### Atlantic Salmon in Fresh Water.

In the fish cultural work of the Craig Brook station the Atlantic salmon has always been the leading species and the methods adopted, which have been essentially different from those pursued with any species of salmon elsewhere, have afforded data for some interesting and important biological deductions.

The methods pursued are in outline as follows: Brood fish are secured each year by purchase from the weir fishermen located on the tidal portions of the Penobscot River and are conveyed immediately to a roomy enclosure in a small fresh-water stream. Here they remain without other care than such as is necessary to guard them against escape from the enclosure or destruction by human or other foes, until late in the month of October, when the female fish lay their eggs. Spawning is nearly always completed before the middle of November, and then the salmon are liberated—commonly in tidal waters.

The collection of brood fish is always made in May and June, and at that early date it is found that the external appearance of the two sexes is so closely alike that it is impossible to distinguish males from females, and they are therefore bought indiscriminately. In September, however, it is found that the sexes have developed peculiar features which afford ready distinction between the sexes. At the spawning season it is always found that there are more females in the enclosure, an extreme instance being the brood of 1910, when out of 693 salmon there were 436 females and 257 males, in some other countries it has been reported that there is a predominance of males.

Early in the history of the station, studies were made on the question of the survival of the salmon that had spawned and their subsequent return to the river. The liberated salmon were marked by metal tags attached by wire to the rear margin of the main dorsal fin. Each tag was stamped with a number which referred to a record of all important facts relative to each fish, so that on recovery of a marked salmon it was possible to follow its history back to the day of its spawning and compare its length, weight, etc., on each occasion. This experiment was carried on for several seasons, and in all over 1,200 salmon were marked. Nearly 40 of these were recovered with the tags on, a few of them were recovered in the spring following their liberation, and the condition of these fish showed that they had been lingering in the river and had taken little or no food. The most of them, however, were taken during the May and June of the second season following their liberation—that is, two years after their first capture; these salmon had fully recovered from the emaciation of the spawning season, and measurements showed that in each instance there had been an increase in length. Several of these recaptured fish were females and in the autumn gave a second litter of eggs. It is probable that the 40 recaptured fish were only a small portion of the actual survivors out of the 1,200 marked; for it is altogether likely that most of the tags dropped off. Indeed, it seems a wonder that any stayed on considering the long time that had elapsed and the constant motion to which the tags were subjected, swinging back and forth with every movement of the fish. It being thus established that Atlantic salmon return to the river a second time for procreation, being then six years old, it is not improbable that a few of them return again, spawning the third time when eight years old, and quite possible that in rare instances the process may be repeated a fourth time at the age of 10 years.

It has until recently been supposed that the recovery of a salmon from the exhaustion of the reproductive process required absolutely a return to the sea and a sojourn of some months in its natural element, with access to its natural food. It was therefore without any expectation of a favourable result that the experiment was tried of retaining salmon in fresh-water ponds for several years after their first spawning. In November 1908, some salmon of both sexes were after spawning transferred to one of the artificial ponds at Craig Brook, and eight of them were retained for this experiment. Three of these fish died in June, 1909, and one more in September. The remaining four lived through to the spawning of 1910. For the first 10 or 11 months of their stay in the pond they refused to eat anything, though often offered small herring and other food. In the fall of 1909, however, they began to eat and showed good appetites, eating through the winter. When the spring of 1910 opened they began to eat ravenously and continued to do so until about July 1, when their appetites began to fail, and in a few days they wholly ceased to eat. The food taken had evidently improved their condition, and they came to the spawning season of 1910 in as good condition (excepting one fish) as is usual with salmon that have been confined in a single summer. There were found to be two males and two females. On November 2 they were subjected to the usual process of artificial spawning. Both of the males were found to be in normal condition, yielding milt as usual. One of the females was sickly and gave inferior eggs which never hatched. The other female appeared to be in normal condition in every respect; her weight was fully up to the average for salmon of her length (32 inches) and her eggs were of prime quality, for they developed as usual and hatched a normal proportion of fry which have thrived through the first summer fully as well as any others. After spawning, the two males and the best of the females continued to live, ate nothing for several months, recovered their appetites in April and May, ending well until about the middle of July, when they ceased eating, and have continued to abstain from all food until the present writing. Sept. 28, 1911, without showing any unfavourable result.—Read by Charles G. Atkins before American Fisheries Society.

### Houses Built Without Nails.

In Alberta there is a village of houses which have been constructed without nails. As a matter of fact, little or no hardware of any character has entered into their construction. These houses have been built by Ruthenian immigrants and their architecture is quite novel. Their first attempts at house building are usually of the kind they have been accustomed to over in Europe, and their buildings are of the typical Ruthenian style—log, pitch-roofed, thatched and wide in the eaves.

In many cases these buildings are put up without a dollar's worth of hardware. Even the doors, an affair of slender twigs woven and laced together, swings on home-made hinges and is latched with a wooden hasp. The floor is of hewn logs, unnailed. The roof, as at the favorite Russian roof always is, is a wonderful fabric of poles and cross-woven wheat straw, 10 inches thick, packed tight and solid, and laid with such care that it will stand the weather for 20 years.

### Do Citizens Want a Change?

IF THEY DO ARE THEY PREPARED TO PAY FOR IT?

There are some people quite anxious to have the Municipal Elections of next June conducted under conditions quite different to those provided by the existing Statute law. Some believe in commissioners paid to devote their full day's work to Municipal matters. It is obvious, however, and admitted that this in itself would provide no adequate remedy for the evils which exist, and that such a course is merely a suggestion for new machinery to carry out municipal work, which will call for considerably more expenditure than is made at present and will entail much higher civic taxation. The problem to be faced first is the raising of more money for civic purposes. The machinery for disbursing it is after all a less serious question, and it seems to us that the present machinery, perhaps with slight modification should be tried first, before it is discarded for more expensive machinery.

As we have pointed out, the main question is whether citizens can afford to pay more and whether they are disposed to pay more for civic work. This can only be discovered by an actual investigation of the ability to pay, and an actual asking of willingness to pay. The way to settle the question whether these who are agitating for a change are backed by a big body of public opinion, is for the agitators to send petitions to the Legislature, to write to the city and take the usual steps to convince the members of St. John's and others that it is a live question, and that there is a sufficient number of citizens behind the movement to justify the Legislature in providing for a plebiscite, in order that the people may say whether civic taxation shall be increased or no, and whether or no there shall be such a radical change in municipal machinery as a substitution of commissioners paid to devote their whole time to the city in place of a Mayor receiving \$600 a year, and six Councillors receiving \$150 a year; or whether the only modification in the machinery shall be a reversion to the ward system for Councillors; or no change at all in the machinery. Any change to be effective before next June must be made at the next session of the Legislature; and if any change whatever is to be made, the agitation for it must commence at once. The absence of any such call will drive public men to the conclusion that there is no such desire for a change as some people believe, and that there is no disposition to improve civic affairs by paying more civic taxes.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

**BERLIN, To-day.**  
The Imperial Chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, today defied the Imperial Parliament to pass amendments to Constitution, proposed by Socialists, making the Imperial Chancellor responsible to the House for acts of the Emperor, and providing for his dismissal upon the demand of the House. The Socialist leaders at the opening of the Budget debate, moved the adoption of the amendments put forward by the party and appealed to the Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg had either resigned or been dismissed by the Emperor. The Chancellor thereupon rose and declared the amendments proposed were clear invasions of the Imperial prerogative and announced that he had neither presented his resignation nor did he intend to do so. The proposed refusal of supplies to the Government were settled regardless of Chancellor's attitude, when Dr. Heller-Spahn of the Center Party announced that his party would oppose the amendments, and would vote the budget not for the Chancellor, but for the German nation.

**MEXICO City, To-day.**  
The Mexican Congress has nullified the Presidential elections and new elections are called for next July. The Congress, according to this action, expects Huerta to remain in the Presidency for at least seven months more. If the time secretary of the election and installation of his successor is taken into consideration, it will be well toward the end of September or next year before Huerta will be ousted. He is now in power to another. In voting last night that the recent Presidential election be null, the Deputies decided to fix the first Sunday after Dec. 15 as the date for a new election. They also confirm the position of General Huerta as Provisional President until then. The action of the Deputies was accompanied by no debate. The Committee's report was approved without a dissenting vote as rapidly as the articles could be read. Not until the last clause was read referring to Huerta as Provisional President, did the Chamber give evidence other than that of a well trained organization. When the reading clerk stopped some one began applauding, and then instantly the Deputies were shouting Vivas for Huerta.

**MARKET WELL STOCKED.**—Within the past fortnight a considerable amount of produce and poultry have arrived in port, the shipments being brought here principally from Charlottetown, P.E.I., by the Black Diamond steamers.

More persons were killed and injured by automobiles in the streets of New York during the month of November than in any similar period before in the history of the city, according to a statement compiled by the National Highway Protective Society. Thirty-eight persons were crushed to death by private automobiles, automobile trucks, mail wagons and taxi-cabs, and 115 persons were injured. Of these fifteen were children under sixteen years of age. This is five more than were killed in October. Trolley cars killed ten persons and injured fifty during the same period. Up to December 1, in New York City, 511 persons have been killed in streets by vehicles, of whom 258 were children. Of this number 277 were victims of automobiles, 147 of these being children.

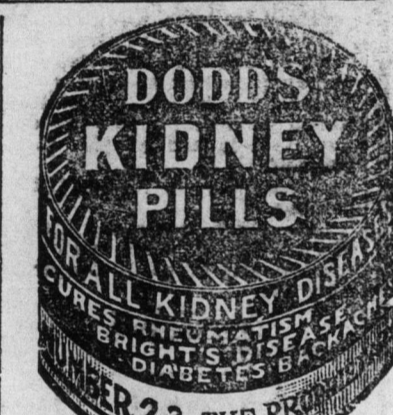

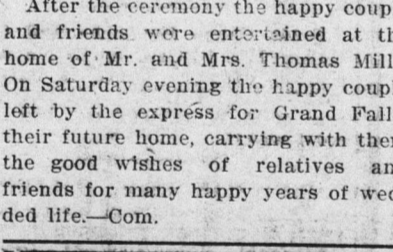

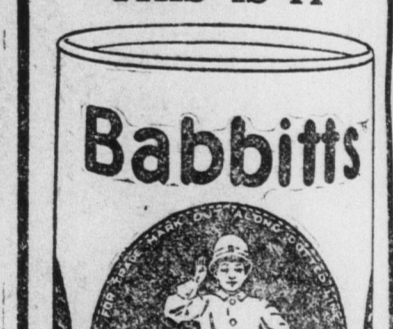

### Fire at Museum.

Shortly after three o'clock this morning, a fire supposedly of an unknown origin broke out in the new Museum building and it would have terminated differently, accompanied by greater loss than it did, but that it was discovered in its early stage. The first to know of the fire, it appears, was Constable Dempsey, who was doing night duty. He had just come out of the police station when he noticed volumes of smoke issuing from a window at the Western end of the Museum building. It was then about 3.30 and a bright and clear morning. The officer's suspicions were aroused and he at once hastened to investigate. He heard wood smouldering and later saw fire. There was nobody in the building at the time. Without delay he sent in an alarm and the Central and Eastern Companies responded hurriedly; a number of police were also quickly on the scene. On arrival the firemen entered the building at the western end where the smoke was coming from, and found the lavatories in the lower portion of the building, in a mass of flames. The firemen promptly applied two streams of water from their hoses which after playing on the blaze for about forty minutes quenched it, but not before the room was badly gutted. The exact origin of the fire cannot definitely be said, but the consensus of opinion of those who were present at the fire, is that it was caused by the extreme heat from the boiler which is situated immediately underneath the lavatory; also there is a strong belief that the hot water pipes connected with the boiler and running through the floors of the lavatory, had something to do with the outbreak. A circumstance in connection with the fire is that the workmen who had been painting and decorating the walls, etc. of the lavatories, had only finished their work yesterday.

### Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not viliate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:— Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry. He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Dudley, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health. I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days was lighted by gas, and in which a patient audience would comfortably sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lew, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov.17

Mrs. J. C. Davis passed away on Sunday last at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Joseph Morris. Mrs. Davis had been an invalid for a number of years.

A baby boy was born at Island Cove the other day, and on the following day some person in the house viewing the new arrival remarked that he was another Conker man. The aged grandfather was delighted, and handed the infant a fifty cent piece, when the remark was made. The child took the coin tightly in its little fingers, when with a frown on her face the old nurse said: "By the way he took the money, I'm afraid he'll be another Grabbitt!" The doctor laughed.

Mr. John C. Noseworthy, an old and highly respected resident of this town, died yesterday forenoon, after a long illness. Mr. Noseworthy occupied the position of foreman at Mr. W. A. Munn's oil refining factory here for a number of years. About four years ago an attack of illness left him so weak that he could not work after, and for the past six months he has been confined to his bed a helpless invalid. He leaves a widow, one daughter and two sons to mourn their loss. Mr. Noseworthy was a member of the C. B. Society and L.O.A., and both bodies will attend his funeral to-morrow.—COR. Harbor Grace, Dec. 9, 1913.

**SNOW STORM**—Yesterday a snow storm raged on the West Coast. This accounts for the coastal steamer Fortia being hung up at Channel. Last night the wind and sea abated.

A feminine letter friend asks me to please write on the subject, "Should the mother be able to lay aside a household worries and care when the father gets home?"

We hear a great deal about the woman who drags her poor, tired husband out to social functions. As a matter of fact she is a product of a small upper class and not half so common as the woman in the humbler home whose husband wants to keep his poor money-maddened wife cooped up within the four walls of her home seven evenings a week, and who furthermore expects her to look pleasant and exert herself to make him happy by way of recreation.

Did you ever hear the expression "K. H. J."? It means "Keep Him Jumping," and is supposed to describe the way women treat their husbands. Now I'm going to invent a new code, "K. H. H." which means "Keep Him Happy," and which I think describes the average woman's greatest care. A friend of mine who was calling with her husband ended the call very abruptly one evening. Afterwards she apologized for her rudeness. "I knew Arthur would be cross if we didn't catch that car," she said. That little incident is typical of the attitude of constant anxious watchfulness, of willingness to sacrifice anything to placate his jowlishness, which many women take toward their husbands.

To my mind all these matters should be compromised. Each should be willing to give up something of personal comfort for the other's happiness. The wife ought not to point out the annoyances of the day into her husband's ear; the husband ought not to expect a hard-working housekeeper and mother to be ready to cheer him up and wait on him.

The only right basis of happiness in married life is reasonableness and justice, and the husband who expects this is not reasonable or just.

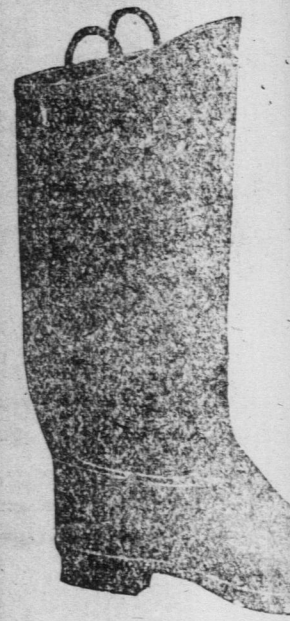

## Cable News.

LONDON, Dec. 9.

King George attended the 115th annual cattle show at Smithfield on Monday, and won six cups and eleven prizes in various classes of stock. The animals, raised at Windsor, Sandringham and Balmoral, were shown. The King spent a long time inspecting his own and other animals and chatting with the farmers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9. A consignment of 3,000 dozen eggs arrived here yesterday from China. The shipment was made from Shanghai, soon after the news reached the Orient that eggs were selling at 75 cents a dozen in the Pacific coast cities. The consignment was marketed profitably, and it is said that other shipments will be made whenever there is an egg-famine on the coast.

LONDON, Dec. 9.

The death is announced of David Anderson, aged 91, the engineer who had charge of the construction of the engines for the Great Eastern, the big ship designed by Brunel, which laid the Atlantic Cable in 1865. As a big ship she was a failure, but it is recalled that when she struck a reef of sunken rocks in American waters, her watertight compartments saved her from the fate of the Titanic. The Great Eastern was the largest ship ever in Halifax Harbor, being 679.6 feet long.

LONDON, Dec. 9.

The Trades Union Council today rejected a resolution in favor of a sympathetic strike of the Trade Unionists of the British Isles in support of the transport workers in Dublin, and instructed the delegates in Dublin to endeavor to resume negotiations with the employers, with a view to bringing about a satisfactory settlement of the dispute. The meeting was a stormy one, the adherents of James Larkin resisting all proposals of the conservative element, which, however, eventually carried the day.

HOUSTON, Dec. 9.

The number known to be dead, as the result of a flood which spread over the low lands of half a dozen counties in South and Central Texas has reached 150. To-night several thousand refugees were crowded in half-flooded cotton-gins and dwelling houses, safe for the time being, but suffering from hunger and exposure. Four-fifths of the destitute and maimed are negro farm hands. Most of the victims lost their lives at Bryan, where a thirty mile stretch of level along the river crumbled. The San Felipe section of Austin county received a shipment of motor boats to-day, and several hundred refugees were removed to safety.

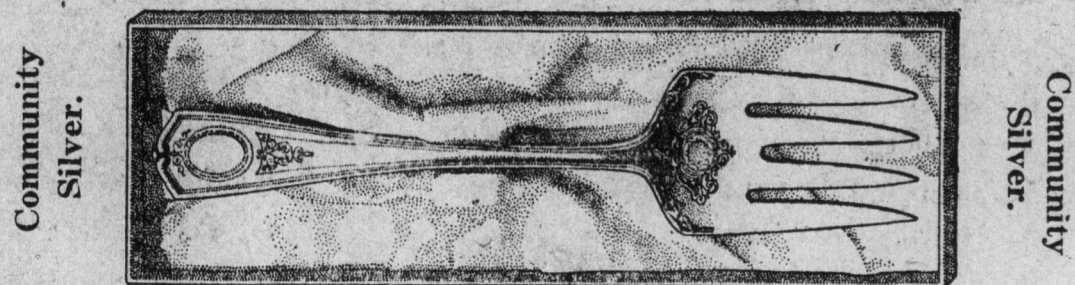
### Tridium Closed

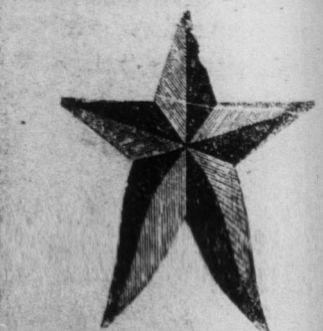
