

That Marine Tragedy.

Survivors Story Not Believed --  
England's Building Problem.

SURVIVORS STORY.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 17.  
A tragic tale of the seas was un-  
folded here to-day by four survivors  
of the British schooner Onato pick-  
ed up while drifting helplessly sever-  
al hundred miles from the shore by  
the American steamship Zirkel. The  
survivors, all from Newfoundland, say  
that the captain of the Onato, James  
Brushia, and his brother Ernest, first  
mate, were crushed to death by the  
shifting of the ship's cargo. Stories,  
however, do not agree with those told  
by Captain Sullivan, master of the  
Zirkel, which arrived here today and  
all four men were locked up at Glou-  
cester Immigration Shed on charges  
of mutiny, and also of having killed  
the captain of their ship and his  
brother the mate. They will be turned  
over to the British Consul. Capt.  
Sullivan declared that when he drew  
near the schooner, he plainly could  
see what appeared to be a general  
fight raging upon the little craft's  
deck amidships, and that one of his  
officers said he heard what he believed  
to be pistol shots. Survivors Douglas  
Nicholl, Thomas Moulton, Lorenzo  
Ash and Ernest Frizzard all told vir-  
tually the same story, except as to  
some details, which the authorities  
said were conflicting. They declared  
the officers met an accidental  
death while the entire schooner's com-  
pany of six were battling to save the  
craft during a terrific gale. Captain  
Brushia and his brother, they said,  
went below deck to look after the  
cargo and were crushed to death when  
it shifted. The crew of the Zirkel  
first sighted the Onato about 10.45 o-  
clock on the night of October 8th,  
when about three hundred miles due  
east of Newfoundland. (The name  
Brushia should read Brushett. Both  
belonged to Burin.)

NEWS FROM SOUTH RUSSIA.

LONDON, Oct. 17.  
The latest authoritative news regard-  
ing South Russia is that Gen. Deno-  
kine's army on the extreme left had  
taken Chernigov and advancing  
northward along the east bank of the  
Dnieper towards Gomel, on the right  
they have crossed the Don on a two  
hundred mile front. Everywhere it  
is driving back the Bolsheviks. In  
East Russia the Bolshevik forces owing  
to great demands elsewhere are  
compelled to adopt purely defensive  
tactics.

SHORT OF BRICKS.

LONDON, Oct. 17.  
(Reuter's Despatch.) — Lecturing  
before the Society of Architects, Sir  
Charles Ruten, member of the Coun-  
cil produced figures as to the country's  
housing needs showing that even if  
the output of bricks increased 250 per  
cent, it would be some fifteen or  
twenty years before the present short-  
age would be overtaken. At present  
time seven million people were im-  
properly housed. The fact, he stated,  
showed the impossibility of the pro-  
duction of brick houses and the cry-  
ing need of immediate use of wood in  
building. He estimated that if the  
housing problem is to be handled in  
any degree satisfactorily during the  
next five years a grand total of 1,044,-  
000 houses must be erected or well  
over 200,000 houses for each year.  
Calculating 25,000 bricks to each  
house this would mean five thousand  
million bricks would be required each  
year. To secure this amount two and  
a half times the number of workmen  
engaged in this industry before the  
war must be found to meet the de-  
mand.

## Kilbride Will Give Bennett, Mullaly & Martin A Bumper Vote on Nov. 3.

### Enthusiastic Meeting Held There Last Night--The Whole West End in Line for the Battle of the Ballots.

The record meeting in the history of Kilbride was held last night by the Liberal Progressive candidates, Hon. J. R. Bennett, J. J. Mullaly and J. T. Martin. attach to him in Newfoundland, but he, through these circumstances, had been left alone to manage district affairs. After these few brief remarks Hon. Mr. Bennett for more than one hour dealt with public questions and with the scurrility and abuse that had been heaped upon him. Not in his whole public life of 20 years did he ever attempt to belittle or vilify an opponent, and he did not intend to at the present time. Policy only was the matter that he wished to discuss. He wished to make known to the people of Kilbride his services as they applied to the department of the Colonial Secretary and Minister of Militia during the war. He challenged any man in Newfoundland to say he did not do his duty as honestly as it could be done. 

These were all the hoaxes which we managed to dig up out of our memories. Perhaps some reader can contribute some more of these rays to light up the depths of human gullibility.

### Household Notes.

Young potatoes are excellent scalloped. Now is the season for banana fritters. Serve cornmeal griddle cakes with sausage.

Potatoes and carrots can be scalloped together. Don't buy kitchen tools which will seldom be used.

Save all waxed paper that comes into the kitchen. Sardines and shrimps can be combined for a salad.

Don't let vegetables stop boiling till they are done. Coddish needs to be freshened for at least two hours.

Stewed corn and tomatoes combined are delicious. A baking pan should always be thoroughly greased.

A double-wire broiler is the best thing for broiling. Use an oil polish mop for all floors except waxed ones.

Use a large cork dipped in powder to scour saucepans. Chopped dates can be used in puddings instead of raisins.

Potatoes added to the bread sponge will keep it moist. Mashed potato cakes can be baked in the oven instead of fried.

When washing colored goods, add a little turpentine to the suds. Smoked fish like flannan haddie requires very little freshening.

Remember that even the simplest dishes require thought and care. Sprinkle stale rolls with cold water and re-heat in a hot oven.

A delicious canned compote consists of plums, cherries and pears. Italian polenta is very like hasty pudding with grated cheese added.

Coal should never be beyond the top of the fire bricks in a range. Make a kitchen pleasant to look at, and it will be restful to work in.

When a bedspread is worn past use, cut into squares for wash cloths. A pinch of boric acid added to the starch will prevent its sticking to the iron.

Warm your potatoes in boiling water before putting in the oven to bake. The worn tablecloth can be cut into squares and hemmed for table napkins.

Secularism.

For the past few weeks, the Opposition papers have warned the Government papers not to engage in sectarian articles and writings, in its attempt to delude (we quote the Opposition press) the electorate, and the people have been most duly impressed by this section of the press—that is, of course, supposing that the Opposition press has weight enough to make any impression. As an inference to be drawn from the above we naturally thought, and we think all intelligent voters thought likewise, that there would be no attempt by these Opposition writers to stir up the electorate on the sectarian question, but the Opposition is so desperately working for power that it stops at nothing. We know full well the sincerity of its protestations and its statements, for the back files of both the Star and Advocate are dotted with gems (?) of the vilest kind of reading. The taxation cry and the confederation cry recoiled like a boomerang upon the Opposition leaders, and in frantic despair the sectarian cry was utilized, as witness the ugly, despicable, dastardly and utterly vile headlines in yesterday's Morning Post. No matter who the writer, the publication of such can only rely upon the publisher. Were there no ulterior motive in it whatever than the mere use of such language, so prominently displayed, were enough to sever from the Opposition ranks all those who value common decency even in yellow-rag journalism.

The indecent expression referred to, however, is not condemnatory only because of its open violence. We believe that there was more behind it than mere spleen against a political opponent. We are told by the parties concerned that tactics tending towards the same end have been hitherto used to offset his chances of election in Port-de-Grave District, and that end is sectarian division. How hypocritically saintly have been the Opposition voices as they lifted up their hands in error at the imagined idea that the Government would revert to this cry in order to catch the votes of the populace. Verily we might cry out as of old, "How are the mighty fallen," but unfortunately for the applicability of the expression, Squires was never mighty except in his own estimation. The zaniness of the Opposition was so cut by its failure to captivate, not the hearts, but the votes of the people, that in pure vexation and desperation of spirits (we are not referring to these that Doc Mosdell issues scripts for), it made what it deemed a "big splurge" yesterday. What an illustration on the needs of education was thus given by the very men who talk so much of the uneducated of our island home. Better indeed to have innate courtesy and the most elementary education, than to be endowed with journalistic (?) ability and yet descend to such depths of degradation in the utilization of the same.

But the outburst in yesterday's Post, which evoked expressions of shame on all sides, is not the only part in the plot to work sectarianism to gain the electorate over to the Opposition. For the past two days, the Advocate, the paper that has attacked all men of prominence in its day, has had big articles aiming at the same thing. Its articles on the Methodist Educational Drive and the liquor question is nothing more nor less (whether intentional or not, and we do not doubt the intentions, as we are creditably informed that the Opposition candidates for St. John's are more than sick with apprehension over the foreboded results of election day) than the incentive to vote according to the religious obligations. The Opposition have seen the manifesto of Squires analyzed dispassionately, and have seen how the manifesto of Sir M. P. Cashin, by its superiority in lucidity and promise of fulfilment, and resultant development of our resources, and by its lack of superfluous words and long-winded phrases, with no definite policy outlined, is in every way indicative of Cashin's superiority over Squires in statesmanship and financial ability. The Opposition have also seen with dismay its vain efforts to gull the public, as to either the liberalism or the reform of the leaders masquerading as the defenders of their country under the title Liberal Reform Party. Realizing that the time is short—a bare two weeks longer—another effort is made by appealing to the religious sentiments of the people. Cutting out cant and other trimmings, the ostensible argument of the Opposition is: Cashin is a Roman Catholic and Squires and Coaker are of the Protestant faith.

Surely the time is gone by when Newfoundland voters can be caught by such shallow reasoning. The present period of our country's history is such that we can do nothing worse than vote for leaders on the sectarian issue alone. Voters, now is the time to exercise that common sense and intelligence that is inherent in every one of us. Compare Cashin with Coaker and Squires. Compare the candidates appealing for your suffrages from the Government side with those of the Opposition, and reason the issues, and the promises of each clearly. You know the present affairs in this country. Undoubtedly all things are not as you would have them. Undoubtedly the taxation is high, but, the Opposition, who are so glib in quoting other countries, admit that our taxation is not as high as it is elsewhere. Cashin promises reduced taxation as soon as the country can afford it. Squires promises it at once, irrespective of his twin's promise that \$3,000,000 of the country's revenue must be guaranteed for sealing steamers, beside the guarantee of tens of millions of dollars yearly for the purchase of fish, all of which means INCREASED TAXES! There is really no comparison between the two policies. One is the policy of a sane man—Sir M. P. Cashin, in his honest endeavor to stand by the country and its independence. The other is the policy of two political desperadoes who reck onought of you, as long as they get the "golden fleece" from the revenue. Finally then, MEN vote this year on reason alone, "a man's a man for a' that," said Burns, and if a man is a man vote for him, and do not vote simply because he is a Roman Catholic or a Protestant, and if you do this, and we believe you will, then there is no doubt of the issue, for Cashin and his party are MEN and THEY WILL COME BACK!

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# BOY SCOUTS' COLUMN.



(Edited by an Asst. S-M)  
WHAT TO DO THIS MONTH.

From "The Book of Woodcraft" by Ernest Thompson Seton I copy the following suggested program for this month:

"Outdoors."  
"Make a collection of leaves and study trees."  
"Make a collection of nuts."  
"Gather wood for bow and arrows."  
"Indoors."  
"Arrange, mount and name specimens."  
"Learn Knots. First Aid."

Let us take the first thing in the 'outdoors' list. This month is the ideal month for making a collection of leaves, but for nature study the month of September is better. Of course there are very few nuts to make a collection of. The best wood for a bow is cedar, apple ash or elm. For the arrows pine or ash are considered the best. To give full directions for making bows or arrows would take up a great deal more space than the General Editor allows me.

After your specimens are pressed and dried they should be gummed on cartridge paper with gummed stumps and labelled carefully for example:—Dogberry, Mountain Ash, White Hills, June 27th, 1919.

As to the knots, well we'll suppose you know them.

WHAT TO DO IN EMERGENCIES.  
Said:—If severe send for doctor. Cut clothes away from patient with sharp knife or scissors. If clothing sticks to skin do not tear off but cut round it. Don't break blisters. If large prick them with a needle not a pin. In the manufacture of pins arsenic is used to put a finish on them and consequently they are dangerous to use. Protect scalded parts from air by dusting with flour, starch, powdered chalk or arrowroot, or by applying strips of lint soaked in butter, sweet oil or carroll oil. Carron oil is a mixture of equal parts of olive oil and linseed. Cover this with cottonwool. Keep patient warm and give warm drinks.

## Political Obituary Notice

FRANK ARCHIBALD, THE "SLACKER" CANDIDATE FOR MR. GRACE DISTRICT.

Frank Archibald the junior member of the firm of Archibald Bros., well known to the people of Mr. Grace and to be known by the people of the outside world by the 5th of November. Frank, as he is known, is of a retiring disposition, especially so from Aug. 4th, 1914, until Nov. 11th, 1918. He was educated to some extent in Mr. Grace and St. John's, but his teachers must have failed to instill in his brain anything of a patriotic nature. He engaged in the business of shoe manufacturing and apparently, was making a success of it. Not being satisfied with the avocation he invested in lines, twines, traps and motor boats, and placed them in the waters—and helped to make it harder for the real fishermen of Mr. Grace Island and elsewhere to get their living.

In the summer of 1914, the great war broke out, and many of the young men and maidens volunteered for active service. As the years passed, others heard the call and answered it. To-night he again accepted nomination as a candidate for the coming election for the district of Mr. Grace, and in thanking his supporters he was a kind of nervous due no doubt to the thundering of cannon, the awful sights, etc., etc., and from the effects of "gas" that he is going to shoot off during the next few weeks.

No man of military age bears a better record (and will) than Frank Archibald, and in passing I might state, that while at his daily avocation he had better imbue some leather in his general system, as his own hide will certainly need it now and in years to come.

**Man Who Helped Build Up Armaments Firm.**

Colonel T. E. Vickers, C.B., who, in his eighty-third year died on Oct. 19, 1919, in London, was for 60 years head of one of the most active industries in England, and in the building up of the great Vickers Company, of which he was chairman for thirty-six years, retiring in 1909. He entered the old family business, which had been conducted by his grandfather and father before him at Millsands and Wadsley, near Sheffield, and was placed in practical control of the works in 1854, when little more than 21 years of age. Soon afterwards he introduced into this country from Germany the manufacture of steel castings, and a few years later invented a mill for rough rolling tyres for locomotives and other railway rolling stock. He was among the first to adopt the open hearth process of manufacture for steel of high quality, and as a result of these innovations great advance was made by his firm, which took up in succession the manufacture of heavy forgings for guns and shafting, finished guns, armaments, machinery, armour, ship-building for the Royal Navy and Merchant Service, and marine and electrical engineering in all its branches. Joining the Volunteer movement at the outset, he was soon in command of the Sheffield infantry battalion known as the Hallamshire Rifles. He was Justice of the Peace for the West Riding and for Sheffield and a confirmed Conservative and Protectionist. A well-known chess-player, he was chairman of the Sheffield Chess Club.

**French Prize Awarded.**

(Christian Science Monitor.) South Hadley, Massachusetts.—Miss Aline de Villele of the department of romance languages at Mount Holyoke College has been awarded the Prix Montyon by the French Academy. This is awarded each year to the French novel which, in the judgment of the members of the Academy, is most distinguished in artistic merit and high moral tone. The novel is "Allemand d'Amerique."


