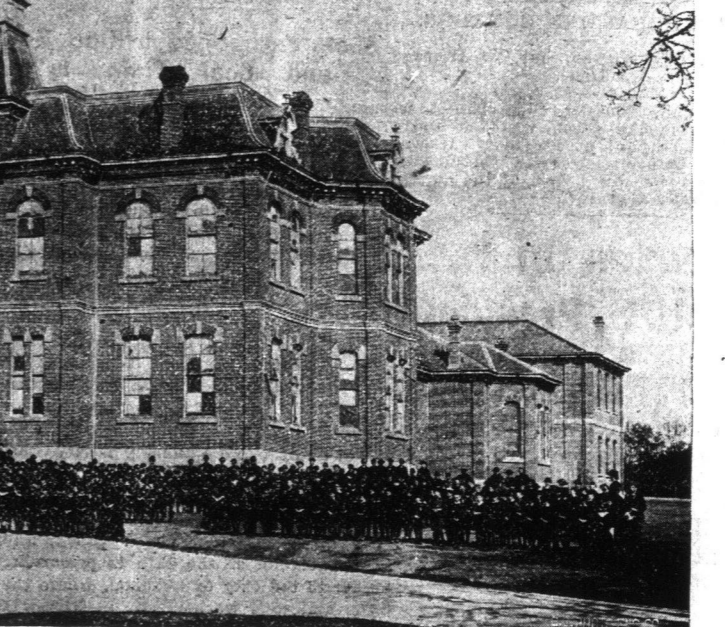

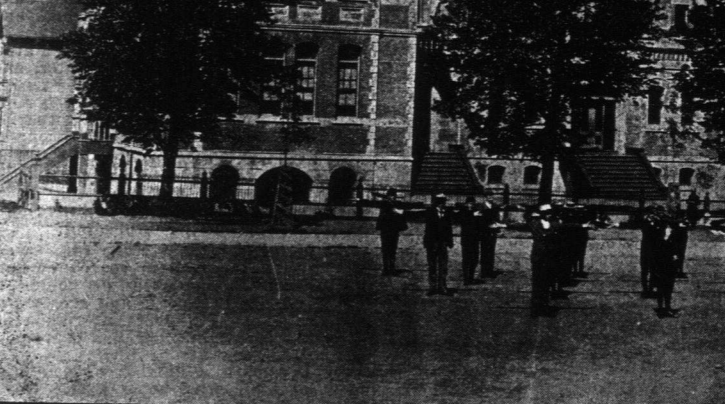

Successful Test of Garretson Pyritic Smelting Furnace at Crofton.

Machine Smelts Ore Direct From Mine Without Roasting or Crushing.

Problem of Treating Low Grade Mt. Sicker Ores Is Solved.

The test of the Garretson pyritic smelting furnace, made at Crofton on Sunday, was quite as successful as anticipated by the gentlemen interested. It must be remembered that Saturday's trial of the Garretson furnace was not a "show" by the Crofton smelters, but a serious test of the working of the furnace in which the proprietors of the Crofton smelter have only such an interest as all practical metallurgists have in a new process which promises to revolutionize the treatment of ores. The furnace does not require roasting or crushing, and the test would have demonstrated an unqualified success had it not been for an unforeseen accident which did not occur in the furnace and for which it was in no way responsible.

The Garretson furnace demonstrated that it could smelt very low grade ores without previous roasting or crushing, with the least possible consumption of fuel, that it could reduce the low grade ore to a very rich matte, and that it was on the point of converting the matte into pig copper when the accident occurred. Enough was done, however, to convince all concerned that the furnace is capable of performing all the work claimed for it when it is in perfect running order.

The furnace also did a trick which has been held an impossibility by metallurgists—reduced to matte, without fluxes, low grade ore very richly impregnated with sulfur. This was an end in itself, and it is the possibility of smelting the low grade ores of Mount Sicker at a fair profit and assures the success of copper mining on Vancouver Island.

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MAY SEVER Relations

Great Britain Has More Trouble With the Quarrelsome Republic.

London, Sept. 22.—The Associated Press is in a position to announce that the relations between Great Britain and Venezuela are on the verge of being severed. Almost an hour after the announcement that the British minister at Caracas has been given his passport with correspondence in his hands, the cause of the crisis does not seem to be a mere question of passports, but consists in various difficulties which culminated in Venezuela assuming a more satisfactory position in leaving Downing street fully informed of the belief that the Venezuelan government was contemplating an action of a crucial nature. That a diplomatic rupture would result in hostilities is a contingency which is severely contemplated.

FIERY SOUTH AMERICANS TAKE A RECKLESS VIEW OF MONROE DOCTRINE.

The view of the foreign office is that affairs have reached a stage where it is impossible to continue the negotiations in Venezuela, in any manner which the foreign office has any hope of success. The United States minister at Caracas, Herr Bowen, announcing that the Venezuelan government was contemplating an action of a crucial nature, against the British flag being raised on the Gulf of Paria, and the United States government understanding Patois island as well as Trinidad and so on, as known by the world, as to its ownership has ever arisen. Recently the British government has been shot or otherwise injured through the action of Venezuelans.

ALIENS VOTED IN VANCOUVER ON SATURDAY—RAID ON GAMBLING HOUSES.
