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A PROPOSAL TO SETTLE.

ENGLAND ASKS RUSSIA TO AGREE TO ABSTINENCE.

Whether the Agreement of March 16 Has Been Broken or Not, is Left to a Crowned Head to Decide.

LONDON, April 30.—In the house of lords this afternoon Earl Granville received a telegram had been received from Gen. Lomaxon contradicting the reports of a Russian advance to Metchik.

In the house of commons this afternoon Lord Fitzmaurice said the government were as yet without information of the second engagement between the Afghans and Russians, and believed the Afghans still held Bala Murghal.

Lord Harrington stated that since the hospital had decided to revise the policy to be pursued in the case of an epidemic in correspondence with the British diplomatic representative at Cairo and Lord Wolsey.

Russia's Latest.

Moscow, April 30.—The Gazette says if England wishes to avoid war she must evacuate Port Hamilton at the entrance to the Gulf of Japan, otherwise Russia will be obliged to occupy Herak.

JOHN BULL'S BIG POCKET.

A Series of Heavy Budgets—How They are to be Met—The Income Tax and Certain Duties to be Increased.

LONDON, April 30.—In the house of commons this afternoon the budget of 1884-1885 was submitted. It shows a deficit of £1,040,000.

The government did not propose to cover the whole of the deficit but to propose to let the whole charge fall upon property.

It is proposed to raise the income tax to eight pence in the pound. The expenditure for the past year was £38,000,000 over the estimates.

The revenues from customs and excise showed steady progress, indicating a recovery of the country.

The present government had paid all the charges demanded of the late government including £5,000,000 given to the Indian government.

The common law is being agreed to the budget resolutions.

The bill relating to industrial schools in Ireland passed the house of commons.

The Telegraph says the budget is acceptable in principle.

An Unpleasant Announcement.
