TOTAL GROSS DEBT OF CANADA \$1,996,393,359.

War Expenditure During Feby. Declined as Compared With Same Month Last Year—Revenue Increases.

OTTAWA, Mar. 7—Canada's net debt stood at \$1,010,780,470 on Feby. 28, an increase during Feby. of \$13,251,263. The total gross debt of the dominion on Feby. 28 was \$1,996,393,359. Total assets were \$985,612,889.

War expenditure during Feby. declined, as compared with the figure for the same month last year. Last month it was \$19,494,711; in Feby. 1917, it was \$23,285,988. Total war expenditure for the eleven months period to the end of Feby. was \$207,849,726.

Revenues show an increase. In Feby. 1918, the revenue was \$21,225,872, as compared with \$17,513,473 in Feby. of last year. Expenditure on account of consolidated fund was \$11,323,497 in Feby. of the present year, in comparison with \$12,581,954, in Feby. 1917.

800,000 MEN ARE CALLED IN UNITED STATES.

Second Army Draft Begins on March 29—Call Issued.

Washington, Mar. 12—Eight hundred thousand men are to be called to the colors gradually during the present year, under the second army draft which begins on March 29.

An announcement today by Provost Marshall General Crowder of the number to be called, was followed closely by an order for the mobilization of 95,000 men during the five day period beginning March, 29 some 15,000 of them to be assembled under the second draft. Eighty thousand will be men of the first draft of 687,000 not yet summoned into service.

The 800,000 men to be summoned this year represent the number necessary to fill up all existing divisions, to create all the army corps and field army troops to fill out the war machine which framework already exists, and to provide a quarter of a million replacement troops.

SUBMARINE SHOWED NET LOSS IN DECEMBER.

Washington, March 7—More submarines were destroyed by the Allied and American naval forces in December than Germany was able to build during that month, according to information reaching Washington. This fact developed today in discussions of the statement made to parliament Tuesday by Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the British admiralty, that the submarines were being checked.

Whether succeeding months have shown a net loss in German submarines is not known here. It is believed however that anti-submarine campaign has proved so effective that increased efforts this spring will see a steady decrease in the number of U-boats available to prey on Allied and American shipping.
