Russian Terms Are Submitted; Teutons **Now Considering Them**

Peace Without Annexations and Without Correspondent Dissects Presi-Indemnities Keynote of Bolsheviki Proposals; If Negotiations Succeed Kaiser May Try to Assemble All European Rulers in Peace Conference

Peace without annexations and without indemnities, the formula adopted by the German Reichstag in its peace resolution last July, is the keynote of the peace terms now being discussed at Brest-Litovsk.

The Russian terms have been submitted to the representatives of the Cen-Powers, who have them under consideration. No compulsory annexation of territory seized during the war, and immediate evacuation of it and no contributions to be required from belligerent countries are proposed by Russia. Mount of Olives Is An Observation Post; Showing the Garden and the Dead Sea, Advance on the Plain of Sharon

London, Dec. 24—Since the Turks were the capture of Bethlehem. The Turks driven out of Jerusalem they have been had strong fortifications here with nuconducting guerilla warfare to the north and east of the city, splitting up into numerous small bodies to attack British outposts, to snipe patrols, and generally to make themselves unpleasant, says Reuter's correspondent at Jerusalem telegraphing under date of Dec. 15.

It is said that on Christmas Day Emperor William will issue a declaration containing peace proposals, but whether conditions of peace may be expected or merely another manoeuvre intended to throw on the Allies responsibility for continuance of the war, cannot be ascertained.

He was in St. John at the time of the tragedy, but has since been notified. She was considered a hard working woman and was respected by the neighbors and the people of Queens county in general. The murdered woman was about forty-five. They were married in Queens County.
