

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IS THIS THE KIDNAPER? Sheriff of Dallas, Texas, Has a Prisoner Who Says He Helped to Steal Young Cudahy.

Protection Has Beaten Out Free Trade—The Supremacy Passing From Free Trade England to Protectionist Countries—One-Sided Preferential Trade Unfair to Canada—The Difference Between the Two Parties in Canada on Fiscal Policy as Outlined by the Member for East York.

Ottawa, March 21.—Mr. W. F. Macdougall rose in the House at 4.30 this afternoon to continue the debate on the amendment of Mr. Borden to the Minister of Finance's motion, that the House go into Committee of Supply. Mr. Borden's amendment was:

That, in the opinion of this House, the welfare of this country requires a pronounced policy of adequate protection and encouragement at all times, to the labor, to the industries, to the mining and other industrial interests of Canada.

That, in the opinion of this House, the adoption of a policy of mutual trade preference within the Empire would prove of great benefit to the Mother Country and to the colonies, and would greatly promote the progress of the Empire as a whole.

And that the present time, when the Commonwealth of Australia is laying the foundation of its fiscal system, is particularly opportune for taking prompt and energetic steps towards the furtherance of this object.

The House is further of opinion that equivalent or adequate duties should be imposed on the raw materials and products and manufactures of countries not within the Empire, in those cases where such countries fail to admit Canadian products and manufactures upon fair terms for this purpose all such available measures as may be found necessary.

House. Not only does he denounce the National Policy in that statement, but he is perforce made to denounce all those instruments of protection which I have already set out. But his present position is the result of those precepts which he has laid down. Let us take some of the means that I have enumerated in connection with protection, and see where he and his party are. Speaking of the duties on the great instruments of protection. Does he use them? Having condemned them, has he removed them from the statutes of this country? Are the protectionist instruments pure and simple. Take the other instruments of protection, trade barriers and drawbacks, bounties on production, bounties on exports, rebates on exports, the prohibition of exports, such as the right hon. gentleman's friends in Ontario have adopted in regard to exportation of logs and wharves. The hon. member of the Interior (Mr. Sifton) proposes to adopt in connection with logs cut on Indian reserves, like reciprocity, a system of bounties and drawback on steamship trade agents' profits of profit, but selling them abroad. Has he not employed every one of these engines of protection under the so-called revenue tariff of his party? He is either a bogus free trader, or a protectionist who is ashamed to admit that he is a protectionist. When he is to come to them, but all of the others he has employed, and yet he says he is a revenue tariff man. Now, what is the difference to a degree between the two parties? The tariff which he proposes today, and the one which he proposed when it was introduced into this country, is the difference between the old and the new tariff was seventy-one hundredths of one per cent., or something less than that. The right hon. gentleman claims that there is a marked distinction between the two parties, will anyone tell what the difference in degree is to the incidence of the two tariffs?

One says that free trade as they have it in England is far away, and the other tells us only that if they have protection it will only be by the exercise of continual vigilance. FROM A LABORER TO A SENATOR
RISE OF AN OLD ONTARIO BOY

Born in Woodstock, Oxford County, Thirty-nine Years Ago. He Has Carved Out for Himself in Utah a Unique Career—Present Postoffice Address—

A big, muscular, fanned-shirted and broad-shouldered young Irishman was toiling up a steep hill in Park City, Utah, about 30 years ago, carrying some heavy timbers on his back. They weighed enough to tax even his brawn, and he was perspiring and puffing when the owner of one of the Park City mines stopped in passing to say:

"Hello, Tom, why don't you get a pack mule instead of being one yourself?"

"It's better for a poor man to be his own pack mule now and ride in a carriage later," was the reply.

That was "Tom," who now wears a common miner's cap. He was digging over eight hours a day.

Evening in a cabin not much better than a shanty, and spending most of his time in the "hole," he was working on his own.

Six years later there was a National Republican convention at St. Louis, at which there was a fierce fight over the adoption of a plank favoring the free coinage of silver.

The plank was defeated, and a body of Western delegates left the convention in Utah, one of the millionaire miners of Park City.

"Tom," by this time, was able to ride in his own carriage, but his ambitions had rarely begun to be assuaged. He made investments in many mines and added rapidly to his already vast fortune; for his claim had developed into one of the richest silver and gold mines in the world.

When Mr. Keenan gave \$50,000 to found an orphanage in Salt Lake City, and \$10,000 toward the building of a great new cathedral, he began to get a reputation for liberality. But the general public was interested in him still as only a millionaire—lucky, but "only a mil-

lionaire," even though he began to build a marble palace in Salt Lake City as his "millionaire's palace."

"Tom" was rapidly leaving the intricacies of business politics. It became his pride to be continually taken as a joke, and he set out to show the people that he was a great deal more than "only a mil-

lionaire." He succeeded.

When it was rumored during the summer that "Tom" Keenan would like to be United States senator, the report passed as a joke of the same order as other stories about him. The politicians patted him on the back, told him what a fine senator he would make, and there was a contribution to this or that campaign fund would help his chances—and he would win, they were willing to bet each other.

The people in general smiled at the idea of "sending a common miner" to the Senate, and laughed heartily at some of his campaign speeches.

"Tom" made a formal announcement of his candidacy. Fitted against him were some of the most influential men in the state. The candidates were a brilliant lawyer and an experienced politician, who was making his light on his previous record in the Senate. Another was a millionaire banker and powerful business man, and another was a prominent politician.

Still another candidate had the support of a coalition that for years had ruled the party in the state. There were half a dozen other aspirants, and the winner, in making their predictions as to the result of the balloting, placed the miner at the bottom of the list.

All the prophecies were ludicrously astray. The first ballot in the legislative caucus showed astounding strength for Mr. Keenan. On succeeding ballots he gained vote after vote that the other candidates had tried in vain to secure.

He stopped laughing at him. The final ballot showed that Thomas Keenan, "only a miner," had won the senatorship. He had overcome the shrewdest and most experienced politicians in the state.

Such, in outline, is the unique career of Senator Thomas Keenan, who has arisen in 10 years from laborer to law-maker, and in less than 30 years from his mine in the little town of Woodstock, Ont. He is the only senator from the West who has a career as a miner. He was a farm hand in Nebraska. Now, among other things, he is a director in a newly organized railroad company, and is president of the construction company that is to build the road.

In entering upon his career in Washington, Senator Keenan carries the handicap of his lack of schooling, but he is starting out with his customary determination to win. He has no other obstacles. One of his first acts after his election was to personally his campaign manager, who is a successful lawyer and former newspaper man, to accompany him to Washington to advise him on the legal phases of the matters that might come up for his action or vote.

WAR EAGLE'S TWO BIG SUITS

Over the Installation of its Old Plant Soon to Come on for Trial at Roseland.

A RAILWAY TO THE MORRISON.

Winnipeg and Brandon and Golden Crown—Sales and Quotations on Mining Issues.

At the next sitting of the Supreme Court, about the middle of April, in Roseland, will be heard two suits brought by the War Eagle Mining Company against the Canadian General Electric Company and the James Cooper Manufacturing Company. In each instance consequential and other damages approximating \$100,000 are sought to be recovered from the respective defendants for supplying alleged defective machinery. The contract price of the last and most important of the suits is \$100,000; that of the James Cooper Manufacturing Company the contract called for a compressor to cost \$25,000.

Thus it will be seen that the War Eagle people are not basing their claims so much on the recovery of the cost of the various plants as for damages alleged to have been sustained through the inability of the mine in consequence to maintain the former standard of shipments. There will be an imposing array of counsel on both sides. In all likelihood the suit against the James Cooper Company will be heard first.

In War Eagle v. The Canadian General Electric Company, Messrs. Daly & Hamilton will represent the defendants. Counsel for the plaintiff company will be the same as in the preceding case.

Brandon and Golden Crown. A plan has just been perfected whereby the treasury of the Brandon & Golden Crown Mining Company will be restored and will enable operations to be resumed shortly on an extensive scale.

Owing to the slump in mining shares in Eastern Canada the directors were unable to dispose of any more treasury stock and in consequence operations were suspended last November. Prior to that date considerable ore shipments to the Trail smelter had been made. The freight and treatment rate was such that the directors did not feel justified in paying it any longer, especially as the smelter company declined to reduce the figure unless a contract for a specified tonnage was entered into or unless the entire output of the mine was sent to Trail for one year at a fixed rate. The re-organization just effected has taken a different form from that usually adopted. Instead of the company being reconstructed and made amenable as in the practice, the original subscribers have entered into a written agreement in virtue of which they have agreed to contribute or surrender to the treasury 40 per cent. of their original holdings; and as the treasury stock has been in a pool since 1887, this agreement was thus more easily accomplished as the promoter's stock was not scattered. By the plan adopted by the promoters two important things have been accomplished: First, the treasury of the company has been increased to 400,000 shares of an extra assessment. The extra assessment has thus shown evidence of their good faith as well as their opinion of the future of the property. The treasury on hand and the 40 per cent. contributed by the original subscribers will bring the shares in the treasury to 400,000. Negotiations for the sale of a large block of the treasury are now in progress, and the proceeds will not only be sufficient to pay off the floating debt, but will provide sufficient funds for working capital; so that when ore shipments are resumed it will be on a permanent basis. The mine will also enjoy the advantage of shipping to the Mother Lode or Pyritic smelters at Greenwood at rates considerably lower than those formerly paid at Trail; in fact the sum representing the difference between what was paid at Trail and the figure quoted by the Greenwood reduction plants will in itself represent a handsome profit—Roseland Miner.

MORRISON HAS A RAILWAY.

The work commenced the first of this week. The C.P.R. holds the road under conditions as to tonnage, the actual payment for same being guaranteed by Morrison Mines, Limited, and Standard Pyritic Smelter Co. The spur will be a mile and a quarter long, and will have a depth of 226 feet. Regarding the Morrison mine, Andrew Ledlaw, manager of the Pyritic Smelting Company, who was largely instrumental in securing for the mine transportation facilities, stated tonight that this company had entered into a contract with the Morrison Mines, Limited, to mine and extract all ore to a depth of 226 feet. His company has engaged the services of Joe Trainor, formerly Le Roi mine superintendent, who will have charge of this work. Concurrently, the Morrison Company continues development made at that depth, and is sinking a shaft from the tunnel level. The mine is down 45 feet in solid copper gold ore, and Mr. Trainor stated that the mine, from all appearances, is in a position, when the stopes are opened, to send down to the smelter fully 3000 tons a month. Mr. Trainor starts his work in erecting one bin and making preparation for opening stopes, pending the completion of the spur. The Standard Pyritic Smelter has also obtained a working option on the control of the stock of the Heligon Gold and Copper Mining Company. Formerly superintendent Oxley has been re-employed by the smelter company, and is continuing development at Heligon. Shipments were resumed yesterday. Five four-horse teams were engaged hauling ore. While the shipping lasts about 60 tons daily will be shipped from the Winnipeg spur. Initial shipments of Boundary mine to the Pyritic Smelter the past week were made by Little Hertha, two cars; Surprise, Nelson, Washington, one; Marguerite, one; Riverside, one.

Lethbridge Coal Mines.

From Roseland Miner. Mr. P. L. Macdonald, general manager of the Great Coal mines at Lethbridge, N.W.T., accompanied by Mr. W. P. Murray, general manager for British Columbia, with headquarters at Nelson, was in town yesterday conferring with the local agents, Martin Bros. Mr. Murray stated that the output of the production now having reached over 600 tons a day. Employment is given 3000 men. The coal is both a lignite and a bituminous. It is used on the C.P.R. for firing purposes as far east as Brandon, Manitoba, and along the Crowfoot line and the Boundary section. A large portion of the output is also shipped to the United States, a railway line owned by the company extending north to Great Falls, a point on the Great Northern. The coal is also largely used for domestic purposes. Mr. Murray added that it was also available for seeding purposes, but, of course, did not rival the Crow's Nest article. He expressed the hope that the sales of his company in British Columbia this year will exceed 100,000 tons, and visitors, during their stay here, were shown thru the mines by Mr. William C. Martin.
