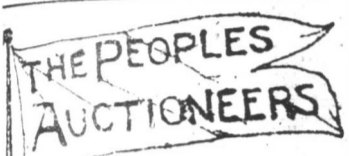

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


"God bless her sweet heart!" murmurs the old lady. "She be a flower indeed! No wonder he loves her—the heart of a stone she'd crack."

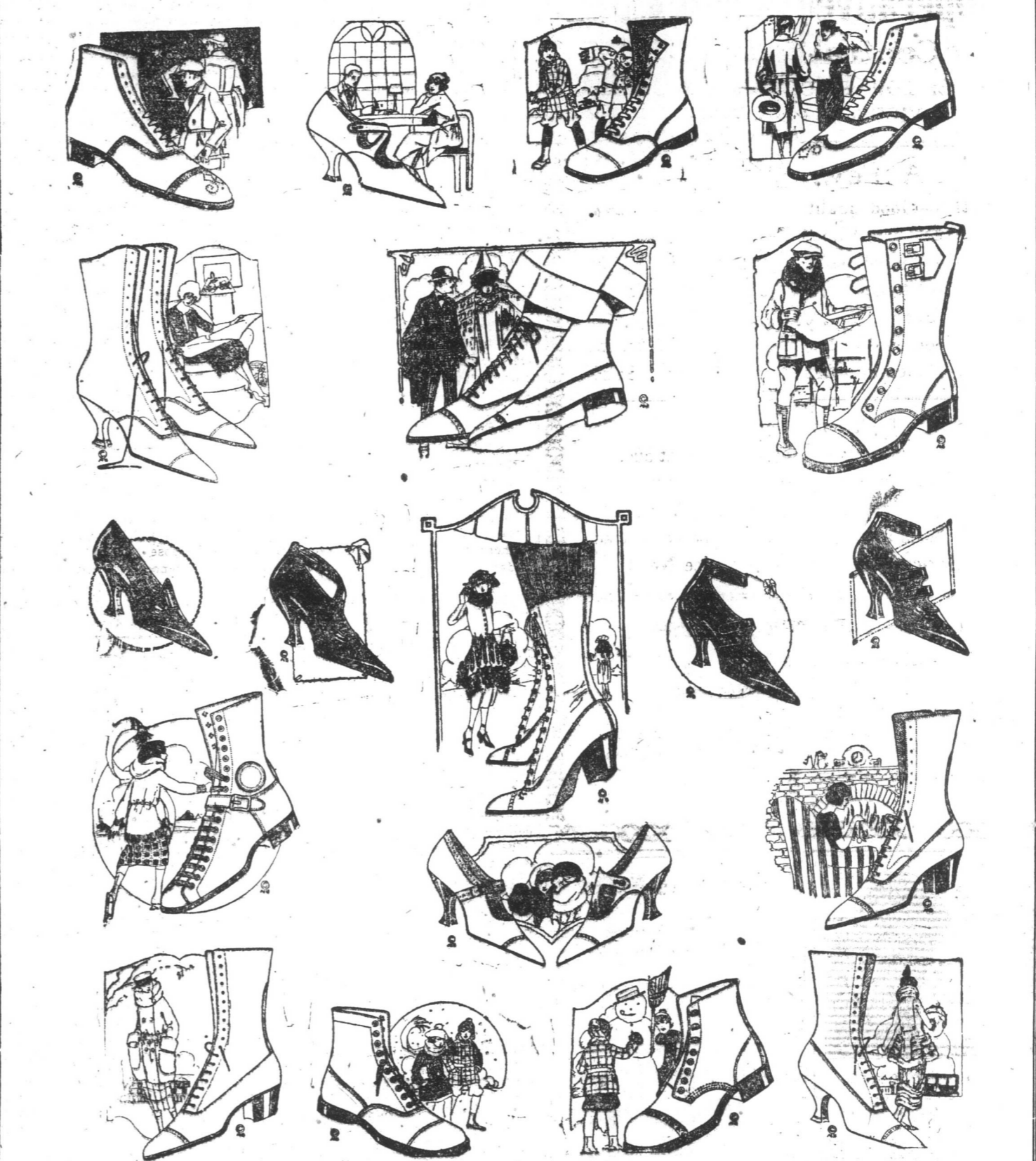

Household Notes.

Dainty bread and butter sandwiches with ice cream are preferred by some to cake.

Hard sauce is much enriched by the addition of a few blanched and chopped almonds.

If plenty of salt is used in making bread, the bread will keep moist for a longer time.

Yolks of eggs and cream beaten together in a basin make an excellent thickening for soup.

Should a cake crack open while baking, you may be sure that you have used too much flour.

An excellent combination for a fruit salad is oranges, apples, pineapple and marshmallows.

For candy making, use a wooden thermometer with which to stir, as it is very easy to keep clean.

Just before serving boiled Brussels sprouts, sprinkle over them a half cupful of grated cheese.

Add a couple of sultana raisins to the cottage pudding batter. They give it a holiday appearance.

If you wish your biscuits to have a brown gloss over them, brush their surface with milk before baking.

Hominy grits served with sausage are delicious, and they will cause the sausage to be more easily digested.

Cook spaghetti in casserole with thin slices of onion, tomato and pepper in alternate layers. Season well.

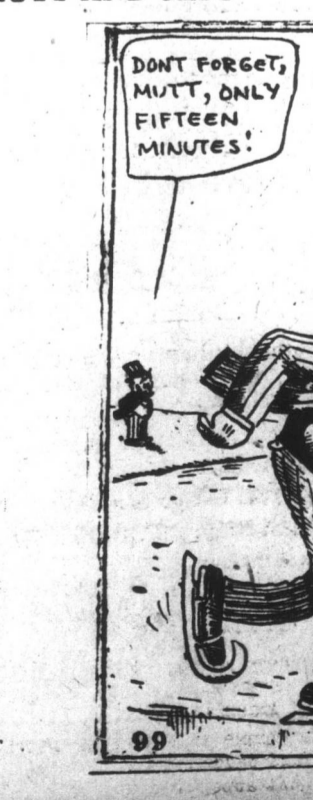
Household Notes.

Supreme Council Reaches Agreement.

British and French Viewpoints Reconciled--Allies Invite Turks to Conference--Dominion Home Rule Will Not Satisfy Irish Republicans--Seamen Refused to Ship on Steamer Minola.

A SOLUTION SOLVED.
PARIS, Jan. 28. A solution of the problem of German reparations was tentatively reached late today by the committee of experts appointed yesterday by the Allied Supreme Council, and confidence was expressed that the Council would approve the committee's plan to-morrow. The proposed scheme provides for payment of annuities on a sliding scale of from two billion to six billion gold marks over a period of probably forty-two years, and also a 12 1/2 per cent. ad valorem tax on German exports, so that her creditors will be paid according to Germany's increasing prosperity. The second ironing out of difficulties widening breaches that threatened to break up the conference, it being virtually suspended except for private conferences. In official French circles they give the Belgian delegation credit for success in reconciling British and French viewpoints. The project in its final form when approved by the Supreme Council will be submitted to Germany for acceptance as an agreement outside of article 233 of the peace treaty, which entrusts the reparations commission with the task of fixing the amount of the indemnity. Then another conference will be called, to which the Germans will be invited.

TURKEY ACCEPTS INVITATION.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 28. Acceptance of the Allied invitation to send Turkish representatives to a conference in London in February, at which the revision of the Sevres Treaty will be considered, was announced by the Sultan's Government to-day.

WHAT DEVALERA THINKS.
DUBLIN, Jan. 28. Answering a question by United States correspondents as to whether he has noticed any change in the Sinn Fein movement since returning to Ireland, DeValera says he has seen only a hardening of the people's determination. He writes, Ireland's separate nationality implies the right of the people to determine freely for themselves their own form of government and adjust as a nation their political relationship with other nations upon common equality of rights.

STILL IN DUBLIN.
DUBLIN, Jan. 28. It is reported here on what was said to be the highest authority, that DeValera is still in Dublin and reports of his visit to France are probably designed to conceal his real whereabouts.

The reason for this move on the part of the Institute was the refusal of the men to accept employment on the steamer Minola bound for Newfoundland when the officers of the ship were seeking a crew. The men said the Minola paid the English wage of \$60 a month instead of \$75.

BANK CLOSURES.
BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 28. The Bank of Spain and America capitalized at 2,000,000 pesos, closed its doors to-day.

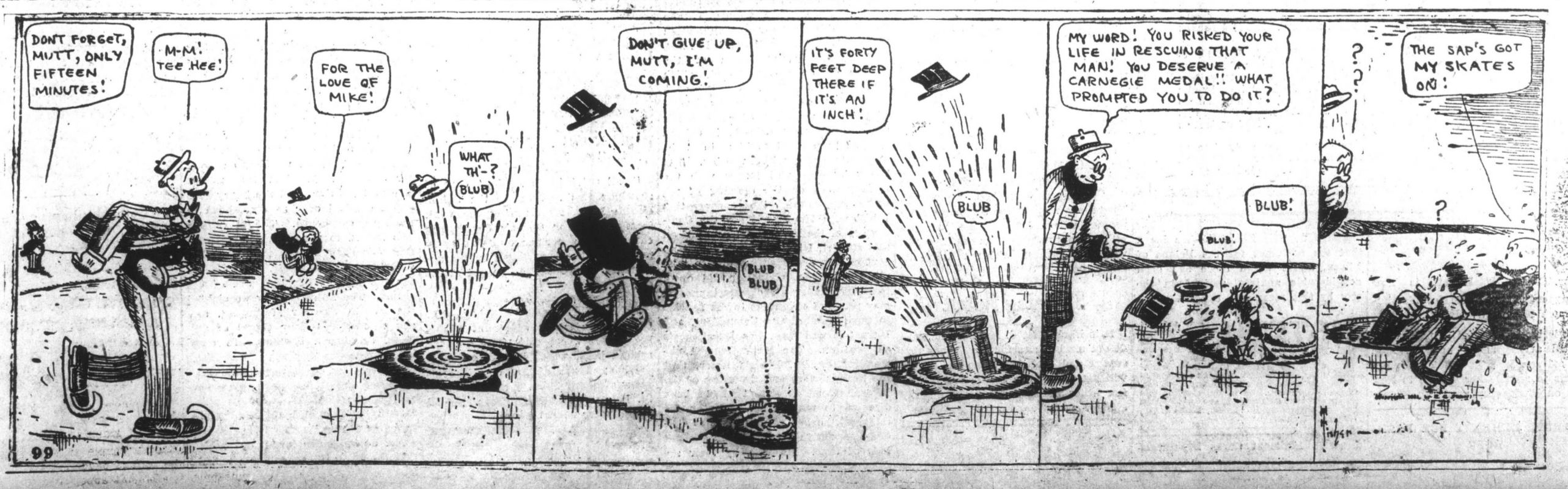

Those ribbons, in possession of the Customs Department here, are for Mr. Abraham James, Spaniard's Cove, T.B.; Mr. John Sinclair, Smith's Sound, T.B.; Mr. Thomas Flander, Trinity, and Mr. Anthony Lahey, Trinity. The ribbon is one and a quarter inch wide. One is red and green, with a narrow stripe of white between. The other is burnt orange flanked with narrow stripes of white, black, and light blue, on either side. They are to be worn on the left breast with or without the medal, and like all other such decorations, they may not be worn without official authority.

I found an old Manuscript Book last week, and seeing the date 1788 on the first page, I concluded that I had a diary of ye olden times, that would supply me with material for some interesting articles. Upon closer examination, however, I am somewhat disappointed, as I find it is largely an account book of one Thomas Dampier, who in 1788 was Quarter Master Sergeant in the Newfoundland Regiment, stationed at Fort William, St. John's. From it I find, the officer in command of the Regiment at that time was Colonel Pringle; and Capt. Right was in charge of the Royal Artillery.

As Quarter Master Sergeant, Mr. Dampier had charge of the regimental clothing and stores; and his accounts deal exclusively with the distribution and the accounting for, of clothing, powder, etc., to the soldiers of the Regiment. There is not much of any other information of interest in Mr. Dampier's records. An isolated note, however, records the following event:—"St. John's, Fort William, Sept. 30th, 1783. The Guard of Fort William of the Newfoundland Regiment was relieved by the 37th Regiment, with one Sergeant, one Captain, and twelve privates, commanded by Captain Nicholas, arrived from New York, being part of the two Regiments Forty-eight Rank and file, with Non-Commissioned officers, drums and fifes, proportioned accordingly."

Mr. Dampier's history would not interest us very much, were it not for the fact, that in 1784, he being honourably discharged from the army with a pension, came to Trinity to live. He bought the house that stood on the present site of Mr. Somerton's house; and in addition to carrying on "a general business" of that day, he provided board and lodging for officers and soldiers who made Trinity their headquarters for several years. Mention is made of those soldiers going to Bay de Verde and to Perlican and returning to Trinity. On October 27th, 1787, Thomas Dampier was married by Parson Clinch, to Anna Sweet. Two children were born to them, viz. Ann and John. Ann Dampier married (skipper) Thomas Jenkins, and became the mother of William Jenkins, whilst John Dampier married and settled at Goose Cove, Trinity; and the daughters of to-day in Goose Cove, are his lineal descendants. Mr. Dampier was vocally gifted as a musician, and a song was called for in social gatherings, or a hymn was to be sung in the service of the Church, he was called upon to "rise the tune." He is still remembered in Trinity by the "Dampier" when one is called upon to lead in some ordinary undertaking of daily life. It may be interesting to know, that all the Dampiers of to-day are good singers.

LONDON, Jan. 28. Reginald McKenna, former Financial Secretary of the Treasury, presiding at a general meeting of the London Joint City and Midland Bank, of which he is director and chairman, said the government's proposed deflation policy, involving dear money and rigid restriction of credit, was impracticable.

Charles I. Beheaded But Honored.

On January 30, 1649, at ten o'clock in the morning, Charles the First walked across from St. James's Palace to Whitehall, in London, calling on his guard "in a pleasant manner" to walk space, and at two o'clock he stepped through a window of the Banqueting House on to the scaffold, and spoke to William Juxon, Archbishop of Canterbury, and the others attending his Majesty, declaring that he had desired the liberty and freedom of the people as much as anyone, "but their liberty consists in having from Government those laws by which their life and their goods may be most their own, not in having a share in the government."

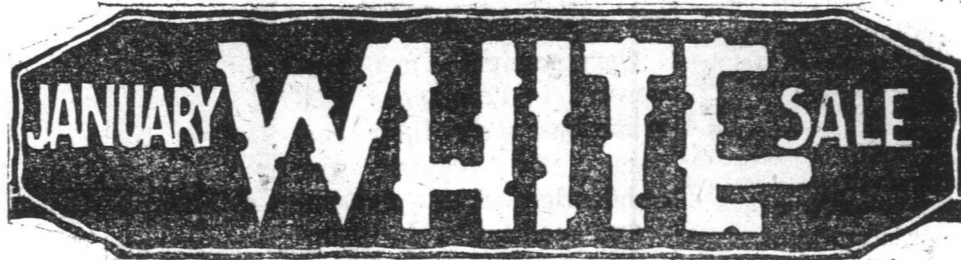

Feildians Defeat Saints.

1500 SPECTATORS WITNESS GAME.

The Feildians won their second league game last night by defeating the Saints by a goal to 2 in the presence of nearly 1500 spectators. The game was not by any means a good one, although occasional flashes of brilliant hockey were to be seen. There was still an absence of any real attempts at combination although at times the Feildians did manage to play together quite well. The only man on the Saints team who made any attempt at combination was Paterson. The individual play was quite good on the whole. Tait, Robertson and E. Munn giving some excellent exhibitions. The goal-tending of Nix Hunt was the feature of the game, however. In the last period particularly, he saved shot after shot in splendid style and undoubtedly helped greatly to keep down the score against his side.

At 7.30 the game was started by Mr. Jack Tobin, who was referee.

THE FIRST PERIOD

was quite fast at first, some excellent combination being got in by the Feildians, who bombarded their opponents goal throughout the period. Tait drew first blood for the Feildians, seven minutes after play had begun, by beating Munn with a scorcher from centre ice. Four minutes later Winter who played a hard game right through, picked up the puck near the Saint's goal and scored. Soon after Tait went down ice stickhandling well, and notched up the Feildians third goal. Two minutes later Robertson made a splendid run the whole length of the rink and placed the puck behind Hunt. Shortly before the end of the period the puck came out to Winter from a puck-off on the wing, and he beat Munn for the fourth time. The period ended with the score 4-1 in favor of the Feildians.

THE SECOND PERIOD

opened with the Saints attacking their opponent's goal but Hunt was always on the job and cleared well. For the greater part of the period play was a give and take nature, some spectacular hockey being played by both sides. In this period as, indeed, right through the game, a constant repetition of off sides served to make interruptions which detracted a great deal from its interest. Payn notched up the Feildians fifth goal after a nice run through four minutes before time, and a long shot from Winter found the net, scoring six for the Feildians, shortly before the end of the period. When the going went the Feildians were still leading the score being 6-1 in their favour.

THE THIRD PERIOD

saw a change of goal-keepers, Voisey, taking the place of Munn the latter replacing Coultas on the right wing. For a time the Feildian defence was hard put to it to keep out their opponents. During this period Hunt's saving was truly marvellous. Time and time again he presented a stonewall front to the Saints, and cleared what seemed almost certain goals. Eleven minutes after the start Tait scored from an excellent shot from the left wing. Two minutes later Errol Munn made a splendid run the length of the rink, stickhandling in fine style, and put the puck behind Hunt for the Saint's second and last goal. A minute later Ewing scored from a wing shot and soon after Winter scored the last goal for the game from a run through on the right wing. When the final gong sounded the score stood at 9 goals to 2 in favour of the Feildians.

COMMENT ON THE GAME.
Field played a very good game for the Saints. Robertson and E. Munn were, however, the mainstays of their team, their individual play being very good. Both seem unable to combine.

L. Munn gave the spectators quite a surprise by putting up an excellent game in goal, particularly in the second period.

Tait and Winter played very well indeed, and helped considerably in gaining the victory for their team.

Payn also worked very hard and got in some good play.

Nix Hunt's goal-tending was undoubtedly marvellous. The manner in which he stopped some of the shots he received was nothing short of marvellous.

The ice was undoubtedly the best for the season and the players say that they found it almost too fast.

The rink management are to be congratulated on the excellent arrangements they have made for dealing with the crowd. The doors were opened at 6.30 p.m. and a queue was formed outside the ticket window. Furthermore, a rail extending from the ticket window to the door opening on the arena permitted of only one person going through at a time and thus avoided the confusion which usually predominates there.

Sergeant Long and two constables greatly assisted the rink management in carrying out their arrangements.

Sugar Control.

The Food Control Board, Sugar Importers, and Prime Minister held a meeting on Wednesday evening to discuss the sugar situation, as a result of which the control of this commodity will be continued indefinitely to make up the losses incurred by an "error of judgment" of the officials of that Board. This means that the Board will continue to disburse their sugar at the price of 22½ cents per lb. With the injustice this is on the public at a time when the cost of living is a serious problem, we do not intend at present to make any comment, as it is up to the public themselves to enter any protest on this head, but there is one serious result from this decision which we would like to point out to those in authority. For some time past the Trade Review has been advocating the desirability of buying home-made products, supporting local industries, and thereby increasing the earning powers of our citizens and insuring steady employment to the wage earners during these troublesome times.

We have been ably supported by the local press, and the Board of Trade in its annual report takes cognizance of our efforts, and goes on record as being in complete accord with this movement, and states that they cannot "too strongly express their feelings that the wholesale and retail trades should leave no stone unturned toward influencing the public to use local made goods more freely than has been the custom hitherto." The price of sugar in New York today is 6½ cents per pound. From this sugar, manufacturers of cakes, candies, Acetated Waters, etc., are making up their stocks to compete with local manufacturing concerns. It can thus be seen that our local factories are faced with very unfair competition, and it will be impossible for them to compete with the imported article when they are in the first instance compelled to pay over three times the price for their raw material.

This naturally will retard the consumption of sugar, and as the Board estimates that it will be necessary at the present rate of consumption, to

keep control until June, it will find, with the local factories closed down, that the consumption will not be up to that estimate. We think that in the interest of the employees of those local concerns making candies, cakes and soft drinks, that the Government should give these plants the right either to import their sugar at the best price they could obtain it, or a special price so as to enable them to continue in operation and compete successfully with the imported article; otherwise the effect will be to throw wage earners out of employment and continue the control of sugar indefinitely.—Trade Review.

A National Loss.

A great national loss is sustained by the suspension of twenty-five per cent. of the newspapers of Canada. The weekly papers in the towns of the Dominion have rendered splendid service to the state in the past, and were capable of continuing that service until the mounting cost of production made it impossible for them to go on. In the past they formed public opinion free from the influence of big business, and in conformity with the convictions of the editors. The country needs just that kind of independent advocacy of political principles. Where amalgamations have taken place—and in scores of cases that has been the result—the paper that remains becomes neutral. The most successful publisher under such circumstances is the one who can follow closely the example of the Lads of the West, who were neither hot nor cold. If the editor has strong views on any public question of a controversial character he cannot express them without offending one half of his subscribers. This, he fears, means a loss of patronage that his treasury cannot meet. Consequently the vitality of the provincial press is seriously impaired, and the people forced back upon a few big papers, published in populous centres.

It all tends to a semi-monopoly of the press, a loss of independent, and practical impossibility to have public questions discussed from the local standpoint. Nothing is more necessary in a democracy like Canada than a free, untrammelled press. But unfortunately as time passes the hobbles on the press become more obvious and restricting. A newspaper has come to be regarded as a commercial enterprise solely. A publisher must, of course, make enough money to pay his debts or go out of business. But an editor who is compelled to keep one eye on the till has only half his sight to give for public service. And unless a newspaper is giving such service it must lumber the earth.

It seems too much to expect that prices of paper, postage and wages will ever fall to the point that will enable suspended publications to resume. In the general interest that is unfortunate.—The Sentinel.

As We See Others.

A CANDID APPRECIATION OF U.S.A. The liner de luxe had swung in past Sandy Hook, and the tender had already come alongside with its mail and Press-gang. There ensued a furious race to interview the most distinguished passenger, and it was by the representative of The Democratic Elevator, who got there first, that the Sage, in the very act of recording the emotions provoked by his first skyscraper, was abode.

"Mr. Punch, I guess?" said he. "Pleased to meet you, Sir. And what do you think of the American nation?" "Shall I tell you now," asked Mr. Punch, "or wait till I've actually seen it?" "Right here," said the interviewer, and drew his note-book.

"Well," began Mr. Punch, "I think a good deal of it—I mean, I think a good deal about it. And it nearly always makes me smile. Of course you won't understand why it nearly always makes me smile, because you don't see fun in the same things. You don't appreciate our humor, and therefore you say that we haven't any. And if we don't appreciate your humor that proves again that we haven't any. So you'll never understand why it makes me smile, sometimes rather bitterly, to think about your nation; but I'll tell you just the same.

"In the first place, what you call 'America' is only a small fraction of the American continent, not even as large as British North America. And in the second place what you call your 'nation'—well, some ruddy person once said of it that it isn't really a nation at all, but just a picnic. I won't go so far as that, but I hardly suppose you will be much better pleased if I call it a League of Nations. That is a phrase that you hate, because your President Wilson loves it.

"By the way, I must be very careful how I speak of your President, because you're so sensitive on that subject. You allow yourselves to abuse him as the head of a political party, but if other nations so much as question his omniscience he suddenly becomes the Head of a Sovereign State. An English Cabinet Minister once told me how an American gave vent in conversation to the most violent language in regard to the policy of the President of the day, and when at the end the Englishman very quietly said, 'I am inclined to agree with you,' the American turned on him in a fury, saying: 'Sir, I didn't come here to have my country faulted!'

"However, to return to your League of Nations. In England (where I come from) they are just now reviving a play by Mr. Israel Zangwill, in which, if I recall it rightly, he makes out your country to be the Melting Pot into which every sort of fancy alien type is thrown, and turned out a pattern American citizen, a member of a United Family. I wish I could believe it. It seems to us that your German, even after passing through the Melting Pot, remains a German; that your Irishman, however much he

said Mr. Punch, "but something far, far better for you: something that gives you, among other less serious matters, a record of the way in which we in England, with private troubles of our own no easier than yours to bear, and exhausted with twice as many years of sacrifice in the War of Liberty (whose colossal effort I have just had the pleasure to remark), still try to play an honourable part in that society of nations from which you have apparently resolved, for your better ease and comfort, to cut yourselves off. "Be good enough to accept, in the spirit of benevolence in which I offer it, this copy of my

America's Part.

Speaking of America, I see it is being again urged that, in her own interests, she should cancel our own and other Allied indebtedness. She has, it seems, already more money than she knows what to do with, and to receive even the interest of her loans in goods is going to embarrass her industries more than she cares to contemplate. But she is getting none of my sympathy—and will get no thanks even if she now cancels the loan altogether. As a matter of fact, it should never have existed—ever on paper! Indeed, if a just balance were struck, all the indebtedness would be found on the other side of the ledger—and of the Atlantic. I have no wish to disparage America's services in France—when once her troops got there. But who was the war—which, as she latterly discovered, was hers as well as ours—till America saw fit to come in? And what compensation has she ever offered for all our sacrifices and all we saved her in the interval? No, no. If America really desired to cancel the indebtedness of her late Allies, she might have found lying on her conscience a far better excuse than her present embarrassment of riches.

Not only was America late in taking her share in the common task of civilization, but, in adopting the attitude she did towards the League of Nations, she seemed out of the contract before the job was half finished. What is she going to allow France for all the anxiety and prolonging of the agony caused her by Germany's dilatoriness in disarming in accordance with the terms of the Treaty, to which America was virtually a party with the rest of us?

It is all very well to say that France's fears are groundless. But unfortunately for France, Germany is an uncomfortably near neighbour of hers. We appreciate our own comparative isolation, and in the circumstances, can only regret America's ready splendid distance. In France's place—or ours—she might have been more interested.—"Searchlight" in Glasgow Weekly Herald.

Foreign Fishing Notes.

POLISH FISHERIES WILL BE DEVELOPED. Poland, which now possesses a sea coast, is interested in the development of the fisheries in the adjacent Baltic. Most of the fishing in that quarter has hitherto been of a small and local character. A large company has been established to organize the distribution of fish throughout Poland. It has a capital of 10 million (German).

JAPANESE DIRECT FROM HANKS TO U.S.

The first cargo of Japanese salt codfish of the season arrived at Anacortes, October 21th on the Sobo Maru of the Japanese Fisheries Co. Two more vessels reached the same port November 1st and several others are reported on the way. These schooners came from Yokohama, via the Okhotsk Sea, that is, instead of being regular fish carriers they are fishing vessels operating direct between the Siberian banks and Anacortes.

GOVERNMENT PROMOTING ITALIAN FISHERIES.

The new Secretary of Agriculture,

Michel, has presented to the Italian Parliament a project of law, having in view to promote national fisheries, which have suffered much from the war. The Secretary asks a credit of 20,000,000 liras. Among the measures to be taken in order to promote inner fisheries and to restock the country's fresh waters, we find the establishment of premiums for hatching fish and for restocking waters. It is intended to dispense the sum of 56,400 liras for that purpose in the fiscal year 1919-1920. —Schweizerische Fischer Zeitung.

MAN WHO SAW PHANTOM SCHOONER DEAD.

The funeral of John Winters in Gloucester, Mass., on December 1, recalled an old time fisherman tradition of a modern "Flying Dutchman" and its ghostly crew that were believed to roam the seas in pursuit of a ship that had sent them to the bottom.

Winters was the last survivor of the crew of the Gloucester schooner Charles Haskell, which in a storm in March, 1869, ran down and sank a Salem schooner and its entire crew on Georges Fishing Banks.

Winters and others of the Haskell's crew refused to fish in the ship again, and a new crew was taken on. These returned with a similar story. Another, and still a fourth crew were shipped, but each came to port with a renewal of the story. The Haskell was hauled up, unable to get men, and finished her seagoing as a sand freighter.

LONDON GOSSIP.

DUKE OF YORK GOES TO BRUSSELS.

LONDON, Jan. 28, 1921.

This week the Duke of York is leaving York Cottage, Sandringham, on a special mission to Brussels, to hand King Albert the Distinguished Flying Cross, as the King of the Belgians is to-day easily the foremost of Royal aviators. This honor is an appropriate illustration of the close tie between this country and Belgium. The stay of the Duke of York (who is, by the way, the King's second son) in Brussels will only be short, but arrangements are being organized in his honor. King Albert has long been anxious to receive a State visit in Brussels from our King and Queen, and it may be arranged for this year. So far, however, King George has made no plans for visits to the Continent.

RUMANIA'S DANGER.

Highly sanguine views prevail in Polish circles as to the speedy conclusion of a lasting peace between Poland and the Soviet. There seems little doubt that Moscow will gladly make peace with Warsaw, although for how long is a question perhaps better left unanswered. For the reason of Moscow's conciliatory attitude towards Warsaw is now apparent. Moscow intends to attack Rumania, seizing upon the latter's reannexation of Bessarabia with the approval of the Supreme Council as a Chauvinistic pretext for aggression. The award having been made by the Supreme Council, the latter cannot altogether decline responsibility for the consequences. In these circumstances, M. Take Jonescu's appeal to the Powers is but natural, and his distrust of the simultaneous massing of Magyar troops in Rumania's rear equally justified. One may expect Budapest to levy blackmail if she can.

AIRSHIPS FOR COMMERCIAL SERVICES.

The airships that are to be used by the civil aviation authorities for experiments in commercial work are R-36, R-37, L-71 and L-64. The two latter are, of course, surrendered Zeppelins. L-71 is the largest completed airship in the world. R-36 is now approaching completion at Beardmore's works at Glasgow. She will be the first British airship to be equipped with a passenger saloon and all the accommodation necessary for commercial work. The passenger saloon will hold fifty people, and there will be cooking galley, dining accommodation, and so on. R-37 is in a less advanced state of construction. The experiments are expected to begin early in the present month. There is very little knowledge of the use of airships on long-distance commercial flights, except to some extent in Germany. The first tests will probably take place on the route to Egypt—Malta and back, for instance. The headquarters of this experimental work will be Paulhan, in Norfolk. In addition to the four airships which are to be handed over to the department by the Air Force, R-33 will be lent for experiments in mooring airships to masts, to ascertain exactly how far such methods can take the place of hangers. If the experiments prove the practicability of using airships for the carriage of goods and passengers the services may be started fairly early this year. The airships may be worked by syndicates, or they may be run by the Government department—that is still a controversial question. The officers in charge of the experiments will be Major E. W. Fuller and Major G. H. Scott, who was the captain of the R-34 on her flight to America and back.

TROPICAL DISEASE EXPEDITION.

At the invitation of Lord Milner, as Secretary of State for the Colonies, the London School of Tropical Medicine, which owes its origin to Joseph Chamberlain, is sending an expedition to British Guiana to investigate elephants and to suggest measures for dealing with it, and it will probably be absent for at least twelve months. This terrible disease is caused by lymphatic obstruction, and the parasite is communicated to man by a species of mosquito. Where these are present in large numbers hideous deformity, the result of abnormal swelling of limbs, follows, and though patients may live for many years, a great number succumb to exhaustion due to amputation of the infected parts. Hitherto the treatment adopted has been unsatisfactory and inadequate, and hence the despatch of the special mission to study the disease on the spot.

LAST OF THE WOMEN WAR WORKERS.

One of the changes which Christmas has brought is the disappearance of women from the Post Office sorting offices here. Introduced during the war emergency, they have performed the duties in a manner which some of the officials assert to be more efficient than many of the regular hands. At one time they nearly outnumbered the men in certain of the offices; but

since the Armistice large bodies of them have been displaced on the return of the permanent staffs from the ranks of the army and the navy. Until just before Christmas there were still some hundreds of women employed in the big offices here, and their services have now also been dispensed with in accordance with the policy of the Government in finding jobs for ex-Service men. They have all been under notice for some months, the date for their leaving the Post Office being fixed so that that department might have the advantage of their experience for the early Christmas pressure. I am told that but for the undoubted claims which ex-Service men have upon the State, many of the higher officials have been reluctant to part with the women sorters. The bulk of them had achieved a proficiency and skill in the work which the authorities reckon it will take the majority of ex-Service men many months to attain.

PROFITEERS IN BANKRUPTCY.

War profiteers and speculators are meeting retribution now that the fall in prices has come, and they compose a big proportion of the failures now providing steady and increasing work at the Bankruptcy Court. The almost stereotyped reason given by debtors just now for their failure is the signing of the Armistice, and their subsequently being caught on a falling market with large stocks, unsaleable at anything approximating to cost. In other words, those who embarked in trade on the top of the boom in the hopes of making a speedy fortune are now being squeezed into Court, whilst firms of repute are still carrying on. The trades from which most of the cases come are the drapery, grocery, engineering, and leather trades, the last of which has suffered heavily, and will no doubt be still more heavily hit by the recent failure of a great firm of fur and skin brokers, whose habits, I am informed, are in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000. Failures of limited companies are also on the increase, as is shown by the compulsory winding-up orders which are being made. The majority of the companies affected seem to be in the motor and engineering trades.

THE WAVING OF THE TALL HAT.

Will 1921 see a further decrease in the wearing of the tall hat? There have been one or two rallies during the year, and a plucky attempt was made by a London newspaper to fight the soft hat fashion by coaxing the West End man to wear the sort of hard, squarish hat that clerks of works and tax collectors wear in Northern towns, but without success. The tall hat proper this winter is in a bad way. A peer of the old school counted the tall hats at the House of Lords during the recent full-dress debate, and never got beyond ten. The frock coat gave way to the cut-away, and the cut-away to the black jacket. Will the last be replaced by what the French call un comple and what tailors used to call a suit of "ditto," which are now common even at luncheons of importance? How far rigour in dress has changed in the present century. King Edward once noticed a colonel of the Guards calling at Buckingham Palace to write his name in the book wearing a black jacket suit, and sent him a kindly admonition. Some years previously a well-known sporting baronet was scolded for coming into the Royal enclosure at Ascot races in a short jacket. He appeared the next day in the same offending garment, to which he had tacked the outer sheet of a newspaper, which gave him a full skirt. But the Court was not amused.

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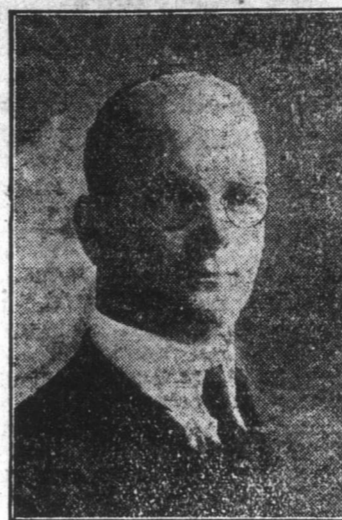
