





If they reckoned their rent on a 10 p.c. basis, that is, to reckon rent at 10 per cent, of the value of the house, they could easily keep the houses in good repair and enable the unfortunate enants to recover the sense of comfort and homeliness that only a "Mark Tapley" can keep under a leaky roof and draughty walls.

I know a small range of houses that must have cost much less than \$1,200, and probably were thrown up after the fire with not much care, and these bring in anywhere from \$200 to \$250 rent from the eight or ten famwretched repair and are delapidated ilies that live there.
