NEW CORPS CALLED CANADIAN YEOMANRY COMMANDER SENATE PO INS NOW IN OTTAWA

Recruiting in Ontario Takes Place on Dec. 9 to | 11, Inclusive-This Province Expected to Raise 169.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—During the four days, Dec. 9, 10, 11 and 12, a mounted force of nearly 600 men, for service in South Africa, will be recruited at different points thruout the Dominion. The force will be called the "Canadian Yeomanry." The orders for the enlistment of this force were issued from headquarters this evening. Militia Orders.

The orders read: "His Majesty's government, having signified their pleasure to accept the offer of Canada to raise a corps of mounted troops for service in South Africa, a regiment, to be known as the Canadian Yeomanry,' and clothed, armed and equipped as the Imperial Yeomanry of His Majesty's regular army, will be organized, under the command of Colonel T. D. B. Evans, C.B., commanding Canadian Mounted Rifles, as hereunder:

Plan Could Not Succeed. If Britain were dependent upon any single country or closely allied group of countries for her food supply, said Prof Shortt, there might, in certain extreme contingencies, be an attempt to cripple her by cutting off her food supply. But, under present conditions, any attempt to starve her by one combination would afford an excellent opportunity for another combination to reap a handsome profit from supplying her with food, at prices somewnat higher than normal.

In the present trouble in South Africa, it was shown that the well-nigh universal hostility of European nations to Great Britain did not extend to the exportation of anything they could sell to Great Britain, even that which would help her in her struggle.

Self-Interest Always First. Ships Outpriced Now.

The Supreme Treasurer, H. A. Collins, returned this week, after a very successful tour through Maine and New York, in each of which States he delivered a number of addresses in commection with the work of the order. The reports from these States show Independent Forestry to be in a flourishing condition in that part of the jurisdiction of the I.O.F. voted a sum of £26,000 (\$130,000) in the voted a sum of £25,000 (\$130,000) in the estimates of that year for subsidies to the chief shipping companies for the retention of the best of vessels of their fleet as auxiliaries to the regular navy in time of war. Six ships, then classed as of exceptional speed, were specially reserved for the national service in case of need, and nine others were placed on a l.st as at the disposal of the Admiralty, tho not actual-ly coming within the regulations of the subsidies.

A Boer prisoner, presumably an Italian mercenary, after escaping from the Fort of Peniche, near Lisbon, robbed a church in the neighborhood of nearly all its silver and gold offerings, and all the jewelry of and gold offerings, and all the jewelry of an image of "Our Lady of Sorrows," which was considered as possessing miraculous qualities and was covered with valuofferings from the faithful.

Expects No Intervention. A despatch from Berlin says: The Lokal Anzeiger publishes an interview with Dr. Leyds, who again asserted that his presence in Berlin had no political mortive. He said he objected to being interview. viewed, but nevertheless spoke quite free-ly. The war, he declared, might last for years. The Boers could hold out for years, and, moreover, they had eliminated the doubtful element from their ranks, and those now in the field had nothing more to lose.
