



#### French Finances

John Bell in the Fortnightly Review: Paradoxical as it may seem, the case of France is pathetic and yet full of hope. Her finances are in a terrible mess. At the time of writing the pound is still worth more than 100 francs. For nine months the Chamber and Senate had been engaged in the task of producing a balanced Budget. France has an internal debt of 150,000,000,000 francs in perpetual and long-term rentes and 130,000,000,000 francs in short term securities. Her foreign debt is of a crushing character. She owes England £600,000,000 and America 4,137,224,350 dollars. Her Budget deficit was 4,000,000,000 francs. France has no trade crisis, no large numbers of unemployed workers to maintain. In fact, she is importing thousands of foreign workmen every week, for her own manual labor is not sufficient for her needs. In a certain measure she is prosperous because she is able to utilize this foreign labor, for M. Caillaux stated in the Chamber the other day that without it industry concerns would have to shut down, with the result that French workers would be laid above in 25c. and 50c. bottles. idle. 

It is wellknown that Canada, South Africa and other nations of the British Empire are averse to a binding European policy, and whatever views readers hold they will agree that General Smuts, who signed the Peace Treaty and is a leading exponent of the League of Nations policy, is a man whose opinion is worthy of serious

"I confess I am profoundly suspicious, not only of the Pact, but also of the policies behind the Pact," General Smuts cables to the Daily News. "It is said that the Pact contains no more than the Covenant of the League of Nations. Then why not be

satisfied with the Covenant?

"Why this insistence on the Pact? And why the jubilations in certain quarters over the Pact? If it is all in the Covenant, let us rest content with the Covenant.

"But in truth there is more in the Pact, or rather behind the Pact. The Pact, like its predecessor, the Protocol, tends to stereotype and entrench the settlement under the peace treaties far more than the Covenant does. "It will encourage the Diehards of the peace settlement to stand more pat than ever.

"Th peaceful reform of intolerable arrangements 'will, in fact, become mpossible; and Europe will be lured to destruction by a false sense of ecurity and solidarity.

"Far rather let Europe grope its way painfully to the light, and a new nternational atmosphere gradually arise under the aegis of the League. "Most of the leading spirits at the Peace Conference recognised the limitations and the transitory character of much of their work, and in the League of Nations they constituted an organ to change, no less than of se

### Sleepy Sickness Peril

ASYLUMS BOARD AND AFTER EFFECTS.

The continued growth of encephalitis lethargica (sleepy sickness) in London, and the serious mental after-effect of the disease among children, have made the question of providing an institution where such cases could be treated an urgent one, states the annual report of the Metropolitan Asylums Board.

The most important of these after-effects have a social bearing "which may bring the patients within the sphere of the criminal law." These effects may follow mild or even unrecognized attacks of the disease.

So pressing has the question become that the board has intimated to the Ministry of Health that it is prepared to undertake the care of these cases, for which no facilities exist at present.

#### America's Newest "Bootleggers"

By KATHLEEN USSHER. America's bootleggers," not content with their enormous profits out of rum-running, have started a subsid-

iary industry. Forty thousand aliens, it has been officially estimated, were smuggled into America last year under a scheme international in scope, which in dramatic interest rivals the exploits of the rum-runners.

An official investigator who recently visited the Caribbean Sea reported to Mr. J. J. Davis, the United States Secretary for Labour, that 10,000 liens are "boot-legged" via Cuba alone at a cost of £2,000,000 a year. They come from all directions and by all means of transportation," he

says. "Huddled in the dark holds of smugglers' vessels, they come with

llicit rum and vile drugs."

The report also states that the vomen make the short crossing from Cuba to Florida as the "wives" of officers in otherwise legitimately oper ated freight and passenger vessels at a cost, including their railway fare into the interior, of from £90 to £100. Passage on fast motor boats is provided at an average cost of £35 a passenger. As these small boats have a capacity of from 10 to 20 people the business is highly profitable. Chinese have to pay the highest fees for passage—from £150 to £200 each-because of the ease with which

they can be detected. Ghastly tales are current as to the fate of some of these unhappy aliens. According to the New York Times, a Chinese in a schooner boarded by inspectors was found concealed in the

"Still more gruesome," it is stated, was the fate of Chinese who were tied in sacks and thrown overboard when a cutter chased the smuggling

A Canary Island half-breed, with two accomplices, took from three to five aliens every week in rowing boats behind Morro Castle, at Havana, under pretence of getting them across to America and murdered them in cold blood, throwing their bodies to the sharks after they had been stripped of valuables.

And 35 skeletons, we are told, are stretched somewhere on the Florida Keys-all that remains of 35 aliens landed there by a smuggler with the assurance that another boat would pick them up and take them to New York. The boat never came.



#### **Tunnel Under Hills**

MEN MEET IN THE CENTRE.

Eight hundred feet below the summit of the picturesque Malvern hills a small army of men were recently able to shake hands and congratulate themselves on having nearly completed the tunnel on which 500 and 600 skilled men have been employed since January 1924. The task will end in the spring of next year.

Just sixty years ago another army of men were building a similar tunnel in exactly the same spot. Both tunnels now run parallel, 41 feet apart, carrying single rail tracks of the Great Western Railway.

The new tunnel is 4.768 feet long. 50 feet longer than the one at present in use. One end opens at the tiny village station of Colwell, and the other at Great Malvern. It is constructed of brick throughout and the foundation is of natural rock with concrete filling.






