PROVINCIAL WAR MEMORIAL TO BE ERECTED

Plans for the erection in Freder scton, as the capital city of New Brunswick, of a provincial war memorial are taking definite form.

It is understood that negotiations have already been carried on which have led to the belief that the provincial government would willingly provide at a nominal rental a site on Queen Street at one of the goverament properties, near either the Provincial Normal School or the Queen Hotel. It is estimated that the cost of such a building as proposed would be about \$150,000.

Tentative plans include participation by the Red Cross Society, and Daughters of the Empire with the G.W.V.A. in the project in such a manner that any proposed building would be a truly representative memorial of all the war activities of the people of the province, including provision for a hall in which memorial tablets for each of the New Brunswick units that went overseas could be suitably placed.

Horse Not Yet Out Of Date

In Illinois, an association has been formed which will spend \$250. 000 in the next three years, in advertising the economic value of the horse. In Denver, on the other hand, the authorities are considering an ordinance to prohibit the use of horses on the streets. 

Waterway in County Fermanagh Because of Old Superstition.

Up in County Fermanagh, in the northern part of the Emerald isle, there is a dark, deep, silent stream, which winds its way some 15 miles more through a picturesque coun try. It is called the Sheelees, or the Stream of the Fairies, and there are many tales and legends told concerning it. It rises near the little village of Derrygonnelly, its source being a small lake called Bunahone. Its course lies between the picturesque moun-tains of Bo and a beautiful level country on its other bank called the Golden The wild sedge grows down to its very waters, and above it the curlew sends out his eerie call in the hush of the evening. But beautiful as the stream may look to visitors, it is shunned by the country folks who live in its vicinity. BLUE SKY LAW EFFECTIVE JUNE 1

The "Blue Sky Legislation" under the ferm of the Sale of Securities Act which was passed at the las session of the Legislature for the purpose of protecting investors from as the now defunct L.R. Steel Co. Ltd., became law on June 1.

The Act does not apply to stocks bonds or other securities of the Do minion, provinces or the municipalities or to any stocks, bonds or de bentures authorized by the Board of Public Utility Commisioners or sold or listed on any stock exchange approved by the Board. Neither does it apply to any sale of stock under contract for such sale entered into prior to the passing of the Act. 





TWENTY years ago Montreal was but a "mere calling place for ships." It had practically no modern cargo-handling devices or equipment, its wharf sheds were just wooden shacks which were actually taken down in winter to prevent them being blown away, and much of the merchandise was stored in the open air at the mercy of the wind and weather. Now Montreal is the greatest port of Canada and it is the best located. From a mere riverside stopping place for ships, it has stepped into the front rank of ocean ports, and has become equipped with facilities for the accommodation of ships and for the handling and storing of freight that are univalled on the continent. Despite the fast that Canada has less than 10,000,000 population and that the United States has more than 110,000,000 for population and that the United States has more than 110,000,000 Montreal sow handles a greater volume of business than any port on the American sentinent with the solitary exception of New York.
