The Dominion Revised Statutes.

We have just received a copy of "The Revised Statutes of Canada," which is the first revision and consolidation since Confederation. It is a work which was very much meeded on account of the various amendments and changes which the laws of the Dominion have undergone since 1867. It was a very difficult tax for anyone, when looking up the law in any particular case, to take it at its commencement and follow it through its various amendments, and perhaps it would be found that the old consolidated statutes of the Province of Canada must be made the basis of research; and there was the further difficulty of determining whether part of one amending act was not impliedly repealed by another amendment without being directly wiped off the Statute Book; whereas all that is necessary to be done now is to find the chapter bearing on any particular subject, and there will be found its complete law, and many doubts which formerly existed as to what was or was not the law will be set at rest.

These statutes were promulgated by royal proclamation and came into force on March I.





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
