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ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

February 19th. At the opening of the House Mr. Currie called attention to the necessity for some proper arrangements for the care and removal of papers on the subject. He was supported by Mr. Farwell, and the motion was carried.

The Attorney General introduced some amendments to the bill for the House relative to the incorporation of the Bank Stock Company. At the request of Mr. Rykert their consideration was postponed.

Mr. Crooks then moved that the report of the Committee of the Whole on the Assessment Act Amendment be received. Mr. Crooks also introduced an amendment declaring that the Bank Stock, Building Societies' shares, bonds and mortgages should all be liable to assessment. After considerable discussion the amendment was lost. Mr. Rykert moved to strike out the clause, extending Bank Stock from taxation which was received and the third reading of the bill ordered for tomorrow.

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The Storm in Saginaw.

300 MEN ADRIFT ON THE ICE. Detroit, Feb. 23.—The heavy wind today drove the ice from the mouth of Saginaw River into the bay. It is reported that about 300 fishermen are on floating ice at last accounts they were five miles from land. Great fears are entertained that the ice will break up and drive the men and boats to sea.

Bay City, Mich., Feb. 23.—Reports from Saginaw say that fifty of the fishermen from the floating ice in Saginaw Bay landed there. Reports from other points say that about two hundred have escaped, and that only two, named A. Smith and John Poirier, of Banks, are positively known to be drowned, though on land are yet unaccounted for. On the ice with the fishermen were several teams and stags. The men are well supplied with shovels, food and fuel. They had drifted slowly north-east, when a strong wind started wind shifting to westward drifted the ice toward the east-south-east.
