SOLIGNUM.
 A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.
 To test Solignum as a preservative for wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.
 Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handled, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Training Teachers.

We observe with pleasure that Dr. Curtis in his report is emphasizing the serious disadvantages under which our teachers labor. Here is what he says:—

"The teachers of Newfoundland labour under serious disadvantages. They have no regular training school in which to prepare for the practical work that lies before them. They obtain some theoretical knowledge, of course, and if they keep their eyes open they may observe much in the way of method from the different teachers with whom they come in contact. But opportunities for the exercise of their gifts in the work of actual teaching are almost nil, until they find themselves with the responsibility of a school on their hands, and then they must do the best they can. In some instances creditable work is done; a few do splendidly; some badly; but none of them can do the work that would have been possible with proper training. It is with this insufficient qualification that a large number of teachers now employed entered upon their work. If they adopt poor methods of teaching their pupils suffer, their pupils fall to benefit in full from their opportunity at school, and the work of education is retarded."

Dr. Curtis recommends the establishment of a Summer School for teachers where up-to-date methods may be studied. He is convinced such a course would be beneficial.

Technical Education.

This new form of instruction is quite modern. Since 1890 it has been very much helped by the National Association for the promotion of Technical Education in England. It has made much progress in America and there is great enthusiasm for this new method of education in Canada and especially in the far west. In Winnipeg they are now building a splendid modern school specially devoted to this subject. George Prowse the Judge's eldest son, who is the leading expert and lecturer on this branch of modern education has been appointed head master, with a large teaching staff under him and he is supervising the internal fitting up of the class rooms. Technical education is of two kinds, oral teaching and written exercises and hand training in the various trades. Prowse's method as best adapted to elementary schools is chiefly hand training, and the result is very successful. At all his lectures he shows examples of the work of his young scholars.

Report of the Officers of the Longshoremen's Protective Union
Your officers beg to present the eighth annual report of the Union for the year ending the 18th day of May, 1911. In doing so it is with much pleasure that we are able to point to a most successful year. While labour conditions were not as satisfactory as all would wish during the winter months, nevertheless with the opening of Spring a great deal of employment is offering to the members at remunerative wages. The relations which exist between employer and employee are of the most friendly character. Since the formation of the Union it may be said with truth that it has had the effect of bringing about a better understanding between the employer on the one side and the employee on the other.
The members, we feel assured, recognize that in those days of industrial activity and keen competition, unions among the workmen are most essential to their welfare. The altered conditions industrially force upon them the great need for co-operation and unity. Conditions in this country the past two years have materially altered. More is demanded of the workman to-day and a greater degree of intelligence in the performance of the duties assigned to them. Fields of industrial activity are being opened up which afford employment to all who desire it. Never before in the history of the Colony has there been such marked activity in the field of industrial operations, and at no period in our history was the demand for workmen greater than it is to-day. The projecting and building of railroads through different portions of the country must of necessity help to maintain a proper standard of wages.
The members must recognize that the opening up of different branches of industry calls for skilled labour. None are better paid to-day than the skilled workman. What is needed in the country to-day more than anything else are highly trained men capable of taking advantage of the opportunities which industrial activity presents, and if workmen of the country are being opened up which afford employment to all who desire it, they have only themselves to blame.
There are now on the Roll of the Union 2,400 members. Upwards of 150 joined during the year just closed. The receipts for the year were \$5,535.25; the expenditure \$4,125.11, leaving a credit balance of \$1,407.14.
The great necessity of providing a hall for members has been apparent for some time. This long felt want

has now been provided, and for the first time workmen who pursue the avocation of Longshoremen are the owners of freehold land upon which there is a spacious hall which is at all times open for the convenience of the members and which your officers feel assured will be availed of more and more in the future.
It is with regret that your officers have to record the deaths of 43 of its members during the year. The sum of \$3,220 was paid out in mortality benefits, namely: to 43 members \$2,330, and to the wives and widows of deceased members to the number of 24, \$840.
The financial condition of the Union is such that leaves no doubt as to its ability to meet every demand and at the same time leave a handsome surplus to its credit in the bank.

Your officers desire to place on record their deep sense of appreciation to the workmen's friend, Hon. Mr. P. Gibbs, for the zeal and energy which he has always displayed, not alone in the interest of Longshoremen, but of workmen generally. Through his efforts the hall which we are now in was secured, and we feel assured that members appreciate the deep debt of obligation which they owe him. Your officers would desire to impress upon the members the necessity of a larger attendance at meetings, especially quarterly meetings at which various reports and financial statements are tabled. The attendance at quarterly meetings is not as large as it should be, and your officers hope that the coming year will show a marked increase in attendance of members at those meetings.
Your officers are very grateful for the kindness and courtesy shown by members to them during the year, and feel that the success which has attended the Union would not be so great were it not for the fact that in all matters they had the hearty support and co-operation of members.

Earl Grey Criticised.

Special Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, To-Day.
In the Senate the Governor-General, Earl Grey, was severely criticised for an alleged slighting of Parliament by sending his deputy to give royal assent to bills prior to the two months adjournment. Senator Power led the attack, and was supported in some degree by Sir Mackenzie Bowell. Sir Richard Cartwright came to the defence of the Government, and incidentally emphasised Earl Grey's services to Canada. Sir Richard explained there was a material difference between an adjournment and a prorogation. In Great Britain the Sovereign as a rule delegates the adjournment of Parliament when such a thing occurs to Commissioners, who are the equivalent of our deputy Governor. The English practice governs ours, and His Excellency was justified in doing as the Sovereign would do in like cases. No definite action was taken.

Brilliant State Ball.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
The first state ball in the reign of King George took place last night at Buckingham Palace. It was unusually brilliant. The King and the German Emperor had previously dined together with the Royal Family. Afterwards they were joined by 30 additional members of the Royal Household, who formed a procession. The King and the Kaiser preceded the state officials who were attired in gorgeous robes, and carried their wands of office through the whole length of the State apartments to the ball room, where had gathered thousands of guests, including the whole of the diplomatic corps. Queen Mary and Empress Augusta Victoria, and all the ladies wore a lavish display of jewellery.

The Government Engineer, Mr. Hall, offered 112 yards of six inch water pipe free, provided the Council would lay a service for the Hospital, along Quill Vidi Road. The Council will lay the pipes provided the Government will pay for same and the work of excavation and back-filling.
The Council will attend to the complaint from South Side residents about the Long Bridge.
Councillor Mullaly complained of the stench caused by the landing of blubber at the dock premises.
W. Watson drew the Council's attention to Springdale Street and Charlton Street, and asked that the residents be made connect with the sewer and put in water service.
At the representation of Mr. J. M. Sullivan the City Council will shortly install sewerage and water service on Pennywell Road.
A six inch pipe will be laid on Patrick Street with the view of carrying out the work of installing a water service on the South Side. Mr. J. P. Blackwood, acting for Mr. F. W. Knight and others, is urging on the Council.

Mr. J. Jardine was given permission to erect a fence on Maxse Street. Mr. H. K. Cook was given permission to erect a fence on Maxse Street.
Mr. S. White will erect a poultry house on Freshwater Road.

The wall at the foot of Market House Hill will be repaired at a cost of \$35.
The dumping of refuse in the West End, near Waterford River, will be continued on the advice of the Health Officer.
The Sanitary Supervisor reported that over 800 loads of refuse had been removed, and by this evening he expected that the number would have increased to a thousand.
The Council released Mr. Burridge from his tender to supply stone.
The Motor Car Act will be rigidly enforced.
The Council on a majority decided to accept the horses imported by J. Judge.
The Health Officer reported four cases of scarlet fever, six of typhoid and twelve of diphtheria in the city now.
The Reid Nfld. Co. contract to water the street was renewed at \$1,000 a year for three years. The service will begin on May 1st and finish October 15th. The work will be begun at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. on all days when sprinkling is required.

There is a strong suspicion that the perpetrator of this robbery is the same as the police have now in the toll for the C. L. B. affair.

Health Report.

Up to last evening there was not a single case of infectious disease reported to the Health Authorities during the week. Nine patients are in hospital suffering from diphtheria, six with typhoid and three with scarlet fever. Being cared for at home are one of scarlet fever and three of diphtheria.
NEW RACE BOATS.—The coming annual regatta at Harbor Grace will be the most interesting ever held there and the people are looking forward to it with pleasurable anticipation. Four fine new racers have been built during the past few months and will run in each race. A fifth is being built and the crews will begin practice next month.

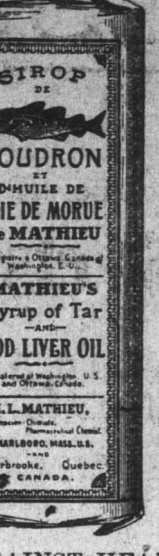

Ancient Goldworkers.

The Swedish Government has made a graceful compliment to the city of Rouen, which is not a little appreciated by the French people. This year the millenary of the founding of the Duchy of Normandy is to be celebrated, and the Normans who came over to this country with the Conqueror were originally Scandinavians. The Swedish Government has sent to the cathedral city of Normandy the replica of a gold bracelet found at Bragnum, in Vestergethland. It is a wonderful example of the goldsmith's art somewhere about 600 A.D., the epoch of Huleik—called Hylgelac in the songs of Beowulf—the leader of the first Swedish expedition, or horde, which invaded France.

This ancient golden bracelet, the original of which is in the Swedish National Museum, shows the perfection which had been attained in the goldsmith's art 1,400 years ago. The replica weighs over 800 grams, or perhaps thirty ounces, and proves that the hand of the Swedish goldsmith today has lost none of its cunning, for the Rouen bracelet is verily a replica. The gold is not of that copper color usually employed by ancient workers, but yellow, indicating a very little silver being used as alloy.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 19.
 Premier Laurier is expected to arrive in London to-night. Borden, Brodeur, and Botha of South Africa, arrive to-morrow. Ward of New Zealand, Fisher, of Australia, and Morris, of Newfoundland, are already here. The list will then be complete for the opening of the Imperial Conference on Monday. The first problem before the Conference will be whether the Press will be admitted. Several Premiers, of whom Laurier is not expected to be one, desire that the Press be admitted, retaining the option of requesting their withdrawal should need arise. Laurier's announcement of his intention to raise the question of securing greater power for direct negotiations with foreign countries, through German and other Consuls-General in Canada, is expected, because grave treaty complications have arisen in connection with the reciprocity agreement. Unionist leaders believe that by the refusal to accept the principle of Empire trade, and of co-operation on a tariff basis, England is driving Canada into a Treaty and other complications which can only end in the success of Tait's policy, and the ultimate dismemberment of the Empire. They hope that a full discussion at the Conference will show that Ministers of all the Dominions are favourable to ex-Premier Deakin's proposal in the 1907 Conference for a system of joint negotiations with foreign countries, which, they contend, would greatly increase their bargaining power, and, as full partners, by an Imperial Treaty system, raise their status among the nations, while completely safeguarding their autonomy. Such a system, however, requires the adoption of tariff preference by the Mother Country, following the example of Canada, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa.

OTTAWA, May 19.
 "We have no information of that kind here," said Commander Roper of the Canadian Naval Service, today, in reference to a Toronto story to the effect that tyrannical and injustice prevailed on the cruisers of the Canadian Navy. According to the story, a young seaman, writing home, said that conditions were so bad, and food so insufficient, that there were thirty deserters in a few weeks, and open mutiny had occurred on the Rainbow. "So far as we know everything is satisfactory," said Roper.

MADRID, May 19.
 The Tanager correspondent of the Herald, telegraphs that the tribsmen, with the constabulary of Raigula, who kidnapped Kaid, MacLean some years ago, have captured the French arsenal at Acazar. The British Consul, Mr. Carleton, is said to have been killed.

PORTLAND, Maine, May 19.
 The barquentine "Kingdom" of the Holy Ghost Society, has been stranded off Sangomar on the West Coast of Africa, and probably will be a total wreck, according to information received here from the National Board of Marine Underwriters of New York.

MEXICO CITY, May 19.
 It is semi-officially stated that the retirement of President Diaz will take place on May 24th. Vice-President Torral's resignation will be sent by cable attested by the Mexican minister in Spain.

GUERNAVACA, Mexico, May 19.
 A sanguinary battle is being fought at Gautela, twenty miles from here, between the federal garrison and the rebels. Fugitives state that the streets are strewn with dead and wounded.

VIENNA, May 19.
 Gustave Mahler, the eminent composer and conductor, is dead.

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, had a wire last evening from the Assistant Collector of Customs at St. Jacques, informing him that the banking schr. Maple Leaf, Capt. Thos. Norman, owned by D. J. & T. Burke, had sunk while fishing on Quero Bank and that her crew of 14 men had been saved. No particulars as to how the accident occurred were given in the message, but it is thought that she foundered in recent stormy weather on the Bank.

Will Establish Company

For some weeks past herring is found in abundance almost round the whole Island of Newfoundland, yet very few are engaged in the industry of it, except in Bay St. George and Bay of Islands. It is a great pity that something could not be done to give an impetus to the prosecution of the herring fishery. We learn from a business man of Water Street that recently no less than 4 English firms made enquiries about No. 1 pickled herring, offered to take considerable quantities and offered \$5 per barrel. This has impelled certain young and energetic men to try something as regards the curing of these fish, and a company will be formed for the purpose, and shares will be sold to people all over the country.

Harbor Grace Notes.

The trouting season is with us once more, and this morning several young men with the necessary apparatus left by train for New Harbor Barrons to tempt the finny tribe.

Mr. A. Granville, of Rocky Pond Road, is going to stay home from the Labrador to attend to his ground this summer. Seeing everybody taking an interest in farming, he says he will give up the Labrador fishery. Mr. Granville is 85 years of age, and has been continually engaged in the Labrador fishery for 73 years. The first time he threw a line overboard on the coast he was only 12 years old, and he caught a pair of fish; but he says he has caught a good many pairs since. He is still quite hearty, as is also his wife, who is 86. We wish the old couple many years yet.

We could not help remarking the very necessary band of citizens who were present at or arrived about the time the burglar was captured at Strapp's pharmacy on Wednesday night at 11.30. First were two policemen, limbs of the law, to see the man got fair play; a doctor to prescribe and a druggist to fill the prescription; a photographer to take a photo of the prisoner, and a reporter to take that and an account of the attempt at burglary and pass it along to the Telegram. Last, but by no means least, a minister to advise him spiritually, which no doubt the young fellow badly needed.

A number of young pigs, imported from Truro by the Agricultural Society, arrived by yesterday's train. They are of the best possible breed, and it is the intention to have them given to competent people who will keep them for a specified time and have their offspring distributed about to any person desirous of getting a good animal. It is generally understood that there is money in pig-raising, and our people should go more into the business.

The man George Perry, who was before the court to-day charged with breaking into Strapp's pharmacy on Wednesday, was sentenced by Judge Oke to six months in the Penitentiary, and as there was another case against him last week, when he was fined \$10 or one month, and which his master for the summer had gone security for, he would now be sent to the "Pen" for the full term of seven months. The case against the other man, James Griffin, an accomplice, was dismissed, he apparently not knowing where Perry had gone when leaving him on Harvey Street.

Lecture by Dr. Tait.

Dr. Tait continued his lecture on "Air and Ventilation" at the Board of Trade rooms last night. He demonstrated the effects of breathing dust laden air, coal gas and foul air in a room. Dr. Tait described the difference between town air and country air, between sea breezes and land breezes, and explained how carbonic acid can be detected. The lecture was one of the most interesting of the series and all who attended were highly pleased. Next week the doctor's lecture will be on "Water."
