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KING OF THE ROAD. New York, April 29.—Now that J. Pierpont Morgan has bridged the ocean with his ship track and takes the first steps towards commercially annexing Europe to America, the old world is in a pass which plans to bring all the earth under American control.

So absolute has become that while he is personally worth perhaps more than a hundred million dollars, corporations over which he has control possess more wealth than there is gold in all the earth.

The total capitalization of all the companies he controls is \$4,477,429,000—and in all the gold, coined or uncoined, in all the nations, including the papal mint, is estimated at \$4,841,600,000.

More than a million men are employed by the companies Mr. Morgan controls. Here are some of the concerns in which he has a controlling interest that are considered Morgan properties: Besides these, there are scores of others in which he owns stock, but does not pretend to control.

Northern Securities Company \$400,000,000; Northern Pacific \$350,000,000; Great Northern \$22,000,000; Burlington \$306,000,000; Reading \$320,000,000; Southern \$300,000,000; Louisville and Nashville \$170,000,000; Erie \$350,000,000; Lehigh Valley \$175,000,000; Total \$4,841,600,000.

Washington, April 30.—Attorney-General Knox has made the following statement regarding the beef trust: "On April 4th this department directed A. Day of Washington, in his capacity as special assistant to the Attorney-General to examine into and report upon the public charges of the effect that a combination of the large meat dealers in the United States had been formed in violation of the provisions of the laws of the United States."

The promoters of the Atlantic shipping trust have a gigantic combination of ocean-going interests in their hands, and the perfection of the scheme, while it is claimed it will have no international significance, will be a peculiarly constructed link in American and European trading concerns.

The Morgan shipping trust controls practically every line of steamers of any importance in the Atlantic passenger or freight traffic, and owns by right of purchase the bulk of these carriers.

—The fate of the Webb-Meyer syndicate in its exploitation of Canadian industrialists shows that a capitalization of millions of dollars does not always prove the strength of a corporation.

—The true value of the properties held by the syndicate in Canada has not yet been ascertained.

—The cargo of the steamer Dalton Hall, which carried the last of the season's apple crop to the English market, sold in London at an average of about fifteen shillings.

—The two top-mast schooner Lizzie, Capt. Gillin, arrived here yesterday from Port Hood, C. B., with a cargo of one hundred and eleven tons of coal for J. H. Longmire & Son.

—Mr. E. H. Dalry, manager of the Stephen & Ramsdell Musical Concert and Comedy Co., was in town yesterday making arrangements for his company which plays here Friday night.

—Your taxes must be paid by Friday if you want to vote on the question of extending the water system to Cadzow's Corner, Tomareze is the last day for receiving discount on their payment.

—St. John Telegraph: It is stated that the lease of Mossopark Park held for this season by Mr. J. S. McEiverson is to be transferred to Dr. Fred Johnson, as Mr. McEiverson will shortly leave for Halifax, having accepted a position in a managerial capacity with the Halifax Transfer Company.

—Only one tender for the erection of a brick school building was received up to noon on Monday, and it is reported by several sources that the sum voted for the purpose of the plans approved by the school board show an up-to-date building with probably the best method of heating and ventilation, and which could not be obtained without considerable increased expenditure. It is up to the ratepayers to decide between a little increase of taxation or a cheaper building.

—Those who listened to Prof. Kidner in the Council Chamber last Wednesday evening felt that no mistake would be made in providing for a department of Manual Training in the schools here, no local and convincing words that gentleman's remarks on the subject. An interesting discussion followed the lecture, in which the manner of introducing and operating such a branch of work here was fully explained. It is the intention, if possible to co-operate with the towns of Annapolis and Bear River, as one teacher could cover the whole field of instruction.

—St. John Globe: John Woodworth of the Bear River packet, Citizen by right at the North Wharf, Market Slip, told a reporter on Wednesday that the family of his brother, Capt. Elias Woodworth, living at Port George, Woodworth, had had a very narrow escape from the Bear River when it was wrecked on the ill-fated Bear River, was also no stranger to those connected with the Nova Scotia schooner trade in this city. The tale in which the Bear River is supposed to have been wrecked and foundered, is said to have been one of the forest in the Bay of Fundy for years.

—A despatch from Ottawa last Thursday says: "The contract for the Dominion subsidy for the Middleton and Victoria Beach railway was signed here yesterday and the contract with the provincial government will be signed next week. Mr. O. T. Danby, the Secretary of the company, is now in Halifax, making necessary arrangements, and Mr. O'Brien, the contractor, is expected to arrive here in a few days when work will immediately begin at Middleton. The contract between the company and the government calls for the completion of the road by December 31st, 1903. Operations will probably reach Bridgetown by the month of August, and the contractor is confident of finishing the work before the date set by the government."

—London, May 7.—There are gloomy prophecies as to the Outlook in India. Both the plague and the famine appear to be worse than ever and the untimely deaths and diseases with even greater horrors than during the recent famine and disease. The plague has now spread over upper India in an alarming manner and is especially virulent in the Punjab. Efforts in the earlier stages to stamp it out by measures involving coercion were entirely ineffectual, which threatened to become so serious that the supreme government was forced to interfere with the local authorities.

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CONCERT BY PUPILS OF THE BLIND SCHOOL

Not often does a larger or more enthusiastic audience gather in Bridgetown that filled the Court House to hear the entertainment given by the pupils of the School for the Blind, Halifax, under the direction of Dr. and Mrs. Fraser and Miss Allison. The object of the concert being to acquaint the audience with the work done in the school, the program was somewhat unique and we venture to say, the most interesting for that reason. A number of musical selections were given, including solos, vocal and instrumental, duets, quartets, and solo recitations by the band. These in themselves were excellent and worthy of hearty applause but the knowledge that these young people have been trained to play these instruments so proficiently without the advantage of sight, heightened the appreciation and doubled the applause. Dr. Fraser gave an interesting account of the history of the school, and in order to show what they did in the way of practical education, conducted several exercises in which pupils showed as great a familiarity with the subject as our own pupils of the school, towards the support of the institution, one member of the auxiliary association was obtained and it is hoped that by means of the collecting cards and booklets distributed, about another hundred may be raised. Dr. Fraser and party spoke highly of the kindness and hospitality of the town here, and all seemed pleased with their visit, including the boys who on leaving the train gave three hearty cheers for Bridgetown.

AGREEMENT IN RE WATER EXTENSION.

And whereas the said Commissioners are desirous of acquiring the right to supply the said town of Carleton's Corner with water from the water system of the said town of Bridgewater.

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ST. PIERRE A BURIED CITY.

St. Thomas, D. W. I., May 9—It is now estimated that forty thousand persons perished as a result of the fourth volcanic eruption in the Island of Martinique. It is rumored in steamship circles that the Morse syndicate which now controls the various lines running to Maine ports and St. John, is also in possession of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island business, for which it is willing to pay, it is said, \$200,000.

As a result of the recent tuberculosis conference two gentlemen have offered to build sanatoria in Canada at their own expense. One is Sir William Mackenzie, who has a sanatorium at one near Montreal, and the other is Mr. W. C. Edwards, M. P., whose sanatorium is at Ottawa.

A bill has been introduced into parliament respecting the great fire which broke out in the city of Ottawa. This bill enlarges the commission established under the Washington act of the north policy, by which the Dominion pays \$50,000 a year for beautifying and improving the city of Ottawa.

It is now proposed to add four members to the number appointed by the Dominion government, who may not be resident in Ottawa necessarily.

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NEWS OF THE WORLD.

The Dominion government will ask for permission to vote \$5,000 for the sufferers from the Martinique disaster. Six hundred seats have been placed at the disposal of the Canadian at the C. Vancouver, at a cost of ten shillings per day.

It is estimated that 30,000 Norwegians have sailed to America this year—double the number for the same period last year.

WATER SUPPLY AND STORAGE IN THE SOIL. Much study has been given to the question of the quantity of water necessary to maintain satisfactory growth of plants.

It is fair to enquire whether experiments justify the statement that all large conserves moisture. Many investigations along this line have been carried on, and I will mention only one or two as illustrative.

It is generally understood that when over the hilling of a soil is increased the water holding capacity is increased. So far, then, as water is concerned, soils which are liable to be dried by the liberal application of farm manure, or by the addition of vegetable matter, are other things equal, better than those which are not.
