The Sixty Million People. The advocates of Commercial Union and of Unrestricted Reciprocity between Canada and the United States are driven to the constant use of such quotations for different articles of farm produce, selected by themselves as special dates and as particular American markets, and used to show the comparative advantage of their policy.

Every effort is being made to delude Canadian farmers by special partial and unbalanced statements, through which disinterested persons are misled to obtain a false and incorrect view of the relative merits of the two policies, which, although differing in name, are identical in meaning and purpose.

The Republican platform, adopted at the Chicago convention, is before the public, and the Democratic platform, adopted by the St. Louis convention two weeks ago. This time we do not propose to make any elaborate comparison of the two, but merely to draw attention to one point, wherein they stand forth in most conspicuous contrast to each other.

It is not our purpose herein to try to prove that the Republican platform is better than the Democratic one, but to show that the latter is not so good as it is made to appear.

At the alleged superiority of United States markets over those of Canada for farm produce, we would not write the extension of Commercial Union and especially of our farmers to a few quotations from the annual report of the Milwaukee Board of Trade.

The quotations submitted give the range from the lowest to the highest prices paid in Milwaukee markets during the four months referred to.

Flour, 100 lbs. super and 100 lbs. extra, 2.00 to 2.20. Corn, 100 lbs. No. 2, 1.00 to 1.10. Barley, 100 lbs. No. 2, 1.00 to 1.10. Clover seed, 100 lbs., 4.00 to 4.25. Butter per lb., 15 to 20. Live stock, the range from good to choice in cattle, and to good in sheep.

The report furnishes a table showing the average price of wheat in several western states.

1888, 1886, 1887. Kansas, 1.00 to 1.10. Nebraska, 1.00 to 1.10. Dakota, 1.00 to 1.10.

The above Milwaukee quotations afford a very fair criterion for comparison with the prices of Canadian farmers under proposed commercial annexation to the United States.

It is an easy matter to theorize as to the importance of wheat production to a market of 60,000,000 people, but it is a fact that this market is more than fully supplied from its own production.

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With the report above that there was plenty of barley for all the requirements of the brewing trade. The barley market on this continent shows a steady decline from the earlier prices of the season.

Notwithstanding all this, it still remains true that the Democratic tariff plank of this year was adopted only after a long and arduous struggle.

An incident which happened at a dinner party of gentlemen recently is worth setting down for the reflection.




THE REPUBLICANS' MOSES

NINTH YEAR.

HAS NOT YET APPEARED TO THE CHICAGO CONVENTION.

Only Two Ballots on Saturday—Sherman and Harrison Apparently Killed Off—Crawford's Friends Hope to See Bestly—Will it be Blaine?—A Dark Horse.

CHICAGO, June 22.—The Republican National Convention was called to order at 10:00 this morning, but it was not until a few minutes later that the proceedings were formally opened by Chairman Eatee calling upon Senator Warner Miller of New York to preside over its deliberations.

Prayer was offered by Bishop Samuel Fallows of Chicago and the convention then proceeded to ballot for its president. It was expected that the most important contest would be between Mr. McKinley of Ohio. As soon as this announcement was made Mr. McKinley was seen to rise in his seat. Amid the most impressive silence he proceeded to make a statement. He said:

"I am here as one of the chosen representatives of my State. I am here by a resolution of the Republican Convention passed without one dissenting voice, commanding me to cast my vote for John Sherman and use every worthy endeavor for the nomination of Mr. Eatee as our candidate for president."

"I do not request, I demand, that no delegate should be permitted to cast his vote for any man not insensible to the honor they would do me, but in the presence of the duty resting upon me, I cannot remain silent with respect to John Sherman. I have no personal animosity against him, but I believe that the State whose credentials I bear and which he has trusted me to represent, has a right to be heard in its own defense. I cannot consistently with my own views of my personal integrity, consent to permit my name to be used as a candidate before the convention."

"I would not respect myself if I could find in my heart to do, to say, or permit to be done, that which would give offense to any one to whom I have devoted my life. I do not request, I demand, that no delegate should be permitted to cast his vote for any man not insensible to the honor they would do me, but in the presence of the duty resting upon me, I cannot remain silent with respect to John Sherman. I have no personal animosity against him, but I believe that the State whose credentials I bear and which he has trusted me to represent, has a right to be heard in its own defense. I cannot consistently with my own views of my personal integrity, consent to permit my name to be used as a candidate before the convention."

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
