Right Rev. Bishop Morrison

Very Rev. James Morrison, D. D., Administrator of the diocese of Charlottetown, has been appointed Bishop of Antigonish, N. S., vacant for upwards of two years, in consequence of the death of the late Bishop Cameron.

The new Bishop is a native of St. Andrew's parish, and was born at Savage Harbor in King's County, in July 1861. He is a son of the late Donald Morrison of that place.

After attending the district school he entered Prince of Wales College and took a teacher's license. He taught school for a couple of years, and then entered St. Dunstan's College, where he pursued his classical course.

On November 1st, 1899, he was ordained priest and not long afterwards returned home. For a couple of years he was attached to the Cathedral staff, and was then transferred to St. Dunstan's College. From 1892 to 1895 he was Rector of the College.

In 1904 he was appointed Vicar-General of the diocese, and after the dedication of the Cathedral in 1907 was transferred to the pastorate of St. Joachim's, Vernon River, vacant by the death of Rev. Dr. Doyle.
