

MORGAN BACKS ROOSEVELT STANDARD OIL FOR PARKER

Millionaire Lawson of Boston Makes Sensational Charges Against Rockefeller and Others.

New York, Oct. 23.—(Special)—Thomas W. Lawson, the Boston millionaire stockholder, formerly partner of H. H. Rogers, and business associate of the Standard Oil ring, who in a magazine article last week made sensational charges that the "Standard Oil crowd" were raising a huge fund to carry Judge Parker as president, supplemented his first charges in a signed statement issued yesterday. It is J. P. Morgan, the bitter foe of the oil trust magnates, Lawson says, who is backing Roosevelt.

He continues: "There will be two or three explosions between now and the time the votes are counted that will give things quite a shaking up, and perhaps—perhaps—I don't know if you say that it will not do for Roosevelt or his lieutenants to sleep or even take a nap between now and election day." Lawson's attack is in part confirmed by a story in The Evening Globe, which asserts that large financial interests hostile to President Roosevelt, have satisfied themselves that Judge Parker's election is still among the possibilities, and have, as a result, replenished the Democratic treasury. A week ago their emissaries who were conducting the investigation reported that while the balance was at present in favor of Roosevelt, time and money might turn the scale. Then the coffers were opened.

Seen by The New York American the various parties implicated in Lawson's charges returned the following replies: J. P. Morgan: "His message said: 'Mr. Morgan does not care what anybody says about him.'"

H. H. Rogers: "His message said: 'This thing—take it! Mr. Rogers is engaged, but if he were not I know he would not even read such stuff, let alone comment upon it.'"

John D. Rockefeller: "A representative said: 'Mr. Rockefeller does not care to comment on the statements of Mr. Lawson or any other person.'"

James Stillman: "You know we never answer such attacks."

Senator McClellan: "Wrathful refusal to answer the charges made against him."
