When plain white lawn waists are worn around the neck and sleeves, they can often be made into corset covers.  
If your gloves get wet, dry them in a cool place and rub a little olive oil into the kid before putting them on again.  
To darn a rent in dark material, ravel out and use some of the thread of it instead of regular darning and sewing cotton.  
If you keep your clean kitchen utensils in cupboards and drawers you will find them always ready for immediate use.  
When the cake in the oven is ready for a final browning, throw a handful of chips on the fire or tuck in a newspaper.  
If you wish to give a brass article a polish like new, heat them first, then rub on a paste of hot salt and lemon juice. Rub clear.  
Clean milk strainers by rubbing a cake of soap over the wire, then pour boiling water through the strainer and rinse well.  
An old Japan tray can be rejuvenated and its usefulness prolonged if you give it two coats of white paint and one of enamel.  
If soot falls on a carpet, do not try to brush it off. Spread a handful of well dried salt upon it and sweep up salt and soot together.  
If you wish to bring out the flavor of vegetables to perfection, add a teaspoonful of sugar to the water in which they are boiled.  
Add a teaspoonful of baking pow-

del to old potatoes when mashing them and beat briskly. This will make them light and creamy.  
If a sewing machine needle stick in sewing heavy cotton goods, rub the line of stitching to be done with a bit of rather dry soap.  
Cake-beaters should be rinsed as soon as used, and any dish that has had eggs in it should be filled with cold water until time to wash it.  
A delicious summer sandwich may be made with nasturtium blossom and leaves salted and spread with mayonnaise between thin bread or butter.  
A good salad is made of stuffed cucumbers, the filling made of sliced cucumbers and onions, or cabbage and green pepper salad. Serve on nasturtium leaves.  
Pawn colored suede gloves can be cleaned with a mixture of fuller's earth and alum. Then brush off the powder. The gloves should be on the hands when cleaned.  
Every householder should have plenty of dust sheets for cleaning days. Sometimes old sheets can be utilized in this way. New dust sheets are best made of cheap calico.  
To take iodine stains out of clothing, rub them with liquid ammonia and rinse well before washing. Another method is to wash with alcohol and rinse with soapsuds and then clean water.  
When stitching chiffon or any such material on the machine, use the finest possible thread and put a strip of thin paper under the goods and stitch them together, then tear away the paper when the work is done.  
When you launder madras curtains, they may be easily dried by hanging them on their own rods, with a heavy brass rod run in the bottom hem to hold them steady. The rods should first be covered with some white cloth.

the Alps this summer. For eight hours Henry Van Goethen, a young German tourist, lay crouched with his feet braced against a boulder, holding the skirts of his sister, Miss Van Goethen, while she hung over a precipice nearly a mile high.  
The girl, with her brother and her fiancé, Maurice Sombardier, ascended Mount Saussure, and in returning to the perilous pathway leading to the glacier of the Domenon. As they were rounding a granite ledge, clinging to the rocks with hands and feet, she slipped and slid away towards the edge of the precipice.  
Startled by her shrieks for help, the girl's brother and fiancé sprang forward just in time to see her disappearing over the verge. The brother threw himself flat on the smooth rock and slid forward just in time to grasp the hem of her skirts as she was going over.  
Luckily, his foot came against a small projecting boulder on the very edge of the precipice. Beyond that he was helpless. Sombardier tried to pull the two back, but could not.  
"Run for help!" the brother cried between the gritting teeth, fearful the sack might tear his sister's skirt and send her crashing down 2,400 feet in to the rocks below. Sombardier rai-

down the mountain.  
The girl's arms had been injured in the fall and she was unable to help herself. Dangling there in space, she could see, far below floating clouds through which she expected every minute to be hurled. Farther down she could see tiny specks, the houses of an Alpine village. All the way down was sheer precipice and jagged rocks. The sight took away her consciousness and thus saved the girl's reason.  
Twilight came, still the young man tired to exhaustion, clutched the skirts of his sister. Minutes seemed hours. Hours seemed centuries. He could not move his feet for fear of losing his toe hold on the boulder and going with his sister down to death.  
At first he held fast to the skirts with both hands, then, as that straining position rendered him nearly mad with pain, he alternated his hands every few minutes, turning the freed hand around minutes, to ease the strained muscles.  
Twilight gave way to darkness and still the brother clung to his sister. At last the faint shouts of a rescuing party came up the mountain pathway. It had taken Sombardier three hours to go down the mountain and five more to gather a party of capable mountain climbers and return.  
When the rescue party succeeded in drawing the young woman from the precipice, her brother fainted. He is now suffering from a severe shock. His sister will undoubtedly recover from her injuries.

**24 Bulls at 1000 Yards.**

Within two years he had to go to the market for a second loan, and every thinking man knows the country is not going to get out of his Railway Extension Act without a third loan of a considerable amount, and this does not take into account the cost of many railway extensions which he has promised and which were not contemplated at

**Seven Deaths by Lightning**

St. Louis, Aug. 26.—Six persons were killed and nine others were injured, one probably fatally, by lightning which accompanied a severe electrical storm that visited this city and vicinity yesterday.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hausdorf, of St. Louis, was struck by lightning while riding with four others in a carriage. The other members of the party were thrown out, but were not seriously hurt.

Orlie Meadows, 5 years old, of East St. Louis, was struck dead by lightning while he was sitting on a bench in a park. Beside him was Edward M. Miles, a man friend, who was so severely shocked and burned that he died at a hospital.

On both sides of the river many buildings were damaged by lightning. In St. Louis several church steeples were demolished and several buildings destroyed.

Near De Soto four members of the family of Jefferson Ruhlo, a road worker, were killed when lightning struck the tent in which they were living. Ruhlo, his wife, and 16 year old daughter and a baby girl were were instantly killed. A grown son escaped death, but was stunned and severely burned.



### Attacked by Devil Fish.

While fishing off French Island in a dory, he was attacked by a Devil Fish, and Sheppard attributes his escape with his life being due to the fact that he had about half quintal codfish in his boat at the time which served as a breakfast for the sea monster.

At an early hour this morning, Josiah Sheppard left for the fishing grounds in a dory being towed there by his brother Henry in a motor boat. After fishing off Wee Bauld for some time and finding fish scarce, they decided to go to the grounds off French Island. Joseph at that time had about half quintal fish in his dory. He joined his brothers in the motor boat and they proceeded to French Island, taking the dory in tow.

Arriving at the grounds Josiah again got into his dory, and his brother slacked him astern about 200 yards. Josiah was preparing to put his lines out when some monster of the deep came to the surface and reared its head in over the side of the dory. The Devil Fish looked first at the fish lying in the bottom of the dory, then at Sheppard. It then took hold of the dory and disappeared with it, throwing its occupant into the sea. Sheppard screamed, and his brothers in the motor boat slipped their cable and hastened to his assistance.

The dory came to the surface bottom up. Sheppard succeeded in getting on the bottom of the dory, from which he was rescued by his brothers in the motor boat.

Upon examination they discovered the Devil fish had driven its teeth through the dory, the bite measured about 2½ feet.

In describing the monster Sheppard asserts it had a dreadful mouth measuring about four feet, large eyes, white bottom and black back; that it did not have to turn to bite, and therefore was not a shark—Western Star.

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The Times recently published a leading article anticipating the possible eventual use of the Australian squadron to enforce an independent Commonwealth policy. This, telegraphs the Sydney correspondent of the Times, "would mean the abandonment of the Naval policy of 1909. Such a course is not expected here. On the contrary, in view of Canada's interest in the Pacific, it is hoped a Canadian unit will be added to the fleet in the near future. Secondly, the Australian view is that the squadron is defensive only, and not aggressive, except when co-operating as one fleet under Imperial command. Thirdly, the external to the Pacific is equally non-aggressive. The Federal Government is most anxious to deal with all matters of external policy in consultation with the Imperial Government. Regarding Panama rates as a grievance, the Commonwealth has twice communicated with the Imperial government seeking information, and asking to be associated in any protest, but its communications still remain unanswered."

Special Evening Telegram.

BERNE, SWITZERLAND, Sept. 1.—A frenzied Swiss soldier ran amuck today, and transformed the town of Romanshorn, Lake Constance, into a miniature battlefield, which was strewn with dead and dying. The soldier, who is a native of the town, named Schwartz, was suddenly taken with a fit of madness, seized his rifle and shot everyone within range of the windows of his house, killing four and wounding six men in a few minutes. He then barricaded himself in his house. When night fell, his residence was surrounded by armed police and citizens, among whom an hour later panic broke out when they heard a shot. The besiegers were under the impression that Swartz had come among them, and started firing, shooting one another down until a dozen of them lay badly wounded on the ground. During the scare, the mad soldier escaped from the house, and fled to the forest, where he is still at large, armed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—That the United States Government will not oppose the action of Britain forwarding a note to the Chinese government, demanding that the British government be consulted with regard to any action contemplated in Tibet, has become known here. While Britain concedes Chinese suzerainty in Tibet, she takes the position that her interests there must be cared for in any action taken by the Peking Government.

ROME, Sept. 1.—A sensation has been caused by the arrest of two leaders in women's society, with five accomplices, on the charge of trafficking in counterfeit bank notes and government stock certificates. The chief accused are counts Falzaccappa and Barbelli.

PARIS, Sept. 1.—That the definite assumption by the United States of the full control of affairs in Nicaragua will be the outcome of the present American intervention in that country, is anticipated by the "Temps." The paper concludes that the United States holds the republic in a vice, and that we may expect soon to see armed intervention transformed into a protectorate.

AMOY, Sept. 1.—A typhoon which swept Fu Chow, caused great loss of life and damage to property. Steamers report from the north that the sea off the mouth of the Min River, is strewn with hundreds of bodies.

### Baleine Will Tow

WRECKED STEAMER HERE.

The S. S. Baleine, having been commissioned by those interested in the wreck, left to-day for St. Mary's Bay where she will take in tow the S. S. Wilhelmina, which went ashore at St. Peter's Banks, but was refloated, and bring her to St. John's. The wrecked steamer, we learn, is in fairly good condition, considering the circumstances of her mishap. On arrival here the Wilhelmina will be dry-docked when she will be thoroughly overhauled and re-closed. The ship's husband for the owners, Messrs. Stevens, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, is now on board the vessel.

DURANGO ARRIVES.—The Furness liner Durango, Capt. Chambers, 8 days from Liverpool, reached port at eight o'clock last evening. Moderate weather prevailing throughout the passage. She brought 400 tons of cargo, a large mail and the following passengers: Messrs. McKay, Mostyn and McIntyre.

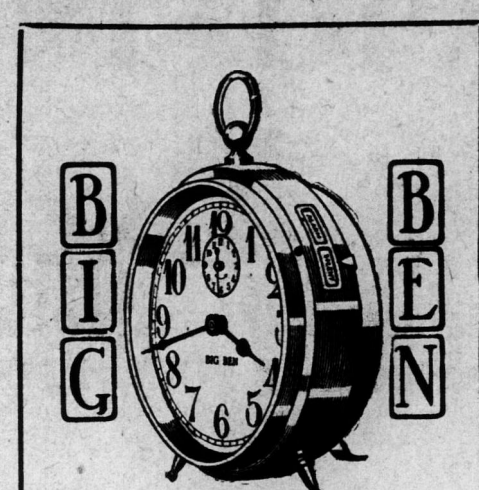

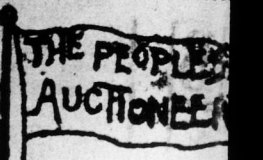
