

TOPICS OF тив рач.

One fine, summer-like evening in the autumn of 1831 a small sail-boat rounded old Point Laframboise, at the entrance of Charlottetown harbor, and skimmed lightly over the ripping waters to a wharf which projected from the western shore of the town. The boat was manned by two strong Irishmen, and its passengers consisted of a delicate looking woman and an infant of about four weeks old. Mooring the boat to one of the posts on the wharf, the elder of the two men sprang ashore, and assisted his wife

Leaving their companion to bis own resources, the couple, the man carrying the infant, proceeded along what is now called Dorchester Street, until they came to a new house of modest proportions, which, judging from its proximity to a large church, they decided to be the parochial residence. Their knock was answered by an elderly woman, who, in reply to their question, said; 'No, Father MacDonald is not in Charlottetown; he is at the mission of Vernon River, about eighteen miles away, and will not be back until Sunday week."

Disappointed and disheartened the couple turned away. What were they to do? The man, whose name was Toher, could, it is true, attend to the business which had brought him from his home in Point Brule, Nova Scotia; but his wife had come on a different errandnamely, that of having her baby baptized. There was no priest, at the time, within miles of her house, and she had gladly availed herself of the opportunity to come over to Charlottetown in a small sail-boat. Bot she was poor, and so was her

obliged to return home as soon as his business should be satisfactorily

The worthy couple found a decent odging-house, and Mrs. Toher soon made up her mind as to her course of action. The next morning she was up at an early hour, and, asking the was to Vernon River, she was told that the first step towards getting there was to cross the Hillsborough River. This was easily accomplished by means of her husband's boat. She had borrowed s pillow from the landlady, and on it she bound her baby, as she had often seen Indian mothers do. She then wrapped a blanket carefully round it, and, attaching a broad band to the two top corners of the pillow, she passed her head through the loop, and hung the precious bundle upon her back, in true Mic-Mac fashion. Then, ascertaining her way as best she coull, this indomitable Irish mother walked the eighteen miles to Vernon River, so that her darling might be received into the Fold of Christ.

The day was well-nigh spent when she reached her destination, pale and tired, but full of joy at finding the priest engaged in hearing confessions in his little sacristy. Father MacDonald was much impressed with her strong Catholic faith, and treated her with the utmost hospitality. Her child was baptized herself refreshed, and then the twain were sent back to Charlottetown in the priest's carriage. Father Mag-Donald prohibited her from again facing the peril and discomfort of the voyage in a mere saileboat, and ordered his servant to engage a passage for her in a schooner that was to sail for Point Brule the

following day. The Father MacDonald of that period shortly afterwards became the second Bishop of Charlottetown, The baby thus adventurously baptized grew up to be a good and elever boy, with a vocation for the priesthood. He was sent by Bishop Connolly to the College of Propaganda, but he died before receiving Holy Orders.



NEW BRITISH WARSHIPS. Some fine warships which will greatly reinforce the British navy will be launched within a month. February 21, the Fairfields, builders of the Campania and the Lucania, will launch the armored cruiser Good Hope, of the Drake class, and the Brown's of the Clyde bank, builders of the Paris and the New York will launch the armoured cruiser Bacchante, of the Cressy class. March 5th the battleships Montague and Albemarle will be launched at Devonport and Chatham respectively, the cruiser Kent at Portsmouth.

TERRIBLE RAILROAD WRECK

A Trenton, N. J. despatch of the

east says: A collision occured on

the Ambey division of the Pennsylvania railroad at 5.30 o'clock this evening at Ruslings siding near Bordentown, about 8 miles south of Trenton, between the "Nelly Bly" express from New York for Atlantic City and a passenger train, running from Camden to Trenton. The number of dead so far as known is ten and the number of injured upward of twenty-five. A special train at about 9 o'clock from the scene of the wreck brought four dead bodies and eighteen passengers to Trenton. The wounded were distributed among the three Trenton hospitals. Other wounded passengers were taken to Coppen hospital at Camden, The two trains collided at full speed and both engines were completely demolished together with the forward car of each train. In both instances a combination baggage and smoker and to add to the borror the wreckage took fire. The second car of the "Nellie Bly" turned over on its side and the passengers had to climb out through the windows. It is believed that one man pinned under the wreck perished in the flames. scene of the wreck was far from outside assistance and when the wrecking train arrived from Trenton was after dark and the work of clearing up the debris and removing the bodies was necessarily slow. The Nellie Bly" was running in three sections and it was the third section with which No. 330 collided. The local train had taken siding to permit the express to pass and it is be lieved that through some misunderstanding or mistake the local came out on the main track after the 2nd section had passed mistaking it for the third second.
