DEATH OF WM. G. MURDOCH The Well-Known Lawyer Dies in Grace Hospital. POST-MORTEM AND INQUEST Suffered from Wound in the Eye Received in Fencing.

There Were No Other Marks of Injury—Frank Lockwood Tells How They Fenced in the Cae Howell With Umbrellas—Mr. Murdoch Was a Lunge and Received the Injury—Dr. Strath's Testimony—What Occurred at the Bowling Green—Inquest Adjourned Till Wednesday—Mr. Murdoch's Clever Career.

The well-known barrister, W. G. Murdoch, died yesterday morning in Grace Hospital in this city. On Wednesday afternoon he was taken to the hospital suffering from a wound in the eye which he had received during the previous evening in a friendly fencing bout with umbrellas whilst in the Cae Howell Hotel.

A post-mortem was held yesterday afternoon and an inquest at the Hospital at night. The wound on the eye. The only mark of violence on the body was that on the left eye, more definitely between the eye-ball and the eyebrow. The attendants stated that it was badly swollen when the body was taken to the Hospital.

Dr. P. J. Strath, deposed that he had seen the deceased in the morning when he saw deceased the latter had been light of what had happened and Mr. Murdoch had been fencing with umbrellas and Lockwood's umbrella had come into the eye of deceased. He had taken the injured man to Matheson's room in the Cae Howell.

INTERESTS OF TORONTO

Discussed Before the Railway Committee.

LANSLOWNE-AVE. CROSSING

to be Spanned by a Wooden Bridge for Pedestrians.

Bay-Street Crossings to be Protected by Gates and Watchmen and Full Width Sidewalks to be Laid.

York-Street Bridge to be Looked Into by Mr. Schreiber, the Government Engineer, and Fixed Up According to His Plans—Lengthy Session of the Committee.

Ottawa, July 2.—(Special.)—The city of Ottawa was much in evidence before the Railway Committee of the Privy Council to-day.

Much time was spent in discussing the city's application to re-open the Lansdowne-avenue crossing case.

The previous order of the committee imposed the obligation on the city to maintain gates and watchmen.

Mr. Blair asked what, under original agreement, the C. P. R. would have to pay.

Judge Clark replied that the company could put in a crossing at small expense, but then the question would arise as to what protection should be given.

Mr. Blair said, supposing a road was laid out and the crossing used, and the question of protection came up, what would Judge Clark say would be the relative proportion of the cost of protection?

Judge Clark replied that if he were driven into that corner he would point out that there was no necessity for protection for one road, but that it was due to the multiplicity of roads that protection was needed.

Mr. Blair announced that the committee did not consider there was any necessity for a bridge for vehicular traffic, but that they would order a wooden bridge for foot passengers as necessary for public purposes.

The application of the city of Toronto for an order directing that protection be provided at the crossing of Bay-street by the G. T. R. and the C. P. R. is next taken up.

The city's application was for gates and watchmen, and that the roadway be planned the full width between and across the tracks.

Judge Clark said the company was willing to resist an order made by the committee, but would ask that, first of all, the city should pass a bylaw declaring the continuation of Bay-street south from the Esplanade into the bay a public street.

Mr. Fullerton strongly resisted this stipulation. He said he had no instructions to concede this.

After some further discussion, in which Judge Clark admitted that he was looking ahead in the matter of future applications for protection, along the Esplanade, the committee decided that the city's request was not reasonable and made the order accordingly.

Next came the city's application for a change of grade on the York-street bridge. Mr. Fullerton said the desire was that the bridge be so changed as to take out the level space a portion of the way down the incline.

Judge Clark first raised the point of lack of jurisdiction on the part of the committee, but on this being overruled contended that in the original plans this level space had been purposefully put there to afford a resting place for horses drawing heavy loads.
