within the Province, and report thereon from time to time to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Stewart and Mr. Boyd, do compose the Committee.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from John Marshall, of Belfast, Ireland, Master of the brig Highlander, praying a return of excess Duties paid on Passengers at the Provincial Treasury, by that vessel; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Jordan, by leave, presented a Petition from Henry Rigby, praying some compensation in consideration of having taught a School in the Parish of Portland, in the County of Saint John, for a period of nine years; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee for taking Petitions praying for School allowance under consideration, to report thereon.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed, to take into consideration the state of the Library of this House, and to report whether any and what additions are required thereto.

Ordered, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Fisher and Mr. End, be the Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Brown moved for leave to bring in a Bill, relating to Highways.
Leave granted.

Mr. Fisher moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to extend the Elective Franchise to Leaseholders.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to amend the Charter of King's College.

Leave granted.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Wednesday, 29th January, 1840.

A Bill to impose a Tax upon all wild Lands in this Province: and

Mr. Jordan, by leave, presented a Petition from Melissa Ann Black, praying to be compensated for her services as Teacher of the Female Department of the Public School at Saint Martins, in the County of Saint John, for a period of ten months, ending on the 14th day of January, instant; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee for taking such Petitions under consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Barberie, by leave, presented a Petition from John Cameron, of Beresford, in the County of Gloucester, praying that the Provincial allowance may be granted him for teaching a School at the Black Point Settlement, in the County of Restigouche, for a period of one year; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr. Barberie moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to provide for the establishment of a Grammar School in the County of Restigouche.

Leave granted.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Lauchlan Donaldson, on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, of the City of Saint John, praying that some measures may be adopted towards the establishing of a Daily Mail Communication between Saint John and Halifax; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Beardsley, by leave, presented a Petition from David Kilpatrick, a licenced Teacher, praying that the Provincial allowance may be granted to him for teaching a School at Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, for a period of six months, ending the 20th day of January, instant; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee for taking such Petitions under consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Rankin, by leave, presented a Petition from James Millar, of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, a licenced Teacher, praying compensation for teaching a School at that place from 1st October, 1833, to the end of March, 1838, a period of four years and six months; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Isaac B. Gidney, Archibald Blue, and others, of the Richmond Settlement, in the Parish of Woodstock and County of Carleton, praying a grant in aid towards the support of a School in that District; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from Henry Holmes, of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, Master and Owner of the schooner Favorite, praying to be reimbursed

reimbursed for damages sustained by his vessel during the time she was in the employ of the Commissioners of Light Houses for the Bay of Fundy ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. M'Leod, by leave, presented a Petition from Ezekiel C. Wilson, of the Parish of Hampton, in King's County, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in that Parish for one year, ending in September, 1838 ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee for taking such Petitions under consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Fisher moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to define the Boundaries of certain Parishes in the County of York, and to erect two new Parishes in the said County.

Leave granted.

Mr. Fisher moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to encourage the settlement of vacant Crown Lands.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

The Honorable Mr. Crane, by leave, presented a Petition from John Trenholm and thirteen others, Inhabitants of the Parishes of Westmorland and Botsford, in the County of Westmorland, praying aid towards the maintenance of a Courier from Cape Tormentine to Nova Scotia ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Whereas a Committee raised at the last Session, to whom were referred the several Petitions from Individuals, praying for return of Duties on articles destroyed by Fire on the 17th of August last, reported on the 18th of September, and in their Report recommended "That the Return Duties prayed for should be granted to such of the Petitioners as should, on an investigation at this present Session, appear to be entitled to the same ;" therefore

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration the said Petitions, as well as such others as may be presented at this present Session, of the like nature, and investigate the same and report thereon.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward, Mr. End, Mr. Rankin, Mr. M'Leod and Mr. Weldon, do compose the said Committee.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas Sime and others, composing the Grand Jury for the County of Charlotte, at the Circuit Court holden for the said County in April, 1839, praying that an Act may pass for the payment of Grand and Petit Jurors : which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from William H. Street, of Saint John, Merchant, praying a return of Duty on three Hogsheads Brandy, shipped to Truro, in Nova Scotia, in December last ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Francis M'Dermott, of the City of Saint John, Manufacturer of Looking Glasses and Picture Frames, praying a repeal or reduction of the existing Duties on Looking Glass Plates, Picture Frames, and Plate Glass ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Trade.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Adam Duncan Thomson, of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, praying that the Provincial allowance may be granted to him for teaching a School in that Parish for the year ending on the first day of July, 1834 ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee appointed for taking such Petitions under consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Brown, also by leave, presented a Petition from Elizabeth Hayley, of Saint Patrick,

Patrick, in the County of Charlotte, praying that the Provincial allowance may be granted her for teaching a School in that Parish for a period of six months, ending on the first day of October, 1839; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr. Freeze, by leave, presented a Petition from George Powell, of the Parish of Sussex, in King's County, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in that Parish for a period of six months, ending in August, 1837; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr Freeze moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for erecting a part of the Parish or Township of Sussex, in King's County, into a separate and distinct Parish or Township.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from William Boyd and others, belonging to the several Fire Engine Companies at Saint Andrews, praying that an Act may pass, exempting individuals composing those Companies from serving on Juries at the Circuit Courts; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas Moses, Deputy Treasurer stationed at West Isles, in the County of Charlotte, praying that some additional allowance may be made to him for his services; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in answer to His Speech at the opening of the Session, reported a draft thereof; which he read, and then submitted the same.

It being handed in at the Clerk's Table, was there again read; and thereupon

Ordered, To be accepted; and

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on the said draft Address.

Mr. Woodward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported; that they had gone into consideration of the said Address, and agreed to the same, without making any amendment thereto.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted; and

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, unanimously, That the Address be engrossed, signed by the Speaker, and presented to His Excellency by the whole House; and further

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, to know when he will be pleased to receive the House therewith.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Allen and Mr. Stewart, be the Committee for that purpose.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Thursday, 30th January, 1840.

Prayers.

Read a second time—

A Bill for erecting a part of the Parish or Township of Sussex, in King's County, into a separate or distinct Parish or Township; and

A Bill to encourage the settlement of vacant Crown Lands.

It being the time appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to receive the House with their Address, in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session, the House waited upon His Excellency and presented the same, and which is as follows :—

To His Excellency Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, K. C. B. and K. C. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The humble Address of the House of Assembly.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE, the Representatives of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects, the People of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for Your Speech at the opening of this Session.

While we feel secure in the enjoyment of a degree of rational liberty, which can only be attained under British Institutions, we are happy to assure Your Excellency of the unalterable determination of the Inhabitants of this Province, to preserve, as far as in them lies, their connexion with the Parent State, and of our desire to co-operate with Your Excellency in the adoption of such measures as may tend to increase the happiness, promote the prosperity, and call forth into vigorous and useful action the various resources of this highly favoured portion of Her Majesty's Dominions.

Your Excellency's assurances of the state of the Province, both as regards its internal condition and its external relations, cannot fail to produce joy and satisfaction throughout the whole land; and we are happy to learn that the pecuniary aid, so cheerfully contributed by the Colonial Legislature for the preservation of National rights, has been applied without prejudice to those domestic appropriations, to which the Provincial Revenues have hitherto been exclusively devoted.

We shall continue to devote our best attention to that very important branch of the public expenditure, the improvement of the Great Roads, and shall attentively consider the recommendation of Your Excellency on this subject; we receive with much satisfaction the information afforded by Your Excellency, that the amount placed at Your Excellency's disposal, for the improvement of the Great Road to Lower Canada, has been usefully expended, and it will be our earnest endeavour liberally to promote the views and recommendations of Her Majesty's Government, by facilitating the communication between the North American Provinces, now rendered so particularly necessary by the proposed improved Post Communication between England and Halifax.

We shall be happy to receive any practical suggestions on the subject of the Coast and Harbour Fisheries, and we beg to assure Your Excellency that every reasonable encouragement and protection in our power shall be extended to this inexhaustible source of National greatness.

The connexion of the Bay of Fundy with the Gulph of Saint Lawrence by means of a Canal, is a project of such importance both in a National and Provincial point of view, that we shall feel obliged to Your Excellency for any information thereon; and we sincerely hope that immediate and successful efforts for the execution of this great public work will be made by the Sister Provinces, conjointly with ourselves, on a scale commensurate with the magnitude of the undertaking.

The state of the Provincial Prisons, we well know, requires improvement, and we are therefore prepared to give our cordial assistance in devising and establishing such plans and regulations for their future governance, as may be best calculated to remove all existing causes of complaint.

Under the influence of that humane disposition which has always actuated the Legislature, the Aboriginal Inhabitants of the Country shall have our favourable attention, and we shall willingly adopt any measure that may be suggested for ameliorating the condition of that unfortunate race.

The continuing and permanent prosperity of this Province is so inseparably connected with its Agricultural Interests, that we shall at all times diligently apply ourselves to the favourable

favourable consideration of every question which may come before us for the support and advancement of so important a branch of domestic Industry; and in proof of our sincerity, we are ready to hold out every reasonable inducement for the promotion of Immigration, an object so desirable both to the Commercial and Agricultural Interests of the Province: The Communication promised by Your Excellency from the North American Colonial Association of Ireland and of London, on this subject, shall receive our attention.

It affords us much gratification to hear of the success which has attended the training of the Frontier Battalions of Militia during the past Summer, and entertaining the most unlimited confidence in Your Excellency's supervision and management of this loyal force, we shall cheerfully do all in our power to enable Your Excellency to continue the system of instruction already established. Connected with this subject, we have no doubt that the provision made by Your Excellency of suitable Uniform Clothing, to be used in the event of any emergency occurring, has been judicious and necessary.

We thank your Excellency for having directed the Public Accounts to be laid before us, and Your Excellency may rely with confidence upon our disposition to make all due provision for the exigencies and probable contingencies of the public service.

An early and amicable, but, at the same time, a *just* settlement of the Boundary Question, has long been most anxiously looked for by the People of this Province; and trusting that the results of the recent exploration may be such as will conduce to the attainment of that desired object, we heartily respond to Your Excellency's hope, that, in the mean time, sentiments of moderation and forbearance may prevail on either side.

Having very recently received Letters from the Company's Commissioner, Captain Hayne, dated 27th June, on the same subject, the Directors are fully inclined to acknowledge that the period is arrived when the Company is bound to make provision for paying a portion of the balance due for the purchase, and arranging the dates for paying the remainder; and in stating this the Directors also admit that the period is approaching when the first portion so provided will have to be paid.

Having referred very carefully both to the contents of Sir John Harvey's Despatches, addressed to your Lordship, and to Captain Hayne's Letter of the 27th June, the Directors do not find any data as to the number of acres to be conveyed by the Crown to the Company which might enable either the Colonial Department or the Directors to calculate the Balance due from the Company to Her Majesty's Government, neither can the Directors infer from Captain Hayne's letter that the Crown Survey is yet perfectly adjusted, nor the Map completed, so as to form a component part of the Company's title.

Being, however, extremely desirous to prove that they have never supported any plea for delaying payment of the balance which was not actually connected with the incomplete state of the Crown Survey, the Directors beg leave to propose to your Lordship, that the payment of the whole sum which shall be finally ascertained to be due to Her Majesty's Government, shall be divided into four instalments, payable as follows, viz:—

£8,000 as speedily as the receipt of the payment of a call now about to be made upon the Company's Capital Stock enables the Directors to pay the amount, say on or about the 20th October next.

£8,000 the 30th September, 1840.

£8,000 the 30th September, 1841; and the remainder as the amount may be finally adjusted, on

£24,000 Total.

The payment of the first of these instalments to be made unconditionally, and the payment of the other instalments to be conditional on the complete adjustment of the Survey, and the details therewith connected.

The grounds upon which the Directors appeal with confidence to your Lordship for the modification in the payment of the balance by instalments, instead of at once, are, that the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, although not bound by the conditions of the original contract to make any improvement upon their tracts of land, have expended upwards of £70,000 in roads, clearings, and settlements: that Crown Lands in the Province of New Brunswick, which at the time of the original contract were selling at five shillings per acre, are now offered for sale at two shillings and six pence and three shillings and six pence, Currency: that the state of political affairs in British North America has very materially diminished the emigration of British Subjects to these Provinces, and thus deprived the Company of any returns arising from sales of their Lands; added to which there is a very heavy existing pressure in the Money Market.

We are particularly desired to take this occasion to apologize for an apparent want of attention on the part of the Directors, in not having duly acknowledged your Lordship's Communication, dated 17th June last. It was, however, deferred at the time, because it appeared from the tenor of that Communication, that a reference from the Colonial Department to the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, on the subject of the Survey, was awaiting a reply from thence; neither had the Directors received any conclusive information on the subject from the Company's Commissioner.

I am directed by the Marquis of Normanby to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 19th instant, in which you propose to pay the remainder of the purchase money due on account of the Land bought by the New Brunswick Land Company of Her Majesty's Government.

In reply, I am to inform you that as the payments of the Company form a part of that Territorial Revenue which has been ceded to the local Legislature in return for a Civil List, Her Majesty's Government have no authority to relax the conditions of the original agreement in respect to the manner and rate of payment: but Lord Normanby will transmit a copy of your letter to Sir John Harvey, and will direct him to bring it under the consideration of the House of Assembly at their next meeting, in order that their opinion on the proposed arrangement may be ascertained.

"The Lieutenant Governor informs the House of Assembly, that frequent applications have been made to him for Licences to practice Physic and Surgery, for the granting of which a previous examination is by Law required; but there is no properly constituted Board of Examiners, and in some instances the Gentlemen applied to for the purpose have declined to serve: The Lieutenant Governor therefore invites the attention of the House to this subject, and recommends that provision be made for the appointment of a Medical Board, to whom applicants for Licences may present themselves for examination, and authorizing reasonable compensation to the Members of that Board for their services.

STEAM COMMUNICATION BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

Downing Street, 4th May, 1839.

SIR,

With reference to my predecessor's Circular Despatch of 24th October last, I have the honor to transmit herewith for your information, an Extract of a Letter from the Secretary to the Lords Commissioners

Commissioners of the Treasury, stating the arrangements which have been made by their Lordships for establishing Steam Communication between Great Britain and British North America.

I also enclose an Extract of a Report, addressed to the Post Master General by the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec, on the subject of the route by which the Mail may be most conveniently carried from Halifax to Quebec. On this point I do not feel competent to express any decided opinion, more especially, as I have not before me any late report on the state of the Metis Road, but I request you to take the subject into your early consideration, and to report to me your opinion as to the route which it would be most advisable to select for the conveyance of the Mail, not only with reference to rapidity of communication, but with reference to security in the event of collision between this country and the United States.

"With reference to your Letter of the 3d instant, and its enclosure from Sir John Harvey, urging the importance of establishing a Steam Communication between this Country and British North America, at the earliest possible moment; and to the correspondence which has previously taken place on the subject of Steam Communication with Halifax, I have it in command from the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to request you will state to the Marquis of Normanby, that my Lords have not failed to use their earnest efforts to carry the views expressed in their former communications into effect.

"In furtherance of this object, the Lords of the Admiralty, in communication with this Board, advertised for tenders, but no offer was made on conditions which answered the advertisement, or which my Lords considered it would be satisfactory to accept.

"Subsequently, however, my Lords have been able to conclude an arrangement, by which a communication by Steam twice every month will be effected, and they have every reason to believe this arrangement will be carried into effect in June, 1840.

"With reference to this point, my Lords herewith transmit copy of a Letter, dated 12th instant, from the Board of Admiralty, which will furnish Lord Normanby with the detailed information.

"Their Lordships would further add, that they have directed a considerable reduction to be made in the Packet rate of Postage on Letters from and to the British Colonies in North America, which has already come into operation.

"These arrangements, my Lords trust, will carry into effect the expectations held out by them in their former communications. But much of the benefit to be derived therefrom will depend upon the efforts made in the Colonial possessions of Her Majesty in improving the Roads, and their Lordships cannot too earnestly press this subject upon Lord Normanby's attention."

"With reference to your Letter of the 27th February last, respecting the conveyance of the Mails in Steam Vessels, by Contract, between this country and the North American Colonies, I am commanded by my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to acquaint you for the information of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, that my Lords have concluded an agreement with Mr. Cunard for the conveyance of the Mails, &c., twice in each Calendar month, between Liverpool and Halifax, (Nova Scotia,) and between the latter place and Boston, United States, and also, between Pictou, New Brunswick, and Quebec, as long as the Saint Lawrence is open, for the sum sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, viz. £55,000, in Vessels of not less than 300 Horses Power, for the trans-Atlantic passage, and not less than 150 Horses Power for the other passages. The service to commence 1st June, 1840, or sooner, if possible.

"The route from Quebec to Halifax at present travelled, after leaving the River Saint Lawrence at Saint André, 108 miles below Quebec, passes for about 100 miles through the Territory in dispute between our Government and that of the United States. The greater part of this route is undeserving the name of a Road. It comprises precipitous mountains, forests and swamps, over and through which, at certain periods of the year, the unfortunate Couriers have to convey the Mail bags on their backs, no other mode of conveyance being practicable; and I will leave you, Sir, to fancy the toil and misery which must attend the transport of fifteen or sixteen hundred pounds weight of Mails (for an English Mail now amounts to this enormous weight,) through such a wilderness. This line of communication, as already observed, passes through a portion of the Territory in dispute between Great Britain and the United States, and on this account Her Majesty's Government may not deem it advisable to incur a heavy expense in improving it. It is, nevertheless, the natural channel to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, for it leads through the heart of the former Province, taking in Fredericton the seat of Government. Should it become absolutely necessary to adopt another route, there is only one choice, and that is the neglected road partially opened by His Excellency Sir James Kempt, which leaving the Saint Lawrence at Metis, 207 miles below Quebec, strikes the Restigouche River near the village of Campbelltown, New Brunswick, and bears the name of the Metis or Kempt Road.

This

This road was never completed, and is now almost filled up by a secondary growth of trees, and is, consequently, in such a state as to be barely practicable for a foot post, which I established some years ago, and which now travels weekly. The distance from the Saint Lawrence to the Settlements on the Restigouche, by this route, is about 95 miles. It will cost from £15,000 to £18,000, judiciously laid out, to make this a good carriage road. After reaching Dalhousie on the Restigouche, the roads become better and continue so along the shore of the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, and thence to Halifax. The journey from Quebec to Halifax, by this route, (after the Metis Road is improved) may be accomplished in from seven to eight days; but then it must be recollected that Fredericton is left out, and that that City can only be communicated with by a lateral route from Miramichi, a distance of about 100 miles. As a preliminary step to a thorough amelioration of the Post to Halifax, it will be for the Government to decide which of the two roads, the Penniscontia or the Metis is to be permanently improved. The advantage of the Metis Road is, that it runs through a territory not as yet disputed by the United States, and free from every risk of hostile interruption from the Americans, unless they can overrun the whole of New Brunswick. In a Military point of view this road is especially deserving the support of Government, (whether the Penniscontia is abandoned or not,) because supplies of Troops and Arms may be brought up the Restigouche by water from Halifax to within 300 miles of Quebec, at periods when the River Saint Lawrence is not practicable. I beg leave here to refer to a Communication from me to you, dated 25th August last, covering copy of a Memorial to the Governor General, which details at some length my views on the Post Roads to Halifax.

“Which ever of the two Roads Her Majesty’s Government may permanently improve, the Mails may be carried through in from 7 to 7½ days, probably 7. I would not undertake to pledge myself to a shorter course of Post than seven days. A light express with a small Valise of Letters may, under very favorable circumstances, get through in six days, or six days and a half. It has already once been accomplished in six days on good winter roads, but it is a very different thing travelling light to conveying a Mail weighing a thousand or fifteen hundred pounds.”

CANAL BETWEEN BAY OF FUNDY AND GULF OF SAINT LAWRENCE.

SIR,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 62, of the 11th ultimo, transmitting a Petition to the Queen from the Chamber of Commerce at Saint John, in which they pray that Her Majesty would be pleased to direct a Survey to be made by some scientific person duly qualified for the purpose of ascertaining the most eligible line for a Canal to connect the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the Gulf of Saint Lawrence on the Eastern shore of New Brunswick.

In reply, I have to observe, that as I should not wish to recommend the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to defray the expense which would attend this Survey, from the Revenues of this Country, it is necessary in the first place that it should be ascertained that there is some local source from which it can be secured. If the House of Assembly of New Brunswick singly, or the Provinces which may be supposed to be mutually interested in such a work, jointly, will make or guarantee a provision for the remuneration of the person to whom the Survey would be entrusted, I shall be happy to do every thing in my power to secure the services of some one for the work, thoroughly conversant with the science of Civil Engineering. You will therefore take such measures as may appear to you most convenient, for ascertaining this point, by communicating in the first place with the Chamber of Commerce at Saint John, and if it should be necessary, with the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, and the authorities of the other Provinces.

The Port of Shediac, on the east side of the Province of New Brunswick, possesses most favorable advantages and facilities for establishing a depot and communication from thence to the Bay of Fundy for Sailing Vessels and Steam Ditto, not exceeding 16 feet water, as 18½ feet is to be obtained across the Bar and up to the Point of Le Chene, from which place a Wharf is to be built, the Province Government having already allotted money for that purpose.

A Canal is in contemplation to be cut, but from what part of the head of the Bay of Fundy is not yet determined. By the way of Dorchester Island, at the entrance of the Memramcook River, is decidedly the most eligible, as I am assured beyond doubts that 12 feet can be brought to the entrance to that River at low water, and consequently little or no delay created by waiting for tide. Moreover, that River can easily be dam'd a little way above its entrance at little expense, the soil being strong brown clay and quite level, with a rise of 50 feet of water. Another point of great importance is, that that River is not backed by any heavy River or rear water, it is consequently slow and easy in its rise and fall;—all the other approaches by the Peticodiac or Cumberland Basin run at a furious rate and would be attended with great risk and danger and probably delay.

When this Canal is cut a distance not exceeding 16 or 18 miles, Steamboats will be enabled to effect a passage from the Wharfs in Saint John to Quebec in 56 or 60 hours, according to the weather and season.

The foregoing are the opinions of Lieut. C. Hare, who, in the summer of 1836, walked over all the ground and surveyed the Harbour of Shediac; in fact whatever private interest may induce the extensive Land Proprietors to use their influence with the Government (and no doubt cause delay) in its

completion, he begs to say that he is totally unconnected and disinterested with all Land and Party, that and that alone, is the only safe and proper route to proceed in.

TENURE OF PUBLIC OFFICES.

Downing Street, 16th October, 1839.

SIR,

I am desirous of directing your attention to the tenure on which public offices in the gift of the Crown appear to be held throughout the British Colonies. I find that the Governor himself, and every person serving under him, are appointed during the Royal pleasure, but with this important difference: The Governor's Commission is in fact revoked whenever the interests of the public service are supposed to require such a change in the Administration of local affairs. But the Commissions of all other public officers are very rarely indeed recalled, except for positive misconduct. I cannot learn that during the present or the two last Reigns, a single instance has occurred of a change in the subordinate Colonial officers, except in cases of death or resignation, incapacity or misconduct. This system of converting a tenure at pleasure into a tenure for life, originated probably in the practice which formerly prevailed of selecting all the higher class of Colonial Functionaries from persons who, at the time of their appointment, were resident in this country; and amongst other motives which afforded such persons a virtual security for the continued possession of their places, it was not the least considerable, that except on those terms, they were unwilling to incur the risk and expense of transferring their residence to remote, and often to unhealthy climates. But the habit which has obtained of late years of preferring, as far as possible, for places of trust in the Colonies persons resident there, has taken away the strongest motive which could thus be alleged in favor of a practice to which there are many objections of the greatest weight. It is time, therefore, that a different course should be followed, and the object of my present communication is to announce to you the rules which will be hereafter observed on this subject in the Province of New Brunswick.

You will understand, and cause it to be made generally known, that hereafter the tenure of Colonial offices held during Her Majesty's pleasure will not be regarded as equivalent to a tenure during good behaviour, but that not only such officers will be called upon to retire from the public service as often as any sufficient motives of public policy may suggest the expediency of that measure, but that a change in the person of the Governor will be considered as a sufficient reason for any alterations which his Successor may deem it expedient to make in the list of public Functionaries, subject of course to the future confirmation of the Sovereign.

These remarks do not extend to Judicial offices, nor are they meant to apply to places which are altogether Ministerial, and which do not devolve upon the holders of them duties, in the right discharge of which the character or policy of the Government are directly involved. They are intended to apply rather to the Heads of Departments than to persons serving as Clerks, or in similar capacities under them. Neither do they extend to officers in the services of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury. The Functionaries who will be chiefly, though not exclusively affected by them, are the Colonial Secretary, the Treasurer or Receiver General, the Surveyor General, the Attorney and Solicitor General, the Sheriff or Provost Marshall, and other officers who, under different designations from these, are entrusted with the same or similar duties. To this list must be also added the Members of the Council, especially in those Colonies in which the Legislative and Executive Councils are distinct Bodies.

The application of these rules to officers to be hereafter appointed, will be attended with no practical difficulty. It may not be equally easy to enforce them in the case of existing officers, and especially of those who may have left this country for the express purpose of accepting the offices they at present fill. Every reasonable indulgence must be shewn for the expectations which such persons have been encouraged to form. But even in these instances it will be necessary that the right of enforcing these regulations should be distinctly maintained, in practice as well as in theory, as often as the public good may clearly demand the enforcement of them. It may not be unadvisable to compensate any such officers for their disappointment, even by pecuniary grants, when it may appear unjust to dispense with their services without such an indemnity.

FISHERIES AND LIGHT HOUSES, &c.

H. M. S. Ringdove, St. John, September 21st, 1839.

SIR,

I have the honor to inform you that H. M. Sloop under my command will have to return to Halifax in the course of next week. I am happy to say her presence in the Bay of Fundy has checked the encroachments of the Americans upon our Fisheries and Shores, there being few in the neighbourhood of Grand Manan compared to what there was when I first arrived there.

I have inspected the Light Houses in the Bay; they are in good repair, and attention appears to be paid to their Lights. The vertical Lights on Point Lepreau are too near each other. At a greater distance than five miles they appear in one. The Gannet Rock is only eighteen feet above high water. The Light House on it being built of Wood I do not consider secure. It should be raised

raised on a Stone Tower ten or twelve feet high. In a gale last winter several shingles were washed off the lower part of the Light House; had it been Spring Tides at the time it would have gone. A Bell attached to each Light House would be of great service to Shipping in thick weather. These are the improvements I would suggest to Your Excellency.

There has been a decrease in the Line Fishery this year, but the vast quantity of Herring taken will compensate for it.

Previous to my departure I shall have the honor of waiting upon Your Excellency, when I hope to afford better information on these subjects

1. State of the Fisheries.—See Report of, September 21st, 1839.
2. State of Light Houses.—See do. do. Urge the necessity of a substantial Stone Building being erected on the Gannet Rock.
3. A couple of well found Provincial Schooners to be placed at his disposal—having each a Pilot on board—he will man and employ them—and will be answerable for their useful service.
4. The Law as it now stands, tends to encourage illicit trade: for example, the Plaister of Paris conveyed from the Bay of Mines to Eastport is paid for in Flour, &c., which articles cannot be seized at Sea, but only if found in the act of being landed without entry at a Custom House—consequently duty is scarcely ever paid upon them. Surely this points with great force to the necessity of repealing the Imperial duty on Flour, &c. *Illustration*—Captain Stewart detained and carried into Saint John on the 11th September, the Schooner “Industry,” of Halifax, and “William,” of St. John, each having several barrels of Flour, Gunpowder, &c. on board, though *cleared in Ballast*. The Collector gives it as his opinion that under the Act regulating the Trade of the British Colonies, (viz. 3 & 4 W. 4, C. 59,) these vessels are not liable to seizure, he allows them to proceed detaining the goods to abide decisions from Home.—Quotes a similar case of Captain Dilkes of Her Majesty’s Sloop Wanderer in 1836.
5. Every British *Boat* should have a licence, otherwise it is impossible to discriminate them from America. This should be a joint Legislative arrangement on the part of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

NORTH AMERICAN COLONIAL ASSOCIATION OF IRELAND.

Fredericton, 10th January, 1840.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Herewith I have the honor of submitting various documents addressed to your Excellency by the North American Colonial Association of Ireland, stating their views and wishes with respect to Emigration on an extensive scale, under fixed regulations.

I herewith enclose a copy of a letter addressed by me to the Acting Sub-Collector there, calling upon him for explanation as to the cause of delay in transmitting them, and I have to observe, that should they not be received by me by the next Mail, Saturday next, the 8th instant, I shall deem it my duty to transmit those that are prepared, without the missing Account, which I am desirous to avoid doing, as it renders the Account incomplete.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston then communicated to the House, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor—

A Correspondence between the Honorable H. S. Fox, Her Majesty's Minister at Washington, and the Honorable John Forsyth, Secretary of State for the United States, upon the subject of the Disputed Territory.

These documents being read at the Clerk's Table are as follow:—

Washington, January 26, 1840.

The undersigned, Her Britannic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, has the honor to acquaint Mr. Forsyth, Secretary of State of the United States, that since the date of his last Official

Official Note, of the 12th instant, he has been furnished by Her Majesty's Authorities in North America, with more correct information than he then possessed, respecting certain reported movements of British Troops within the Disputed Territory, which formed the subject of a part of that Official Note, as well as of the two Official Notes addressed by the Secretary of State to the undersigned, on the 24th December, and on the 16th instant.—The same reported movements of Troops were referred to in a recent Message from the Governor of Maine to the Legislature of the State, and also in a published Official letter addressed by the Governor of Maine to the President of the United States, on the 23d of December.

It appears from accurate information now in possession of the undersigned, that the Governor of Maine, and through him the President and General Government of the United States, have been misinformed as to the facts. In the first place, no reinforcement has been marched to the British Post at the Lake Temiscouata; the only change occurring there has been the relief of a Detachment of Her Majesty's 24th Regiment, by a Detachment of the same force of the 11th Regiment; this force of one Company being now stationed at the Temiscouata Post, as it always has been, for the necessary purpose of protecting the stores and accommodations provided for the use of Her Majesty's Troops, who may be required, as heretofore, to march by that route to and from the Provinces of Canada and New Brunswick. In the second place, it is not true that the British authorities either have built, or are building barracks on both sides of the Saint John River, or at the mouth of the Madawaska River: no new barracks have in fact been built any where. In the third place, Her Majesty's Authorities are not concentrating a Military force at the Grand Falls: the same trifling force of sixteen men, is now stationed at the Post of the Grand Falls which has been stationed there for the last twelvemonth. It was perhaps, however, needless for the undersigned to advert to this last matter at all, as the Post of the Grand Falls is beyond the bounds of the Disputed Territory, and within the acknowledged limits of New Brunswick.

The undersigned, while conveying the above information, upon a matter of fact, to the Secretary of State of the United States, takes occasion to repeat distinctly his former declaration, that there exists no intention on the part of Her Majesty's Authorities, to infringe the terms of those provisional agreements which were entered into at the beginning of last year, so long as there is reason to trust that the same will be faithfully adhered to by the opposite party. But it is the duty of the undersigned at the same time clearly to state, that Her Majesty's Authorities in North America, taking into view the attitude assumed by the State of Maine with reference to the Boundary question, will, as at present advised, be governed entirely by circumstances, in adopting such measures of defence and precaution, (whether along the confines of the Disputed Territory, or within that portion of it, where, it has been before explained, the authority of Great Britain, according to the existing agreements, was not to be interfered with,) as may seem to them necessary for guarding against, or for promptly repelling, the further acts of hostile aggression over the whole of the Disputed Territory, which it appears to be the avowed design of the State of Maine sooner or later to attempt. For the undersigned has to observe, that not only is the extensive system of encroachment, which was denounced, and remonstrated against by the undersigned in his Official Note of the 2d of last November, still carried on and persisted in by armed bands employed by the authorities of Maine, in the districts about the Aroostook and Fish River; but that Acts, as above stated, of a character yet more violent, and obnoxious to the rights of Great Britain, and more dangerous to the preservation of the general peace, are with certainty meditated by the inhabitants of that State.—The existence of such designs has for months past been a matter of notoriety by public report; those designs were plainly indicated in the recent Message of the Governor of Maine to the Legislature of the State: and they are avowed in more explicit terms in the letter addressed to the President of the United States by the Governor of Maine, on the 21st of November, which letter has within the last few days been communicated to Congress and published.

The undersigned, it is true, has been assured by the Secretary of State, in his note of the 16th instant, that the General Government see no reason to doubt the disposition of the Governor of Maine to adhere to the existing arrangements, and to avoid all acts tending to render more difficult and distant the final adjustment of the Boundary question. But in face of the above clear indications of the intentions of Maine, as given out by the parties themselves, the Secretary of State has not given to the undersigned any adequate assurance, that Maine will be constrained to desist from carrying those intentions into effect, if, contrary to the expectation of the General Government, the Legislature or the Executive of the State should think fit to make the attempt.

The undersigned not only preserves the hope, but he entertains the firm belief, that if the duty of negotiating the Boundary question be left in the hands of the two National Governments, to whom alone it of right belongs, the difficulty of conducting the negotiation to an amicable issue will not be found so great as has been by many persons apprehended.—But the case will become wholly altered if the people of the State of Maine, who though interested in the result are not charged with the negotiation, shall attempt to interrupt it by violence.

Her Majesty's Authorities in North America have, on their part, no desire or intention to interfere with the course of the pending negotiation by an exertion of Military force; but they will, as at present advised, consult their own discretion in adopting the measures of defence that may be rendered necessary by the threats of a violent interruption to the negotiations which have been used by all parties in Maine, and which the undersigned regrets to find confirmed by the language, (as above referred to,) employed by the highest official authority in that State.

The undersigned, Secretary of State of the United States, has the honor to reply, by direction of the President, to the Note addressed to him on the 26th instant, by Mr. Fox, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of Great Britain.

The President derives great satisfaction from the information conveyed by Mr. Fox's note, that with reference to the reported movements of British Troops within the Territory in dispute, no actual change has taken place in the attitude of Her Majesty's Authorities in the Territory since the arrangements entered into by the two Governments at the commencement of last year, for the preservation of tranquillity within its limits; and from his assurances that there exists no intention on the part of Her Majesty's Authorities, to infringe the terms of those arrangements, so long as they are faithfully observed on the side of the United States. The President, however, cannot repress a feeling of regret; that the British Colonial Authorities, without graver motives than the possibility of a departure from the arrangements referred to by the State of Maine, should take upon themselves the discretion, and along with it the fearful responsibility of probable consequences, of being guided by circumstances, liable as these are to be misapprehended and misjudged, in the adoption within the Disputed Territory of measures of defence and precaution, in manifest violation of the understanding between the two Countries, whenever they may imagine that acts of hostile aggression over the Disputed Territory are meditated or threatened on the part of the State of Maine. The President cannot but hope, that when Her Majesty's Government at home shall be apprised of the position assumed in this regard by its agents, proper steps will be taken to place the performance of express and solemn agreements upon a more secure basis than Colonial discretion,—to be exercised on apprehended disregard of such agreements on the part of the State of Maine.

It is gratifying to the President to perceive that Mr. Fox entertains the firm belief, that the difficulty of conducting to an amicable issue the pending negotiation for the adjustment of the question of Boundary, is not so great as has been by many persons apprehended. As, under a corresponding conviction, the United States have, with a view to the final settlement of that exciting question, submitted a proposition for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government,—the President hopes that the sentiments expressed by Mr. Fox have their foundation in an expectation of his having it in his power at an early day to communicate to this Government, a result of the deliberations had by that of Her Britannic Majesty upon the proposition alluded to, which will present the prospect of a prompt and satisfactory settlement, and which, when known by the State of Maine, will put an end to all grounds of apprehension of intentions or disposition on her part to adopt any measure calculated to embarrass the negotiation, or to involve a departure from the provisional arrangements. In the existence of those arrangements, the United States behold an earnest of the mutual desire of the two Governments to divest a question abounding in causes of deep and growing excitement; of as much as possible of the asperity and hostile feeling it is calculated to engender; but unless attended with the most scrupulous observance of the spirit and letter of their provisions, it would prove but one more cause, added to the many already prevailing, of enmity and discord. Mr. Fox has already been made the channel of conveyance to his Government, of the desire and determination of the President that the obligations of the country shall be faithfully discharged: that desire is prompted by a sense of expediency, as well as of justice, and by an anxious wish to preserve the amicable relations, now, so manifestly for the advantage of both, subsisting between the United States and Great Britain.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from John V. Thurgar and Thomas Wallace, of the City of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of Duties on five puncheons of Whiskey, shipped to Norton, per schooner Eleanor Jane, in the month of October last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Partelow also, by leave, presented a Petition from Abraham Gesner, of the City of Saint John, praying that an Act may pass authorizing him to light the said City with Gas, and for an exclusive privilege for that purpose, for a limited period; which he read.

“Gentlemen,

“During the last Summer an Exploration and Survey of the Road leading from Restigouche to the Saint Lawrence, by the Lake Metepediac, was made by a Military Engineer Officer, by direction of the Lieutenant General Commanding at Halifax, of whose Report, accompanied by an Estimate, His Excellency was pleased to allow a copy to be sent to me.

“The estimate appeared to me so considerable in its amount, that, under the apprehension that it might operate to retard or prevent the undertaking, I directed my enquiries to the subject, and procured from two highly intelligent, respectable and responsible individuals, perfectly acquainted with the line and practically conversant with the expense of Road Making, a proposal predicated upon the Report to which I have alluded, to construct and perfect that Road, agreeable to the proposed Plan and Specification, for a sum not exceeding £12,000 currency.

“Having myself received no authority to conclude any agreement or to incur any expense connected with the Metis line of Road, I could only communicate the result of my enquiries to the Authorities of Canada and Halifax,—which I accordingly did,—and I have since heard nothing further upon the subject;—but I feel it to be one of deep importance, secondary only to the improvement of the Line of the Saint John, (and I will add, to that of the proposed Canal for connecting the Bay of Fundy with the Gulf of Saint Lawrence,) and I accordingly not only recommend it to the favourable consideration of the House, but offer myself as the medium of communicating with the Governor General and with the Governments of Lower Canada and Nova Scotia upon it.

The Committee therefore recommend that this House do, by Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, recommend that a Grant be made to the said Company of 15,000 acres of the Land originally agreed to be sold to the Company, that is to say;—Of the Tract contiguous or near to their Mills erected on the Tobique, containing 5,000 acres, and of the Tract situate on the Gulquak Stream, a branch of the Tobique, containing 10,000 acres, on the said Company's paying the sum of £1000 over and above the amount already paid in, and that they be allowed, on these terms, to relinquish the residue of the original purchase.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill again before them, it was moved—To expunge the whole of the said Bill, and substitute the following:—

“ *A Bill to continue the several Acts now in force to regulate Tavern Keepers and Retailers.*

“ *Be it enacted* by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That an Act made and passed in the fifth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled ‘ An Act to regulate Tavern Keepers and Retailers;’ also, an Act made and passed in the first year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled ‘ An Act in addition to and in amendment of an Act, intituled “ An Act to regulate Tavern Keepers and Retailers;” ’ also, an Act made and passed in the second year of the Reign of Her said Majesty, intituled ‘ An Act in further amendment of the Law relating to Tavern Keepers and Retailers;’ and also another Act made and passed in the second year of the Reign of Her said Majesty, intituled ‘ An Act in addition to an Act, intituled “ An Act to prevent Desertion from Her Majesty’s Forces, and to punish unlawful dealings with Soldiers and Deserters,” ’ be, and the same are hereby respectively continued and declared to be in force until the first day of April which will be in the year of our Lord 18 .”

“ That no Inn Keeper or Tavern Keeper who shall sell upon trust or credit any Wine, Spirits, strong Beer, or other distilled or fermented Liquors, mixed or unmixed, to any person whomsoever, to any amount whatever, shall have any remedy against the said person, his Executors or Administrators, either in law or equity, for the recovery of the same; and in case any Bill, Bond or Note shall be made or executed, the consideration, or any part of the consideration of which, shall be proved to be for Liquors, sold upon trust or credit by any Inn Keeper or Tavern Keeper, the same shall be deemed and taken to be fraudulent and void in all Courts of Justice within this Province:”

To which an amendment was moved—To expunge the word “ or,” before the word “ Note,” and insert after the word “ Note,” the following:—“ Mortgages, or other securities or conveyances whatsoever.”

“That it shall be the duty of the several Clerks of the Peace, in their respective Counties, and they are hereby required, as soon as may be after the end of every General Sessions of the Peace at which Tavern or Retail Licences may have been granted, to transmit to the Town Clerks of the several Parishes a nominal list of the persons Licenced to keep an Inn or Tavern, or to sell Wine, Spirits, strong Beer, or other distilled or fermented Liquors, by Retail, in their several and respective Parishes; and it shall be the duty of such Town Clerks to make diligent enquiry in their respective Parishes, and to make known to the Clerk of the Peace or to the nearest Justice, if any person or persons be guilty or suspected to be guilty of any breach of or offence against the provisions of this Act, in order that such offender or offenders shall be prosecuted as this Act directs; and it shall and may be lawful for Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of the several Counties in this Province, at their respective General Sessions of the Peace, to order such sum of money to be paid to the said Town Clerks respectively, from the funds of the County, as remuneration for the duty imposed upon them by this Section, as such Justices in their discretion may think fit.”

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee for taking Petitions praying a like return of Duty under their consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas Carson, of the Parish of Saint Patrick, in the County of Charlotte, setting forth, that he had made purchase of a tract of wilderness Land, paid the purchase money, and cultivated and improved the same, and is now obliged to relinquish the purchase, and praying to be remunerated for loss sustained in consequence thereof; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Brown, also by leave, presented a Petition from John Carson, of the Parish of Saint Patrick, in the County of Charlotte, setting forth, that he purchased a tract of Land from the Crown, paid the purchase money, obtained his Grant, and improved the said Land; that he is now called upon to surrender that Grant, and praying to be remunerated for loss that he will sustain in the event of the said Grant being cancelled; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. End, from the Committee appointed on the 31st January last, to take into consideration the subject of Agriculture and Immigration, submitted a Report, and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred that part of the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, which relates to Agriculture and Immigration, Report:

“That having taken these important subjects into consideration, and being of opinion that Immigration is essentially connected with the interests of Agriculture, the Committee gave their first attention to that subject.

“Your Committee have had before them the several documents, explanatory of the views of the North American Colonial Association of Ireland, transmitted to the House by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, which have been carefully perused and considered. They likewise had the oral explanations and evidence of M. H. Perley, Esquire, New Brunswick Agent for that Association.

“The views and sentiments expressed by the Association, appear to your Committee to be highly satisfactory;—their propositions, based upon sound principles, and stated with candour, are impressed throughout by a spirit of liberality and patriotic feeling. The documents to which your Committee refer, are as follows:—

“First.—A communication from the Association, under their Public Seal, addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that their proposals might be laid before the Provincial Legislature, and acquainting His Excellency that, in the event of an acquiescence in their views, Mr. Perley was their qualified Agent, authorized to settle the details for carrying into effect the objects of the Association without unnecessary delay.

“Secondly.—A copy of the Act of the Imperial Parliament incorporating the Association, for the purpose of promoting a systematic Emigration from all parts of the United Kingdom, of persons of all classes and conditions, leaving the Association the uncontrolled selection from the whole of Her Majesty's North American Provinces, of the particular Colony or Colonies in which to carry on their operations.

“Thirdly.—The Prospectus of the Association, developing their plans and giving the names of the Directors and Officers, who appear to be Gentlemen of high standing, large landed proprietors, or connected with eminent Banking and Mercantile establishments in London and Dublin. The high respectability and known character of the Noblemen and Gentlemen connected with the Association, your Committee value upon as a guarantee for the bona fide fulfilment of the contemplated plans—which, your Committee observe, are susceptible of modification to meet any peculiar circumstances in either of the Colonies in which the Association may determine to plant Settlements.

“Fourthly.—An extract from a communication made by the Association to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies; and

“Fifthly.—An extract from Mr. Labouchere's reply thereto.

“The

“The document, Number Four, sets forth the circumstances which have diverted the stream of British Emigration from the North American Provinces to Australia and other parts; and document Number Five refers the Association to the Legislature of this Colony.—The Association express a conviction that the Loyal Province of New Brunswick is well adapted for British Settlements on an extensive scale, and they give this Province due credit for the enterprising spirit of its inhabitants, and the enlarged views of public policy which, upon many occasions, have actuated those who had the conduct of its affairs.

“Your Committee observe, with some degree of gratification, from the evidence before them, that the Association formed no opinion particularly favourable to this Colony, until after a full, minute and careful investigation of its circumstances and situation, and an elaborate examination of the various public and official documents on record in the Colonial Office—from which statistical tables were prepared, shewing the rise and progress of New Brunswick, from its infancy to the present time, affording the strongest testimony that it has steadily advanced at all times and under all circumstances. After cautious and diligent enquiry, the Association appear to have concluded, that whether in a social, political, or financial point of view, New Brunswick is possessed of advantages equal (and in some respects superior) to most other Colonies; that it contains germs of wealth and prosperity whose growth is not to be prevented, requiring only the judicious application of capital and labour to relieve its agriculture, develop its resources, and exalt it to the highest rank among the appendages of the British Crown.

“The Association are desirous of ascertaining whether the Legislature of the Province will grant them a Tract of Land fit for the immediate settlement of a large number of British Emigrants, upon the principle now acted upon in colonizing the Australian Colonies—that is, the remission of the purchase money towards defraying the costs of Emigration, or its application partly in paying such expenses, and partly in constructing works incident to the formation of a new Settlement,—the Association undertaking to transmit to the Province a certain number of Emigrants annually, and to provide them and their families with shelter and employment on their arrival, and engaging to procure the performance of such definite Settlement Duties upon the Land as will afford a full equivalent to the monied value of the grant.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that the Agriculture of this Province, forming the surest basis of its prosperity, and in the prosecution of which Man is not exposed to those demoralizing influences unhappily attaching to Lumbering pursuits, is at present languishing under the high price and scarcity of labour, and that the Farmer, although possessing capital and skill, is unable to obtain from the soil that rich product which its natural fertility (under the blessing of Divine Providence) would lead him to expect. That the obvious remedy for this state of things, is a reduction in the price of labour, to be only attained by rendering the supply adequate to the demand. Your Committee therefore conceive, that a large and constant current of Emigration from the Mother Country, regulated by a fixed system, and under proper management, will greatly mitigate the evil complained of. The introduction of persons of all classes and conditions, as proposed by the North American Colonial Association, would not only furnish a supply of labour, but by an infusion of British Capital, and as we hope, *British Feeling*, accompanying that labour, would materially accelerate this Province in its course of prosperity;—British settlers would joyfully aid their Colonial Brethren in the defence and maintenance of British interests; habits of British comfort would be indelibly stamped upon a British race; while the Empire would be strengthened and relieved by transferring to her Colony a portion of that superabundant population which is oppressing her with its constantly increasing weight.

“Your Committee confess themselves to be unacquainted with the details of the South Australian plan of Emigration, or its results; they therefore are disposed to require more full and perfect information before they can recommend its adoption, to the full extent, in this Province; nor would we by any means advise a measure which might encumber this Province with a pauper population, or control the present system of disposing of wild lands, under which, however objectionable its many points, the Country has never retrograded. But at the same time, your Committee conceive the proposal and plans of this Association to be so feasible, and the immediate and continuous introduction of a large body of labourers and others, into this country, so great

a desideratum, that they consider it advisable to meet the wishes of the Association, on a moderate scale, giving them every reasonable encouragement to carry out their views, while guarding the Province by judicious conditions and limitations, from the evils which past experience has taught it to fear from large Grants of Land without restriction or condition.

“ As the measures for carrying out the proposed plans of Emigration and Settlement will be somewhat novel in this Colony, and necessarily embrace a variety of details, flowing from the exigency of circumstances impossible to be anticipated or provided for, your Committee would deem it advisable to authorize the Executive Government to settle and arrange such details, subject to certain views and principles to be sanctioned by the Legislature. In order, therefore, to encourage, so far as they prudently may, the resort to this Province of a class of persons such as is contemplated by the Association, your Committee recommend that your Honorable House do address His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, advising and authorizing His Excellency in Council to grant the Association a tract or tracts of Land in this Province, fit for settlement and cultivation, containing in the whole not more than two hundred thousand acres, at a price not exceeding three shillings per acre,—two thirds of the purchase money to be remitted to the said Association, on condition of making and establishing the necessary Roads and Bridges on such tracts at their own expense, and within a limited time performing such certain definite improvements thereon, with reference to actual settlement and cultivation, as may be determined upon,—in default of which, the Lands to be reinvested in the Crown.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message:—

"New Brunswick.

"Message to the House of Assembly, 20th February, 1840.

"J. HARVEY, Lt. Governor.

"The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly an Extract from the Minutes of the College Council, on the subject of the Charter of that Institution, and submits the same to the consideration of the House.

"J. H."

The document communicated in the foregoing Message, being read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows:—

IN COLLEGE COUNCIL, 18th February, 1840.

The Council having resumed the consideration of such modifications of the Charter as might be deemed expedient, and the Report of the Committee thereon, are of opinion, that the objects for which the College was established might be secured, and objections to its constitution in a great measure obviated, should Her Majesty be pleased to ordain and grant as follows, *videlicet*:—

First.—That the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or person administering the Government of the Province for the time being, shall be the Visitor.

Secondly.—That the Chief Justice of the Province for the time being, be the Chancellor.

Thirdly.—That the President of the College be appointed by Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, or by the Visitor on Her Majesty's behalf, and that the present provision in the Charter—"That the Arch-Deacon of the Province for the time being, shall, by virtue of such his office, be at all times the President of the College," be rescinded.

Fourthly.—That the Professors be appointed by Her Majesty, or the Visitor on Her Majesty's behalf, always requiring the Professor of Divinity to be a Clergyman of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Fifthly.—That the Council consist of the Chancellor, the Bishop of the Diocese in which Fredericton may be situated, or (in the absence of the Bishop) the Arch-Deacon, the President of the College, the Master of the Rolls, the Speaker of the House of Assembly, the Secretary of the Province, the Attorney General, and six other Members, (of whom two shall be Professors in the College,) nominated or to be nominated by the Visitor, with the power of suspension in the Visitor now vested in the Chancellor, provided however, that the seat of any of the present Members of the Council shall not be affected hereby, and that no less than seven Members shall form a quorum for the despatch of business.

Sixthly.

Sixthly.—That it shall not be necessary that the Members of the Council be Graduates, nor shall any religious test or qualification be appointed for or required of them.

Seventhly.—That the Council have power to make, revoke, renew, augment or alter Statutes, Rules and Ordinances, on the motion of any Member, without the previous sanction of the Chancellor, subject, however, to the approbation of the Visitor, as now provided by the Charter.

Eighthly.—That the Registrar shall in each and every year prepare a full and detailed account, duly attested, of the income and expenditure of the College for the previous year, together with a statement of the number and names of all the Officers and Members, to be laid before the several Branches of the Provincial Legislature, within fourteen days after the meeting of the General Assembly.

The Council are further of opinion, that should the foregoing modifications of the Charter take place, it shall be expressly provided, that Divine Service in the College shall be performed according to the order, rites and ceremonies of the United Church of England and Ireland.

SIR,

I have the honor to lay before Your Excellency a Copy of an Order which I have received from the Honorable the Commissioners of Customs, No. 40, dated 25th May last, enclosing a Copy of the Coasting Regulations proposed to be adopted between this Province and Nova Scotia. I also enclose a Copy of the said Regulations, and have the honor to observe to Your Excellency that the Regulations in question, if carried into operation, would be rendered nugatory by the existing Provincial Law, 6 Wm. 4, cap. 4, sec. 3, intituled “An Act to provide for the collection of the Revenue of the Province.” It is, therefore, desirable, in my opinion, that prior to these regulations being adopted with reference to this Department, that the subject should be taken into consideration by the Provincial Authorities; I therefore transmit the accompanying papers, to enable Your Excellency, should Your Excellency think fit, to call for the Report of the Provincial Treasurer thereon, or refer the matter to the consideration of the Legislature of the Province.

In order that I may be able to comply with the directions contained in the Honorable Board's Order, I have respectfully to request that Your Excellency will be pleased to favor me with such observations as may, in Your Excellency's opinion, appear necessary.

Regulations for the Coasting Trade between the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Whereas by an Act passed in the 3d and 4th years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad,” it

it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs to make and appoint such Regulations for the carrying Coastwise of any Goods, or for the removing of any Goods for Shipment, as to them should appear expedient; and that all Goods laden, waterborne or unladen, contrary to any Regulations so made and appointed, shall be forfeited.

And whereas by an Act passed in the first and second years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," it is amongst other things enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs expedient to establish a Coasting Trade for the removal of Goods generally, or for the removal of any particular Goods, being neighbouring Ports of different Colonies, similarly circumstanced in respect of Duties in any of the British Possessions abroad, it should be lawful for the said Commissioners to issue directions for that purpose; and from and after the publication thereof in the Gazette, or other public paper printed in the said Colonies to which such Coasting Trade had been extended, the same should come into and be in full force and effect; and such Coasting Trade should be subject to the like rules, regulations, penalties and forfeitures, as the said Commissioners are authorized to make for the carrying Coastwise of any Goods under the provisions of the said Act for regulating the Trade of the British Possessions abroad.

We, the undersigned, Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us by the said Act, do hereby order that the Trade between the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall, from and after the promulgation of these Regulations, be taken and deemed to be a Coasting Trade for the removal of Goods, similarly circumstanced in respect of Duties in the said two Provinces, under the following Regulations:—

First. All British Vessels or Boats, owned and navigated according to Law, may carry from any part of Nova Scotia to any part of New Brunswick all Goods, the produce of either Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, or of the British Fisheries, similarly circumstanced in respect of Duties in the two Provinces, without Entry or Clearance.

Secondly. All such Vessels or Boats may carry as aforesaid all other Goods without Entry or Clearance, provided the Master shall keep a Cargo Book, in which shall be entered an account of all Goods taken on board his Vessel or Boat, noting the respective days on which the same had been laden, also the marks and numbers of the several packages, the qualities and description of the Goods therein, and the quantities and description of any Goods stowed loose; also the names of the respective Shippers and Consignees, so far as such particulars shall be known to the said Master, who shall also note in such Cargo Book the respective days upon which any such Goods shall be delivered out of such Vessel or Boat during each respective voyage; and the Master of such Vessel shall produce his Cargo Book to any Officer of Customs whenever the same shall be demanded, who shall be at liberty to make any remark therein which he may deem proper; and if at any time any Goods, not the produce of the Provinces, nor of the British Fisheries, shall be found on board any Vessel or Boat employed as aforesaid, which shall not be inserted in the Cargo Book, the same shall be forfeited.

Thirdly. And if the Cargo Book hereinbefore required to be kept by the Master of every Vessel carrying Goods as aforesaid shall not be duly kept on board the same, or if the same shall not be produced to any Officer of the Customs as hereinbefore required, in either of such cases, the whole of the Goods found on board such Vessel or Boat shall be forfeited.

Mr. Street moved for leave to present a Petition from John T. Williston, Esquire, William Joplin, and 340 others, inhabitants of the Town of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, praying that an Act may pass, authorizing the erection of a Lock-up House at that place, and that the said County be assessed for the erection and support thereof; and that Witnesses may be heard at the Bar of the House upon the subject.

And the Rule of the House, limiting the time for introducing Petitions, having expired, it was moved—

"That the said Rule in this instance be dispensed with, and leave granted to present the said Petition."

A Bill relating to Wrecked Property.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted.

The Bill being then handed in, was read a first time.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill for the Naturalization of Aliens in this Province.

When Mr. End moved the following amendment to be added thereto, by way of Ryder, and to stand as a Fifth Section, viz :—

“ V. And whereas it is not expedient or proper that any Alien or person of Foreign birth should, by virtue of this Act, become entitled to the privileges of Her Majesty's natural born subjects, unless such Alien or person of Foreign birth be a believer in the fundamental principles of Christianity ;

“ Be it therefore enacted, That every person applying to be Naturalized under the provisions of this Act, in addition to the oath or affirmation hereinbefore required, at the time of taking such oath or making such affirmation, shall further swear (or affirm, in cases where affirmation is allowed by law,) and subscribe to the affidavit and declaration following, that is to say,—

“ I, A. B. do solemnly swear, that I do believe in the Divine authenticity of the Holy Scriptures, and in the fundamental principles of the Christian Religion.

“ SO HELP ME GOD.”

Which oath or affirmation shall be administered by the Judge before whom the first-mentioned oath or affirmation is by this Act directed to be taken ; and no testimonial or certificate of Naturalization shall be in any wise granted under the authority of this Act, to any Alien or person of Foreign birth, who shall neglect or refuse to take the oath or make the affirmation in this Section mentioned.”

And the same being thrice read, and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House.

Resolved, That the Bill, with the Ryder, do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Boyd do take the same to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Miller, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to

A Bill to continue the Act relating to Church Wardens and Vestrymen, and to persons having voices in their election, so far as relates to the Parish Church of Saint Andrews :

With amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of the House.

At A in Section III. insert the words “ And into any shop or other place where Bread is sold, or offered for sale, and carefully to inspect and weigh all Bread so manufactured or offered for sale.”

At B insert the words "or the Commissioners of the Poor House, as the case may be."

At C in Section IV. expunge the word "Clerk," and insert the words "respective Clerks."

At D in Section V. insert the words "or on confession of the party charged."

And the question being severally put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Boyd return the Bill, with the amendments, to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

On motion of Mr. Boyd,

The House proceeded to take into consideration the amendments made by the Council to

A Bill to amend and continue an Act, intituled "An Act to repeal the Laws now in force for appointing Firewards and for the better extinguishing Fires in the Town of Saint Andrews, and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town," and for other purposes therein mentioned.

The amendments being severally read, are as follow :—

At A in Section I. expunge the remainder of the Section, and insert as follows :—

"That an Act made and passed in the ninth year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to repeal the Laws now in force for appointing Firewards and for the better extinguishing Fires in the Town of Saint Andrews, and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town, and for other purposes therein mentioned,' be and the same is hereby continued and declared to be in force until the first day of April which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty five."

And the question being severally put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Boyd likewise return the said Bill to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

Mr. End moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to repeal an Act, intituled "An Act to continue an Act intituled, 'An Act to prevent Pedlars travelling and selling in this Province without Licence.'"

And the Rule of the House limiting the time for bringing in Bills to the 20th instant, being in this instance dispensed with,

Leave was granted.

On motion of Mr. M'Leod,

A Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for Queen's County to Lease a certain Lot of Land in the Town Plat of Gagetown.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed, as amended, under the amended Title.

“That inasmuch as the present Auditor General of this Province is an Officer appointed by Government, under the provisions of no Legislative enactment upon the subject, his duties are confined merely to the Auditing of the expenses of the Collections of the Casual and Territorial Revenues, and of the Expenditure of that part thereof granted for the support of the Civil Government of this Province. The Committee are

are therefore of opinion, that it is highly necessary and desirable that a good and efficient Auditor should be appointed by Law, by whom all the Accounts of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Public Revenues of the Province should be Audited, prior to the same being laid before the House of Assembly; and have therefore prepared a Bill, under the Title of 'A Bill to establish and regulate the Auditing of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Provincial Revenues;'"—which they now respectfully submit with this Report.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the House—

A Letter from the Honorable Thomas Baillie, late Commissioner of Crown Lands, relative to a further investigation into the Accounts connected with that Department.

This communication being then read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows :—

Fredericton, 20th February, 1840.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

A short time since I received a Message from Your Excellency, through the Honorable Mr. Shore, that I should hand to the Commissioners for inspecting the Accounts of the Crown Land Office, a certain Book kept in that Office, called the "Deposit Book." This Book I had taken to my House for safe custody, as it contained many entries which I considered of the greatest importance to me personally. Upon Your Excellency's wish being communicated to me, however, (although I had left a copy of such part as related to the public in the Office) I most cheerfully presented the Book to the Commissioners, together with a correct account of all my private transactions with the several Accountants of that Office since my arrival in the Province, thereby proving that there was nothing I wished to conceal, but, on the contrary, that I courted enquiry into every public and private act in any way connected with the business.

While doing this for myself, however, I think I have a right to demand that the same course may be pursued towards others, who have had any transactions with the Financial affairs of that Office, one of whom has been recognised by the Government as exercising authority, as well during two periods when I was in England as when I have myself been present in Fredericton. I

I have reason to believe that the Commissioners would be willing to go fully into the matter, provided they were clothed with sufficient power; in which case I have to assure Your Excellency that every exertion of which I am capable shall be used to facilitate and lighten their duty, and I really believe that if certain measures which I can suggest are adopted, one month will be found sufficient to complete the business.

Life is at all times uncertain; and moreover, under present circumstances, I am particularly anxious to bring all my affairs to a close, and as I am unwilling that any person should have it in his power to say, that he had paid one penny into the Office I had held, for which he had not had proper credit, or that the Crown had lost a pound which it ought to have received, so I am also unwilling to lose anything myself; and if I have disbursed on account of the Crown more than I have received, (which I have reason to believe) it is but fair that I should have full credit for it.

I cannot help believing that such a proceeding would be highly satisfactory to most of the parties concerned, as well as to the public generally, and to myself it would be no more than an act of justice; as it does appear to me that I have now a right to demand and receive a full and formal *quietus* and discharge from the Crown for all monies received; or if that cannot be given, that the enquiry I now request may be instituted, commencing from the 1st January, 1830, which will embrace nearly all the Land sales, and so comprise every thing that may be necessary, provided the Commissioners be armed with sufficient powers to compel the necessary papers to be produced and persons to appear and answer under oath. I have therefore humbly, but earnestly, to request of Your Excellency, that the Act under which the Commissioners to examine the Accounts of the Crown Land Office are appointed, should be revived and extended, with such other provisions as the case may appear to require.

Whereas this House considered it necessary, in 1836, to depute two of its Members to England, to bring under the consideration of His late Majesty's Government certain highly important matters, in the speedy settlement of which this Province was deeply interested; And whereas a second Deputation was also deemed proper in 1837, in consequence of a difference having taken place between the two Branches of the Legislature and the then Lieutenant Governor, in the final adjustment of concessions made by His late Majesty's Government, and ordered to be carried into effect by Legislative enactment in this Province; And whereas one of the said Deputation, the Honorable William Crane, has declined receiving any compensation for the valuable services rendered by him in bringing to a successful issue the various subjects given the said Deputation in charge; And whereas L. A. Wilmot, Esquire, the associate of the said Honorable W. Crane in the said Deputation, has been subject to much loss in his professional business, independently of the time occupied on both

both said Missions, and it is therefore considered reasonable, just and proper that some remuneration should be made him therefor, and particularly as he obeyed the orders and directions of the House upon the implied understanding that some compensation should be afforded him for making so great a sacrifice; therefore

Resolved, That there be granted to the said L. A. Wilmot, Esquire, in addition to the sum of two hundred and eighty eight pounds seventeen shillings and six pence, now in his hands, unexpended monies voted for the expenses of the Deputation of 1836, the sum of £200 as a remuneration for such service in 1836.

Resolved, That there be granted to L. A. Wilmot, Esquire, the sum of £ for his services as one of the Deputation to England in 1837.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker laid before the House—

A Communication received from R. Hayne, Esquire, Commissioner for the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, containing memoranda in reference to their purchase made from Government and the operations of the Company thereon.

The same being read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows:—

NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA LAND COMPANY.

Lord Goderich, who was the Colonial Secretary during the negotiations for the purchase of the Lands now belonging to the Company, urged that 5s. per acre was the upset price for Crown Lands in the Province; and subsequent instructions were given to Sir Archibald Campbell, it is believed, to maintain them at this price, and at which they remained, until the first Session after the Casual and Territorial Revenue had been ceded to the Province, when they were reduced to 2s. 6d. and 3s. per acre.

1.—Lord Goderich expressly reserved the right of making a Road (the Royal Road) through the Company's Lands; and consequent on the operations on this line of Road, the Company expended nearly £1000 in clearing land, building log houses, and in otherwise preparing for the reception of Emigrants: to the comparative cessation of these operations may be attributed the present state of the clearances and buildings herein referred to, which are unoccupied, and the lands now in a much worse condition than if they had remained in a wilderness state.

2.—The Company have expended from ninety to one hundred thousand pounds in the Province, chiefly in clearing lands, the erection of *Grist, Saw and Oatmeal Mills, and other buildings,—in the opening of Roads, and the construction of Bridges of a superior description—witness that across the Nashwank, which was the first ever built.

3.—The Company have imported Seeds—wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, turnips, &c. &c. of the best possible quality, to the amount of one thousand pounds; and now give annual Agricultural Prizes, amounting to upwards of one hundred dollars, for the purpose of encouraging the cultivation of the soil.

4.—The price to be paid for the Company's Tract of Land, is 2s. 3d. sterling, per acre, with a
Royalty

Royalty on all the Coal excavated over and above chaldrons, amounting to per Newcastle chaldron.

5.—The Company agreed to give £1000 sterling for the Survey of their Tract of Land, which, on completion, is found to differ materially from the Plan attached to the Grant, which is the chief cause of the delay which has taken place in the conveyance of the Company's Land: this delay has been highly prejudicial to the Company's interests, and they anxiously hope it will be speedily removed.

6.—The British North American Land Company were allowed a remission of nearly one ninth of the number of acres in their whole tract of Land, to cover waste and unimprovable land, waters, &c., or 90,000 acres out of about 882,000 acres. The Company ask a remission equal to one tenth, which was, until late years, the allowance made on all grants of land in the Province.

7.—The Company have exerted themselves to promote the settlement of their land: and at this moment offer Lots of 100 acres, with a log house and small clearance adjoining, at the low rate of £25 to £40 per Lot,† or from 5s. to 8s. per acre, inclusive of house and clearance, which together originally cost the Company about £40; so that the Company are actually giving away land with the view to the encouragement of the Settlements at Stanley and Campbell.

8.—The Company ask or require nothing more than is fair and reasonable: nothing more, in fact, as regards the Conveyance, than any individual Member of the Honorable House of Assembly would look for, as a right, were he to purchase a lot of wild land at the Crown Land Office, or from any private individual.

Mr. End, from the Committee to whom was referred on the 22d instant, the Petition of Isaac Foshay, presented to the House on the 20th instant, and praying relief from a prosecution against him and his Sureties for not fulfilling a contract entered into for building a Bridge over Hammond River, submitted their Report, and having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Isaac Foshay, praying relief under the circumstances therein stated, Report:

"That in May, 1832, one John Cunningham, a Commissioner appointed to erect a Bridge over Hammond River, near Ketchum's, after a sale by Public Auction, entered into a contract with Petitioner for the building of the same according to certain specifications insisted upon by the Commissioner, and agreed to by Mr. Foshay; that the contract was executed by the parties, and secured by the Bond of John C. Vail and Abel Sands; that the Bridge was to be completed by a certain time,—to be upheld in serviceable order for seven years, and at the expiration of that period, to be delivered over to the public, in good, sufficient and substantial repair; that the Bridge was erected by the Petitioner, and opened to public use nearly two months sooner than required by the contract; and your Committee (in the absence of all positive testimony) presume that it was built according to the specifications, for they find that the Petitioner hath received the whole contracted price from the Commissioner, part of which, by the terms of the contract, was not to be paid until '*the completion of the Bridge.*'

"That while the Commissioner was offering the contract to public competition, he repeatedly called the attention of the bidders then assembled, to a quantity of scantling and plank, belonging to the Province, lying in the immediate neighbourhood, and collected for the purpose of building a Bridge over the same River, and described this scantling and plank as suitable, fit and proper for the Bridge, of which he had charge; and that this scantling and plank were soon afterwards bought from the Province by the Petitioner for the sum of £150, and constituted the whole of the covering and the principal part of the frame work of the said Bridge.

"That by the terms of the contract the piers were required to be of Cedar.

"That the Bridge had not been more than two years in use when it became dangerous, and a subject of general complaint;—the Cedar piers, from the spongy and porous nature of that wood, proving altogether insufficient to sustain the superincumbent

cumbent weight; the planking, in a great many places, being infected with dry rot, and some of the stringers and king post braces likewise perishing by the same disease.

“That the Petitioner, at his own cost and charges, during the last four years, has kept the Bridge in such repair that teams have been in the habit of using it, but that it has not been maintained in that serviceable condition contemplated by the contract, nor has it been delivered over to the public in substantial and sufficient repair at the expiration of the seven years, and that it is now in a nearly ruined state and highly dangerous.

“Your Committee attribute the Petitioner’s breach of contract to the defective scantling and plank bought of the Province, and to his being required by the Commissioner to use Cedar as a material for the piers.

“Your Committee cannot close this Report without remarking that the Petitioner has endured a series of Law proceedings for his alleged default in this matter, which they trust are capable of being redeemed from the vexatious and harrassing character by which your Committee feel themselves justified in designating them.

“In 1838, a suit by *scire facias* was instituted against the Petitioner and his Sureties by Her Majesty’s Attorney General:—To this a *noli prosequi* was entered very soon after the Petitioner had entered his appearance, and shewn a disposition to defend himself.

“In October of the same year, three other suits of *scire facias* were instituted—that is, one against Petitioner, and one against each of his sureties,—to all of which the Petitioner entered appearances. This cause was ready for trial in October, 1839, but was then put off at the instance of the Crown. In November, 1839, the Petitioner sought relief from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and was informed by letter from the Secretary of the Province, dated 6th December, 1839, (now before your Committee) ‘that although from the statement, the case appeared to be a hard one, His Excellency regrets it is not in his power to afford the relief prayed for, which can only be obtained by application to the Legislature.’ That in Hilary last, the cause was not tried, owing (as the Committee are informed) to Her Majesty’s Attorney General deeming it necessary to amend his replication,—and is still pending.

“And that lately, three further actions have been instituted against the Petitioner and his Sureties, to which Petitioner has also entered a defence.

“It has been shewn to your Committee, that the Petitioner has already expended upwards of £50 in defending those Suits.

"That from personal observation in various parts of the Province, and after the most diligent enquiry, they find that the Great Roads of Communication are generally in a state of rapid progressive improvement, and that therefore it is not necessary to make any essential alteration in the Law relating thereto. They are, however, of opinion, that the allowance of ten per cent. out of the several Grants, as a remuneration for the services of the Supervisors, operates unequally, and would therefore recommend, that the Great Roads of the Province should be divided into Districts ; that one Supervisor should be appointed to each District, upon a fixed Salary ; and that the Supervisors, so appointed, should devote their time and attention to the supervision of their respective Districts during their continuance in office.

"For this purpose, the Committee have prepared a Bill, under the Title of—'A Bill to alter and amend the Act relating to the Great Roads of Communication through this Province.'

"Your Committee recommend that Plate Glass be exempted from Duty in the Revenue Bill for this year.

"No. 2.—The Petition of Phineas Williston and Brothers, praying for a return of Duties on one puncheon Rum exported from Chatham to Prince Edward Island, in November last.

"Your Committee recommend that the prayer thereof be complied with, as the difficulty of obtaining the drawback arose from the neglect of the Master in not making affidavit at the Treasury on clearing out his vessel, and that the same be referred to Committee of Supply.

"No. 3.—The Petition of Elisha Stevens and others, praying that a Survey may be made of that part of the Bay of Fundy and Shepody River, which lies between Grindstone Island and M'Lellan's Landing.

"Your Committee cannot recommend the same, as they think that it does not come within the sphere of Duty of your Committee.

"No. 4.—Is the Petition of the Branch Pilots of the Port of Saint John, recommended by the Agents for Lloyd's, and Liverpool and New York Underwriters, and others, praying for Legislative enactment to authorize the Pilots to receive distance money.

"Your Committee finding that the right of appointing and regulating the Pilots of the Port of Saint John rests with the Common Council of that City, and that their jurisdiction is restricted to the bounds of the Corporation, your Committee would recommend that it may be effected by extending the powers of the City Corporation in this particular, and now report a Bill for that purpose.

The Bill, relating to Wills, Legacies, Executors and Administrators, sent from the Council, was then read a first time.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having again under their consideration the Despatch from the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, relative to the Tenure upon which Public Offices are hereafter to be held, the following Resolution was moved:—

"*Resolved*, as the opinion of this Committee, that there is nothing in the Despatch of the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, now under consideration, to call forth any expression from the House on the subject of Colonial Government, and that in the event of any occurrence taking place to disturb the present happy political state of the Province, the House cannot but entertain the opinion that any loyal and dutiful representations which they may have occasion to lay at the Foot of the Throne, will receive, as they have always done, the Royal consideration."

When the following amendment was moved to the said proposed amendment—To expunge the whole thereof, and substitute the following:—

"*Whereas* the avowed object of convening this Branch of the Legislature is to make Statutes and Ordinances for, and to advise the Executive Government in, all questions affecting the peace, welfare and good government of the Inhabitants of this Province: And whereas the exercise of all Executive functions should be controlled and

and directed with a special view to the attainment of the same objects: And whereas this Committee cannot waive or forego the inherent right of this Branch of the Government to advise and assist in such control and direction, and to remonstrate against the abusive exercise of those functions; therefore

Resolved, as the opinion of this Committee, That the House should view the Despatch in question as distinctly recognizing an efficient responsibility on the part of Executive Officers to the Representative Branch of the Provincial Government."

I have the honor to enclose to Your Excellency the within Copy of a "Report of a Committee of the House of Assembly, to whom was referred the Petition of Isaac Foshay, praying relief under the circumstances therein stated," by which Report Your Excellency will see, that a strong censure has been expressed by the Committee, in relation to proceedings which I considered it necessary to adopt, in carrying into effect Your Excellency's command to compel the Petitioner to fulfil his contract for building the Hammond River Bridge.

Statement of Proceedings had in the Supreme Court, Exchequer, at the Suit of the Queen, against the Contractor for building the Hammond River Bridge.

In the SUPREME COURT, EXCHEQUER,

The QUEEN, vs. ISAAC FOSHAY, JOHN C. VAIL and ABEL SANDS.

On the 21st of August, 1838, I received from the Honorable Mr. Secretary Odell, the Letter herewith, marked "No. One," addressed to him by the Supervisor of the Great Road leading from Saint John towards Westmorland, indorsed by His Excellency as follows, to wit:

"Let this Report be placed in the hands of the Attorney General, in order that the Contractor may be compelled to fulfil the conditions of his Contract.

(Signed)

"J. H."

Upon the receipt of which, on the 13th of September, I issued a process against Isaac Foshay, John C. Vail and Abel Sands. This process was a writ of *scire facias*, returnable on the second Tuesday in October then next, which was returned, served on Isaac Foshay and John C. Vail, and *nihil* as to Abel Sands, who had removed from the Province.

This

This process was joint against all the parties *jointly* : and as one of them, to wit, Abel Sands, was not served, I could not go on with the proceedings, without first issuing an alias writ of *scire facias* against him, which would not be returnable until the first Tuesday in February then next. Early in November following the return of the said first writs, part of the Bridge in question had given way and fallen down, which having taken place subsequent to the proceedings then instituted, would not be matter of evidence in the cause, under the terms of the contract, as that damage was subsequent to the action commenced. Therefore, as no time would be lost by discontinuing those proceedings, and the Defendant would be put to no additional cost by my commencing *de novo*, I, with the advice of the Solicitor General, entered a *noli prosequi* in that case, and commenced a new action. And in commencing those new proceedings, in order to avoid the delay which must arise by including all the parties jointly, I proceeded separately against each, on their *joint* and *several* Bond, and the process was returnable in the February Term following ;—whereas, had I proceeded jointly, as in the first instance, the parties would have had time until the second Tuesday in June following, and it being a joint and several Bond, I was compelled to join them all, or proceed separately against each, as I could not include Isaac Foslay and John C. Vail by themselves ; and, in the mean time, the public were sustaining injury for the want of a safe Bridge.

The cause then proceeded regularly : the declarations were filed in due time, and the Defendants pleaded “ full performance of all which was required from them under their contract,” and replications were filed by me, suggesting certain breaches. To this replication the Defendants Attorney thought proper to file a demurrer as to matter of form, which demurrer it was necessary should be argued and decided before a Trial could be had, which circumstance prevented the possibility of a Trial at the Sittings of the Court in July last. The demurrer then stood for argument, and was not proceeded with in consequence of the urgent wish of the Defendants Counsel that it might stand over until the February Term, when he confidently expected, that in consequence of a Petition which the Defendants intended to lay before the Legislature, a compromise would take place, and which was acceded to by the Solicitor General and myself, on his, the Counsel, undertaking that if the demurrer should be overruled when the Court met in October, he would take short notice, and proceed to the trial at the October Sittings of the said Court.

Shortly subsequent to this, in a consultation between the Solicitor General and myself, it was determined between us, as the causes stated in the demurrer were merely as to matter of form, and did not affect the cause of action, that I should withdraw the replication which had been demurred to for defect in form, (not that we had any doubts on the Law) and reply *de novo*, yielding to the Defendants his exceptions as to the matter of form, and file an amended one, containing a more specific assignment of breaches, which was accordingly done by the consent of the Defendants Counsel, and such amended replication was placed on the files of the Court. Subsequent thereto, the Defendants Counsel applied to one of the Judges of the Court, and obtained an order, giving him thirty days time to file a rejoinder, in consequence of which, there was not time to bring the cause to Trial at the Hilary Sittings in February now past ; and for this I was not particularly anxious, as I had understood from the Defendants Counsel, as before stated, and indeed from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, through the Secretary, the Honorable Mr. Odell, that a Petition on the subject, which had been presented to the Governor and Council, was to be laid before the Legislature at their meeting on the 28th of January, when it was supposed some compromise might be made with the Defendant relating thereto.

And now with regard to the third action of which complaint is made, I have to say, that by the terms of the original agreement, the Defendant covenanted and bound himself to keep the Bridge in perfect repair for the term of seven years from the time it was completed, and at the end of that period to yield and deliver the same to the Commissioner appointed to receive it, perfectly sound and in good repair. That period was the first day of December last past ; therefore, it was one strong additional reason with me not to press the Trial for the want of repairs, which had gone by, when the period for the final delivery in good and perfect state was so nearly at hand.

Shortly previous to that date, to wit, the 1st of December, in consequence of a communication from me to His Excellency on the subject, a Commissioner, to wit, Benjamin L. Peters, Esquire, was duly appointed to receive the Bridge from the Defendant under the terms of his contract, who duly attended to that duty, and made report to His Excellency that the said Bridge was not in a situation to be received, according to the covenants contained in the said contract.

Shortly after which report, it was communicated to me by the Honorable Mr. Secretary Odell, that His Excellency having received a Petition from the Defendant on the subject of the Bridge, that it was His Excellency's wish that no action should be taken on the said Report until after the 28th of January, when the Legislature would be in Session, and the Petitioner would have an opportunity of submitting his case to that body, and thereby ascertain whether his Petition would be favorably received.

In this state the case remained until the 3d day of February, instant, when I addressed the Note, numbered “ Two,” to the Honorable the Secretary, to which I received the answer contained in “ Number Three.” Immediately on the receipt of which, as no time could be lost, unless I occasioned great delay of further proceedings for four months, I issued the third processes alluded to in the Report of the Committee, which processes have merely been served, and were returned on Saturday the 15th instant.

I trust the above explanation will prove satisfactory. I certainly did not imagine that in the correct, conscientious and faithful discharge of my duty, as Attorney General, and that with as much forbearance

forbearance and consideration for the situation of the Defendant as I could justify, I should have been called upon to exculpate myself from a charge of *vexatious* and *harassing* conduct in the discharge of that duty.

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having again gone into consideration of the business referred to them, had passed a number of Resolutions, which he read, and they being handed in at the Clerk's Table, were there again read, and are as follow :—

Resolved, That there be granted

To the Justices of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, the sum of £990 13 9 to reimburse the Superintendent of the Temporary Provincial Lunatic Asylum established in the said City, for the support of that Institution in 1839.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the sum of £78 12s. to reimburse them for Duties paid on a Fire Engine and Apparatus, imported from the United States, subsequent to the great Fire in August last.

To Neal M'Lean, of Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, the sum of £8 5s. being remission of Duty on a puncheon of Rum destroyed by accident.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £100 for the payment of the Commissioner in 1839, for over expenditure which was rendered absolutely necessary to preserve the Public Wharf near Gagetown, and for finishing the approaches thereto.

To the Commissioners for running a Stage between Fredericton and Newcastle, in Northumberland, the sum of £30 in support of a Team Ferry Boat, plying at the entrance of the North and Southwest Branch of the Miramichi River.

To the Reverend Jerome Alley, the sum of £32 10s. to finish the Madras School in the Town of Saint Andrews, and that no further grant be made to this Institution.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £50 for a Missionary to the Melicite Tribe of Indians, stationed in Fredericton, for 1838, and the like sum of £50 for 1839.

To Mary Harned, widow of the late Alward Harned, formerly Doorkeeper to this House, the sum of £20 to assist her in her present situation.

To James M'Indoe, formerly one of the Messengers of this House, from which he was obliged to retire in consequence of extreme ill health, £20 to aid him in his present circumstances.

To Mary Dingee, widow of the late James Dingee, the sum £15 for accommodation afforded to Her Majesty's Troops on their march to Canada and the upper part of this Province at various times, the said Mary Dingee not keeping a Public House.

"The Committee appointed to take into consideration the several Petitions preferring charges against the Supervisor of the Great Road from Saint John to Hayward's Mills, beg leave to Report:

"That they have made diligent enquiry into the subject matter of the said Petitions, and the several allegations of the same, and after careful investigation and examination into the several alleged causes of complaint, cannot find that the Supervisor was in any way to blame, in any of the proceedings complained of by the Petitioners. From various documents laid before the Committee, it appears that contracts, with certain well defined specifications and conditions, had been, in the usual manner, entered into for the performance of Road work, and that the Supervisor had withheld certain sums in several instances where the work had not been completed agreeably to such specifications. The Law, making the Supervisor the sole judge of the performance of the contractors, and holding him and his sureties liable for his doings, does not permit your Committee to decide in any case of dispute between him and any of his contractors, all such cases being referable to the legal tribunals of the Country.

"Your Committee feeling the propriety and justice of extending due protection to a Public Officer, more especially where it appears that, in a trial before a competent Court, he was successful on the merits, have no hesitation in recommending that the Petitioner's Counsel fee, £5 16 8, his personal expenses, £4 4s., and six day's detention of himself and his horse, £3, amounting in the whole to the sum of £13 0 8d. should be provided for by the House. But a further claim of the Petitioner for £15 16s. being the amount of the taxed costs in the cause, your Committee consider inadmissible, inasmuch as the Petitioner can have his remedy by execution against M'Pherson and Forbes, on the judgment which he has obtained.

“The Committee appointed to take into consideration the various Petitions and other matters relating to certain contemplated alterations on the Road between the head of Bellisle and Kingston, beg leave to Report:

“That after a careful examination of the documents, consisting of three Petitions, the Report of Exploration, and a Map shewing all the explored lines, their courses, distances, elevations and depressions, they are of opinion, that it is expedient to adopt the line laid down in the Map, as commencing near Gillis', at the head of Bellisle, thence along near the Shore to Ganong's, thence by a line through the Beaver Dam Hollow to the present Great Road, and thence, including the alteration laid down on the Map, to the Court House in Kingston. The whole of this distance is seventeen miles and three quarters, and the estimated expense of opening and completing the same is £1,875, a portion of which the Committee would recommend to be granted for that purpose during the present Session.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

The

The Honorable Mr. Crane, from the Committee on Internal Communication, submitted their Report, and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred the consideration of all Petitions or applications in aid of Internal Communication throughout the Province, and also all applications for assistance to promote Communication by Packets or otherwise to the neighbouring Colonies, Report:

“That impressed with the necessity of rendering our Internal Communication as efficient as possible, not merely in reference to the ordinary interests of the Province, but as preparatory to that state of affairs in which circumstances may sooner or later involve us; and being convinced that increased facility of communication, and many advantages, have resulted from the Legislative aid hitherto afforded, your Committee recommend a continuance of the same, subject, however, to a rule of distribution to be ascertained by the extent of accommodation rendered to the public, as well as the safety, regularity and rapidity of the conveyance.

“In reference to the Stages now receiving Legislative assistance, your Committee do not deem it expedient to grant money to more than one establishment on the same line of Road, and recommend that four horse Stages, and those running twice or thrice a week, should be deemed entitled to a portion of pecuniary aid larger than others; that two or more Commissioners should be appointed to superintend each line, and that no Warrant should be issued in favour of any establishment until a majority of the said Commissioners shall have certified that the respective Stages have been in all respects properly and efficiently kept up, and due attention paid to the accommodation of the public.

“Your Committee have perused a letter, dated the fourteenth day of February, instant, addressed to His Honor the Speaker by the Chairman of a Committee appointed by the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, to take into consideration the subject of a Daily Communication between Halifax and Saint John; they have also had under consideration a Petition from the Chamber of Commerce of Saint John. This being a matter of very great importance, likely to become very expensive, and affecting many interests, your Committee are of opinion that the necessary information cannot be obtained otherwise than by Commissioners to be appointed from this Province, who, during the recess, shall meet Commissioners from Nova Scotia, and report on the subject at the next meeting of the Legislature.

“The Committee have had under consideration the Petition of the President and Directors of the Woodstock Stage Company, and recommend that there be granted in aid of that Establishment the sum of £200.

“Also the Petition of the Honorable Thomas Wyer, President of the Saint Andrews and Saint John Stage Company, and recommend a grant to be made to them of £200.

“Also the Petition of the Proprietors of the Victoria Coach Company, on the line from Saint John to Dorchester, and recommend in aid of the said Company £250.

“Also the Petition of James Bradley, Proprietor of the Daily Communication between Fredericton and Saint John, and recommend in aid of the same £150.

“Also the Petition of James M. Kelly, for additional aid towards running a Stage between Fredericton and Miramichi, and recommend that if the said Stage is run twice a week in future, that there be granted for that purpose £50.

“Also the Petition of James Tilley and others, praying a grant of money to assist them in clearing out Loder's Creek, in the Parish of Sheffield, County of Sunbury, and recommend that there be granted for that service the sum of £50.

“Also the Petition of James Tilley, Thomas Harrison, and others, praying Legislative assistance to enable them to erect a Wharf at or near the Public Landing in Sheffield, and recommend that there be granted for that purpose the sum of £25.

“Also the Petition of Stephen Peabody, George Miles, and others, praying for a grant of money in aid of individual subscription to assist them in protecting the Banks of the River Saint John, in the Parishes of Maugerville and Sheffield; this object your Committee do not consider to be immediately within the scope of their duty.

“Also the Petition of James R. Tupper, praying aid to keep up a conveyance from Woodstock to the Grand Falls, and recommend that there be granted him for that purpose £50.

“Also

“ Also the Petition of William Weeks, praying aid to run a Packet to Prince Edward Island, and recommend that there be granted for that purpose £40.

“ Also the Petition of John Trenholm and others, praying aid to enable them to pay a Courier to convey the Mails from Cape Tormentine to the Post Road, and recommend that there be granted for that purpose £20.

“ The Committee also recommend that there be granted in aid of keeping up a conveyance from Dorchester to Bathurst £100.

“ Also that there be granted in aid of a public conveyance from the Bend of the Peticodiac, in Westmorland, to Shediac, the sum of £25.

“ The Committee have also had under consideration the Petition of Barnet Rogers, Lyman Ballow, Philip White, William White, William Simpson and Joseph Burgoyne, praying for aid to assist them as Ferrymen for the transportation of Passengers and the Couriers carrying the Mails, and in the present state of the Post Office Establishments in this Province, the Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the said Petitions to the favorable consideration of the House.

“ The Committee recommend the Petition of Isaac Turner and others, praying for aid to explore a Road from Point Wolfe River to the Parish of Saint Martin's, to the favorable consideration of the House.

“ They also recommend that the prayer of the Petition of John Winters, for return of Duties, be complied with.

“ The Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Petition of George E. Ketchum and others, to the favorable consideration of the House, liberal appropriation having been made in aid of conveyance by Coaches on the same route.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to give directions to Her Majesty's Attorney General to adopt proceedings at Law against the Author or Publisher of the said Newspaper for the said false and scandalous Libel; and further

Resolved, That the Legislative Council be requested to join in said Address.

To which Mr. Street moved as an amendment—To expunge the whole of the foregoing Resolution, and substitute the following:—

Resolved, That the Libellous article contained in the Saint John Chronicle of the 28th February last, under the Signature of "W." is too ridiculous and contemptible in its nature to call forth any notice from this House; inasmuch as His Excellency's character stands too high in the estimation of the People of this and the adjoining Provinces, and is too well known to be injured thereby, and inasmuch as it might only have the effect of giving to the article in question a degree of importance and notoriety, of which it is altogether unworthy.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to bring under the notice of Her Majesty's Government, the propriety and expediency of paying the Salary of the Master of the Rolls from the Surplus arising after the payment of the Salaries and other charges now chargeable upon the Civil List.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Messages:—

"Message to the House of Assembly, 9th March, 1840.

"J. HARVEY, Lt. Governor.

"The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly, a Copy of a Report made by the Honorable the Attorney General and Colonel Shore, with an Account of Expenses, amounting to £91 19 9, which the Lieutenant Governor deemed it indispensably necessary to incur, to relieve the Inhabitants of Madawaska from a state of severe and increasing distress, and for which he recommends that provision be made.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In consequence of Your Excellency's Letter which was received by us at Madawaska, on the subject of the suffering state of many of the Inhabitants of that Settlement for want of provisions, we called on the Reverend Mr. Langevin, the Roman Catholic Priest, and communicated the contents thereof to him.—He said it was true, that a number of persons in the Settlement were really in a suffering state for the want of food, which, from its great scarcity, could not be procured for money, —the communications with the Settlement having been impeded the whole spring by the flooded state of the Rivers, which prevented all supplies being got up, even by the Merchants.

But

But the *real* distress was chiefly confined to poor Canadians and their families, who had immigrated in the course of the last year or two from the Canada Settlements, about Saint André, the River Ouelle and Deloup,—that the real Madawaska Parishioners were not many of them in that state.

The Priest was much gratified at ascertaining Your Excellency's intention of affording the assistance contemplated—but suggested that it would not answer to make a direct issue of provisions, even to those persons who actually were in need thereof, unless the same could be effected as a remuneration for labour of some kind, as the report of such aid being furnished in the way of donation, would very soon reach the settlers on the Saint Lawrence, and induce great numbers to remove to Madawaska immediately, by which means the distress would be eventually increased.

At our suggestion, it was at length arranged that Lieutenant Colonel MacLauchlan, who, as Supervisor of the Canada Line of Road, was then about selling the Road, (as it is called,) should reserve small parts of half or quarter of a mile in extent in different places, to be worked by such of these poor people as should produce the Priest's Certificate, who would receive provisions in advance, and if they should fail in performing the labour sufficient to pay for the whole amount of provisions, such deficiency only would be chargeable to the fund intended for charity, under Your Excellency's intentions of affording assistance.

As no provisions are to be purchased at Madawaska, it will require that the same shall, for the present, be advanced from the Queen's Stores at the Great Falls.

“GENTLEMEN,

“I came among you charged by our Gracious Sovereign to announce to the Inhabitants of this Loyal Province, the Royal decision upon a proposition which had been laid by them at His Majesty’s feet, and with respect to which, to use the emphatic language of one of the most excellent men and ablest Statesmen of his day, ‘The King had only to be satisfied of its advantages, as respects the interests of His faithful Subjects of New Brunswick, to insure for it His Majesty’s most willing and gracious assent.’ The circumstances, therefore, under which I assumed the administration of the affairs of this Province appeared to be calculated to disarm political hostility, to calm party feeling, and to unite all classes of the King’s Subjects in gratitude towards their Paternal Monarch, and in a desire to manifest their confidence in His Representative. From that hour to the present I have devoted myself zealously, and, I will add, laboriously, to the duties of my station, and have used my best endeavours to convince the Legislature and the People of this Province of my anxious desire to administer its Government upon sound, Constitutional principles, in conformity with the commands of my Gracious Sovereign, and, therefore, in accordance with the wishes and interests of Her Majesty’s Provincial Subjects;—and that I have not wholly failed in effecting these important objects of my mission, I proudly appeal to the Legislature and the Country, from both of which I have received so many gratifying assurances and proofs of confidence and satisfaction. To say that I am *deeply sensible* of these repeated marks of approbation and good will, is to use language which very inadequately conveys the intensity of the feelings under which I now address you.

"With reference to the immediate cause of your present Address, I would observe, that from an early period after my arrival in this Province, I found myself, my measures, and my confidential advisers, assailed through the press in question, by calumnies so bitter, so malignant, so personally abusive, so atrociously and scandalously false as to excite my utmost indignation and *astonishment*, never before having in any Country, been made the object of anything of the kind, during the whole course of a long public life.

"That these attacks have proceeded from a small and disappointed party, I have not entertained a doubt,—but that any individuals of respectability can have lent themselves to anonymous proceedings of so mean, so base, so unmanly a character, I must continue incredulous, until such proof shall have been produced as may satisfy the minds of a Jury of the Country.

At F. at the end of the same Section, add “And it shall be the duty of the Owner or the Master, or the Officer or Consignee of such Ship or Vessel, complaining as aforesaid, to supply for the use of the said Mariner or Seaman, all necessary bedding, provisions and maintenance during the time of his detention in prison as aforesaid, and pay to the Gaoler of said prison his lawful fees on receiving and discharging such Mariner or Seaman; and in default thereof the said Gaoler may make the supplies aforesaid and maintain an action therefor, together with the fees aforesaid, against the Owner of the said Vessel, or the Master, or the Officer or Consignee complaining as aforesaid, in any Court of Record, or if the same shall not exceed five pounds, before any Justice of the Peace, according to the provisions of the Act, intituled ‘An Act to regulate proceedings before Justices of the Peace in Civil Suits.’”

At G. in Section IV. insert the words “knowing him to have deserted from or to belong to any other Ship or Vessel in the Province.”

At H. in the same Section, insert the words “in the case of persons allowed by law to affirm.”

At I. insert the word “charged.”

At K. expunge the remainder of the Section, and insert as follows:—

“He may be entitled to on board the Vessel entered by him after such desertion, to be detained by the Master or Owner of such Vessel to and for the use of the Owner of the Vessel from which he deserted, and to be sued for and recovered from him by such last mentioned Owner, by action of debt or on the case in any Court of Record, or before any Justice of the Peace, if the sum claimed do not exceed five pounds, agreeably to the above recited Act for regulating the proceedings of Justices in Civil Suits.”

At L. in Section V. insert the words “in the case of persons allowed by Law to affirm.”

At M. in the same Section, insert the words “in the case of persons allowed by Law to affirm.”

At N. in Section VI. expunge the remainder of the Section.

At O. in Section VIII. expunge the words “cause or procure,” and insert the words “provide or procure, or cause to be provided or procured for.”

At P. expunge the Section, and insert the following:—

“IX. And be it enacted, That if any person shall detain any Seaman or Mariner's Clothes, Chest, Hammock, or other property, it shall and may be lawful for any two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, upon complaint made to them by any such Seaman or Mariner, on oath or affirmation (in the case of persons allowed by Law to affirm), to issue their Warrant directed to any Constable of the County in which such Justices shall have jurisdiction, requiring the said Constable to bring such Clothes, Chest, Hammock, or other property before them, and to summon the person so detaining the same to appear before them to answer for such detainer, and upon a full hearing of the case on the oath, or affirmation (in the case of persons allowed by Law to affirm,) of the parties and their witnesses, taken *viva voce*, or on proof that the person required to be summoned could not be found and that a copy of such Warrant was left at his last place of abode, the said Justices shall and may make such order touching the articles mentioned in the said Warrant and so brought before them, and the delivery thereof to the party complaining, or the restoration thereof to the party charged

charged with detaining the same, as may be reasonable and just: and in case the articles cannot be found, on proof thereof and on the appearance of the party charged and hearing all parties as aforesaid, or proof of the service of a copy of the said Warrant as aforesaid, then the said Justices shall and may order payment of the value thereof, together with the costs of prosecution, if the same shall to them appear reasonable and just, to be levied by warrant of distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party upon whom such order shall be made, to the use of the said Seaman or Mariner, and in default thereof the said person so detaining the same to be committed to Gaol, there to remain without bail until the payment of the sum so ordered and costs aforesaid: Provided always, that no proceedings shall be had unless the value of the articles alleged to be detained shall not exceed ten pounds: And provided also, that no Innholder, or Tavern Keeper, or other such person, shall be allowed to make any claim before the said Justices for any lien on the said articles mentioned in the said Warrant, or any debt due from the said Seaman or Mariner, if it shall appear that the said Seaman or Mariner was, at the time of such application, a deserter from or belonging to any Ship or Vessel."

And the question being severally put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Rankin do return the Bill, with the amendments, to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill further to provide for the expenses of the Legislature.

And upon the question, that the said Bill do now pass and be sent to the Council for their concurrence, the House divided—

Mr. Jordan, from the Committee appointed to investigate the several applications for School allowance, submitted their Report, and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“ The Committee to whom were referred sundry Petitions praying grants of money for services rendered by teaching Schools in certain Parishes, Report :

“ That your Committee have gone through a laborious examination of the several Petitions, in number thirty eight, fourteen of which your Committee have rejected, twenty three of which your Committee have approved of, and one of which, (being very peculiar in its nature,) your Committee have deemed it proper to submit for the favourable consideration of the House.

“The principles on which your Committee have acted, are as follow:—

“To reject all Petitions of persons not licenced, or not recommended by the Trustees of Schools; and all applications for compensation in addition to that which the Petitioners received under the existing Law; and all applications for pensions; and all applications in cases where it did not appear that the inhabitants had complied with the conditions required by Law.

“Your Committee have favourably considered all applications of licenced Teachers recommended by the Trustees, where the Provincial allowance had not been received on account of some neglect or mistake of the Trustees; and also all applications of persons, duly qualified and recommended, who had taught School under the sanction of the Trustees, but for whom the Trustees could not certify to the Sessions, by reason of the Parish having already had its full number of Schools.

“Your Committee have had before them several Petitions from licenced Teachers, duly recommended, in cases where all the conditions of the Law had been complied with, but for whom the Trustees declined to certify to the Sessions, under an impression that the certificate ought not to be given unless the Teacher were actually licenced during the *whole* period of service.

“Your Committee consider this a too rigid construction of the Law, and are of opinion that the circumstance of a Teacher's licence being dated subsequent to the commencement of the time of service, should not prevent the Trustees from granting a certificate.

“Your Committee trust that as a Law has passed during the present Session, authorizing an increased number of Schools in each Parish, that the House will not in future entertain any application from Parish School Teachers, who cannot claim under the provisions of the Law, unless under very extraordinary circumstances.

“Your Committee have rejected the Petitions of Henry Rigby, Mary Albee, Patrick Shields, Mary Berte, J. C. Beckwith, Henry Caldwell, John Cameron, James Robertson, and others, Dorcas Clarke, Julia Crowley, Thomas Burnett, John Murdock, Andrew Shanklin, and William Bell.

“Your Committee recommend that there be granted to Melissa Ann Black, the sum of £16 13 4 for teaching a School in the Parish of Saint Martins, in the County of Saint John, for ten months ending 14th January, 1840.

“To David Kilpatrick, the sum of £10 for teaching a School in the Parish of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, for six months, ending 20th January, 1839.

“To Hugh M'Lean, the sum of £10 for teaching a School at Richmond, in the Parish of Woodstock and County of Carleton, for six months, ending 26th December, 1839.

“To Ezekiel C. Wilson, the sum of £20 for teaching School in the Parish of Hampton, in King's County, for one year, ending 13th September, 1838.

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, That the rights of Mining in the County of Westmorland should be disposed of at Public Auction, and that the following Regulations be observed at the Sale, and the following terms prescribed:—

1st. That a part of the land supposed to contain the Minerals in that County be divided into Lots as follows:—The first to extend from the junction of the Peticodiac and Memramcook Rivers, north, until it meets a prolongation of the lower side line of lot No. 45, granted to Peter Le Blanc, in Dorchester, and to extend eastward to the rear line of the front lots on the said Memramcook River, from the lower side line of Lot, No. 14, granted to Charles Dixon, and to extend westward to the Peticodiac River:—The second lot to extend from the said lower side line of lot No. 45, to the lower line of the escheated Des Barres tract:—The third lot to extend from the lower side line of the said Des Barres tract, to the Bend of the Peticodiac River.

2d. That the preference money on the said lots be as follows:—Fifty pounds on the first tract:—Thirty pounds on the second:—Twenty pounds on the third; to be paid by the purchasers, respectively, to the Receiver General, or other person authorized to receive the same, on the day of sale.

3d. That the rights of Mining on each lot be separately put up for the term of Twenty five years, at an upset rent of 5 per cent. of the Minerals raised, to be delivered to an Agent for that purpose to be appointed, at or near the place or places of Mining, to be delivered half yearly on the 1st day of May and 1st day of November in each year.

4th. That two years be given to each purchaser from the day of sale to explore and select his Mining ground within the lot purchased by him, which ground so to be selected, is in no case to exceed three miles square.

5th. That the purchaser of each lot, after having explored and selected his ground, shall cause a survey and plan thereof to be made by some duly authorized Deputy Surveyor of the Province, and filed in the Office of the Surveyor General; and that after such plan shall have been confirmed at the said Office, a Lease of the Mines comprised therein shall be forthwith made out in accordance therewith.

6th. That after the said Lease is executed and delivered, the Lessee shall be allowed to work the said Mines for three years free of any rent or charge.

7th. That if the Lessee shall not have actually commenced Mining within two years after the date of the Lease, the same shall be forfeited.

8th. That if the rent be behind or unpaid for the space of Thirty days after the same shall have become due, the Lease shall be forfeited.

9th. That the Lease contain a clause of renewal; and that the Government may take the improvements at a valuation to be made by Arbitrators mutually chosen by the Surveyor General for the time being, and by the Lessee or his Assigns.

10th. That with regard to other parts of the said County not hereinbefore mentioned, the Surveyor General be authorized to expose for sale by Public Auction tracts of not more than six miles square, with the same time for exploration and selection hereinbefore mentioned, to be reduced by such selection to three miles square, with Twenty pounds preference money on each Lot, and subject to the same terms as hereinbefore prescribed.

11th. That in no case shall a Lease be executed for more than three miles square.

12th. That if the Lessee or his Assigns shall neglect to work the Mines within his Lease for any two years during the continuance thereof, the said Lease shall be forfeited and revert to the Crown.

“The Lieutenant Governor submits to the House of Assembly, a Report of the Commissioners

Commissioners appointed to superintend the expenditure of the money granted for the erection of additions to the Province Hall, with an Account, and an estimate of such further sum as will, in their opinion, be required for completing the work.

Fredericton, 12th March, 1840.

SIR,

Having been appointed by Your Excellency as Commissioners for the expenditure of the Money granted for the erection of additions to the Province Hall, we immediately, after our appointment, advertised for Tenders, and closed a Contract for the sum of £1620.

Owing to the delay which was caused by the Short Session in September last, the Contractor could not finish the work in time, and some portion therefore remains to be completed during the present year, to secure the performance of which we have retained £120 on the Contract.

We have the honor herewith to lay before Your Excellency an account of our expenditure of the £2000, shewing a balance of £47 13s. not applied.

In consequence of many alterations made during the progress of the contract-work, and the erection of an additional Building, a further sum will be required to pay for those services, and from the accounts rendered to us of those services, we are of opinion that a further sum of £2000 will be required from the Legislature, as well to pay for those extra services as defray the expense of other additional work, which we know will be required to be done.

John, and of laying out other Streets therein,' having examined the several allegations set forth in the said Petitions; and having examined the Plan and Assessments of the Commissioners appointed under the aforesaid Act, beg leave to Report as follows:

"That so much of the Plan, Assessment and Report as relate to Dock Street, be cancelled, and henceforth be deemed null and void.

"That the said Commissioners be authorized and empowered to extend Dock Street ten feet only on the east side thereof, and to make a new assessment of the damages arising therefrom.

"That the damages be apportioned in a different manner than provided for in the said Act: and the Committee respectfully recommend the following apportionment as one more just and equal in its operation:—

"The sum of £3000 to be paid out of the Province Treasury by Legislative appropriation; one third of the residue of the gross estimate to be assessed on the parties interested in any Lands in the Burnt District, so called; one third of the said residue to be paid by the Corporation of the said City; and the remaining third of the said residue to be assessed on the Inhabitants of that part of the said City on the Eastern side of the Harbour, excluding from the said assessment the lands, tenements and hereditaments within the said Burnt District.

"And the Committee further beg leave to submit a Bill, prepared for the purpose of carrying into effect these their recommendations.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Messages referred to them again under their consideration, they had passed several Resolutions, and he having read the same, as well as such divisions as were had thereon, handed them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were again read, and are as follow:—

On motion of Mr. Hill,

The House proceeded to take the said Address into consideration, and it being then again read, was unanimously agreed to, and is as follows:—

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Joint and Humble Address of Her Majesty's Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

The Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in behalf of Her Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Inhabitants of the Province of New Brunswick, beg leave, with the most profound humility and respect, to represent for the Gracious consideration of Your Majesty,

That

That under the operation of an Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the second year of Your Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for the prevention of loss of Life, and Vessels clearing from Ports in British North America wholly or in part laden with Timber with deck loads, from the 1st day of September, 1839, to the 1st day of May, 1840," the Trade between this Province and the West Indies, as well as with the United States of America, and also the Coasting Trade, has been materially injured, owing to the construction given to the Act by the Officers of Customs, and Law Officers of the Crown in this Province.

That although no Timber, properly so called, is ever exported from the Province to any other than the Ports of Great Britain, the Officers of Your Majesty's Customs and the Law Officers, have considered the true construction of the Act to refer to Deals, Boards and other Lumber, as well as Timber, and to the Trade with the West Indies and other parts, as well as the Mother Country; and no Vessels laden with Deals or Lumber of any kind have accordingly been allowed to clear out with Deck Loads: at the same time an entirely different construction and line of conduct have been adopted in the Sister Province of Nova Scotia.

That the injury to this Trade has been materially enhanced by the different construction which has thus obtained in the neighbouring Province of Nova Scotia, by which not only are the Vessels of this Province induced to repair thither and load, instead of receiving their loading at home, but the singular anomaly is occasioned of Vessels of two Provinces so closely connected, sailing some with and some without Deck Loads, governed by the constructions thus given to the same Act.

That the duty on Lumber imported into the West Indies from the United States becomes, under the present system, no longer a protection to the Lumber exported from this Province, the freight earned by the Vessels of that country on the Deck Load, which our Vessels are not allowed to carry, about equalizing the amount of the duty they have to pay, thereby rendering the object of the duty nugatory.

That in consequence of this decision many Vessels which had been built purposely for the West India Trade, and so constructed as to carry Deck Loads with safety to the Vessel and the lives of those on board, and with advantage to the owners, have either been laid up, are turned into some other Trade, or are prosecuting the one for which they were expressly built with great loss; while it is important to press on the attention of Your Majesty that this Trade has not been attended by the loss of life and destruction of property known to exist in the transmission of Timber to Europe; and it is therefore conceived, whatever ambiguity may arise from the terms of the Act, that was the only object intended to be embraced by its provisions.

That for West India voyages there is no part of the year more dangerous to Vessels sailing from the North American Colonies than between the months of May and November, which is the period excepted from the operation of the Act, and emphatically the period for hurricanes in those warm latitudes; thus prohibiting Deck Loads to be carried at a season of the year when our Vessels leave a cold for a milder climate, and allowing them at a time when the danger is greatest, and thus presenting another argument to prove that it could not have been the object of the Imperial Parliament to interfere with this portion of our Trade.

The Council and Assembly therefore beg leave most respectfully to lay this representation before Your Majesty, in the humble hope that their apprehension of the highly injurious consequences which have resulted and must continue to result to this important portion of the Trade of the Province, may be removed by Your Majesty's Government refraining to have the Act referred to continued, so far as the same relates to the Trade of this Province with the West Indies and the United States, and also as respects the Coasting Trade.

And as in duty bound will ever pray.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the sum of £3,000 towards relieving the heavy assessment upon the said City, consequent upon the Act for widening several Streets therein, for the preservation of property and preventing the ravages of Fire, agreeably to the Report and recommendation of the Select Committee on this subject, made to this House on the 16th instant; out of which the expenses incurred, and to be incurred, by the Commissioners appointed to carry into effect the Acts of Assembly for widening the Streets, to be paid.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £30 towards the expense of exploring, by a Commissioner or Commissioners to be appointed for that purpose, a proposed new line of Road along the Shore of the Bay of Fundy, from Wolfe Point to Quaco, as contemplated by the Petition of Isaac Turner and others; and to make Report of the same at or before the next Session of the General Assembly; the results of such exploration to exhibit the courses and distances, the levels and probable expense of opening the same.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £300 for the purpose of building a sufficient Bridge, with a Draw therein, over the Musquash River, on or adjoining the site of the present Bridge, near the residence of G. C. Carman, Esquire; the said sum to be paid to the Lancaster Mill Company, on their undertaking and giving security to build the Bridge without further claim on the Province, and to maintain the Draw in said Bridge at their own expense; the same to be taken out of the grant made this Session on the Great Road from Saint John to Saint Andrews.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £100 for the purpose of running a Packet to carry Mails from Saint Andrews to Deer Island, Indian Island, Campo Bello and Grand Manan, and back from those places to Saint Andrews.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £260 18s. to reimburse the Commissioners appointed to enlarge the Secretary's Office, and to provide an Office for the Clerk of the Pleas, being the balance of expenditure for those services.

To Thomas Wood, a licenced Teacher, the sum of £15 for teaching a School in the Parish of Botsford, in the County of Westmorland, for nine months, commencing the 19th November, 1835.

That

That the following sums granted in the year 1838 for the following Bye Roads in King's County, but not drawn from the Treasury or expended thereon, be reappropriated, and applied towards the improvement of the same Bye Roads, viz:—

The sum of £15 for the Road from Moses Hodge's, by Moses Innes' and Motley's, to William H. Baxter's;

The sum of £10 for the Road from William H. Baxter's to Sussex line;

The sum of £10 for the Road from Mitchell's Corner, by Joseph Moody's, to M'Affee's;

The sum of £10 for the Road from the Mill of the late James Smith to the County line towards Loch Lomond;

The sum of £15 for the Road from Richard Smith's Corner to Beattie's Ferry; and further, that the sum of £10 granted in the same year for the Road from the Midland Road, near Mabee's, to the Picwacket, near Jerome Seeley's, and which was returned into the Treasury by P. Dann, be reappropriated, and applied to cut down and improve the Road between John Brittain's and Kingston Church.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £— for the improvement of the Road from Burnt Church, in the County of Northumberland, to Shippegan, in the County of Gloucester; £— of which to be laid out from Burnt Church to Tabusintac, and the remaining sum of £— from Pokemouche to Shippegan,—such amount as may be necessary of the latter sum to be applied in improving a great swamp or morass on part of the said last line of Road.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, the Committee divided—

To the Justices of the Peace residing in the Parish of Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, the sum of £50 towards building a Wharf on the Saint Croix, in the said Parish, for the accommodation of Steam Boats and other Craft entering the said River.

To Thomas White, the sum of £10 to enable him to keep up a Ferry between Oak Point and Waweig River, on the Road to Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, the same not to be paid until the end of the year for which the sum may be granted, and not then unless the said Ferry has been properly attended.

To William Simpson, the sum of £10 to enable him to keep up a Ferry between Waweig and Oak Point, in Charlotte County, the same not to be drawn until the end of the year for which the sum may be granted, and not then unless the said Ferry has been properly attended.

To the Chairman of the Committee of Public and Private Accounts, the sum of £150 for various services performed by him during the recess, and also for extra services during the Session, in Auditing and Reporting the said Accounts.

To Edward L. Jarvis and Company, the sum of £44 5s. being for return of Duties on goods destroyed by Fire at Saint John on 17th August last.

To W. H. Street and W. P. Ranney, the sum of £135 19 10, being amount of Parliamentary Duties on goods consumed at the great Fire in Saint John in 1837.

To William Hammond, the sum of £67 3 1, being amount of Parliamentary Duties on Goods consumed at the great Fire in Saint John in 1837.

Mr. Miller, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to

A Bill for enabling persons indicted of Felony to make their defence by Counsel :

A Bill to alter and amend an Act to provide for the safe keeping of the County Records, so far as regards the County of Carleton : and

A Bill to authorize Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Gloucester to assess the said County, for repairing the Public Buildings therein :

Without making any amendments thereto.

And that the Council had agreed to

A Bill to incorporate the Saint John Orphan Benevolent Society,

With an amendment, to which they desire the concurrence of the House.

Mr. Street, from the Committee appointed yesterday, to take under consideration the subject recommended by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, as regards a Steam Communication between this Province, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“ The Committee to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of the 9th instant, laid before this House on the 10th instant, on the subject of promoting a Steam Communication between Miramichi, New Brunswick, Charlotte Town, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou, Nova Scotia, submit the following Report :

“ That the Committee having had the subject matter of this Message under consideration, are of opinion, that it is an object of great importance to this Province that a Weekly Steam Communication be kept up between Miramichi, New Brunswick, Charlotte Town, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou, Nova Scotia; but that owing in part to the expensive description of the Boats required for that Line, and the additional fact of the Boat being only able to run about six months out of the twelve, the Committee are of opinion, that such a Steam Communication cannot be kept up without Legislative aid; and therefore recommend, that an annual sum of £350 be granted for five years, commencing from the 1st of May, 1841, in aid of the above object, provided a good and efficient Steam Boat, of not less than eighty horse power, be run on that Line, under such restrictions as shall secure to the Public the accommodation contemplated; and the Committee are further of opinion, that this sum, with the aid that will doubtless be

be afforded by the Legislatures of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, should afford sufficient encouragement to procure a good sufficient Weekly Communication on the line above mentioned.

The Honorable Mr. Crane, from the Committee appointed on the 10th day of February last, to take under consideration the several matters as regards the purchase made from the Crown by the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, submitted their Report ; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“ The Select Committee to whom was referred the subjects of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Land Company's purchase, have attended to the duty devolved upon them, and beg leave to submit the following Report :

“ The Committee have had before them the following documents :—

“ 1st. The Grant to the Company dated 5th November, 1835, for 558,214 acres.

“ 2d. Lease of Coals for 10,000 years, dated 28th December, 1836, at 2s. per chaldron on the Coals raised ;—the Committee are informed that the Company have also obtained a Lease for — years of all the Minerals and Fossils within this tract.

“ 3d. Two letters of Colonel Hayne, the Company's Commissioner, to the late Commissioner of Crown Lands, dated 10th January, 1839, and the other dated 16th January, 1840.

“ 4th. Report of the Company for 1838, published in London in March last.

“ The Committee have also had the Company's Commissioner before them, and have examined him particularly as to the Survey and the details connected therewith. Several points have been brought by the Commissioner to the notice of the Committee, the most important whereof are as follow :—

“ 1st. That the exterior lines of the Company's tract have not been adjusted, inasmuch as the lines forming the North West angle do not close. On this point, the Committee beg leave to refer to a Despatch from the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, dated 22d December, 1835, to the late Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of the Survey of the Company's Land, wherein His Lordship says, ‘ the exterior Survey is, I understand, already complete.’ This information it appears His Lordship must have obtained from the Deputy Governor of the Company in London, and therefore should be taken as conclusive on this point. But in addition to this, the Committee observe the following paragraph in the Annual Report of the Company printed in London, and dated 14th March last :—‘ After a lengthened period of delay the Survey of the Grant by the Crown Officers has been completed. By Captain Hayne's Annual Report recently received, it would appear that on closing the Survey, the tract is found to comprise only 559,151 acres.’—These evidences the Committee conceive must put at rest any question as to the exterior Survey.

“ 2d. The next point brought before the Committee as connected with the Survey, is, that 55,821 acres, equal to 10 per cent. of the gross contents, should be deducted for unimprovable Lands, Lakes and Rivers. On this point the Committee beg leave to state, that it does not appear that any stipulation to that effect was made in the original contract of purchase. In the next place the Land was selected after examination and inspection, and the Grant received without any such deduction, so that the Company took their title with full notice of the Waste Lands ; and lastly, not only was the price of the Land low, but the Company have received the two Leases of Mines, Minerals and Fossils.

“ Since the Grant of the Land passed without paying any additional consideration therefor, and as some of the Lands considered as waste and unimprovable, may be the most valuable for Mining operations, and as the Rivers intersecting the whole tract enhances in a very great degree the value thereof, the Committee therefore cannot recommend any allowance to be made to the Company on these grounds.

“ The

“ The next point brought before the Committee is, that as the sale price of Crown Lands has been reduced since the Company’s purchase from 5s. to 3s. by a late Act of Assembly, some allowance should be made by the Legislature for loss to the Company in the sale of their Lands. This claim for consideration is not founded on correct premises, for at the time of the Company’s purchase, Crown Lands were being sold as low as 2s. 6d. per acre for settlement, and since the Grant passed large portions of Crown Lands have been sold at over 6s. per acre. The Committee cannot learn that any pledge was given by the Government to the Company, that the Crown Lands should be kept at 5s. per acre, nor could such a pledge be prudently given, as it would be unjustifiable to control and direct the sales of the whole Crown Lands in the Province with a view to the private interests of any one man or set of men, and for these reasons we cannot recommend that any allowance be made to the Company on this score.

“ The only point remaining worthy of notice is, that as the Company may hereafter have some difficulties with the proprietors of the adjoining Lands, owing to the difference between the lines on the Grant Plan and the lines of actual survey, the Government should indemnify and save harmless the Company from all suits and claims which may hereafter arise in consequence thereof, but as the Grant and Plans were completed under the inspection and approbation of the Agent, the Committee cannot discover why the Company should have advantages and protections which are never extended to other Grantees; they cannot recommend any allowance to be made on this point.

“ The Committee would observe that the Company have been in the peaceable possession of the whole tract since their Grant came out, and it does not appear that any difficulties have as yet arisen with regard to the exterior or interior lines of the Tract.

“ The Committee, in conclusion, would recommend that the sum of £485, Currency, be credited to the Company, on account of tonnage money received at the Crown Land Office for Timber cut on the Company’s Tract, between agreement for purchase and the issuing of the Grant.

And the question being put thereon,

Whereas highly important Military services were rendered to their Queen and Country by Lieutenant Colonel Maxwell, of Her Majesty's Thirty Sixth Regiment, and the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers under his command, while commanding the Forces stationed on the Upper Saint John, for the protection and defence of the Northwestern Frontier of this Province; And whereas those services were eminently distinguished, as well by untiring zeal on the part of the said Lieutenant Colonel Maxwell, and the Officers under his command, for the improvement of the Provincial Militia, as by the most unremitting vigilance over the extended line of defence, whereby those Officers and Soldiers have not only obtained the highest approbation of His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, Commander in Chief of this Province, in the District General Order of the 27th of March last, but have justly merited the grateful acknowledgments of Her Majesty's subjects in this loyal Province; therefore

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, for the time being, the sum of £350, annually, for the next five years, from the 10th day of May, 1841, for the purpose of encouraging a Weekly Steam Communication between Miramichi, New Brunswick, Charlotte Town, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou, Nova Scotia; Provided that a good and efficient Boat, of not less than Eighty Horse power, be by the period above named put upon that line, and that the same do run regularly not less than once a week between the above mentioned places, between the 10th May and the 20th November, each year, during the same term, (going and returning within the week) and proceeding up the River Miramichi as high as the Town of Newcastle, each trip, both on the arrival and departure of the said Boat, to discharge and receive Freight and Passengers, touching at Douglstown for the same purpose, both on her arrival and departure, and stopping at each of those places each time not less than half an hour;—which sum shall be paid annually to such person or persons as may run such Boat, by Warrant, under the hand and seal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, only on its being certified to him, by Commissioners to be by His Excellency appointed to superintend such Steam Navigation in this Province, that a good and efficient Boat of the power aforesaid has been put on said line, and that the conditions of this grant have been, for the year for which the grant is applied to be paid, in all respects complied with.

A Bill to repeal certain Sections of an Act, intituled "An Act for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John:"

Without making any amendment thereto.

And that the Council had also agreed to

A Bill imposing Duties for raising a Revenue.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot, from the Select Committee appointed to prepare a Bill for granting portions of the Crown Lands to the North American Colonial Association of Ireland, reported, that the Committee had attended to that duty, and directed him to report a Bill, intituled "A Bill to authorize the granting of certain tracts of Land to the North American Colonial Association of Ireland, and to prescribe the terms and conditions thereof;" which he was directed to submit to the House.

“ That there being no Establishment in the Province for the purpose of placing convicted Criminals to hard labor, when sentenced thereto by the Courts, your Committee think it highly desirable that the House of Correction now building near the City of Saint John should be accepted as a Provincial Penitentiary, and that an Act should be passed at the next Session to authorize the transportation of Criminals from the several Counties to Saint John; and they further recommend that a Grant of money be made at the present Session to the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint, John payable in 1841, to enable them to complete the said Building.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Weldon; further

Ordered, That the said Report be referred to the Committee of Supply.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the following Returns from the Office of the Surveyor General, made up in pursuance of an Address to His Excellency of the 9th instant, viz:—

Particulars of the Five Year Licences granted in the years 1838 and 1839, shewing the amount paid thereon, the quantity of Timber and Logs cut, and the Excess returned by the Deputy Surveyors as cut on such Licences:

Particulars of Timber and Logs cut on Land for which agreements to purchase had been made, but not completed, in the same years: and

Return shewing what amounts remain unpaid on Timber and Logs cut in Excess, as also on such as was cut on Lands purchased, but not paid for or secured.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot, from the Committee to whom was referred the subject recommended by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, relative to a Canal between the Bay of Fundy and the Saint Lawrence, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“ The Select Committee appointed on the 31st January last, to consider that part of His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the present Session, relative to the connexion of the Bay of Fundy with the Gulph of Saint Lawrence by means of a Canal, have attended to the duty devolved upon them, and beg leave to submit the following Report:

“ The Committee have given this important subject great consideration, and are therefore the more deeply impressed with the necessity of adopting immediate measures for the prosecution of a work which, when completed, will not only greatly advance the Commercial interests of this Province, but will also conduce to the Colonial union and strength of all the North American Colonies.

“ Under these impressions, the Committee are happy to find that the attention of the Home Government has been called to this subject, and that His Excellency the Governor General evinces such an interest in the undertaking, as will ensure His Excellency's powerful influence and co-operation in the future prosecution of the work.

“ Although several Surveys have been made, in order as well to ascertain the best line for the Canal as to estimate the probable expense thereof, yet the Committee are of opinion that neither of the Surveys and estimates heretofore published should be relied upon so far as to justify the commencement of the work without a further exploration.

“ The Committee would respectfully press upon the House the necessity of immediate and efficient action on this all important subject; and as it is on every account desirable to insure the assistance of British capital in the prosecution of this great enterprise,

enterprise, the Committee are of opinion that nothing can so certainly guarantee such assistance, as a survey of the line and estimate of the expenses made by a British Engineer of high character and standing.

"The Committee therefore unanimously recommend that the sum of £1000 be put at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, towards defraying the expenses of a new Survey to be made by a person thoroughly conversant with the Science of Civil Engineering, during the coming season; and that His Excellency be respectfully requested to communicate this Report to His Excellency the Governor General, and also to the Lieutenant Governors of the neighbouring Colonies, and desire their assistance and co-operation in this important measure.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee appointed on the 12th instant, to take under consideration Petitions praying permission to surrender to the Crown certain purchases of Lands, to report thereon.

Read as engrossed,

The Resolutions of Appropriation made and passed in Supply yesterday the 23d instant.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward do take the said Resolutions to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Hill,

"Whereas it is desirable that the Receipts and Expenditures of the Public Revenue of the Province, from whatever sources derived, should be audited by some person unconnected with this House; And whereas it is inexpedient that there should be more than one Audit Establishment for the Province; And whereas the present Salary of the Auditor General is a sufficient compensation for an efficient performance of the above service; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to direct the Auditor General to perform the duty of auditing the Receipts and Expenditures of all the Public Revenues of the Province, from whatever sources derived; and that His Excellency will also be pleased to take such measures as he may deem necessary to secure an efficient discharge of the above service, and cause the Accounts so audited to be annually laid before this House, at as early a day in every annual Session of the Legislature, as may be practicable."

To which Mr. Wilson moved the previous question—

That the question upon the Resolution be now put.

And upon the question, the House divided—

YEAS, 3.

NAYS, 17.

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Hill,

"Whereas it is a duty which this House owes to the Constituency of the Province, to guard its Members against the suspicion of being actuated by other than motives of Public good, and to prevent as much as may be, the constant, though silent efforts of the Executive to extend its influence, by the distribution of its patronage; And whereas the appointment of Members of this House to places of emolument is in con-

travention of a well established constitutional doctrine, inasmuch as it has a direct tendency to fetter the freedom of action of its Members, by presenting to their minds motives of Public conduct inconsistent with a faithful and independent discharge of their Public duties; And whereas a like Rule should be applicable to Members of the Legislative Council, inasmuch as their freedom of conduct is, in common with Members of this House, liable to be affected by their hopes or their fears arising from like causes; And whereas the payment by the Province of the un-salaried Members of that Body, for their services as such, removes the only plausible ground on which such appointments could be made; And whereas the promotion of harmony between the different Branches of the Legislature requires the exclusion of all influences which may have a tendency to interfere with the prerogatives of the Crown, or with the independence of the Representatives of the People, or Members of the Legislative Council; And whereas the passing by the Legislature, upon accounts of Monies expended by its own Members, is anomalous in its character, and frequently exposes them to the suspicion of want of fidelity to the Public interests; therefore

Resolved, As the opinion of this House, That appointments from either Branch of the Legislature to places of emolument, should, in future, be avoided by the Executive of the Province."

To which Mr. L. A. Wilmot moved the previous question—

That the question upon the said Resolution be now put.

And upon the question, the House divided—

YEAS, 5.

NAYS, 17.

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the matters referred to them again under their consideration, had passed a number of Resolutions, and he having read the same, they were handed in at the Clerk's Table, and there again read, and are as follow:—

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £108 5 1 to reimburse David Crocker for exploring a line of Road between Tettagouche and Eel River.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £16 4s. to reimburse J. E. Woolford, the Barrack Master at Fredericton, for loss of Stores issued for the use of the embodied Militia in 1839.

To the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, the sum of £88 8 8 to reimburse them for expenses incurred for the support of transient Poor in the said Parish, from the 13th May, 1839, to the 6th February, 1840.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £300 towards providing Materials for building a Bridge across the Arestook.

To A. Wedderburn, Emigrant Agent at Saint John, the sum of £50 in addition to his Salary of £100 sterling, chargeable on the Civil List.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief of the Province, for the time being, a sum not exceeding £1,500 as a loan to the Disputed Territory Fund, and to be repaid out of the first monies which may come into the hands of the Receiver General from any Securities taken for Timber cut upon the said Territory.

To William Watts, the sum of £— as a public mark of approbation for his laudable exertions during several years past, as a Nurseryman, Florist and practical Gardener.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions engrossed, and leave to sit again granted.

On motion of Mr. Street,

“Whereas the Committee on Roads, in their Report upon the Petitions of James Gilmore and others, Donald M’Kay and others, and Alexander M’Laggan and others, praying a grant of a sum of money in aid of individual subscription, towards building a Bridge across the Northwest Branch of the Miramichi, have referred the prayer of those Petitions to the House ; And whereas it appears by the said Petitions that the sum of six hundred pounds, or thereabouts, has been already subscribed by the Inhabitants of Northumberland towards that highly desirable object ; therefore

“*Resolved*, That this House will, at the next Session of the Legislature, grant, in aid of individual subscription, the sum of two thousand pounds towards the erection of the said Bridge, on its being made to appear to the satisfaction of this House, that not less than the sum of five hundred pounds of the said individual subscription in aid of that object has been actually paid and applied thereto, or placed in one of the Incorporated Banks for that purpose.”

Upon the question for sustaining the Resolution, the House divided—

YEAS, 6.

NAYS, 13.

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Brown, from the Committee to whom was referred the Petitions from Thomas Carson and John Carson, and George Acheson, presented to the House on the 6th and 18th of February last, severally praying remuneration in consequence of being called upon to surrender certain tracts of Land purchased from the Crown, submitted their Report ; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk’s Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“The Committee appointed on the 17th instant, to take into consideration the Petitions of Thomas Carson and others, setting forth, that they purchased at Auction from the Honorable Thomas Baillie, certain tracts of Crown Land then represented as vacant, and which afterwards appeared to have been previously granted, by which one of the said Petitioners was subjected to the payment of heavy expenses in an action at Law, and all of them to the loss of labour, and expenses connected with the purchase and improvement of the said Lands, Report :

“That they have attended to that duty, and that they have had before them the Honorable Thomas Wyer, who was present at the sale, and who states, that from an investigation which took place at a former period, when he himself intended to make a purchase, he was satisfied that there was no vacant Land there. That he made this statement publicly to the Commissioner at the time of the sale, and that in reply, Mr. Baillie stated, that from a Survey recently made he was satisfied that there was vacant Land there ; and that the Attorney General having been consulted, was also of the same opinion, and that under these circumstances the purchases were made by the Petitioners.

“The Committee have also had before them a letter from Mr. Mahood, who made the Survey, wherein he states, that it was decided by the Attorney General that the Land was vacant, which was afterwards sold to the Petitioners ; and since the Report in the case of the Petitioner George Acheson, the Honorable Thomas Baillie has endorsed on the said Petition, a certificate, setting forth, that at the time when he was before the Select Committee, several circumstances had escaped his recollection, and that he had stated prior to the trial, that Government would indemnify Mr. Acheson in case he failed in the Suit.

“From these considerations, your Committee are of opinion, that the Petitioners are entitled to some further remuneration than the mere return of their purchase money,
and

and therefore respectfully recommend them to the favourable consideration of the House.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the House—

Report from the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency under an Act of the Assembly, passed in the year 1837, for examining into the Accounts connected with the Crown Land Office, from the year 1831 to 1836, inclusive.

And the same being read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows :—

“ *Report from Commissioners for examining into Accounts connected with Crown Land Office, from the year 1831 to 1836, inclusive.*

“ MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

“ Having been appointed by Your Excellency in 1837, under an Act of Assembly, Commissioners for investigating the Accounts connected with the Crown Land Office from 1831 to 1836, inclusive, we beg leave respectfully to acquaint Your Excellency, that we have made a diligent and careful examination of the various documents laid before us, and others which we had occasion to call for, and we now proceed to inform Your Excellency the result ; and first we have to remark, that the unbusiness like manner in which the proceedings of the Office have been conducted, and the want of method in making up the Accounts, rendered our labours much more complicated and difficult than they otherwise would have been, many instances having occurred in which monies were paid into the Office not having been credited until one and two years subsequent to their receipt, and besides, the Duties received for excess and unlicensed Timber were so intermingled with those for which regular licences had issued, that it became extremely difficult to trace out and classify them.

“ Much time and labour were occupied in examining the Deputy Surveyors Reports and comparing them with the Dockets, but as many important Reports were not on file, and consequently could not be furnished, the investigation into this most essential branch of our duty was not so comprehensive as we could have wished.

“ The result of the investigation is as follows :—

Timber and Lumber as shewn by the Deputies' Reports, which we cannot discover as being credited, and to account for which the Office is unable—

“ For the above amount we consider the late Commissioner of Crown Lands accountable to the Crown.

“ But we think it proper to state that the following proportions of this deficiency of Credits took place during the absence of Mr. Baillie in England, in part of the years 1831, 1832, 1833, and 1834, while the Office was under the superintendence of Mr. J. A. Beckwith, as Deputy Commissioner :—

“ The above amount of deficiencies is all we consider necessary to bring under the notice of Your Excellency ; yet we could have particularised transactions to a very large amount which ought to have been credited in 1835 and 1836, and which we subsequently discovered had been carried to the credit of the Revenue in 1837—a circumstance which would have swelled up the amount to a very large sum, and which must have inevitably been reported, had not we, as Members of the Legislature, been conversant with the accounts for the latter year, and thought it necessary to refer to them, after we had first ascertained that the various sums were not credited where they ought to have been, although our authority, as Commissioners, did not extend to investigate beyond 1836.

“ We have deemed it unnecessary to particularise the various parties who have paid the above monies, or the names of the Deputies who have made the Returns. The latter were detailed in seventy four interrogatories we made to the Office on the 31st January, 1839, and to which we received the answers we have the honor to annex to this Report ; and we consider it but an act of justice to Mr. Baillie to state, that in every instance where we sought for information, he appeared desirous and anxious to afford it, and directed that we should on all occasions have full and free access to all the books and documents in the Office.

“ We have also abstained from remarking on the immensely large sums paid to the different Deputies, and the total absence of an efficient audit of the respective claims. These have all been paid under the requisite authority, yet in some instances we discovered that the late Lieutenant Governor, Sir Archibald Campbell, when directing a Warrant to issue for the payment of accounts submitted to him, endorsed them as being, in his opinion, very extravagant and objectionable, and we cannot avoid saying, that we entirely coincide in such an expression of sentiment.

“ The large salary which appears to have been paid to Richard M'Laughlin, who had the control of the Crown Revenues in Northumberland and Gloucester for so long a time, after it became notorious that he had become utterly incompetent to perform, and in fact was not discharging his duty, could not fail to strike us as an extraordinary procedure ; but, as we before observed, the payment has been made under the authority existing at that time, and cannot now be disturbed. This is one of the Deputies to whom allusion is made in a preceding part of this Report, scarcely any of whose Reports to the Office were on file, and consequently did not come under our examination.

“ Among other subjects to which we turned our attention, were the accounts of the late Receiver General, and we endeavoured by a thorough and critical investigation, to discover, if possible, how the great deficiency to the Crown (about £7,000,) could have arisen, which appeared by the account submitted by the Administrators immediately after his death (January 1836) ; but we regret to say, that our efforts in this respect have been unavailing. We have, however, satisfied ourselves on one point, which we conceive worthy of remark, and that is, it almost entirely took place between June, 1834, and December, 1835, a period only of eighteen months—the balance at the former date in his hands being about £600, and that, therefore, the remaining £6,400 must have arisen within the time mentioned—an occurrence, we cannot avoid remarking, we consider incredible.

“ In discharging the duty confided to us by Your Excellency, we have spared no pains, with a due regard to avoid expense, of giving every matter connected with the commission, the best attention in our power, and only regret that we could not have submitted a Report at an earlier period ; but when it is considered that the accounts through which we had to wade were so voluminous and complicated, and that to the written interrogatories put to the Office we did not receive the annexed reply for twelve months, we trust that Your Excellency will be satisfied that no unnecessary delay has taken place on our part. Some of the Reports from the Deputies,
handed

handed to us only three weeks since, we have been unable to investigate, and should anything arise hereafter from these documents, or from some other Reports which we still hope to be forthcoming, we will notice them in a subsequent communication.

“ The Committee on Light Houses, to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of 22d February last, submitting a Report from L. Donaldson, Esquire, who was employed to inspect the Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, and recommending that provision be made for the permanent appointment of a Surveyor of Light Houses, with an adequate Salary, as well as remuneration to Mr. Donaldson for his past services, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to Report :

“ That from the services rendered by L. Donaldson, they think that the Commission allowed on expenditure is by no means a remuneration for the same, and in accordance with the views expressed by the Commissioners last year and the present, they now recommend the sum of £175 18 7 be appropriated, to make the Salary equal to £250 per annum ; but they cannot recommend that any provision should be made for past services, although they agree that those past services have been very valuable to the public.

“ The Report of Mr. Donaldson on the state of the Light Houses, is very lengthy and ably drawn up, and shews the different Establishments to be in a very efficient state.

“ That they have had the same under consideration, and on reference to the Act of 6th Wm. 4th, c. 4, they are of opinion, that Vessels coastwise, arriving at the different Ports in this Province, not having on board articles subject to duty, are not required to make a Report at the Treasury Offices in this Province, the second Section of the said Act making Vessels having dutiable articles only, subject to the subsequent provisions of the said Act.

“ Your Committee would therefore recommend that the principles Offices of Her Majesty's Customs should carry out the instructions of the Honorable the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, as far as the same can be consistently done, with due regard to the protection of the Revenue collected under the Imperial Acts, and should it be found that any inconvenience is felt by the operation of the ‘ Act to provide for the collection of the Revenue of this Province, ’ of the 8th March, 1836, such alteration may be subsequently made, as may be found necessary.

"Whereas His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor did, by Message dated the 18th day of February last, bring under the notice of this House the Plan of a Building proposed to be erected by Mr. John Walker, in the City of Saint John, for a Custom House, Treasury and Bonded Warehouses, together with Letters from the Collector of the Customs and the Province Treasurer on the subject, and the same being referred to a Committee of the whole House, the Committee reported, that the same should be recommended to the favorable consideration of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor; therefore

"*Resolved*, As the opinion of this House, That the erection of the proposed Building would be an accommodation for Public Offices at Saint John, as well as an ornament to the City; and further

I have had the honor to receive your Letter of the 9th instant, addressed to my Predecessor, conveying the representation of the Members of the Royal Yacht Club, upon the complaint made by the owner of the Schooner Yacht Royalist, of that Vessel having been subjected to certain Local dues and Customs at the Cape of Good Hope, and I have to request that your Lordship will cause me to be informed of the advantages enjoyed by the Royal Yacht Club in the Ports of this country, in order that I may be able to judge whether it would be proper to recommend to the various Colonial Legislatures to grant to them similar indulgences, and that I may be the more able correctly to estimate the probability of the success of any such recommendation.

MY LORD,

I have been favored with your Lordship's Letter of 28th December, 1839, requesting I would furnish your Lordship the advantages enjoyed by the Royal Yacht Squadron.

The Royal Yacht Squadron pay no Lights or Harbour dues, at Home or in Foreign Ports.

They carry the White or Saint George's Ensign by Admiralty Warrant.

Quarantine Laws, the same as Men of War not having a Cargo.

The complaint made by the Royalist of the Squadron was, that Harbour dues were demanded (very civilly) at the Cape of Good Hope, and paid, being the first Yacht that had visited that Port, and the Authorities stating that they had no knowledge of the Royal Yacht Squadron.

The Members in consequence would feel greatly obliged if your Lordship would have the goodness to request the Authorities to grant the same indulgence that is allowed in England and Foreign Ports.

I have desired the Secretary, Mr. Bates, to forward your Lordship a French Certificate (which is the same to other Nations except in the National language,) which, with the Admiralty Warrant, are shewn on entering a Foreign Port, exempts us from paying Harbour Dues.

I have had the honor to receive your Lordship's Letter of the 5th instant, and I have to acquaint you, in reply, that I shall be happy to recommend the request of the Royal Yacht Squadron to the favorable consideration of the Legislative and other Local Authorities in the various Colonies, with whom, however, it must rest to adopt or to reject it.

In the meantime, I would observe to your Lordship, that there are very few, if any, of the British Colonies in which Port and Harbour dues are not either vested in Corporate Bodies, independent of the Crown, or appropriated by Local enactments with which the Crown has no power to dispense.

Extract of a Letter from the Secretary to the Royal Yacht Squadron to the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, dated 8th January, 1840.

"I beg permission, my Lord, to state, that as the Yachts of the Squadron are not employed in carrying Cargoes or any kind of Merchandise, but used for pleasure only, employing thirteen hundred Seamen annually, and improving Naval Architecture, the Governments of this and all Foreign countries have granted many indulgences to the Royal Yacht Squadron, admitting them without payment of Port dues, and in most Countries upon the same footing as Men of War.

"Each Yacht is provided with an Admiralty Warrant, authorizing her to wear the Saint George Ensign, and Certificates in the different languages. On production of these documents, Yachts of the Squadron are admitted into all Ports free of Port dues—not obliged to enter and clear out at the Custom Houses in England, as Merchant Vessels are obliged to do—permitted to remove their furniture, &c. in their own Yachts without communicating with the Customs, and many other privileges."

On motion of Mr. M'Leod,

Whereas, in the opinion of this House, the request of the Royal Yacht Squadron, that their Vessels should be received in the Ports of Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions on the same footing as they are in England and all Foreign Ports, is reasonable and proper; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to take such measures as may be in his power, to insure the reception into the Ports of this Province, of all Vessels belonging to the Royal Yacht Squadron, on the same footing as they are received in England and in Foreign Ports; and that this House will make good any remission of Duties which may be made during the current year upon such Vessels, or until an Act of the Legislature may be passed to exonerate them from Duties.

At E in Section II. insert the words “nor less than five.”

At F expunge the words “by some duly qualified person,” and insert the words “under the direction of the Surveyor General of the Province.”

At G expunge the word “six,” and insert the word “twelve.”

At H expunge the word “one,” and insert the word “three.”

At I expunge the word "one," and insert the word "three."

At J expunge the words "one tenth," and insert the words "nine per cent."

At K expunge the word "ten," and insert the word "eight."

At L insert the words "blocks of."

And the question being severally put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher do return the Bill, with the amendments, to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Whereas the Bridge across the Musquash River, on the Great Road leading from Saint John to Saint Andrews, is in a very dilapidated state, and a new one is therefore absolutely necessary, and required to be built with the least possible delay; And whereas in the erection of a new Bridge across the said River, it would much commodate the great Lumbering Establishments, in the vicinity, and particularly the Lancaster Mill Company, if a sufficient Draw were made in the same, to allow Vessels, Boats and Scows to pass through, when required, in order that free access may be had to such Establishments; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to appoint a Commissioner to erect a new and substantial Bridge over the Musquash River, at or near the site of the present Bridge, across the said River, near the residence of G. C. Carman, Esquire, with a good and sufficient Draw therein; provided the Lancaster Mill Company shall contribute towards the erection of said Bridge, and bind themselves to defray any expense that may accrue by reason of a Draw being in said Bridge; and that this House will make provision for the sum of £200 for the same, at the next Session of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward, Mr. H. T. Partelow and Mr. Taylor, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Miller, Master in Chancery, communicated to the House, that the Honorable Mr. Peters was appointed a Committee on the part of that House, to join such Committee as may be appointed by the Assembly, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Joint Address of both Houses to Her Majesty, congratulating Her on Her Marriage with His Royal Highness Prince Albert of Saxe Coburg and Gotha.

On motion of Mr. Fisher,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed on the part of this House, to join the Committee appointed by the Legislative Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the said Address.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher and Mr. Hayward be the Committee for that purpose; and further

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher do acquaint the Council therewith.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee to whom was referred the several matters, connected with Arrearages due on Purchases of Lands from the Crown, as well as other claims, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Select Committee appointed by the House to take into consideration all Arrearages due upon Crown Land Purchases, and also the out-standing Balances at the Crown Land Office, Report:

"That having the same under their consideration, they have found it necessary to class the matters referred to them under several heads, with a recommendation as to what course should be pursued upon them respectively.

1st. In reference to the Balances due from Purchasers of Crown Lands, over three hundred acres, who have paid one or more Instalments of the purchase money,—but no Patent has issued to the Purchasers, nor have the persons purchasing cut any Timber or Logs upon the Land applied for,—

"Your Committee recommend that they be required to come forward and pay the
balances

balances due upon such Purchases, by the 10th of September next; and in the event of their failing to pay the balance, the money already paid be forfeited and the Land revert to the Crown, and all Bonds or other securities given be cancelled; and in cases where one or more Instalment or Instalments be paid, and the parties have cut Timber and Logs, they should only be relieved upon payment of the Duty upon such Timber and Logs.

“That where balances are due from Purchasers who have taken out their Grants of the Land, your Committee recommend that the parties be called upon to make payment by the 10th September next; and in the event of their failing to make payment, legal proceedings should be resorted to for the recovery of the balances respectively due from such Purchasers.

“2d. Amounts due from Parties for Instalments due upon Five Year Licences.

“Your Committee recommend, that in all cases the Instalments should be required from the parties as they respectively become due; and in the event of payment of such Instalments being deferred for thirty days after the time the amount should be paid, the Bonds should be prosecuted. As regards the amounts due for Excess of Timber or Lumber cut upon Five Year Licences,—these amounts should be immediately paid, or legal proceedings had to compel payment.

“Upon the subject of the Five Year Licences, your Committee recommend, that the Reports of the several Deputies to the Land Office should shew the particular Excess cut upon each Five Year Licence, and that payment of such Excess be required within thirty days after the expiration of the year ending in June, for which time the Licence or Lease is granted. Your Committee would further recommend, that in no case should the Excess cut upon one Five Year Lease be credited upon another Five Year Lease,—but that each Lease, with the Excess cut thereon, be kept separate, and paid for accordingly. A contrary rule would operate injuriously, by enabling a party to lock up a portion of the Country from other applicants.

“3d. Amounts due upon One Year Licences, and Excess for unlicensed Timber.

“Your Committee consider that payment should forthwith be made, or legal proceedings had to compel payment.

“Your Committee regret to find so large a sum due on the five year Leases, one year Leases, and Excesses upon each, which have been allowed to accumulate and stand over, without steps being taken to secure the same or compel payment, and they conceive it to be the especial duty of the Auditor General of the Crown Revenues to bring these Arrearages before the Executive Government, in order that peremptory proceedings be had to compel payment. Your Committee would further recommend, that no Licence to cut Timber or Logs should be granted to any applicant, who may be a defaulter, until all arrearages are paid up or secured.

“Your Committee conceive, that by allowing arrearages of one year to accumulate upon another, very great confusion will arise—loss to the Revenue, and injury to those who pay promptly. That the same punctuality should be required from debtors to the Crown, for Stumpage upon Timber and Logs, as is required from persons indebted to the Provincial Revenue.

“4th. Amounts due from Purchasers for Instalments upon Crown Lands under three hundred acres.

“Your Committee would recommend, that they be called upon to pay, but that no coercive measures be adopted in case of their being unable to pay,—but that the Executive Government should, in such case, extend the period for payment, as, in their discretion, they should deem applicable to the respective cases.

“In the case of the Petition of Isaac and Thomas Murray, on the subject of their transactions with Duncan Barber, your Committee cannot recommend a compliance with the prayer, as the relief sought for would inflict a very great injustice on the general Creditors of Duncan Barber and Company; but your Committee would respectfully recommend, that all claims against Duncan Barber, for or on account of Lands agreed to be purchased, the grants whereof have not issued, should be remitted, in order that the Lands revert to the Crown upon the payment of such Duties as may be due from Timber and Lumber cut upon the said Lands.

“Your

"Your Committee having examined the several papers connected with the Petition of Moses H. Perley, Esquire, beg leave to recommend that the deposit of £500 should be refunded to the Petitioner.

"Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Petition of Crookshank and Walker, and others, Creditors of Duncan Barber and Company, nor the prayer of the Petition of Robert Eggar, Creditor of James Campbell, late Deputy Treasurer at Saint Andrews.

"Your Committee cannot close this Report without animadverting in strong terms on the conduct of several Deputies, in making no Returns to the Crown Land Office, which render the Returns from that Office necessarily imperfect. Your Committee would further recommend, that the several Deputies should be called upon to make their Reports regularly, and in the event of their neglecting to do so, the interposition of the Executive should be required to appoint more suitable persons in their place.

An Act to provide for a regular supply of Seamen for new Ships fitted out or loaded in this Province :

An Act to provide for the more effectual prevention of Trespasses, and protection of Timber growing on the Crown Lands within this Province :

An Act to amend an Act, intituled “ An Act to provide for the purchase of a place for the residence and accommodation of the Governor or Commander in Chief of this Province :

An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace in and for the City and County of Saint John to make compensation to the Assessors of Taxes for the Parish of Portland, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine :

“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“ I offer you my hearty congratulations upon the proceedings of the Session, which have been marked not only by a close attention to the business of the Country, but by, if possible, an increased disposition on the part of each Branch of the Legislature to carry on the duties of Legislation in a spirit of perfect good understanding with the other. Possessing a Legislature animated by such dispositions and composed of men practically and thoroughly versed in what its true interests consist,—enjoying the blessings of the British Constitution and the powerful protection of the Parent State, New Brunswick cannot fail, under the protecting care of Divine Providence, to be carried rapidly forward in that course of prosperity which she is evidently destined to pursue.

“ The joyful event of the Marriage of our gracious and beloved Queen has afforded you an opportunity, of which you would not separate without availing yourselves, to renew to Her Majesty the assurance of those feelings of Loyalty and devotion towards Her Majesty's Person, which will ever lead you warmly and affectionately to sympathize in any and every event which promises to promote Her happiness:—It will be my pleasing duty to transmit Your Address to be laid at Her Majesty's feet.

“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ In the name of the Queen, I thank you for the liberality which has characterized your Grants and Appropriations for the Public Service, and it will be my earnest endeavour in carrying them into effect, to make them, to the utmost extent, available for the beneficial purposes for which they are intended.

*“ Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“ The prospect of any further disturbance with the Neighbouring States appears to have greatly diminished, if not wholly to have vanished, in consequence of the prudent course adopted by our more immediate Neighbours of Maine, in having placed the conduct of the Boundary Dispute wholly in the hands of the General Government of the United States—thereby affording to both Countries the most satisfactory guarantee that the peace and friendship, now happily subsisting between two of the greatest and most enlightened Nations of the World, and in the maintenance of which their best interests are acknowledged mutually to consist, will not be suffered to be disturbed, or interrupted on light or insufficient grounds.

“ In now taking my leave of you, therefore, I do so in the confident hope that nothing may occur, during the Recess, calculated to impair the prosperous and satisfactory state of Public Affairs under which we separate.”

That His Honor the President of the Legislative Council then said:—

*“ Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
“ Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“ It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this General Assembly be prorogued until the last Tuesday in June next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the last Tuesday in June next, then here to be holden.”

EXPLANATORY REMARKS ON THE TWO FOREGOING RETURNS.

1st. The Regulations under which 5 Year Licences are granted require that the parties shall in each year pay tonnage for not less than a prescribed quantity stated in each; and that one quarter of this duty shall be paid on the 24th September; one quarter on the 24th December; and one half on the 24th June, in each year.

2d. It is also required that each Lessee do on the 24th June make oath to the quantity cut on his Lease during the preceding season, and if such quantity exceed that for which he is bound to pay by the terms of the Licence, he must then also pay *single* duty upon such excess quantity.

By reference to the Returns now prepared it will be seen that in very few instances have the parties complied with the second of the above mentioned regulations, and the necessary information upon this point could only be procured from the Deputies. They were accustomed to give credit to the parties for the aggregate of Leases in their District belonging to each person, returning a General Excess against each Lessee, without mentioning the particular Lease upon which these Excesses arose, and, consequently, it is impossible in this Return to state the quantity cut on each Lease—they are herein classed by Districts, which was the only method by which I could shew the quantities cut upon each group, as classed by the Deputy.

No Return has been filed in the Office for many of the Leases, but I am not prepared to account for this omission, because the Deputies, I presume, were informed of the particulars of all Leases issued within their respective Districts,—last spring a list was sent to each from the Office.

Mr. Allan has filed no Return of Leases in his District for the year ending in May, 1839. Neither has Mr. Garden nor Mr. Davidson filed such Returns for the same period, and Mr. H. B. Rainsford has filed the particulars only of a few, for which Messrs. Scoullar and Partelow are responsible, and also of Mr. Woodward's Lease.—The absence of information from these gentlemen renders the accounts of Leases necessarily imperfect.

A reference to the above Memoranda will shew the manner in which offsets of tonnage have hitherto been allowed in the Office, and as no instructions have been issued upon the subject, the same system is still in force.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Report from L. Donaldson on the state of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having been requested by Your Excellency's Letter of the 3d May last, to do the duties of Surveyor of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy,—I duly attended to those Establishments, and beg leave to Report:—

QUACO.

That the alterations made in the Quaco establishment last year, have added much to the efficiency of that Light, which now gives satisfaction to the Trade. No special repairs are required, nor are any charges contemplated, so that the outlay there will not in all probability require to be of moment in 1840. Mr. Lamb is attentive to his duties, and the condition of his charge is at all times creditable to him as a Keeper. There are here 6 reflectors of 24 inches diameter, and the revolving machinery is in good order.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND.

The Light House at Partridge Island is in order, and requires no repairs or alterations, and a good Light is always kept at it. The Keeper's house is old and not worth repairing, as will be seen by the certificate of Messrs. Hagerty and Portmore, among the vouchers of the Commissioners for their Account of the year at this station. The Commissioners did not consider it to be their duty to build a new house for the Keeper without thus bringing the subject before the Legislature, the more especially as it is their opinion that the public service would be promoted by a small building for the Keeper being placed near the Light House, instead of being at such a distance as the present one,—to which, in the most inclement seasons and in storms, the Keeper must necessarily repair at various hours in the night to trim his Lamps. The Commissioners also have no authority to build within the circle of the Battery unless leave is first had from the Commander in Chief. It is to be hoped some directions will be conveyed to the Commissioners on this head. The charge for the new Lantern at this station will be spoken of when reporting on the Cape Enrage Light House. There will, in 1840, be 15 reflectors in this Light House of 23 inches diameter.

BEACON LIGHT.

The Beacon Light House is in good order, and the contingent expenses are likely, as this year, to continue small. It is intended to take the reflectors (4 of 23 inches diameter) of this station to Cape Enrage, and substitute 4 of those now imported, and spoken of in the report on Cape Enrage Light—but this will be attended by no expenditure.

POINT LEPREAU.

Point Lepreau establishment, both in respect to the Light House and Keeper's House, is in good order, and the Light is well spoken of. The buildings will require painting in 1840, but I see no other expenditure necessary, unless, indeed, the lowering of the under Light to the ground floor may be done, which many competent persons think would be an improvement, as at five or six miles off, the two Lights are thrown into one, from the short space separating them,—this will be investigated more fully during next summer. While the 5 upper reflectors are of 23 inches diameter, the 5 on the lower flat of the building are only of 15 inches diameter. The Oil Tanks here, and at the different stations, answer well, and the Boat Landing cut out of the rocks here a few years since, proves a great convenience to the public service in landing Stores, and to the Keeper and others. Mr. Petingell has, by his perseverance and industry, made Point Lepreau, from being one of the worst stations, probably the best belonging to the Province, and he lives most comfortably.

HEAD

HEAD HARBOUR LIGHT.

Head Harbour Light House I found in all respects perfectly clean and in good order, except some leaks near the windows and some deficiency in the foundation. These have doubtless been repaired when the house, then about being built for the Keeper, was completed, which it has been. Here there are 8 reflectors of 22 inches diameter, with the same size burners as at all the other New Brunswick Light Houses. No Oil Tanks were, at the period of my visit, at this or any other of the Charlotte County stations, but Mr. Campbell having been strongly urged by the writer last winter to provide such, they have now, I understand, arrived at Saint Andrews; any small deficiencies of glass, &c. I stated to Mr. Campbell on visiting Saint Andrews, and he immediately attended to the same.

There are two matters which require notice at this station; 1st, the Landing (from Head Harbour) should be cleared of the loose and very large stones which render it so difficult and dangerous for any one to land, either personally or with oil or other stores or supplies; and 2ndly, the Lantern is unfit for the reflectors at this station, it is so small that the Keeper cannot get into it without great difficulty, and the reflectors have been placed on the frame in a pivot, so as to be turned round, and thus enable the Keeper to clean them and the Lamps as each may come opposite to the aperture—of this again, when treating of the Saint Andrews Light. The deck here is sufficiently large to receive any new Lantern of proper size which may be placed on it.

SAINT ANDREWS LIGHT HOUSE.

The Saint Andrews Light was clean and in order, notwithstanding the keeping there of the Oil and other supplies for the different stations under charge of the Saint Andrews Commissioners. There are 4 reflectors here of 15 inches diameter. The Light House is not lathed and plastered, and I should think the oil during winter, and in an inland station like this, would be apt to thicken, especially as from the shape of the frame the Keeper cannot burn a Winter Lamp. The Keeper has only £30 per annum with the use of a house, and I should have thought his remuneration small had not the Commissioners said they could get others to do the duties at the same rate. The premises should be painted in 1840, and the inside of the Light House washed with lime, if it is not plastered. The foundation of the Light House is not good, or rather it is not properly secured on the wharf, as a shake on the Balcony Rods near the Lantern, makes the whole of the fabric tremble or rather totter. This can be remedied at small expense and it ought to be done, as in a gale of wind the building must shake so as to cause the Lamps to overflow and go out.

This Lantern is, and ever has been, utterly unfit. Its size is such as to prevent any one from going into it except with great difficulty, even if only a small man. The burners are turned round on a pivot, and brought to where the Keeper has to stand, in order to be cleaned and have the reflectors put in order. The size of the glass is reduced (partly owing to the large and unnecessary mouldings,) to $11\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ inches, so that, while the oil is consumed, the light furnished cannot nevertheless be thrown out on Saint Andrews Bay. No time should be lost in procuring another Lantern, and probably if the Head Harbour one was removed to this place, and a new one got for that station, it would be the best and least costly plan, and the 4 15-inch diameter reflectors of this station would have room enough in the Head Harbour Lantern, though it is too small for the 8 22-inch diameter ones.

MACHIAS SEAL ISLANDS.

Machias Seal Islands are always reported as giving a good light. I came upon this station very early in the morning, and before the Keeper had his Lamps cleaned, but I found every thing in perfect order, and had entire satisfaction in viewing every part of the establishment. Both Light Houses, as well as the Keeper's House, will require painting in 1840. The new Landing was just being finished, it promises to answer well and was much needed. There is a general regret expressed that the two Lanterns here were not each some ten or twelve feet higher. Should it be considered proper to elevate them, the expense of adding some few feet to the present deck would be but small, (the frames being very good) or the elevation of the whole buildings and placing a stone wall under each, would not be very expensive, and in

some instances this would seem to be required, as in high tides, with South and S. W. winds, the sea rises to the door,—but the subscriber would not like to recommend such change, nor the having one of these Lights, as well as the Beacon Light in the Harbour of Saint John, shaded with red glasses, without the advice of the Commissioners, after an examination on the spot. The reflectors are 8 and 8 of 23-inch diameter each, and with two winter Lamps. A signal gun should be placed here, as also at Gannet Rock, without delay; by this means the Keepers would often be enabled to warn vessels of their danger when nearing the Reefs and Ledges, as in one instance the writer had an opportunity of seeing in August last, when two Brigs would have run on the Rosemount Rock but for the firing of muskets from the Gannet Rock. This Keeper has a cow, garden, and every comfort, and is an excellent Pilot. I think he should be bound to keep a proper assistant in this lone station, even if £10 or £12 in addition was granted to his salary.

GANNET ROCK.

Gannet Rock is a fearful place in storms. Found every thing perfectly clean, and the lantern, reflectors, and flash machinery in good condition. There are 8 reflectors of 23 inches diameter. Examined into the damages done last winter, and put the Artificers carried down with me to work. It may be doubted if anything less than a cut stone wall of 12 or 14 feet in height and 4 feet thick, bolted with iron into each stone, and erected around this Light House, can make it safe; and I fully concur in opinion with the Keeper, Mr. Kent, that nothing but the numerous iron braces and chains making fast the building to the rock, and which were placed there in 1838, saved the whole establishment and its inhabitants from being swept off during the gale of wind which destroyed the Mount Desert and other Light Houses in January, 1839. Much has now been done to render it safe, but there can be no confidence in its remaining so for an hour if a southerly gale rises during high tides, and I should hope that during this year the opinions of some well qualified persons, as well as the Commissioners, may be taken on this subject. If the navigation of the Bay requires the support of this station (as it no doubt does), humanity is concerned in seeing that the Keeper and his family are made secure; besides the first outlay may be less than constant repairs paid by the Province. The iron gangway for aiding in having the boats and the supplies taken up, (made of 2 inch square Iron,) is completely destroyed, and the iron twisted into a thousand forms. I recommend that an excavation be made in the rock from the Light House door to the water, and a gangway of iron placed down in such gulch, this would allow the seas to pass over without doing harm; it is necessary to do something of the kind, as neither boats nor other articles can now be got up except with much labor and many hands. The Keeper is a good Pilot for this neighbourhood, but in winter he could not get a boat into the water from want of a gangway. A signal gun should be placed here as well as on the Seal Islands, as stated in report on that station.

CAPE ENRAGE.

The Advertisements, Tenders, Plan and other Documents regarding the erection of Cape Enrage Light House, will be seen with the account of the Commissioners, detailing the purchase of the ground and buildings placed on that station.

The Commissioners concluded to shift the Partridge Island Lantern to Cape Enrage, procuring one of greater height for the former place, where a double range of reflectors was to be placed, and they had reason to expect, from having written to England in February, 1839, that the required articles would have arrived in time sufficient to enable them to effect the change before the winter commenced, but in this they were disappointed, as will be seen by the letters of the agents accompanying the accounts. The new Lantern is placed at Partridge Island, and the other will be placed on Cape Enrage in the spring. The £150 sterling Bill of Exchange charged in this account, and which was sent to England in part of the claim for new reflectors, &c. &c., was considered by the Commissioners equivalent to the cost of the Lantern, Lamps, Glass and Reflectors, which will be sent there in the spring, and the public service is advantaged by the exchange, as it was better to have the superior Lantern and Reflectors off this Harbour. There is a balance of £211 3 2 stg. still due in England, which

which will be sent in a short time,—the new Reflectors, &c. are of the first order. The £18 charged per James Munson in the Cape Enrage account, is to pay him for living in and taking care of the establishment, though he is not to receive full pay till the Lamps are in use.

NOVA SCOTIA LIGHTS.

The Light Houses at Briar Island and Cape Sable would have been visited this year, but after having made the necessary arrangements to sail from Gannet Rock, the weather became so unsettled that the writer abandoned the attempt, especially as the Schooner was cast on shore at these Islands and got some injury; they will be visited next year.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

The consumption of oil varies considerably at different Light Houses, partly owing to the difference in time of lighting and extinguishing the Lamps, and partly from the superior attention and neatness of Keepers. No loss of oil now takes place, as the Tanks are perfectly tight; the old oil is every year removed from the various stations, and sold in Saint John, and in 1840 there will be a credit of £21 6 1 for oil sold this year, per Mr. Hanford's account, and which came in too late for this year's statement. While Gannet Rock consumes under the 40 gallons per burner, and the Seal Islands about that quantity, the major part of the stations use more than this range,—but as all the burners are of one size, if we allow that there are 70 in use, the quantity used will be found to be about 2,800 gallons per annum. I would most respectfully solicit an increase of income for Mr. Kent, (probably £25 a year) as also for Mr. Lamb. Their labour and anxiety in keeping machine working Lights is much greater than the others, and they live on mere spots of rock where grass never grows, and consequently where they can keep no Cow and have no garden. Mr. Kent is cut off from all intercourse with the world and lives at considerable expense. I told him he could not be allowed to keep the Assistant, paid for by the Province, of a mere labouring class, but that he must hire a man of some standing in event of accidents happening to himself in this wild place,—he has had consequently to hire a person at £35 per annum, which sum, with the board of the person, eats too deeply on his £165. All the other Keepers are more comfortable in every respect.

Were the person acting as Assistant at Gannet Rock (Mr. Albert Worster, who engaged on the 20th December,) assured by the Executive, that on the first vacancy he would be promoted to a Light House, and another young man be placed in his stead at Gannet Rock, to be also in like way advanced on a vacancy arising, the Province would soon have a class of respectable young men in their employ, and who, in every case, would have experience before they were put in charge,—this would put an end to the practice of getting up petitions recommending the aged, the lame, and too often even the unsteady, as Keepers of Lights. In any country, to keep a Light House is, for a person advanced in life, an arduous task, but in a climate like this it is often most severe, and we have seen the birth applied for, and formerly too often granted, as if it were considered as a refuge for the destitute.

New Brunswick, on her Bay of Fundy line, requires no Light House other than at the stations already occupied,—and the erection and support of those having been completed without Provincial aid, and entirely from the Shipping of the present day, it is certain that if the navigation of the Province holds at or near to its present extent, a reduction of the tax will soon take place, even though improvements attended with expense may be adopted to render the present Lights more perfect. The navigation of the Bay would be advantaged by a Harbour Light at Apple River Head, in Nova Scotia, and if one third or even one half the cost of erection and support of this $\frac{1}{3}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ Light was even defrayed by New Brunswick, it would be paying only a small sum for a great benefit, as all the trade of that place and its neighbourhood belongs to New Brunswick.

REPORT

Report from Commissioners of Machias Seal Island, Campo Bello, and Saint Andrews Lights.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. and K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

We, the undersigned, Commissioners of the Machias Seal Island, Campo Bello, and Saint Andrews Light Houses, beg leave to Report :—

That during the past year we found it necessary to erect a House for the Keeper's residence at Head Harbour, he having hitherto resided in the lower part of the Light House, which was found to be too small, and endangered the whole Building on account of fire.

At Machias Seal Island a set of new Ways (on an inclined plane) have been laid down to enable the Keeper to take up his Boat to a sufficient height above the surf, and to launch her in safety when required.

We have this year received from England eight double tin Cisterns, with brass cocks and strainers, two for each Light House, to contain the Oil, which will be a great saving, by preventing leakage ; they cost about one hundred and fifteen pounds sterling, which is to be paid for out of this year's grant.

The Lamp at Head Harbour Light House is getting out of order, and will be required to be replaced by a new one and a larger one, as the present one is too small for that Light House.

The Light Houses at Machias Seal Island and at Saint Andrews will require to be painted this season.

The ordinary expenses this year, including the payment for the Cisterns and new Lamp, will be about six hundred pounds.

In conclusion, we have only further to observe, that we have received very satisfactory accounts from Ship Masters, Pilots, and others, of the very brilliant appearance of the Lights on all occasions when they were in their vicinity.

MILITIA.

Report from George Priestly, Captain and Staff Adjutant of Militia, of Drill during past Year.

Maugerville, 12th November, 1839.

SIR—I have the honor to transmit, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, a general Report of the Drill of the several Battalions of Militia which I have been directed to visit, between the 20th day of June and 19th October, 1839.

3rd July. } I have this day completed the Drill of the 2d Battalion of the
2d Battalion Carleton } Carleton County Militia. Both officers and men have been
County Militia. } regular in attendance, and very attentive while at Drill, not a
single instance of drunkenness or any other irregularity occurred. I have not yet
been furnished with a State by the Officer commanding, but from the number of Arms
and Accoutrements issued each day, upwards of 400 men of this Battalion have been
drilled.

I further beg leave to state, for the information of His Excellency, that the Arms and Accoutrements in Store at the Tobique are many of them much out of repair ; there are two firelocks without bayonets and without a ramrod, and one with a broken ramrod ; two with the upper jaw of the cock and cock screw deficient, and several others with
the

the interior of the locks out of repair, and the whole of the Arms excessively rusty and otherwise very dirty, from some of them having been fired out of and in that state put into Store. There is a cask with some ball ammunition in; this cask is open, having no lid to it. The Accoutrements, when I found them, were placed on the shelves of the front room of the Store, amongst articles exposed for sale; the Arms are not in boxes but piled up in a corner of the Store. If my time would have permitted I would have had them oiled. The Accoutrements, almost all of them, require some little repairing, from the sewing having given way. I have caused a bag to be tied over the top of the ammunition cask, and the Accoutrements to be stowed away in an upper room, where they will be more secure than where I found them.

20th July. } I this day completed the Drill of the 1st Battalion of the
1st Battalion Carleton } Carleton County Militia. 550 of the Non-Commissioned Of-
County Militia. } ficers and Privates attended and have been instructed in the
firelock exercise, principally to the priming, loading and firing; some of the young
Officers fell into the ranks, and were instructed with the Men; others were drilled
at the Sword exercise, and for the time performed well. There were some absentees,
both Officers and Men, owing, as I was informed by the Commanding Officer, Major
Dibblee, to their having been absent from their homes when the drill was ordered.
Major Dibblee attended every drill of this Battalion, and did all in his power to for-
ward the public service. The men, with the exception of the absentees before men-
tioned, were punctual in their attendance, and exceedingly attentive while at drill,
and all throughout has been conducted with the utmost order and regularity.

I beg leave to suggest to you, for the favorable consideration of His Excellency, that about 80 stand of arms, with a like number of accoutrements, be deposited with Lieutenant Connell, at the Village of Victoria, (Wakefield.) Mr. Connell informed me, that, should His Excellency approve of the arrangement, he would willingly take the charge. This Officer has a good store room, and in my opinion, the arms would be full as safe there as at Woodstock, and would be upon the spot where two strong Companies assemble.

Of the 58 stand of Arms and one bayonet, in Store with Mr. Carman at Fiardscramble, (Woodstock) two of them are unserviceable from the stocks being broken completely through, and one from the lock being much out of repair.

I beg to draw your attention to the state of the Woodstock Light Dragoons, the Captain of which did not attend a single drill; the men are a fine body, all young and well mounted; twenty of them have provided uniform, and the remainder are ready to do so when they shall have been completed with swords, belts, &c.

3d August. } I this day completed the Drill instruction of 705 Non-Com-
2nd Battalion York } missioned Officers and Privates of the 2nd Battalion of the York
County Militia. } County Militia, all of whom conducted themselves at the dif-
ferent Drills in the most orderly and praiseworthy manner. The payment for the
carriage of the Arms for the Drill of this Battalion was made from the Regimental
Funds, by direction of Lieutenant Colonel Allen. One Company of this Battalion,
viz. Captain Dow's, did not attend at the Drills. On enquiry I was informed that the
men had not been warned according to the Militia Law, owing to Captain Dow being
away from home. I am aware that his Company was not drafted last winter, which,
together with their having been absent from the Training, seems to have created a
general dissatisfaction in the other Company in this part of the district of the Corps.

17th August. } I have completed the instruction Drill of the 3rd Battalion of
3rd Battalion York } the York County Militia, when there were present under Arms
County Militia. } 10 Captains, 13 Subalterns, 22 Sergeants and 350 Privates. I
beg leave to state, that on account of this being the season for cutting hay, and to
afford those concerned an opportunity to be amongst it as much time as the service
would admit of, I arranged with the Commanding Officer to keep the officers and
men a longer period each day for two days for each detachment, instead of three days
as was ordered, which, together with additional Drills that the men volunteered to
attend, enabled me to put them through the same course of Drill as the other corps,
and

and as the Battalion did not lose any instruction by the arrangement, I trust that His Excellency will not disapprove of it. I have further to state, that both the officers and men were regular in their attendance, and exceedingly attentive while present: the cost of the carriage of arms was defrayed from the Regimental fund, by direction of Lieutenant Colonel Robinson, the Commanding Officer.

1st September. } I have completed the instruction Drill of the 1st Battalion of the Queen's County Militia, when there were present 9 Captains, 18 Subalterns and 250 Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates; both officers and men were extremely attentive, and the Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Peters, accompanied by Major Foshay, superintended at all the Drills, when every thing was conducted with the utmost order and regularity; there are 120 stand of Arms in possession of this Battalion, 7 stand of which are reported to be unserviceable from want of their being put in repair. The Arms were taken to and from the Drill ground at the expense of the Regiment.

12th September. } I have completed the instruction Drill of the 1st Battalion of the Charlotte County Militia, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Campbell, when there were present under Arms at the different Drills, 4 Captains, 3 Lieutenants, 5 Ensigns, 14 Sergeants and 218 rank and file. The Commanding Officer attended at the whole of the Drills, and so did Major Garnett at Saint Andrews, but not in the country. All the officers and men were punctual in their attendance and attentive to the instructions given to them at Drill. I here beg leave to particularize the Rifle Company, under the command of Captain Boyd, as having been exceedingly so. Captain Boyd appears to be a zealous officer, to have paid much attention to the instruction of his Company, who are in a tolerable good state of Drill, so much so as to render them a credit to the Battalion to which they belong. The Arms were taken to the detachment which assembled in the country, as well as the Drill Sergeants, free of expense to the Government.

26th September. } I have completed the instruction Drill of the 4th Battalion of the Charlotte County Militia, when there were present one Lieutenant Colonel, 1 Major, 9 Captains, 8 Lieutenants, 8 Ensigns, 18 Sergeants and 471 rank and file; both officers and men were regular in attendance and exceedingly anxious to gain information in Military exercise, the Rifle Company in particular, the men of which, after having attended the three days Drill according to the General Order on that head, assembled on the afternoon of the 25th instant, on my return from the Drill of Saint David's, when I was requested by the officer commanding the Company to give them an additional Drill, which request I complied with. This Company is composed of young men who had not received any instructions previous to this, and now from their zealous attention at the Training of this year, are able to perform the manual and platoon exercise of Riflemen, and have made some progress in skirmishing Drill. I have further to report for the information of His Excellency, that the Arms for the use of the two divisions which assembled in the country, viz. at Saint James' and Saint David's, were conveyed there, as well as the Drill Sergeants, free of expense to the public: also that I found in store at this Town (Saint Stephens), 187 stand of Arms and 143 sets of Accoutrements; the number of Arms over that of Accoutrements were obtained last winter by Major Marks from some of the old inhabitants in this neighbourhood, and deposited in store. 44 sets of Accoutrements are wanting to complete the number of Arms in possession of this Battalion.

5th October. } I have this day completed the Drill of the 1st Battalion of the Saint John City Militia, when there were present 1 Lieutenant Colonel, 1 Major, 10 Captains, 20 Lieutenants, 1 Ensign, 34 Sergeants, 513 rank and file. Too much cannot be said in favor of this Corps for its steadiness and attention under Arms, and the officers far exceed those of any other Corps that have come under my notice during my tour of duty this Summer, in the knowledge of their duty. Four Companies of this Battalion have provided themselves with

with Military Clothing, and from a desire to become acquainted with their Drill, in order to be useful in case of need, they have, previously to this Training, met for Drill under a competent instructor of their own providing, and are at present in such a state of discipline as to be able to march and perform evolutions with Her Majesty's Troops. The Bayonet Belts, Pouch Belts and Slings in the use of this Battalion are fairly worn out, and so bad as to be quite unfit to be worn upon any duty.

11th October. } I have this day completed the Drill of the 2nd Battalion
2nd Battalion Saint John } of Saint John City Militia, when there were present 14
City Militia. } Captains, 13 Lieutenants, 6 Ensigns and 390 Non-Com-
missioned Officers and Privates. No Arms could be obtained for the Drill of this
Battalion except those in charge of Captain Thurgar; the officers and men were generally attentive. Lieutenant Colonel Ward did not attend any of the Drills.

6th November. } I attended at the following places on the dates mentioned, accom-
Sunbury County } panied by the Drill Sergeants, for the purpose of giving instruction
Militia. } to the Sunbury County Militia, viz: At the south branch of the
Oromocto on the 14th and 15th; at the mouth of the Oromocto on the 16th and 17th,
and at Sheffield, on the 18th and 19th October. There were present 1 Lieutenant
Colonel, 1 Major, 6 Captains, 5 Lieutenants, 6 Ensigns, 25 Sergeants and 590 rank
and file; all of whom, with the exception of a trifling irregularity in one of the Com-
panies at the mouth of the Oromocto, behaved with the utmost propriety. Lieutenant
Colonel Miles caused 48 stand of Arms and a like number of Accoutrements to be
conveyed to the Oromocto and to Sheffield, for the use of the Drill.

COLONIAL ASSOCIATION OF IRELAND.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. and K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The North American Colonial Association of Ireland take leave to transmit to Your Excellency the accompanying documents, to which they request Your Excellency's serious attention, and they will feel obliged by your submitting them to Your Excellency's Council, or to the Legislative Assembly, as to Your Excellency may seem meet. The documents are as follows:—

No. 1. A Copy of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, incorporating the Association, by which it will be perceived that the Legislature has been pleased to confer upon the Company most important and extensive powers and privileges for the purpose of promoting a systematic emigration from all parts of the United Kingdom—and has left the Association the uncontrolled selection from the whole of Her Majesty's North American Provinces of the particular Colony or Colonies in which they will carry on their operations.

No 2. A Copy of the Company's Prospectus, developing their contemplated plans, and naming the Directors and Officers by whom their affairs will be conducted—from which it will be seen that the direction is composed of men of high standing, both as large landed proprietors in the United Kingdom, and as connected with eminent Banking and Mercantile Establishments in London and Dublin. The particular plans stated in the Prospectus are susceptible of modification to meet any peculiar circumstances of either of the Colonies in which the Association may determine to plant Settlements.

No. 3. An Extract from a communication made by the Association to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

No. 4. An Extract from Mr. Labouchere's reply thereto.

From the preceding document, (No. 3,) Your Excellency will be informed of the circumstances existing in this country which have diverted the stream of Emigration from the North American Provinces; and from Mr. Labouchere's letter will perceive that it is to the local Legislature Her Majesty's Government refers for any alterations that the interest of the Colonies may require.

The North American Colonial Association are of opinion that the loyal Province of New Brunswick is well adapted for British Settlements upon an extended scale. It is, however, quite obvious, that Agricultural operations cannot be conducted in the Colony with pecuniary advantage to the Association, unless the rate of wages be materially diminished, and this can only be effectually and permanently accomplished by the steady introduction of a large number of labouring Emigrants into the Colony, either by means of a direct bounty on Emigration out of the local Revenue of the Province, or by some equivalent advantage to be granted to the Association in the manner indicated in their letter to the Secretary of State.

The enterprising spirit of the Inhabitants of New Brunswick, and the enlarged views of public policy which have upon so many occasions been evinced by those who have the conduct of her affairs, lead the Association to believe that the local Legislature will be disposed to adopt the principle applied to emigration with so much success in the Australian Colonies; if so, Moses Henry Perley, Esquire, of Saint John, has been qualified and authorized by the Association to communicate with Your Excellency, for the purpose of making, without loss of time, the details of an arrangement to carry into effect, with as little delay as possible, the objects and intentions of the Association.

IN many parts of the United Kingdom, particularly Ireland, there is a large surplus population, for remunerating employment at home, and in England there are great masses of Capital wanting means of profitable investment, while in the North American Colonies extensive tracts of valuable Land, now unprofitable to the mother Country, need but the infusion of Labour and Capital, to place them amongst her most valuable possessions.

It is the object of the North American Colonial Association to unite in one bond of mutual Interest—the *Landlord*, who considerately seeks to provide for his humble dependants ; the *Colonist*, who is anxious to see the resources of his Country developed ; and the *Capitalist*, with whose assistance these remote elements of national wealth may be beneficially and permanently combined.

The Act of Parliament incorporating and empowering this Association, limits the responsibility of the Proprietors to the amount of Shares taken by each, and gives all requisite powers and privileges for conducting Emigration, Colonization, and Banking, in the North American Provinces, upon an extensive scale.

Shortly after the Association obtained their Act, they opened a negotiation with some influential persons in Upper Canada for the purchase of Land, intending to establish a Settlement for Emigrants in that Province, but they were prevented at that time, by the unsatisfactory state of the Colony, from carrying their design into execution. Should the measures in contemplation, for tranquillizing and improving that Province, be attended with the desired success, an intelligent Agent from England, who is now at the seat of Local Government, has instructions to take advantage of any favorable circumstance that may present itself to forward the objects of the Association ; in the mean time, the Directors have received offers of extensive tracts of Land in Upper and Lower Canada, and also in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince

Prince Edward's Island, in every way suited to the *immediate* location of several thousands of Emigrant Families. The Climate of these Colonies is remarkably healthy, and the Soil particularly fertile; and in the latter Provinces the Inhabitants are universally peaceable, loyal, industrious, and contented, so much so, that during the time the Canadas have been shaken to the centre by civil dissensions and party strife, the tranquillity of these Provinces has never been in the slightest degree disturbed.

It is proposed to divide the Shares of the Association into Three Classes, and to appropriate 5000 to *Capitalists*, for investment; 5000 to *Land-owners*, and others having an interest in promoting Emigration upon a large scale; and 5000 to *Colonists* in the vicinity of the Company's Settlements, to create a local interest in the prosperity of the undertaking, and give increased facilities for the Banking operations of the Association.

The Subscribers can only be required under the Act to pay calls of £2 per Share, at intervals of Three Months; but it is proposed to give to Capitalists, who choose to pay up the whole amount of their Shares, (or so much as may be needed for Land purchases,) 5 per cent. per annum on the amount of the excess of their payments over the amount of calls on the other Shares.

Subscribers to the Second Class of Shares will be entitled, in respect of each Share, *in the order in which they subscribe*, at stated intervals within Five Years, to transmit one able-bodied male Emigrant, with his family, to the Company's Lands; the Company engaging, upon his arrival on the Land, to procure or provide for him suitable employment, at wages adequate to the comfortable maintenance of himself and family; and at the end of two years from the date of his arrival, (if then working on the land) to convey to him, free of expense, Five Acres in perpetuity; and further, to reserve for his use forty five acres of Land immediately adjoining, which the Emigrant shall be at liberty to rent or purchase of the Association, on moderate terms, at the end of five years, if by industry and perseverance he shall have then placed himself in a position to bring it into cultivation. If the Emigrant be desirous of occupying the five acres immediately on his arrival, he shall be at liberty to do so, but the land is not to be considered *his own* until he shall have been located on the Estate two years. By this arrangement, the Emigrant and his family will have an opportunity of employing a portion of their time in domestic labour, and will have before them the prospect, at no distant period, of becoming independent cultivators of a farm of their own, while their first occupation on their arrival will be as *labourers for wages*,—a condition for early Settlers which universal experience has proved to be most conducive to the prosperity of the community and the welfare of the individual.

The price at which the Association can buy a large tract of valuable Land in either of the Provinces named, is, of course, proportionably much less than the selling price of the same Land in small portions. It will be the first duty of the Company to make good Roads of communication, and other public improvements on the property; the Directors will then cause the whole Tract to be surveyed and divided into Districts, and subdivided into allotments of 100 acres; and the Association will, if required, at any time within five years, convey to holders of either of the first or second class Shares, or their Nominees, (being Settlers from the United Kingdom,) ten acres in perpetuity, in respect of each such Share, upon payment of the *cost price* thereof—which cost price will be fixed by competent valutors, upon a calculation of the relative value of the Land in the several districts, in proportion to the fertility of the soil, the eligibility of the situation, and the improvement of the district. The Association will further advance, at interest, upon the credit of the Shares, to all such Settlers as may desire it, a sum equal to one-half of the paid-up capital on each Share, for the purpose of being employed in cultivating and improving the Land.

Plots of Land suitable for Building, and for the Settlement of small Shop-keepers, Bricklayers, Blacksmiths, Carpenters, Wheelwrights, and other Mechanics required in rural districts, will likewise be assigned to Shareholders of the first and second class, and their Nominees, upon similar terms; and advances will also be made upon Shares, to assist Settlers of this description in erecting the requisite buildings, and in otherwise improving the property.

Shareholders will be entitled, in either of the foregoing cases, to *one nomination only* in respect of each Share.

A Committee from amongst the Directors will superintend the arrangements for Emigration, founded upon the principles, and as nearly as possible, in conformity with the plan adopted by Government for conducting emigration to Australia. By this arrangement, persons sending out Emigrants will derive all the advantages of efficiency and economy which result from the combination of numbers. Application will be made to Her Majesty's Ministers to allow the purchase money of the land to be applied in assisting to defray the charges of transmitting to the Company's Lands the Emigrants to be nominated by the Shareholders, who will, in that case, also have to be examined and approved by Government Officers. This is substantially the plan adopted in promoting Emigration to the Australian Colonies; and there is no circumstance connected with the North American Provinces that should, in principle or in policy, disentitle Emigrants proceeding thither to participate in the same privileges.

Although the primary design of the Association was to encourage Emigration from Ireland, yet Scotland and England are especially included in the Act; and the Directors, in conformity with its provisions, will send Ships to any part of the United Kingdom, whenever the holders of the Second Class Shares are prepared with Emigrants sufficient in number for their economical transmission to the Company's Lands; it is the anxious desire of the Association that, in this respect there shall be no distinction of Country, for it has been uniformly found, that the national peculiarities, which exist most strongly amongst the labouring classes in every country, are susceptible of the most advantageous modification in New Settlements. To encourage the location together of several families from one neighbourhood of similar habits, and similar opinions, and to assist in providing for the moral and religious wants of the Settlers, the Association will engage, that when one hundred families of any denomination of professing Christians shall be located upon their Lands, within a reasonable distance, the Company's Agents will pay one half of the sum requisite to build a place of Worship for their use, and will, for five years after its erection, contribute towards the support of their Minister.

The Poor Laws, now in force in England and Ireland, make provision for assisting the surplus population of both countries to emigrate, and to enable the Rate payers to borrow money on the credit of the Rates for that purpose. The North American Colonial Association affords an admirable opportunity of giving effect to the provisions in these Acts—for Magistrates, Clergymen, and other Guardians of the Poor in their several districts, by obtaining Second Class Shares, will be enabled to nominate Emigrants to the Company's Lands, with the gratifying assurance, that, instead of encountering the frightful difficulties to which many new Settlers are exposed, they will find on their arrival present labour and food, with the opportunity of acquiring future independence. The Guardians, by continuing Shareholders in the Company, will derive an ultimate pecuniary return for their benevolent exertions—they will receive constant information of the welfare of each person on the Company's Estates—they will, as it were, form the connecting-link, uniting the Emigrant with the land of his birth and the country of his adoption, and become the pleasing medium of communication between the Settler in "a stranger land" and the objects of affection he has left behind him.

As the projected plan assumes for its basis the judicious combination of Land, Labour, and Capital, it is obvious that its success will depend upon the immediate and hearty co-operation of Capitalists and Land-owners, in subscribing for the Shares upon the terms stated; for prudent *Capitalists* will not invest their money in the purchase of Colonial Lands, unless they have the certain assurance, that those who have the means of doing so, will send an adequate and steady supply of labourers to bring them into profitable cultivation. *Landlords*, with a knowledge of the evils unregulated emigration has occasioned, will scarcely induce their poor Tenants to Emigrate, unless they know that land and employment have been provided for them on their arrival; and *Colonists* will give no encouragement to any scheme, which, by the irregular introduction of Emigrants into the Colony, will disturb all subsisting relations of labour and wages, and cause fluctuations in prices, alike injurious to the Old Inhabitant and New Settler.

Although the North American Colonies offer a wide field of profitable enterprise, it is not the intention of this Company to engage in Commercial or Agricultural speculations,

speculations, believing that they can always be more efficiently and more economically conducted by private individuals than by public Companies; it will be the province of the Association to encourage all well founded undertakings of this nature, by infusing into the Colonies, where they purchase lands, an adequate supply of the two great elements of prosperity—Labour and Capital—and their profits will be derived from the re-sale of Land, and the exercise of the Banking privileges which the Act confers. In the present stage of their proceedings, the Directors feel themselves restrained from entering into details which might interfere with pending negotiations; they may, however, remark, that the tracts of Land offered to the Association in each of the Provinces referred to, are sufficiently large in quantity, and moderate in price, to allow of sales affording a very large profit, when the process of Emigration and Settlement shall have sufficiently advanced to augment the value of property within the sphere of its improving influence. The Directors, for similar reasons, refrain from particular allusions to either of the Provinces named, in respect of their Banking operations; that this branch of the Company's business would, however, be very lucrative, may be fairly inferred from the fact, that, in all the North American Colonies, the current rate of interest is 6 per Cent. on very first-rate Securities; that there is a deficiency of Capital and circulation to give effect to the most legitimate undertakings, and that in either of the Provinces that may be selected by the Association, as the principal field of their operations, a large, a steady, and well-regulated immigration of Labourers will increase the demand for Capital, to carry on the numerous important transactions—Agricultural, Manufacturing, and Commercial—to which it will naturally give rise. In the profits thus to be derived from the judicious combination of *Land, Labour, and Capital*, the Shareholders in the Association, whether Colonists, Capitalists, or Land-owners, will equally participate, according to the number of Shares for which they may respectively subscribe.

Extract of Letter from the North American Colonial Association of Ireland to the Most Noble the Marquis of Normanby, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

The North American Colonial Association of Ireland are desirous of being informed whether Her Majesty's Government will grant to the Association a Tract of Crown Lands in either, and if so, in which, of the North American Colonies suitable for immediate settlement and location of a large number of British Emigrants, upon the principle now pursued in colonizing the Australian Provinces, namely, the remission of the purchase money towards defraying the costs of Emigration, or its application partly in paying such expenses, and partly in constructing necessary works incident to the formation of new Settlements. The Association undertaking to transmit to the Colonies in which they receive their grants, Emigrants to the amount of the sum stated, and to provide them and their families on arrival with shelter and employment, and engaging to perform such definite settlement duties upon the Land as shall afford a full equivalent to the monied value of the grant.

The Association, in making this preliminary application, abstain from pointing out any particular *locality* in which they desire to obtain a grant,—they likewise refrain from specifying either the quantity of Land they are disposed to purchase, or the price they are prepared to pay: If Her Majesty's Government, with "even handed justice," are willing to apply the same principle to the North American Colonies, which, with so much success, they have done and are now doing to New South Wales and other Australian Provinces,—the Association will lose no time in giving their application for land a more specific form, as to situation, quantity and price; but they do not think it prudent to waste their funds in preliminary investigations and expensive surveys, unless the great and important principle which can alone make such a grant of any value, be first conceded to them.

If British America be put upon the same footing with other British Colonies, in respect to Emigration, she need fear no competition; but, suffering as she is, *unnatural depression* from political causes, it is utterly impossible for the Association to hope to attract to any Settlement they may establish in those Provinces, the spontaneous immigration of labourers and mechanics, while the Government Agents and Public Commissioners are tempting with a free passage the *elite* of those classes to emigrate to the Australias, raised, as those Colonies have been, into a state of artificial prosperity by the bounties lavished upon them by the Parent State.

The Association are far from regretting the prosperity of the Australian Colonies, or condemning the principles by which it has been produced;—several of the Shareholders and Directors of the Association have a pecuniary interest in their welfare; but while they rejoice at the rapid advances they have made in wealth and population by means of a gratuitous immigration from the Mother Country, they respectfully solicit His Lordship's attention to the fact, that affording free passages to Australia has operated to the most serious disadvantage of other British Colonies, where the same principle is not permitted to prevail. The effect of the system may be seen from the following facts:—In Mr. Elliot's Annual Report to the Colonial Office, (House of Commons papers, No. 389, 14th May, 1838, p. 30,) it is stated, that the number of persons gratuitously sent out by the Government Agents for Emigration to New South Wales in seventeen months, from March, 1837, was 7,080. If to these are added the immense numbers gratuitously sent out to the other Australian Colonies by the Commissioners during the same period, the vast quantity who received from the Colonial Government on their arrival the amount of their passage money in the shape of a bounty on immigration,—and also those Emigrants of capital naturally attracted to those Colonies by the influence of a good system,—the entire number of Emigrants for the whole period will perhaps be double that stated by Mr. Elliot;—whereas the actual immigration to those Colonies, upon average of seven years previous to the year 1832, (when the system of a gratuitous emigration was first adopted) did not exceed 1000 persons per annum; thus shewing a tenfold increase in seven years; while Emigration to the North American Colonies has during the same period actually declined, and has now almost entirely ceased. And yet, at the time this check to Emigration to that quarter was given, it had been rapidly encreasing for several years; and, had it not been interfered with by this and some other concurrent causes of a casual and temporary nature,—or, had North America been admitted to the privileges of a gratuitous emigration, accompanied by a proper system of colonization, she would doubtless have been the favorite outlet for British Emigration, British capital would then have accompanied British labour, and British interests might have been defended by British Settlers at a tythe of the sum which it has cost the Parent State for British Soldiers to keep Military possession of the Country.

The Association are moreover not left to learn from the facts which statistical returns supply, the effect which the Australian system has produced upon Emigration generally; for, in the Spring of the present year, two of the Officers of the Association traversed the South of Ireland, to ascertain the disposition of the poor to emigrate to North America, and to learn whether their Landlords were willing to assist them. They found that the gratuitous assistance given by Government to the Australias, had operated as a check to any other species of emigration, both as regarded the poor and their Landlords. The Landlords were anxious to use their influence with the Government to get pecuniary assistance to clear their Estates of surplus population, instead of contributing themselves,—and the poor relaxed in their efforts to procure means to pay for their own passage, when they found the walls placarded over with invitations to Australia, by means of a free passage from the bounty of the Government. The introduction of this system has in fact well nigh destroyed the principle of self dependence amongst the poor, in reference to Emigration, and has taught them a habit of thinking in this respect fatal to the system by which Emigration to North America had been previously conducted. The evil is not confined to the Emigrants who are taken,—its effects are principally felt amongst those who are left behind. Emigration to the Australian Provinces is necessarily expensive, and can scarcely, under the most propitious set of circumstances, absorb *one tenth* of the number of those who are anxious to avail themselves of it: but although only *one tenth* of the candidates

candidates for gratuitous emigration can be taken, the other *nine tenths* become discontented and dissatisfied at finding one portion of their neighbours presented with a gratuitous passage, while they are left to pine in despair; or what is worse, left in hopes of being sent out in a succeeding year, only to meet a similar disappointment.

The overflowing numbers of applications for a free passage, and the limited capabilities of the Australian Emigration, are particularly referred to by Mr. Elliot, in his Annual Report as Agent of Emigration. (See Paper 388, 14th May, 1838.) The Association respectfully submitted to his Lordship, that it is to the *North American Colonies* England must principally look as a refuge for her daily increasing population; while those Colonies are anxiously desiring an influx of British Emigrants, the United Kingdom, particularly Ireland, is suffering from a superabundant population—an evil not stationary but daily increasing in a formidable ratio; for, calculating the actual amount by the increment of the last decennial census, it would appear to be something more than 400,000 persons per annum; it is essential to the tranquillity and prosperity of the Kingdom that this increase should be kept in check by an extensive Emigration, and, it is manifest, such an Emigration can be cheaply and effectually accomplished only by extending a measure of gratuitous assistance to the British American, similar to that which is now afforded to the Australian Provinces. The Association are anxious to employ the extensive powers and privileges of their Act to assist in working out this important national object, if Government will render the required co-operation and assistance.

The Association have further to observe that North America has to complain that she has suffered by the Government system of bounty and free passage, not alone in the *diminished number* but in the *deteriorated quality* of the Emigrants, who, failing to obtain a free passage to Australia, have been obliged to seek refuge in other and cheaper Colonies. Mr Elliott, in his report before quoted, speaks of the care used by the Government Agents in selecting from the candidates for Emigration, young and useful Mechanics, and Labourers, with their families, for a free passage to Australia; such a selection, of course, leaves the residuum in a moral, physical, and industrial point of view, far less desirable than would have been the case if the Emigrants to North America, had been, in these particulars, fairly represented in the whole mass.

By the well arranged plan as applied to the Australian Emigration, (as appears by papers 388 and 389,) the Government Agents provide free passages for *Children*, in equal numbers with the *Adults*; whereas, as also appears by the Emigration returns, the number of Children upon an average of five years emigrating to North America, constitute only two ninths of the whole. By Lord Durham's Report, and the evidence taken upon various occasions, it is sufficiently proved that three fifths of all the British Emigrants landing in North America proceed to the United States. If *free passages* to the North American Colonies were granted to Emigrants *and their families*, the authorities would not have to complain of the result. The brevity of the summer, and severity of the winter, in North America, would, it is true, render some preparations necessary to be made for the reception of a Settler's family, with *young children*, but this being done, the whole family would all as it were take root in the soil together, and no apprehension of their removal to the United States need then be entertained.

If the Australian plan be applied to North America, so that a due proportion of children be sent with their parents, in regulated numbers, and at stated periods, the Association will take care to make previous preparation for providing employment for the parent and shelter for the family, upon the lands which may be granted to them for the purpose of colonizing; so that the new settlers may be protected immediately upon their arrival, from the misfortunes and sufferings to which, without some preparation, they would be exposed.

The Association are not uninformed of the arrangements entered into with the Provincial authorities respecting Crown Lands, particularly with New Brunswick, in 1837. These arrangements may perhaps occasion the Colonial Department some difficulty in promptly disposing of this application. From information which the Association has received from influential individuals in some of the North American Colonies, they are of opinion, that the Provincial authorities are so thoroughly convinced of the paramount importance of a large immigration of British population to promote the tranquillity

tranquillity and prosperity of the Colonies, that they will cheerfully give effect to any well considered scheme to promote this object, that may receive the sanction of the Home Government. If, therefore, the state of existing arrangements respecting Crown Lands prevents Her Majesty's Government from direct interference in the manner the Association has suggested, the Association will (upon receiving from the Colonial Office an intimation to that effect,) make a similar application to the Governor of such of the Colonies of North America as they may think best suited to the objects and purposes they have in view, that they may, if possible, prepare themselves in the ensuing Spring, to fulfil the important objects confided to them by the Legislature.

A true Extract from the Letter from the North American Colonial Association of Ireland to the Most Noble Marquis of Normanby.

Extract of a Letter from Mr. Labouchere, under Secretary of State for the Colonies, to the Association, in reply to their Letter from which the foregoing was extracted.

Both in Upper Canada and in New Brunswick, Acts have been passed and assented to by the Crown, defining the manner in which the Waste Lands should be disposed of,—and in the latter Colony the Revenue arising from the sales of Land has been finally given up to the Legislature in exchange for a Civil List—while in the former a Bill has been recently passed, and is now under the consideration of Her Majesty's Government for effecting a similar arrangement with regard to the Casual and Territorial Revenue. Her Majesty's Government, therefore, are divested, both as regards Upper Canada and New Brunswick, not only of the power of making you the grant of Land which you require, but in New Brunswick they are also without any control over the Revenues which would arise from the sale of such Land. It is in the Provincial Legislature only, that resides the power of practically considering and deciding on the scheme.

PRISONS.

Report from Judges Botsford and Parker on State of Prisons.

SIR—In compliance with your Excellency's desire, we visited the Gaol in this place on the 24th December last, accompanied by Mr. White, the High Sheriff, and inspected all the apartments.

The building is altogether too small for the present wants of this City and County, and does not admit of any separation or classification of the Prisoners, even of the most obvious necessity, viz:—

- Between Convicts and those committed for trial;
- Between Felons and Convicts for minor offences;
- Between Juvenile and other offenders.

The only division which appears to have been regularly observed is that of the sexes.

The Debtors principally confined within the walls of the Gaol, are those for small debts upon executions from the City Court; who are obliged to remain fourteen days before they can obtain support from their creditors, frequently destitute of the ordinary necessaries of life, and relying on the charity of the Gaoler, or their fellow prisoners.

There appeared, as far as we could judge, as much attention paid to the comfort and security of the prisoners, as the present state of the premises would admit; and in no instance was any complaint made to us of ill usage, or of any other suffering than such as was necessarily produced by the confined dimensions and crowded state of the apartments, and want of cleanliness in some of the prisoners.

We beg leave to accompany this Report with a ground-plan (or rather sketch) of the Gaol, which will serve to explain our remarks, and those of the Sheriff.

Thinking also, it would be in fulfilment of Your Excellency's wishes to obtain such further information respecting the past and present state of the Gaol, and the regulations therein observed, as could be furnished by the High Sheriff and the visiting Magistrates, we addressed severally communications to them, which with their replies, we beg also to enclose.

We have pleasure in stating to Your Excellency that the Justices, at their last Session, determined to erect a new Gaol; and that the House of Correction, when completed, will remedy many of the evils which we now complain of.

ARESTOOK BOOM.

Report from George Hayward and James A. Maclauchlan, of Boom across the Arestook, and Bridge over the same.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, the undersigned, having been appointed by Your Excellency Commissioners to examine and report upon the state of the Boom across the Restook River, with the probable cost of the same, and to recommend the rate of Boomage to be demanded by the Government, beg leave to submit the following Report:—

This Boom, which is erected near the entrance of the River, is formed of three Piers, about sixteen by thirty two feet each, and fourteen feet in height, made of flatted Hemlock and Cedar, filled with Stone; from these Piers part of the Boom was hanging, and supported by Chains connected with the shore.

It will be necessary to raise the Piers at least eight feet, as they were under water during the greater part of the Spring freshet; this, together with the want of two extra Piers, no doubt, was the principal cause of the destruction of the Boom last year. On each side of the River, opposite the Boom, a Log Camp has been built, of hemlock logs, twenty five by fourteen feet, and eight feet in height, covered with split cedar, and worth about ten pounds each.

With respect to the cost of this Boom, it is impossible for us to form any correct estimate, not knowing the expenses incurred for Chains and Iron work; but the probable value of the Piers, two of which have been removed from their original position, we should say was about seventy five pounds each.

The Boomage to be demanded by Government from persons securing Timber in this Boom, in our opinion should not exceed one shilling per ton.

Your Excellency having at the same time required us to examine and report upon a proper site for a Bridge over this Stream, we beg to recommend its being thrown across at the lower end of the Boom, instead of the upper,—(the site pointed out by Mr. Maclauchlan in his Report of last year,)—so that the two extra Piers required for the safety of the Boom, will answer as abutments for the Bridge; and in the event of the Legislature making an appropriation for this work during the present Session, which we consider will cost from six hundred to eight hundred pounds, much time and expense will be saved by contracting for the materials during the Winter season.

OROMOCTO BRIDGE.

Report of the Commissioners appointed to Contract for the Erection of a Bridge over the Oromocto.

Having been appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Commissioners to carry into effect the wishes of the Legislature for the erection of a Bridge over the Oromocto River,—Our attention was first directed as to the site; and as the
Commissioners

Commissioners appointed last year, after having examined the Stream from its mouth up to Camp's, reported, as their opinion, that the most eligible place for its erection was near the property of Messrs. Scoullar and Partelow—which report appears to have met with the approval of His Excellency, and the Legislature. Upon viewing the ground, we found that much the most eligible and convenient line to connect the Road and the Road on the western side of the main River, and to approach the Oro-mocto River, would be through a strip of Land owned by George Morrow, and although this strip of Land was not four rods in width, Mr. Hazen agreed to give a piece on the lower and Messrs. Scoullar and Partelow on the upper side, that the Road should have its full width of four rods. The piece of Land of Morrow's was all that he owned, having purchased it for the purpose of building on, and he appeared loth to part with it, and offered to give £25 towards the Bridge if we would select some other site, but if compelled to sell, he demanded £200. Messrs. Scoullar and Partelow offered to give the Land for the Road, if we would carry it above their Store, but upon examination, we found that there would be two sudden turns in the Road, and the land near the banks low and broken, and that it would cost at least £200, in addition to what it would by Morrow's, to form the Road, and then not be near so good a line to connect the different Roads, and approach the River. We therefore thought it advisable to take the Morrow line; but as the sum demanded by him was greater than we felt justified in giving without the voice of a Jury, we had one called, and they awarded the sum of one hundred and seventy pounds. Having determined upon the site, our attention was then directed to endeavour to ascertain the best and most secure manner of erecting said Bridge, and after taking the best means in our power to inform ourselves, by consulting with persons in this Province, and from the United States, who were conversant upon the subject, we were induced to believe that one erected on Piles would be the most durable, and least liable to be effected by the Ice, than to be built in any other way; we therefore procured the services of Mr. John Clark, a person of practical knowledge and recommended to us as well qualified for the duty, to come and inspect the site, take the distance and levels, and, as far as practicable, ascertain the nature of the bottom, and to prepare a Plan and make out Specifications of the Timber and Materials required for a Bridge of this description, with a Draw of 40 feet; and after examining the same, and submitting the Plan, &c. to such persons that we considered most conversant in such work, and generally approved of by them, we were induced to advertise the selling of the said Bridge, at Public Auction, on the 15th February, agreeable to the said Plan and Specification, which was on that day struck off to Jephtha S. Hubble, for the sum of £994, he giving a Bond of £250, with two Sureties, that he would, on the 25th February, instant, enter into a Bond, under the penalty of £1,500 with two Sureties, to be approved of, for the faithful performance of said Contract on or before the 1st April, 1841. The distance from the upper end of the contemplated Bridge to the high intervale where it strikes the present line of Road, near the Bank of the River, is 1540 feet, about 900 feet of this distance will require to be raised from eight to ten feet, the remainder part of the distance from two to four feet, which, if raised upon bents, and covered as the Bridge, will, in all probability cost £500, the approach on the lower side, £100. Should the money be appropriated at this Session, we have no doubt but the whole may be completed by the time specified for finishing the Bridge.

ROAD FROM BELLISLE TO KINGSTON.

**Report from Philip Palmer and John Jordan, Esquires, of Explorations
of Road from Bellisle to Kingston.**

*To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant
Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

A grant having been made by the Legislature at the last Session, towards the expense of exploring a proposed new line of Road between the Head of Bellisle Bay and Kingston, in King's County, as contemplated by the Petition of Edward Scovil, Vincent White, and others, and also to survey the present Great Road between those two places, and to explore some minor alterations proposed therein, and to report on both routes; the results of such exploration to exhibit the courses and distances, the levels, the comparative advantages of, and an estimate of the probable expense of completing each of those lines; and Your Excellency having been pleased to appoint us, the undersigned, Commissioners for that purpose, we beg most respectfully to submit the following Report:—

We proceeded in July last from Kingston corner, traversing the present Great Road, at the same time taking the angles of elevation and depression, from that place to John Chaloners, a distance of two and a half miles; many parts of this Road are rather hilly, but the best that could be found; from thence to Perkins', three and a quarter miles, the hills are still greater, particularly the one at Peirs'. A new line had been contemplated by the Supervisor, Benjamin L. Peters, Esquire, of which we made a survey; next to Chaloner's, this line passes through a Wood, thence over cleared land, a part of which is but partially improved; this line would, if made, effect a considerable improvement, but would be attended with additional expense to that of making, as the proprietors require large damages, particularly Major Dann, through the whole width of whose Farm it passes, and estimated (as we were informed by a Jury) at eighty pounds. From Perkins', beyond the Beaver Dam, is a high eminence, called Gilbert's Hill, over which the Road passes in a winding direction, is rocky, and the ascent and descent of which, in many places, too steep for a carriage road; to avoid which, we explored and surveyed a proposed line from the Beaver Dam, to meet the present Road, a distance of two hundred chains. This line, though much elevated in the centre, would be something better, as the rise and fall is more gradual, but not such as would be desirable to locate a Road on. The next obstacle that presents itself is the rocky eminence before coming to Redding's Brook, to avoid which, a line was examined and surveyed along the foot of the precipice, and found to be such as would answer, provided the other alterations were adopted; the remainder of the Road, though a little undulating, is not objectionable, except the descent to the Intervale at the Head of Bellisle Bay.

The new line from the Head of Bellisle Bay along the Bay Shore, we found to be suitable, and a proper site as far as Ganong's, and could be made at the usual rate, except an additional expense for short Causeways at Gray's Brook and Redding's Brook, and a Bridge over the Stream at Yandle's. From Ganong's to Peters' the line is objectionable, particularly at Erbes' Mountain, which extends to the water's edge, and is very steep; a pass however may be made by digging and walling the lower side, which is practicable, although attended with additional expense, but may be liable to be obstructed by the accumulation of ice, by the water descending from the Mountain at certain seasons of the year. Thence on to Haynes' the line passes alternately through cleared and wood land, some small hills intervening; from thence to Simpson's, or new Landing Road, (so called) it is tolerably level, but passes through a wood, uninhabited, and would be difficult to keep open in the winter season; thence by the new Landing Road to Kingston corner, there is a continued rise, and some parts of which rather steep. From Simpson's, or new Landing Road, to Brittain's and Bates' Mill Pond, the line is not such as to be objectionable, and from thence along the western side of Bates' Mill Pond, to the Great Road, the site is admirable and can be made a good Road of.

The

The present Great Road and the new line might be connected by a line surveyed from the Beaver Dam to Ganong's, a distance of 147 chains, which passes through a slack in the Ridge connecting Erbe's Mountain and Gilbert's Hill, and although something elevated towards the Beaver Dam, the ascent is gradual, and a Road could be made at an average price.

Distance of the present Great Road from Kingston corner to the Head of Bellisle Bay is 1420 chains—Head of Bay by the new line to Kingston corner, 1395 chains. Proposed alterations on the present Great Road—From Chaloner's to Perkins', 269 chains—from Beaver Dam to Road, 200 chains—Redding's Brook to Road, 200 chains—Beaver Dam to Ganong's, 147 chains—New Landing Road to Great Road, 145 chains—this is a continuation of the new line; thence to Kingston corner, 128 chains.

Estimate of expenses of opening and completing the new line of Road from the Head of Bellisle Bay to the new Landing Road at Simpson's, and from thence to the present Great Road by the way of Bates' Mill Pond, and of the different alterations proposed on the old line:—From the Finger Board Road, a distance of two and a quarter miles through the wood, £337 10s.; from thence to Ganong's, five and three quarter miles, £575; and from thence to Simpson's, nine miles, £1350; Causeway and Bridge at Gray's Brook, £20; Bridge over Redding's Brook, £30; Bridge over Yandle's Stream, £50; excavating and walling Erbe's Mountain, £50; Simpson's to Great Road, one mile and three quarters, £200. Present Road—From Chaloner's to Perkins', three and a quarter miles, £487 10s.; Beaver Dam to Great Road, £375; Redding's Brook to Road, one mile, £140; Beaver Dam to Ganong's, one mile and three quarters, £245.—A Plan, shewing the different lines and their profiles, is herewith attached.

All which is respectfully submitted to the consideration of Your Excellency.

CANADA LINE OF GREAT ROAD.

Report from James A. Maclauchlan, Supervisor of Canada Line of Road.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The Report of James A. Maclauchlan, Esquire, Supervisor of the Canada Line of Road, most respectfully sheweth:—

In my Annual Report which I had the honor to lay before Your Excellency in January last, I stated that this important line of Communication with the Canadas was only opened by appropriations of the Legislature as far as the Grand Falls, about one hundred and thirty miles above Fredericton, the seat of Government.

That in March last I was called upon by Your Excellency for information on the state of the remaining part of this line, from the Falls to the Saint Lawrence Portage at Lake Tamisquata, a distance of eighty miles, which Report I shortly after transmitted to Your Excellency, as well as another on the same subject in June.

In these Reports I endeavoured to explain to Your Excellency the very serious inconvenience the Government and the Public daily experienced by this communication not being opened, by land or water, more particularly through the unsettled parts of it, that is on the Little Madawaska River and round the west shore of Lake Tamisquata, a distance of forty five miles.

That on receiving Your Excellency's instructions to expend the appropriation of the Legislature of the last Session on that part of the Communication supposed to be immediately required by the Government, and which Your Excellency considered was that section of it between the entrance of the Little Madawaska and the Saint Lawrence Portage at Lake Tamisquata, no time was delayed by me in complying with Your Excellency's wishes, and the following improvements were made during the season, which I must beg to assure Your Excellency have been found very useful to the public, by affording a temporary land and water communication until adequate appropriations

appropriations are made by the Legislature for the completion of this very important line, which will pass through a country well adapted for making an excellent level Road with little expense for Bridging, and when finished, together with the contemplated improvement between Fredericton and the Grand Falls, including *the much required Bridge* at the Restook River, that I had the honor of reporting on to Your Excellency last year, will enable the public to perform the route between Fredericton and Quebec, distant three hundred and fifty miles, in five days, particularly as the Canadian Government now appear determined on making a good and efficient Road across the Portage, which was commenced last Summer by an expenditure of upwards of two thousand pounds.

The Towing Path made under my direction on the left bank of the Little Madawaska at its confluence with the Saint John, and extending up to the Degeli, at Lake Tamisquata, twenty six miles, is from twelve to twenty feet in width, by having the trees and bushes cut down and removed; also a track or path levelled four feet wide, and Bridges of six feet in breadth built over the small tributaries and hollows where required. This path was found very useful through the season from its answering the purposes of a temporary highway, as well as affording Boats and Canoes to pass up and down the Stream with facility, and without danger from the removal of the overhanging trees and bushes on its banks.

The cost of this Towing Path is about twenty two pounds a mile, and was made by contracts and the hire of the inhabitants of Madawaska, as Your Excellency wished, in order to prevent as much as possible expense to the Province in furnishing provisions for the relief of their families, at that time so much required.

From the Degeli round the west shore of Lake Tamisquata to the Portage, eighteen miles, the ground was thoroughly explored and the Road made by a Turnpike of twenty four feet in width, with a skirting of twenty feet on each side down to the Cabano, two miles, at one hundred and sixty pounds a mile: and from thence to the Degeli it is also opened and almost all stumped the same width at one hundred pounds a mile. Of this distance two miles were made by the inhabitants and the remainder by contract.

Two permanent Bridges have been built on this line: one at the Cabano River, which cost one hundred and ninety eight pounds, the other at Perel Brook for thirty pounds. Contracts were also entered into for the remaining three Bridges on this route, which will cost one hundred and sixty pounds: but the season being too far advanced to have them properly made, I allowed the Contractor at his own expense to erect temporary ones for the winter communication, which enabled the public to use the Road since the early part of December.

Before closing this Report, I must again be permitted to bring under Your Excellency's notice, the state of this line between Woodstock and the Grand Falls, a distance of seventy five miles, as I am fearful unless an appropriation is made by the Legislature this Session for the necessary repairs of the Road and Bridges, as well as the building of the Restook Bridge, that Her Majesty's Mail may be seriously delayed on the route to Quebec.

GREAT ROAD, FREDERICTON TO WOODSTOCK.

Report of Expenditure of £500, on the Great Road between Fredericton and Woodstock.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In the apportionment of the appropriation made for the Great Road from Fredericton to the Canada line, £500 was set apart towards the payment of any sums that

that may have been due upon Contracts entered into by my predecessor, and also toward making repairs on the Road on the north side of the River. As all sums that may have been due on old Contracts were first to be paid, it became necessary to give ample time to individuals who might have entered into engagement for work on this Road to submit their claims previous to proceeding to expend any part of the amount at my disposal, consequently it was late in the season before I could proceed to the expenditure of this part of the Grant.

Finding that no applications were made for amounts due upon old Contracts I proceeded to the expenditure of the amount on such parts of the Road lying on the North side of the River as I conceived most to require it, and after the erection of a New Bridge over Morehouse's Mill Stream, as well as repairing various other Bridges on the line, I took a Contract for opening a new piece of Road around Cunningham's Hill; this has been completed, and one of the worst Hills on the whole line has been avoided by the alteration, and the Road considerably shortened. By the accompanying accounts, Your Excellency will observe that the sum of £60 remains in the Treasury. This amount has been reserved for putting a new Covering on the Nackawickack Bridge, which is very much required; the materials are on the ground, and the work will be completed early in the Spring; but I would remark that the sum reserved will hardly be sufficient to complete the work, as a new railing will be necessary the whole length, the expense of which was not included in the estimate.

As the expenditure of this part of the Grant was confined entirely to the north side of the River, the Road between Fredericton and Burgoyne's Ferry, on the south side, has got out of repair, consequently, this part of the Road will require some additional labour during the ensuing season, in addition to which, about eight miles of Road, on the recently explored line is yet to be opened, and various Bridges on the same to be built; the Timber for some of these is now on the ground, I would therefore respectfully suggest that a sum of from £1,000 to £1,200 would be required to complete the Road and erect the Bridges, between Fredericton and Burgoyne's Ferry.

NEW LINE OF ROAD, FREDERICTON TO WOODSTOCK.

Report of the Expenditure of £2,500, on the Western side of the River Saint John, between Burgoyne's Ferry and Patchell's Ferry.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In the appropriation made by the Legislature for the Great Road from Fredericton to the Canada Line, £2,500 was required to be expended in opening and improving a Road on the western side of the River Saint John, between Burgoyne's Ferry and Patchell's Ferry in Woodstock, with a view to a more direct communication to Canada, and Your Excellency having been graciously pleased to appoint us Commissioners for the expenditure of that amount, as also to carry into effect the wishes of the Legislature with regard to taking Contracts to the extent of a further sum of £1,250, for the erection of the Bridges on the same line,—we respectfully lay before Your Excellency the account of expenditure of the amount placed at our disposal, and at the same time beg to submit for your consideration the following Report:—

Upon receiving official notice of our appointments, we proceeded to post advertisements, and at the times stated therein put up several parts of the Road at Public Auction, and they were taken at unusually low rates. All these Contracts have been completed in a most substantial manner, with the exception of three, viz:—One taken by John H. Smith, from the Poquiock to Brown's Creek; another by Charles Nevers, from the Shogomock to Fox's field; and the other by John M'Farlane, a small distance above Fox's field. The Contracts taken by these individuals are on the Road lying
between

between Poquiock and Eel River, and the most difficult and expensive of the whole line on account of the numerous ledges and deep ravines; consequently, they were much harder to work than was anticipated at the time the Contracts were entered into, and it is more than probable that they will experience a heavy loss in the completion thereof, but the public interest in this regard will not suffer, for these parts of the Road will be infinitely better than if they had been completed in the fall of the year; and in order to secure the faithful discharge of this unfinished work, we have retained the sum of £285, which will not be drawn from the Treasury until the same is completed, which will be in the early part of the ensuing summer.

We would now beg permission to state what further Grant, in our opinion, will be required upon this most important line of Road before it can be brought to answer the great purposes anticipated by the Legislature at the time of making the most liberal Grant of the last Session.

That part of the line between George Wheeler's and the Poquiock, a distance of fourteen miles, the sum of £500 will be requisite to make it passable for carriages, and from Sutherland's Creek to Patchell's Ferry, in Woodstock, a distance of nearly twelve miles, about £2,200, exclusive of a further sum which will be necessary to complete the Bridge at Eel River, the latter Road require to be made new the whole distance.

In the further discharge of our duty, with regard to the Contract for building the Bridges upon this line of Road, we have unavoidably exceeded the amount specified in the Resolution of the House, but the importance of this Road being made useful at an early day, will, we trust, be sufficient cause for so doing, more especially, when it will be manifest that the Contracts are taken at very low rates. And we cannot refrain from expressing our opinion as to the incalculable advantage resulting from the wise measures of the Legislature, in giving authority to take the Contracts for Bridges, as we are satisfied they never could have been completed for anything like the sum for which they are now contracted for, had the expenditures been left to the usual course—the parties being enabled to get the materials upon the ground in the Winter Season at so much less expense than in the Summer. In order to satisfy Your Excellency that we studied all due economy in the expenditure of what we respectfully term a wise appropriation, we beg to exhibit the following Schedule of the Contracts entered into:—

All these several Contracts are to be completed by the 10th of October next.

We humbly trust that the amount we have recommended to be granted toward the completion of the Road will not be considered extravagant, when on reference to the estimate made by the gentlemen who so faithfully explored the line, and which estimate was before the Legislature when making the appropriation, it will be seen that we are within the amount there stated.

We close the report by remarking that the work which has been performed this season has been most substantially done, and, from what we can learn, gives very general satisfaction, and there can be no doubt that when the Road is completed, it will prove to be one of the most useful ones in the Province.

NEREPI'S GREAT ROAD.

Report of the Supervisor of the Nerepis Road.

As early as the opening of the Spring would permit, I went over the whole line of Road intrusted to my superintendance, to enable me to form the best estimate my judgement would allow me to do, as to the expenditure of the sum granted for this Road. After having, as fully as was practicable at that time, ascertained the state of the Road, I found that after selling some particular sections and renewing certain Bridges, by Public Auction, that from the limited sum put at my disposal, I would be compelled, in keeping the Road in a safe passable state, and prepare it for the Fall travelling, to put two or three parties upon it by the day, in some places to make permanent repairs, in others only temporary ones, by filling up ruts caused by carriage wheels, the effects of frost, the washing of the Spring rains, &c., repairing water courses, &c.

I consider that I was particularly fortunate in obtaining the services of two persons to take charge, of whose faithfulness and skill in Road making I had fully proved for the last four or five years; and although this mode caused a good deal of additional superintendance and expense to myself, I am fully convinced that in no other way could I have succeeded in getting the Road in the state it was in the Fall for the same amount; and it has most fully confirmed me in my previous opinion, that in no way upon old Roads will public monies be so faithfully expended, or the Roads perfected so far as the climate and the nature of the soil will permit, as by days' work, under the faithful superintendance of persons properly qualified for that purpose.

From the experience I have had of contracts for the repairs of old Roads, I have found that they were generally taken for less than the parties could possibly afford, and with all the vigilance of the Supervisor, they are seldom satisfactorily performed. The opening of new Roads, the erection of Bridges, taking down Hills, &c., may with advantage be sold at Public Auction; but I am strongly of the opinion that the wisdom of the Legislature will ere long approve of the repairs of old Roads by days' labour.

In consequence of an important Bridge and Causeway having been so much injured by the Spring freshet at what is called Earl's Creek, near Fredericton, I was commanded by His Excellency to erect a new one, and although this service was absolutely requisite for the safety of travelling, to be performed, it unexpectedly called upon me for eighty pounds which I had intended expending upon other parts of the Road that required it. The principal travelling upon this Road is in the Fall and Spring, both by persons passing between Fredericton and Saint John, and also by Farmers at that time finding it an advantageous time to make their market, consequently the wear and tear upon it is very great. There was more injury done to it last Fall in one week after having been frozen and a severe thaw coming, than by the whole Summer's travelling. This will always remain an inconvenience, that this Road will be more liable to than any other line that I am acquainted with. I have found very great benefit and the most effectual preventative, where I have been enabled to gravel, but this cannot in all places be effected for the want of the material, but in many parts it could, to great advantage, were there sufficient means to effect it. I have agreed for the opening the Road the full width between the Oromocto and Garey, to cut down the small growth which has so shaded it as to prevent the sun entering to dry it after wet weather. There are also several Causeways and Bridges between

between Fredericton and the Oromocto require to be attended to early in the Spring, the materials for which must be procured during the Winter.—I am well aware, that a Report from a Supervisor, stating the necessity of a more liberal grant upon a Road under his charge, is viewed with a degree of jealousy by the Legislature, as under the present system it increases his Commissions; yet I feel it my duty to state, that let whoever His Excellency may be pleased to appoint as Supervisor of this Road, it will be impossible for him to make any important improvement, or more than keep it in a passable state, unless a larger sum be appropriated than has been for the last three or four years. There are many parts that have not been worked since the first contract; those have been so much worn, that the centre of the Road has become the lowest part, consequently the water remains in the centre instead of running off into the ditches; these parts require to be new formed, and the width extended to twenty two feet, its present width in many parts not being more than sixteen feet. There are a number of the old Bridges passing over deep gullies, that will not be safe without being renewed, and as the Road is now so much travelled during the Winter, and the frequent thaws that have occurred of late seasons, require that the most particular attention should be paid to guard against the water crossing the Road on the side hills, which are very numerous, by deepening the water tables, and taking off the water in every possible way, to prevent those dangerous slews to which travellers are now liable. If this duty should be properly attended to, and added to the necessity of keeping the other parts of the Road in a proper state, I feel confident it cannot be accomplished, however judicious the Supervisor may be, without an increase upon the grants of late years. My attention having been more particularly called by the erection of the Bridge at Earl's Creek, to the width of the Road immediately below it, and upon measurement found it to be nearly one third short of what is contemplated in the Great Road Law. Upon application at the different Public Offices at Fredericton, I was unable to procure any record of this part of the Road. Considering it of importance that the Road so near the Seat of Government should have its full width, I applied to the Surveyor General, who ordered a Deputy to make a Survey and Plan, which I laid before His Excellency and the Honorable the Executive Council, stating the facts, but have not as yet received any orders or instructions thereon. Should it be thought of importance that this part of the Road should be opened to its full width, it can never be done with less inconvenience to the parties through whose land the Road passes, or expense to the public if any compensation should have to be made—more particularly so as the Honorable Mr. Parker has recently made a purchase of the land on one side of the Road, and is about making improvements thereon, I am informed, early in the Spring.

ROAD FROM FREDERICTON TO GRAND LAKE.

Report upon the Peticodiac Road from Fredericton to the Head of the Grand Lake.

Woodlands, February, 1840.

SIR—I beg to submit the following statement, shewing what has been done under my Commission for laying out a Road from Fredericton to the Head of the Grand Lake, together with the Accounts up to the present time.

Under the perfect conviction that the errors manifestly committed in laying out most of our Roads, have arisen from the bad method hitherto pursued, and not from any difficulties which the general features of the Country or its uncleared state present; I have ventured to adopt, in this instance, the only certain method by which these errors can be avoided, and the only one which is recognized by Engineers, as that upon which a good Road can be constructed.

Experience has proved and reduced it to a rule, that when a rise is met with presenting an angle of more than $3\frac{1}{2}$ degrees, or more abrupt than one foot in twenty, it should be considered an obstacle, and the angle reduced either by excavation or by an encrease of distance, except in extreme cases.

Upon

Upon Roads of much traffic in Countries where expense is not an object, the former is frequently resorted to, but in this Country a small encrease of distance is to be preferred. Accordingly upon the present Line this latter principle has been adopted, and in no instance does the grade exceed 1 in 20, and that but for a short distance.

The expense of taking levels to effect this object, if properly conducted, will be found to be very small as compared with the great waste occasioned by making alterations where labor has already been expended.

The wetness of the early part of the Season was so much against carrying on operations of this nature that it very much encreased this expense.

I have endeavored to have the Plans which accompany this Report as comprehensive as possible, being upon a Scale of 10 Chains to the inch. Those usually exhibited are upon a scale much too small to give a correct view of the subject they represent, and as sources of information, cannot be depended upon.

The Line as shewn upon these Plans has been opened from Fredericton to Newcastle, and Contracts entered into embracing the whole amount at my disposal.

The plan adopted has been to open half the intended width of the Road through the whole Line; that is, a width of 33 feet has been opened, upon 13 feet of which the Trees have been removed by the Roots; this has been effected at an average of £20 per mile. I was induced to adopt this method from a conviction that it would be attended with good economy, and from a desire to have the whole Line opened, that if necessary, its nature and advantages might be clearly ascertained.

Twelve miles of the remaining half have likewise been contracted for at a corresponding rate with the first, that is from £19 to £20 per mile, making the cost of opening the whole width (according to the original Specification) about £40 per mile.

The latter Contract having been rendered necessary by the difficulties occasioned by Major Yeamans in crossing the Newcastle Stream, (leaving a sum still to be disposed of) was effected very late in the Season; I have therefore been induced to give the Contractors an extension of time for its completion.

A Contract has been entered into with Mr. Ledbeater, of Little River Mills, for furnishing the Lumber necessary for the erection of a Bridge across that Stream, (the only one of any magnitude) the Winter being the proper Season for that purpose.

A difference of opinion existing as to the comparative advantage of having the Trees with their roots removed under one operation, or making them the subject of a separate and distinct Contract: having adopted the latter method, I beg to offer a short remark upon the subject:—

In those Sections of the Country where the soil and growth is light, as is the case in the greater part of the Counties of Queen's and Westmorland, the Trees with their Roots may at once be removed with some advantage, but where the growth is heavy, this system, in my opinion, should not be adopted.

I beg to call your attention to the subject of Major Yeamans' Petition.

The Contractors upon this part of the Line being desirous of commencing their work early in the Spring, it should be decided upon which Line (marked on Plan No. V.) the Road is to be taken.

For further information I must refer you to the Plans and Accounts accompanying this Report, which is submitted with the greatest respect by,

ROAD BETWEEN NEW CANAAN AND PETICODIAC.

Report of E. Botsford, on Road between New Canaan and Peticodiac.

Fredericton, 31st August, 1839.

SIR—I have to report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that in conformity with his wishes, I proceeded to examine that Section of the Road from Salmon River to Fredericton, which passes over Newcastle Stream, for the purpose of ascertaining the most eligible site for a Bridge. It would appear that the
Commissioner

Commissioner, Mr. Hansard, purposes to abandon the Mills' Road, so called, from one David Mills having been the Contractor in 1836, to stump and level the same. The distance of this Road from Salmon River to the point marked A on the plan, I have directed Mr. Ramsey to lay before you, and which is intended to accompany and elucidate this Report, west of Newcastle Stream, where both the contemplated Roads intersect each other, is seven miles sixteen rods, about four miles of which, from Salmon River onwards, has been worked by Mills. It will be observed that this Road deviates in the centre about a mile to the north, from a right line between the two Rivers, at the proposed Bridging places; no reason is given for this deviation, which increases the distance between the above observed points one half mile, other than the imperfection of the first Exploration and Survey. To remedy this most unnecessary deviation from the general course of the Road, which is also yet more objectionable from the innumerable short crooks without regard to the different grades of the surface throughout its length, Messrs. Wightman and Hansard recommended the new line as subsequently surveyed by Mr. Ramsey, which passes through Mr. Yeamans' property, and is opposed by him. The distance from Salmon River to the point Marked A on this line, is six and a half miles and nineteen rods. Should this latter line be approved of, which I am induced to think under all the circumstances the most eligible one, there cannot exist a doubt but that the site of the Bridge over Newcastle Stream should be below Mr. Yeamans' house, and at the place shewn by the plan I have previously referred to. On the other hand, should it not be deemed advisable to abandon Mills' Road, because of the work already expended upon it, and that it will better accommodate some Settlers on the Hard Wood Ridge Settlement, the Bridge ought in that case to be built over the Mill Pond at the place pointed out and recommended by Mr. Yeamans. The great objections to this line, however, are, that it increases the distance half a mile, that the expense of building a Bridge over the Mill Pond will be at least double that of a Bridge on the more direct line, and that a very considerable Hill will have to be encountered at the west bank of the Stream. It may be observed that as the distance between the two sites is only one quarter of a mile, the Inhabitants could easily obtain access to the Bridge proposed by Messrs. Whiteman and Hansard, by making a short Road from their present one to it.

As the last surveyed line upon which the Commissioner has made Contracts, will pass over some of Mr. Yeamans' Intervale, and Mr. Hansard being only a Commissioner, and not having the requisite power to lay out and establish it, and to agree with Mr. Yeamans for any damage he may sustain or demand, the Road will therefore have to remain undecided until established by the Legislature, or until it shall have been made a Great Road of communication, and a Supervisor regularly appointed to it. For these reasons, the Honorable Mr. Johnston (who accompanied me in the examination) and myself, deemed it advisable to direct Mr. Ramsey, who appeared to be acting for Mr. Hansard in his absence, to give notice to the Contractors not to commence their work. This delay will not retard the completion of the Road, as Mr. Hansard's Contracts extend only to taking out the Trees one half of the width of the Road, (13 feet I believe) leaving the roots in; and the Road when relet can with advantage be stumped, grubbed, and levelled the whole width in one Contract, preparatory to its being turnpiked.

ROAD FROM MIRAMICHI TO GRAND LAKE.

Exploration of the Road from Miramichi to the Grand Lake.

Miramichi, 7th February, 1840.

SIR—We beg leave to submit, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the following, our Report, as Commissioners appointed to explore a line of Road from Miramichi to the Grand Lake:—

It may be necessary to account for this duty not having been attended to at an earlier date, by stating that one of us, David Crocker, was so engaged during 1838 in exploring

Roads and performing other duties, as Supervisor and Commissioner in the Counties of Gloucester and Restigouche, as to prevent the possibility of his giving this duty his attention: nor could we, between us, without immediate interference with other public duties, attempt this exploration before last October, when we made it our business.

As nearly the whole tract of country through which we had to travel was an unsettled and unexplored wilderness, our first attention was turned to a direct line, in order to give good connexions to certain points, and at the same time determined, that one of ourselves, should, instead of confining himself to the party running the line, (the whole party consisting of ourselves both, Deputy James Davidson, and six hands,) turn his exclusive attention to exploring the country to the eastward of the line, that only being the side on which there was any room for speculation, the west side being hemmed in by Cain's River and its tributaries.

We commenced at the N. E. end of a tract of land, surveyed by Deputy Hunter, on the S. W. side of Barnaby's River, known as the Semogan Ridge, thence followed a line running S. W. through the middle of said tract 5 Miles 15 Chains; thence S. 37° W. 70 Chains; thence S. 53° E. 30 Chains; thence S. 37° W. 3 Miles and 12 Chains; thence S. 53° E. 10 Chains, to avoid some small Lakes; thence S. 37° W. 29 Miles and 47 Chains, to Fairweather's line; thence followed that line S. 18° W. 3 Miles and 4 Chains, to the termination thereof; and from thence S. 37° W. 2 Miles and 17 Chains, to Salmon River.

The line through the Semogan, or Semewagan Ridge, passes through excellent land, covered with hardwood, with the exception of one small Barren, and by keeping about 30 Chains to the S. E. of our line, we think that Barren may be avoided. The same Hardwood Ridge extends 1 Mile and 46 Chains beyond Hunter's survey. There are already several persons settled on this Ridge, and we have no doubt, but that in the course of a short time the whole of the lots already surveyed, if not the whole Ridge, will be settled. The Settlers here, as well as on Barnaby's River, are almost exclusively Irish. There is a double Saw Mill, and also a Grist Mill, on Barnaby's River. From the termination of the Semogan Ridge, the land is moist for 3 Miles and 12 Chains, a proportion of which is burnt, and interspersed by Barrens; thence, for $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile, the line passes through a fine Hardwood Ridge. To the eastward of the line, after leaving the Semogan Ridge, the country for 3 or 4 miles is low and sunk, towards the east branch of Barnaby's River, and from any observation that we could make, there was no improvement of the aspect of the country for a considerable distance to the eastward and southward in the direction of our line.

From the last Hardwood Ridge for 8 Miles and 25 Chains, we passed chiefly over burnt land, a great part of which is bare of Timber, crossing Black Brook, (Cain's River,) and Salmon Brook. In that distance the land is rather uneven, and of a broken surface, but presenting no steep hills, with one exception, which may be easily avoided; and although there is a small proportion of barren, the ground, generally, is dry, and not unfavorable to the formation of a Road; there is also a small proportion of mixed Green Woods, fit for Settlement. The burnt land, above referred to, extends 6 to 8 miles to the eastward of our line. From the last point to the East Branch of Sabby's River, distance 2 Miles and 68 Chains, the land is generally dry; a part of this distance is covered with Green Woods and is fit for cultivation. The banks of Sabby's River are rather steep where the line crosses, but a short distance up stream they become more level. There is a Saw Mill about two Miles below our line on Sabby's River. From the East Branch of Sabby's River for 1 Mile and 55 Chains, the land is partly green and partly burnt, but will admit of a good Road; thence 55 Chains through a fine Hardwood Ridge, which extends a considerable distance South-Eastwardly, and in the direction of our line, but to the Eastward of it 5 or 6 Miles. From the last point to the West Branch of Sabby's River, is $1\frac{1}{2}$ Miles, through mixed woods, a part of which would admit of being settled.

From the West Branch of Sabby's River to Salmon River the distance is 18 Miles and 61 Chains, and we conceive it unnecessary to give anything more than a general description of the country,—for the whole distance, it is nearly a continuation of soft woods, burnt land, dry "knolls," and a great many barrens; there are, however, some spots fit for cultivation, and some good meadow and grass lands; but those exceptions bear

bear but a small proportion to the whole extent: the ground is generally level, with a sandy bottom, and would admit of a fair Road. It should be observed that in crossing the W. Branch of Sabby's we encountered some high and precipitous banks on our line, which, however, soon disappeared, and gave way to the level country above described.

The ground on the North side of Salmon River is of a poor quality, except a small skirting along the margin of the River.

We struck Salmon River about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles above the mouth of the Gaspereaux, here we found the country for $1\frac{1}{2}$ Miles above our line, towards the Upper Mills, poor and principally burnt for some distance to the Northward of the River. When at Salmon River, we turned our attention to a site for a Bridge, and discovered that there were two pretty favorable ones, viz: one at the Upper Mills, and the other a short distance above the mouth of the Gaspereaux,—either of which would answer by accommodating the line to it. At Salmon River we discharged our men; one of us, A. Goodfellow, proceeded to Fredericton, accompanied by the Surveyor, and the other returned to Miramichi, accompanied by two of the men, by way of the Gaspereaux and Cain's River, keeping to the westward of the line, and in which route the general features of the country were about the same as on the line, presenting no improvement upon the line in any way, either as to Road making or for Settlement. One object of A. G. in returning *via* Fredericton, was to seek further information in the Crown Land Office, and to compare notes and plans with former Surveys.

Having again met in Miramichi, we proceeded to the Semogan Ridge, being our former starting place, and ran a direct line to Chatham, the course being N. 37° E. and the distance 11 Miles, making the whole distance from Chatham to Salmon River 55 Miles and 5 Chains.

From the Semogan Ridge the land descends gradually to Barnaby's River, distance $1\frac{1}{2}$ Miles, chiefly through Hardwoods, but part of it is rather moist. Leaving Barnaby's River, for 2 Miles and 35 Chains is soft land, covered with Spruce, Juniper and Ash, and a small part of the distance is naked Barren; for 1 Mile and 75 Chains further there is a fine Hardwood Ridge, on which there are several Settlers and some pretty good farms; from thence to Malcolm's Brook, a distance of 20 Chains, the land is swampy, and continues wet for $\frac{1}{2}$ a Mile beyond Malcolm's Brook; for 2 Miles and 45 Chains further, to the Road leading through the Settlement on the second tier of lots, in rear of St. Paul's Church, Chatham, the line passes through a fine Ridge of land, the first half mile through green woods, and the remaining distance through burnt woods. From thence to the Highway, a short distance above the Town of Chatham, is 1 Mile and 65 Chains, and, with the exception of the hills over Clarke's Cove, the land is level and good for Road making.

From all the information we could gather from other persons worthy of credit, as well as from our own observation, on the Line, and that of our David Crocker, who for at least for five or six days attended to the principle laid down in the third paragraph of this Report, viz: examining the Country by climbing and otherwise, to the Eastward of our Line, we are decidedly of opinion, that there are no extensive Ridges of Land, fit for settlement between the Semogan Ridge and the Salmon River.

There is a Hardwood Ridge on the East side of the East Branch of Barnaby's River, about eight miles to the S.E. of our line, but we are led to believe, from information received from persons, who we believe to be well acquainted with it, that it is not so extensive as the Semogan Ridge, and besides making the distance much greater, it is very doubtful if a good Road could be made from that Ridge to Miramichi River, as the land is reported to be exceedingly swampy. We have been very particular in collecting all the information we possibly could, as well from plans of surveys in the Surveyor General's Office, as from every other source, and from all the information we could glean, we are decidedly of opinion, that the best ground for a Road from Barnaby's River to Salmon River, is nearly in the direction we ran, or perhaps a short distance to the S. E. of the line. The Country a few miles to the S. E. of our line is reported to be interspersed with immense naked Barrens of several miles in extent. We are also of opinion that the line of Road from Barnaby's River to Miramichi River should not lead direct to Chatham, but to the Bridge on the Cove dividing the Parishes of Nelson and Chatham, as shewn by the dotted line on the Plan; and although there would

would be a trifling increase in the distance, by coming out at this Bridge, still there would be a very great saving to the Province, as upwards of five miles of the Road, being the distance from the Bridge to Chatham, is already well made.

Not having found any extensive tracts of land beyond the Semogan Ridge well adapted for settlement, as contemplated by the Resolution of the Honorable the House of Assembly of 24th February, 1838, we did not consider ourselves warranted in going on to mark out a line of Road carefully, which would have added very much to the expense, without making a report of our proceedings so far; but we do not hesitate to say, that a good line of Road can be found nearly in the direction in which we ran the line, and by no means an expensive one, compared with other Roads in the Province.

Upon the whole, we beg leave to state, that so far as we have gone on this exploration, it constitutes only a beginning, and that determining upon the Line actually to be adopted, will yet be the work of much time and labour, in our opinion not less than that of a whole Summer.

We beg leave to submit the accompanying Plan of Survey, which will more fully illustrate our exploration, and having introduced upon the Plan extracts from the different Surveys upon and in the vicinity of our Line, have no doubt of its affording much useful information.

ROAD FROM SACKVILLE TO NOVA SCOTIA LINE.

Report of the Honorable E. Botsford, Supervisor of the Great Road from Sackville to the Nova Scotia Line.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

As Commissioner appointed to superintend the alteration of the Great Road from Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, to the Nova Scotia Province Line, I beg leave to Report,—That previous to laying out the same or making any Contracts for the performance of the work, I took the necessary measures to ascertain whether the Province of Nova Scotia was prepared to comply with the conditions attached to the appropriation of this Province, viz: that of “completing so much of the Road as lay within that Province.” A Commissioner has been appointed for that purpose, and a sufficient Grant made to complete their part of the Line. I also felt it my duty to require that a certain sum should be raised by subscription, in aid of the liberal Grant made last Winter Session, in order to enable me to carry out the intentions of the Legislature in completing the Road without further demand upon the liberality of the House. I am happy to have it in my power to state, that five hundred pounds has been raised by Individual subscriptions towards the work, and land to the value of £200 given by the owners for the use of the Road, independent of about £1000 subscribed towards the erection of an Aboideau over the Au Lac River, which will form a permanent Bridge for the Road.

Those preliminary arrangements having been made, I proceeded to Contract for the ditching and turnpiking of the marsh part of the Road throughout its whole extent, which has been satisfactorily performed with the exception of a short piece of undyked marsh, which the Proprietors intend enclosing the ensuing Summer; those Contracts amounted to £400, which I have paid. I have also contracted for the erection of all the small Bridges, which are now in a state of progress, amounting to £200. This will enable the Commissioner to proceed with the gravelling early next Season; to facilitate this part of the undertaking, I have made Contracts for the furnishing of a quantity of Brush, to the amount of £75, to be drawn this Winter, as it can be obtained for one half the price than if it were delayed until Summer. I

I have entered into a Contract for the erection of a Bridge upon Colonel Towns' improved Truss principle, over the Tantamar River, being 580 feet wide and 36 feet deep, to be completed by the 1st day of October in the present year, for the sum of £2,450, with two substantial Sureties for the faithful performance of the work. I have also contracted for the building of a Bridge to be constructed upon Piles over the Missiguash River, for the sum of £270, one half of this Contract is to be borne by the Province of Nova Scotia. I have further engaged to pay the Proprietors of the Marsh bordering upon the Au Lac River, the sum of £550, upon condition that they will build a good substantial Aboideau over that River, to be used as a Bridge over the Line of Road, which they have undertaken to do. This work is estimated to cost £1,850.

It will be observed that the total amount of Contracts thus entered into by me is £3,810, leaving the sum, including subscriptions, of £1190 for gravelling and completing the Road.

ROAD FROM SALMON RIVER TO RICHIBUCTO.

Report upon an Exploration for a Line of Road between Salmon River and the Town of Richibucto.

Fredericton, 31st December, 1839.

SIR—Having had the honor of being appointed Commissioner by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to explore a Line of Road from the Head of the Grand Lake to Richibucto, I procured the necessary hands and provisions, and proceeded with my party from Saint John to the starting point, and having arrived there and made an exploration for two days between James M'Donald's and the Peticodiac Road; not having received any distinct orders upon that head, I concluded to act upon my own judgment, until my return from Richibucto, when I could, upon further exploration, point out the most suitable line of Road, and which would be the least expensive to Her Majesty's Government, as there was an extensive swamp to be avoided.

I therefore proceeded from M'Donald's lower line on the Settlement Road, on a course by the magnet N. 79° E. through good level land fit for cultivation, to the rear of the Front Settlement at angle A: thence I changed my course to N. 59° E. for two miles and a quarter, to angle B, through a similar tract of land equally fit for settlement, being covered with a growth of maple, white birch and spruce. From the last mentioned station I altered my course to N. 40° E. through another excellent tract of land well adapted for settlement, a distance of one mile and a quarter, to angle C: thence changed the course to N. 60° E. three miles and a quarter, to angle D, also through an excellent tract of level land fit for settlement: thence I changed the course to N. 78° E. to avoid the high banks of the several streams emptying into Salmon River, as will more plainly appear on reference to the accompanying Plan.

On this line there is a continuation of the same description of fertile land to the 13 mile tree.

From the 13 mile tree to angle E, the land is of a very inferior quality, the soil being very light and stony, principally covered with spruce and sapling pine.

In climbing at several places between the 13 mile tree before mentioned and the Lake Stream, I could plainly discover in a southerly direction a tract of hardwood land, running almost parallel with the present line until it meets the bank of Coy's Brook. I have marked in dotted lines on the Plan, for His Excellency's consideration, how far it might be deemed advisable to extend the line through this apparently valuable tract, and should this arrangement meet His Excellency's views, it would lengthen the Road but one quarter of a mile.

At angle E, I was obliged to alter the course a little, to avoid the swamp shewn on the Plan, and after clearing that, returned to the last mentioned course, viz: N. 78° E. to angle F, through land of an inferior quality. Thence I was again obliged to

change the course to the left, to avoid an extensive swamp stretching in a southeasterly direction, and having cleared that difficulty about the 20 mile tree, I changed the course to N. 80° E. through excellent land, far superior to any before mentioned, being very level and covered with a very large growth of birch, hemlock and ash, with some scattering firs and spruce.

At the 24 mile tree I fell in with a tract of burnt land, stretching from the banks of Salmon River in a southeasterly direction, its width on the intended line being three quarters of a mile. From that I passed through level land to the 28 mile tree, wooded principally with a small growth of white birch and spruce, and the soil of a light sandy nature, but well adapted for making a good Road, and with less expense than land of a superior quality. At the 28 mile tree I changed the course to N. 79° E. to avoid swampy land which I fully ascertained it would lead to, and which course I followed to the 32 mile tree, through land favorable for settlement, but not equally so with that heretofore mentioned, being a cold sandy soil.

From the 32 mile tree I changed the course to N. 65° E. to the 33 mile tree, leaving an extensive barren plain on my right, towards the Ox Bow on Salmon River, on which are several small Lakes, which would prove a strong impediment to forming a Road in that quarter, and I would therefore respectfully suggest, for His Excellency's consideration, an improvement which can be easily made from the 31 mile tree, which would lead the Road through a tract of land of very superior quality, as well as shortening the distance, as will appear by reference to the dotted line on the accompanying Plan.

From the 33 mile tree I shaped my course N. 78° E. and intersected the Salmon River 60 rods below Estabrooks' Portage, at a very unfavorable point for Bridging, and after examining the banks of the River in the vicinity, I found no place more favorable for that purpose than the landing at the said Portage. I then continued the line on this Portage about 60 rods, when I was under the necessity of changing the course to N. 82° E. to avoid barren land extending in a north westerly direction towards the old Portage, as laid down on my Plan. This course I continued to the 39 mile tree. The land from the River to the 37½ mile tree is level, but cold and uninviting. From the 37½ mile tree to the 38 mile tree the land is burnt, and covered chiefly with spruce and scattering white birch. From the 38 to the 39 mile tree the land is of a very superior quality, chiefly covered with hard wood and hemlock.

From the 39 mile tree I changed the course to N. 55° E. keeping the Hudson Brook in a parallel distance of about half a mile on the northerly side, until I met the westerly bank of Richibucto River, about three quarters of a mile above the head of the tide, within 17½ miles of the Town of Richibucto, and distant from the starting point 42½ miles.

This latter tract is decidedly the best for settlement and cultivation I have met with on the whole line, its locality being exceedingly advantageous, extending along the intended Road four miles, and running back parallel with the same two miles and a half on each side.

On my arrival at the Richibucto Settlement I found much difference of opinion to exist with regard to the old Road, in consequence of which I found it necessary to stop the survey until I could personally explore and examine it, and fix upon the most eligible line.

In consequence, I proceeded on the old Road to the Town of Richibucto: From the Richibucto Settlement to Bass River Settlement, I found the Road very crooked; and from Bass River to Molus River, very hilly and irregularly laid off. On Molus River the abutments of a Bridge are laid down, the top of which is about eighty feet below the level of the banks of the River, and which, if attempted to be finished, would amount to a very serious expense before it could be made a good carriage road. From Molus River, along the rear line of the Indian Reserve, the Road is partially opened, in some places merely chopped. At a small stream which empties into the last mentioned River, the banks on each side are covered with a small strip of intervalle, after passing which, they rise almost perpendicularly to a height of about 170 feet. At a small brook which empties into the main Richibucto at Oak Point, I found the banks nearly similar to the last mentioned. From that point the land is tolerably good as far as the north east angle of the Indian Reserve; it then passes through a very

very deep barren plain about one mile in length, one quarter of which is turnpiked in such manner that it is impossible for two horses to pass each other, the Road being only eight feet wide, and on each side a large wet dyke, sufficiently deep to float a tolerable sized boat. Thence the Road passes through low barren swampy land to within half a mile of the Mill Creek, crossing the same where the banks are very high, and over which is a Bridge, but difficult for carriages to pass. From this, the Road passes through land partially burnt, for a distance of one mile and a half: thence to the Town of Richibucto, (about four miles) the Road passes through low, level swampy land, leaving a large barren plain on the northerly side, extending almost to the North West Richibucto River.

After closely examining this old line of Road, I found that the distance could be shortened four miles from where I crossed at Pine's upper line, to the Town, as well as avoiding the several swamps, barrens, and difficulties in bridging the places before mentioned.

I then returned to Pine's, and crossing the Richibucto, changed the course to N. 63° E. through burnt land, one mile; thence through good level land to Point * * at Kendricks' lower line, on Bass River; thence along that line one hundred rods to the westerly bank of said River, where I found it favorable for bridging. After passing this River, I continued through burnt land three quarters of a mile, where I met with excellent land for settlement, covered principally with a large growth of hemlock and hardwood, to the banks of Molus River. About the 49 mile tree I crossed the last mentioned River at the most favorable point for bridging.

After crossing this River, I changed the course to N. 80° E. to angle G, and met with very low level land, principally covered with cedar and a small growth of white birch and spruce, to the 51 mile tree, whence to the 53 mile tree passed through excellent land for settlement.

Thence I changed the course to N. 78° E. and passed through burnt land to the 54½ mile tree, where I crossed the present Road leading to the Town of Richibucto; thence to the Mill Creek, and crossed the same at a favorable point for bridging. From the Mill Creek I crossed the said Road again at 56½ miles from the place of beginning, and about 3½ miles from the Town of Richibucto.

After travelling in various directions, in order, if possible, to shorten the above old Road, I found it necessary to give up any further proceeding, as it would be impossible to avoid the barren plain heretofore mentioned. I then returned to M'Donald's, on Salmon River, where I started, with the intention to connect this line of Road with the Peticodiac Road, but found that impracticable, unless I followed the old Settlement Road, (the survey of which appears in dotted lines on the Plan, with some proposed alterations,) and after having exercised my judgement to the best of my ability, I would respectfully suggest to His Excellency, that the present line of the Peticodiac Road should be moved to M'Donald's, on Salmon River, where an Island offers a favorable position for bridging. The point of the line of Road from which the Peticodiac Road would run, is good hardwood land, highly favorable for settlement, and continuing so in the direction of the latter as far as visible, and would not make any material difference in the distance.

Having thus far reported upon the quality of the soil, and the localities of the line of Road surveyed, I beg leave to submit for His Excellency's consideration, the accompanying Schedule of the width of the several large Rivers mentioned in this Report, requiring to be bridged, as also some other particulars connected with the same.

The several other small streams which appear on the face of the Plan I did not consider necessary to report on, as the largest does not exceed eight feet in width, and do not offer any great impediment to the road maker.

In making the survey, my sole object was to find a good line of Road through land favorable for settlement, as well as to leave a tract of good land on the northerly side of the intended Road, to connect with the rear line of the granted land on the southerly side of Salmon River, thereby affording sufficient accommodation for two tiers of lots on land fit for cultivation.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

ROAD FROM WESTMORLAND MARSH TO LOCH LOMOND.

Report of Exploration from the Old Westmorland Road to Loch Lomond.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having been appointed by Your Excellency, Commissioner to examine a new line of Road from the Forks of the Old Westmorland Road, or Marsh Road, to Loch Lomond, I beg leave to submit the following Report:—

Having explored every route between the said Forks and the Lake where appears that it might be practicable to carry a Road, the Commissioner finds that the only ground that would be capable of making a level Road is almost in a straight direction to the Lake, as will shew by the plan accompanying the Report. The land appears to be free from Stone, and not difficult to make a Road upon, and the Road this way would be shorter (as will appear by the Plan annexed,) than the present Road, which is very hilly.

ROAD FROM EEL RIVER TO OAK BAY.

Report of Exploration of proposed Road from Eel River to Oak Bay.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having been appointed Commissioner to expend the sum of £500 between Oak Bay (in Charlotte County,) and Eel River Bridge (in the County of York,) on a line as explored and marked out by Mr. Wightman:

I have to report,—That immediately after my appointment, (in October last,) I advertized to sell the opening a Road on Mr. Wightman's line. A short time before the day of sale, however, I ascertained that no line had been run by Mr. Wightman, as had been supposed when the Grant was made. On making this known to Your Excellency, I was directed to postpone the sale until a further exploration should be made, and at the same time instructed to make that exploration, which I forthwith commenced, and to assist me in which, I found it necessary to employ a Surveyor, (Mr. Ramsay.) By the accompanying Plan it will be seen that the distance explored, measured, and marked out by me, on which the Road is contracted to be cut, is 43 miles. This exploration has been effected at an expense of about £160; the expense would not have been so great had I not found it necessary to run the first 11 miles from the Eel River Bridge twice, before I could decide where the Road should be carried. This also appears by the Plan, so that the whole distance explored, measured and

and marked by me, is fifty four miles. Vouchers for the Expenditure, &c. occasioned by this exploration will, of course, be submitted, with my account, to the Honorable the House of Assembly.

I would here state, that the exploration made by Mr. Wightman, was of material assistance to me; the more so as Mr. Ramsay had been employed by him while engaged in his exploration, and was therefore well acquainted with the various points it had been commenced from.

Having completed the exploration, I again advertised to sell, and entered into Contracts to the amount of £220, to cut a good Sled Road from Eel River Bridge to the Irish Settlement, a distance of 43 miles, at an average price of £5 per mile; these Contracts, I regret to say, remains unfinished, although more than one month has elapsed since the time specified for their completion. Even in the unfinished state of the Contracts, I met with no difficulty in driving a pair of Horses and Sled along the whole line, with the exception of five miles, for which distance I was compelled to abandon it, as one of the Contractors had still that distance to cut out.

A portion of the land through which the Road is carried is rocky and swampy, but a great proportion is good, and well adapted for Settlement. The country is remarkably level. A good Turnpike Road, twenty feet wide, may be made throughout the whole 43 miles. The expense of making which, I should estimate, on an average, at not less than £160 per mile. When completed, this Road will require but a small sum annually to keep it in repair, as there are but two Bridges required in the whole distance, the largest of which I have contracted to have built for £100.

Report of Commissioners on Wharf at Shediac.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. & K. C. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commissioners appointed for building a Wharf at Shediac beg leave to Report:—That being desirous of selecting a site, having the advantage of easy communication with the Shipping, and which should be so sheltered that a sufficient Wharf could be built without too great expense, we found it necessary, as the first step towards the performance of that duty, to make a particular examination of all parts of that Harbour, and having thus found a place, possessing those advantages more pre-eminently than any other part of the Harbour, we adopted it, which, with the Road thereto, was conveyed to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Westmorland, agreeable to the conditions of the Grant; and finding upon such examination, that a Wharf to be sufficient for the shipping of Troops, and other purposes contemplated by Your Excellency, would require to have been between 700 and 800 feet in length, which would give the depth of nine feet of water, and feeling that it was our imperative duty to have such a Wharf as would be available and of essential service for these purposes, we early in the month of July last contracted by Public Auction, for the building of one of the length of 760 feet, for the sum of £310; and although some delay was occasioned by circumstances with which Your Excellency is acquainted, yet we are enabled to state that the work is in a state of forwardness, and will be substantial, and we trust, entirely completed early the next Season.—We have advanced the Contractor the sum of £120.

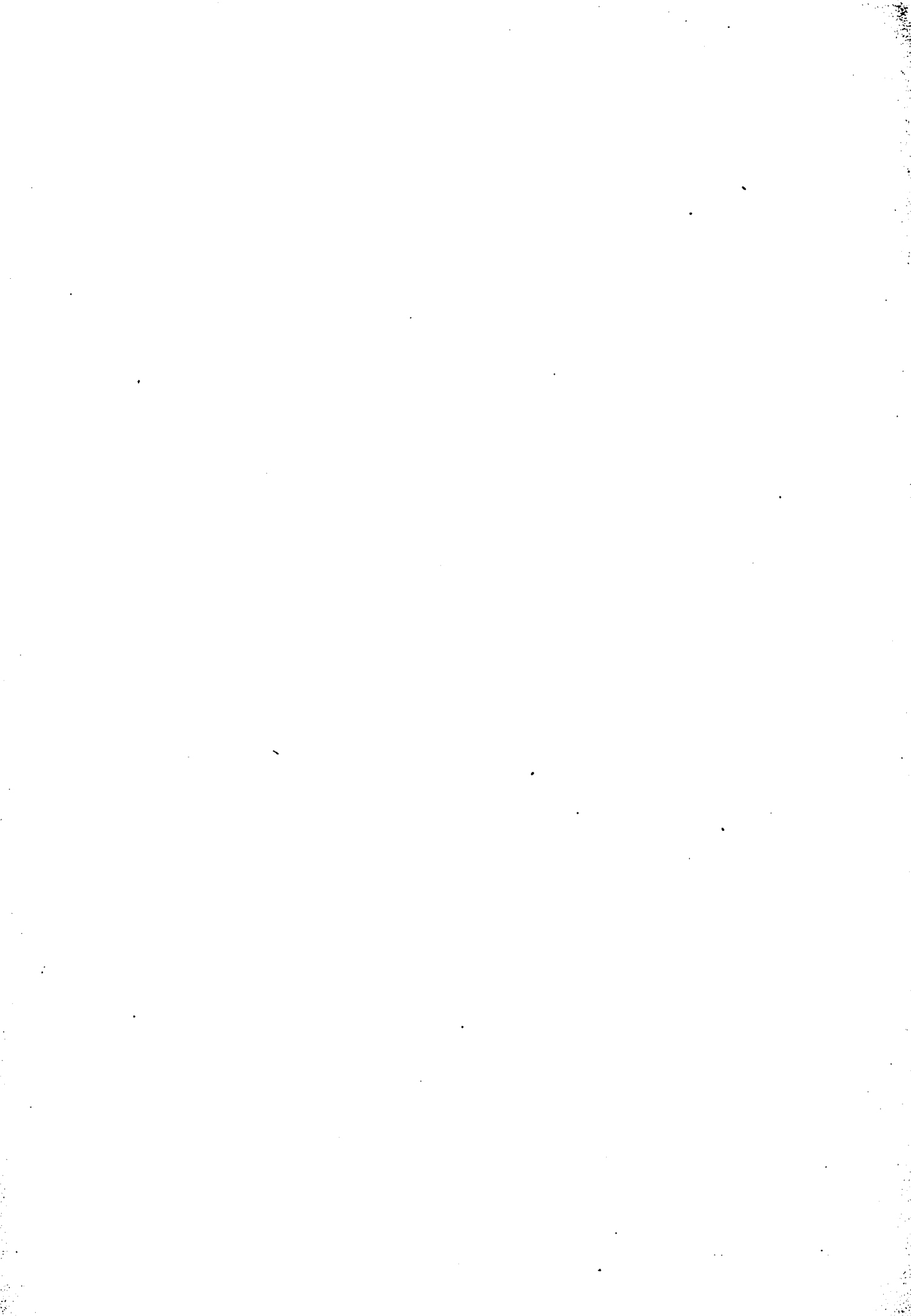

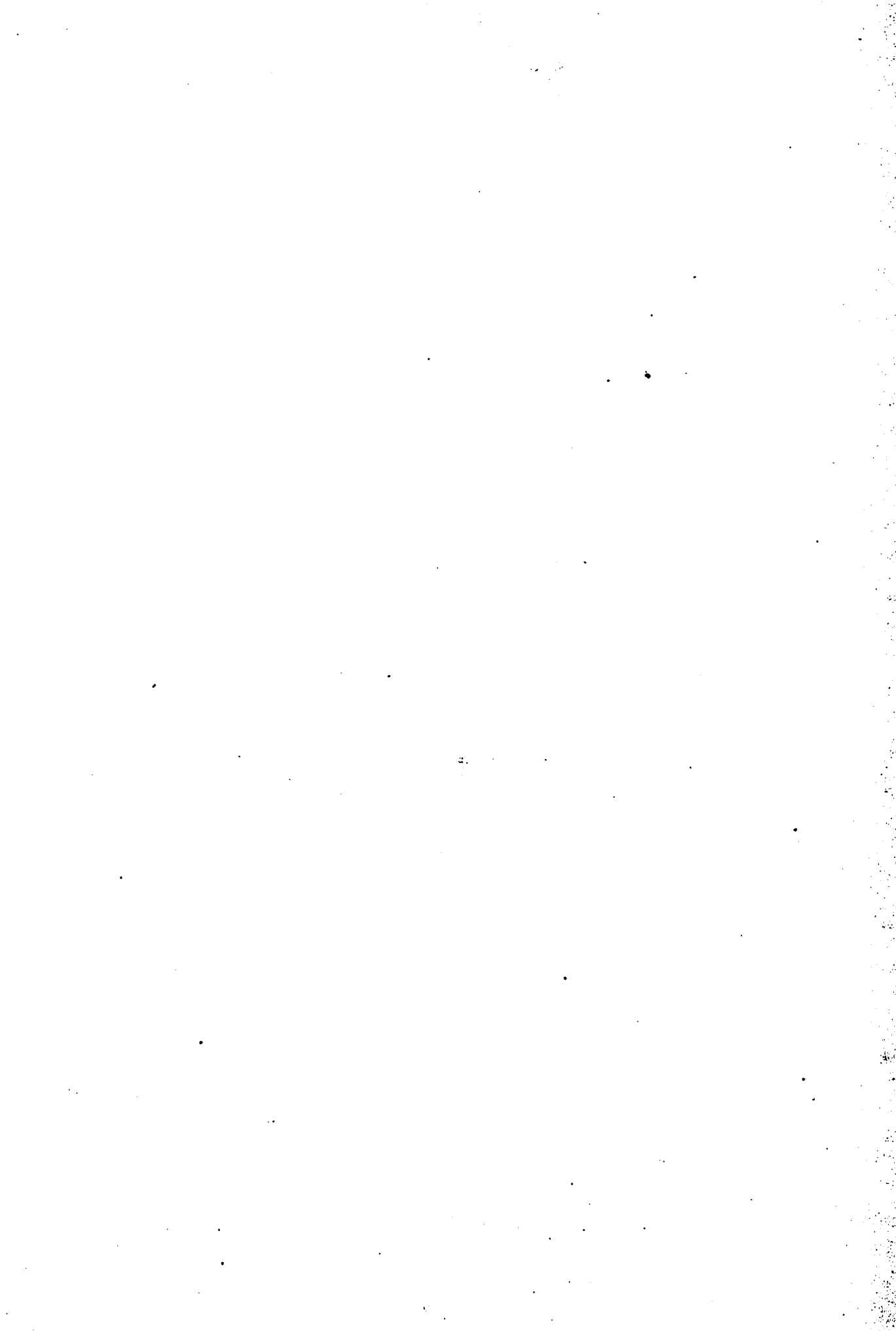

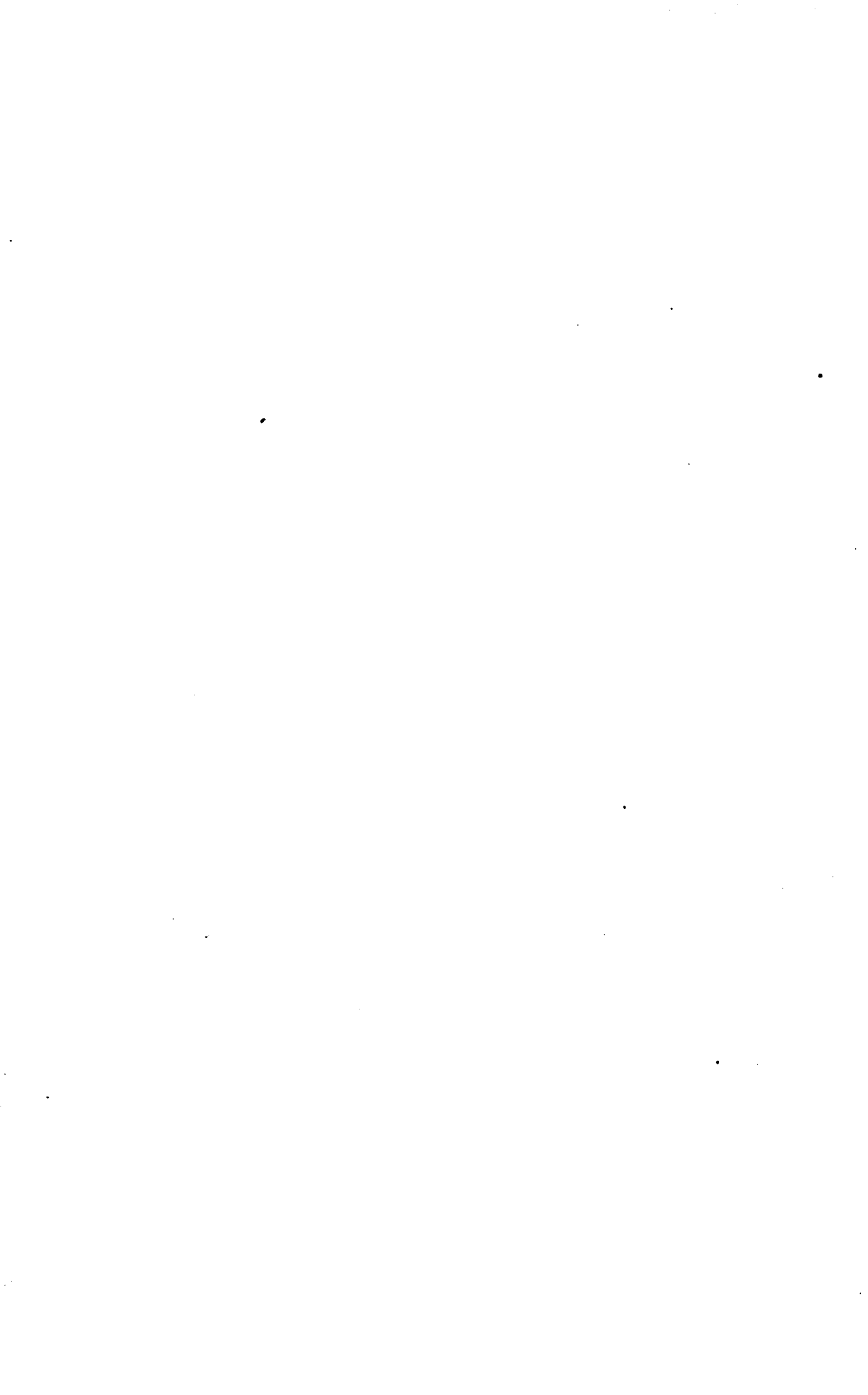
