# Daniel Littlejohn Gives Life In War

Died of Wounds in France on May 31-Several Reports of Casualties Among Local Men

Pte. Daniel E. Littlejorn, in his day Wounded But on Puty. well known as a boxer in the maritime provinces, has fought his last great fight and today his body is reposing in France where he died after valiantly meeting the Germans in one of the recent big drives. Word of his death was received this morning by his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Littlejohn, of 104 Brittain street, in an official telegram from Ottawa. The telegram was as follows: "Deeply regret to inform you that Pte. Daniel Edward Littlejohn died of wounds in No. Four Wounded But on Puty.

Charles H. Wasson of Hampstead, Queens county, who is at present residing at the Dufferin House, West St. John. received word this morning from Ottawa, that his son, Gunner Charles Alfred Wasson, of the artillery, had been officially reported wounded on May 29, but remaining on duty. Gunner Wasson has a brother overseas with an infantry unit and his twin-brother endeavored to get over, but was turned down on account of a minor injury after a period of service with the field ambulance.

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



DIETING UNNECESSARY There are two ways by which people

There are two ways by which people who suffer from indigestion, dyspepsia, sour stomach, flatulence, etc., can overcome the trouble. Wool collection and grading was carried on this week at Sussex. M. A. Mc-Leod, of the provincial agricultural societies, superintended the collection, wool from Kings and Westmorland counties being secured in considerable quantities and also from other sections of the province. 

In twenty years (1890 to 1910) South Dakota's population increased 67 per cent., while North Dakota under Prohibition increased 202 per cent.

Between 1910 and 1915 South Dakota lost 4,350 people, while North Dakota gained 51,000! The increase of town and city population in South Dakota in twenty years was 168 per cent., while that of its "dry" neighbor jumped 494 per cent.

The increase of wealth in the \$19,137,000 worth of manufac-Prohibition state, between 1890 and 1912, was a trifle less than double that of her rival. Values of the northern state's farm products were greater in proportion than those of any other state in the whole union. From 1898 to 1913 her bank deposits increased by more than 1,000 per cent.
