Two Recitals at Acadia Seminary.

On Friday evening, March 15, was given in College Hall a programme which included the two operettas, 'The Japanese Girl,' by Vincent, and 'The Rose of Sherry,' by Hodson. These operettas were directed and staged by Miss Newey, of the Vocal Department of the Acadia Conservatory of Music, and very efficient assistance was rendered by the Acadia orchestra under the direction of Miss Badde. Miss Bunting, of the Conservatory staff, and Miss Lillian Russell, of the Seminary graduating class, were accompanists.

The work of Miss Staples, especially in 'The Japanese Girl,' was of a high order. Miss Staples graduate from the Conservatory this year. Nor must this statement be construed as casting any reflection upon the work of all the soloists. It was all good, but Miss Staples shows the results of her longer training.

A most interesting Junior Recital was held in College Hall on the afternoon of Friday, March 22. In this for the most part the juvenile pupils of the Conservatory participated apparently much to their own delight as well as to the untiring enjoyment of the audience. The younger pupils were assisted by the older girls. The musical material at Acadia is evidently abundant and of exceptional quality.

In response to the appeal made in behalf of the Prisoners of War Fund by Captain Taylor, of the Military Y. M. C. A. staff, the students have already pledged and given to this fund \$1000 and this may be augmented to \$2000. Since the beginning of the war the Red Cross Society of Acadia Seminary has given for all patriotic purposes including the pledge of \$600 to the above fund more than \$3,000. This shows what can be done by systematic giving of small amounts, plans for summer evening, etc.

At The Opera House.
