### WOMEN TO CONFER WITH THE SENATE

Will Discuss Amendments to the Crimnal Codde. OTTAWA, March 11-The Executive Committee of the National Council of Women has decided that a delegation, to be appointed by the President of the Council, shall confer with the members of the Senate to discuss the amendments to the Crimnal Gode suggested by the National Council, on behalf of the Women Citizens' Association of Ontario. These amendments were passed by the House last session, but were rejected by the Senate, and it is the intention of the Council to give first-hand information as to their reasons for requiring these changes.
