



WATER SUPPLY AND STORAGE IN THE SOIL | Something should be said conce

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lowed to he in this compacted condi-tiong until late in the season. the loss of water is enormous. This indicates, in a general way, that the cu,tivation of the soil in the spring should be at the earliest date when this can be done without producing an undesir-able merhanical condition because of over wetness. Prof. King of Wisconsin gives instances where comparison has been made between the effect of early and late spring plowing, upon soil moisture. In his book on 'soils' he mentions one instance where a soil plowed April 28 was compared with one plowed May 6; the former was found to contain later in the season over nine inches more water in the upper four feet than the latter, a most important difference. In another experiment' performed by Prof. King, one plat of soil was plowed April 12 and another May 12, which resulted in a retention of 420,000 pounds more of water in the upper three feet ofthe early plowed than in the same volume of the later plowed. This is, of course to be kept up to a generous percent-age. It is probable that a clay soil starts in the spring at the point of saturation, and if the rainfall during the growing season which actually percolates the soil to the area where it men the utilized by the roots of percolates the soli to the area where it may be utilized by the roots of growing plants is from 12 to 15 in-ches, satisfactory plants may be pro-duced. 
