Mr. Jack labors in the autumn were confined to an examination of the Crown Lands lying adjacent to the I. C. R. and in the Counties of Kent and Northumberland.

Speaking of N. E. Rogerville the commissioner is quite hopeful for next year, and says several new buildings are being put up and choppings made.

Commissioner Atchison's Report is very satisfactory. He says,— "The progress made in this settlement for the past year is very satisfactory."

Commissioner McPhail, a thrifty, intelligent Scotchman, sends in a satisfactory report from Stonehaven, Victoria. He says the total value of the properties in the settlement is \$8,087 greater for this year than last year.

Commissioner Brewer writes hopefully, and says a grist mill is about being erected now to grind the home grain. Some of the people here raised turnips weighing from 10 to 15 lbs. each.

There is perhaps no man at the present time that occupies a larger share of public attention than Charles Stewart Parnell. A brief record of his life will not be uninteresting to our readers.

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FOREST FIRES. Mr Jack, agreeably to instructions, has furnished a paper on the above subject. Forest fires he says arise sometimes, though rarely, from lightning, oftenest from the carelessness of lumbermen, hunters, land clearers, locomotives, &c., &c.

Northumberland which in the past was away down among the X Y and Z's of the "settlement" list, now stands out to the front, made a sudden bound immediately after Hon. M. Adams had taken office. Commissioner Doolan writes thus of Rogerville:

This settlement is improving surprisingly fast. Some of the settlers have already commenced stumping, and will be able next spring to put in a good deal of their crops with the plough.

The crops the past year were abundant; wheat, corn, oats and potatoes were excellent. Wheat and beans would have been wonderful crops except owing to the early frosts, which somewhat injured them, though they were quite as good as last year.

Most of the settlers have raised sufficient for their own consumption the present year. About the middle of the district they now have a fine school house, and the road is well on to the end of the settlement. The settlers all seem well content.

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politician, having been a distinguished member of the Irish Parliament and an opponent of the Act of Union. Mr Parnell's mother, who with two of his sisters now live in Hoboken, New Jersey, is a daughter of Commodore Charles Stewart of the United States Navy.

In 1875 the representation of Meath being vacant Parnell was selected as the popular candidate. When brought upon the platform to address the electors he broke down, and was unable to say a word. This circumstance did him no harm, as some one on the platform explained that he was the young man whose mother had done so much for the Fenians, and shouts of "We'll elect him," came from the enthusiastic crowd. Parnell was triumphantly elected. In the first Session Parnell was silent. He devoted himself to a thorough study of the rules and procedure of the House, and began to warmly second the policy of obstruction commenced by Biggar. In 1877-8 he came more prominently forward as an obstructionist, and virtually assumed the leadership of the movement. He became very obnoxious to the English members. To use his knowledge of the rules of the House, and to exercise his privileges to the utmost in obstructing public business, in order to force the Irish questions upon the attention of the nation, required a wonderful amount of nerve, resolution, and persistence as well as a perfect indifference to public opinion. Parnell soon showed that he possessed all the requisite qualities. It was no uncommon spectacle to see him remain the floor of the House for a quarter of an hour and upwards, calm and unmoved amid a storm of groans, hisses and jeers, which rendered it impossible for him to be heard. So soon as the noise subsided, he would resume in his calm, deliberate tones,—"Mr Speaker,"—"when the outbreak would again commence; but he remained cool and calm, taking up the thread of his discourse so soon as his opponents had fairly tired themselves out. On the death of Butt he became virtually leader of the Home Rule party; when he spoke it was noted that the leading men in the House rose to reply.

Parnell's visit to America to solicit funds for the relief of the famine, and his subsequent career is familiar to all. At the last general election he was returned for three constituencies, Meath, Mayo and Cork, and elected to sit for the latter.

In appearance Parnell is prepossessing. He is slim in build, about five feet ten inches in height, has a high forehead, smooth regular features, a pair of piercing blue eyes, and light hair and whiskers. He dresses elegantly. He is an orator; he speaks right on with out any attempt at rhetorical flourishes or rounded periods. The strong point of his speeches is their practical character, and the number of hard, unvarnished facts they contain. He has perfect self possession, and delivers himself in a methodical, deliberate, straightforward fashion—without a trace of the Irish accent. He is an excellent landlord, and highly esteemed by his tenants.

Mr Parnell is a hard worker. He has labored incessantly in the interests of the Land League. He is a man of inflexible will, and under a quiet demeanor hides a spirit of cool determination and dogged courage, and he would be the last man to abandon a cause in which he had enlisted.

At present it seems to be the object of certain papers to cast obloquy on Parnell by raising the religious cry. That Parnell has faults we readily admit. But in judging him let us call to mind the words of another great Irishman, the illustrious Edmund Burke.

"Look! he says, to the whole tenor of your member's conduct. Try whether his ambition or his avarice have justified him out of the straight line of duty,—or whether that grand foe of the offices of active life, that master vice in men of business, a degenerate and inglorious sloth, has made him flag and languish in his course. This is the object of our inquiry. If our member's conduct can bear this touch, mark it for sterling. He may have fallen into errors, he must have faults, but our error is greater and our fault is radically ruinous to ourselves; if we do not bear, if we do not even applaud, the whole compound and mixed mass of such a character. Not to act thus is folly. I had almost said it is impiety. ... He censures God who quarrels with the imperfections of men."

MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF GEN. NEY. The city of Paris was agitated on Thursday morning by the report that General Ney, otherwise known as the Duke of Elchingen, had been murdered. His body was found in a stone quarry at Chatillon, near Paris, lying face downwards. Whether death was the result of a fall, snipe or murder is not yet known. Another despatch says the body of the General, according to the report, shot himself in the back, while seeking a pistol, the body being found in a room which had been converted into a shooting gallery. The report was a great surprise to the famous Marshal Ney.
