GERMANY HAS SHOT HER BOLT; WAR TO END IN 1916, SAYS REED

War Correspondent Says That The Kaiser Must Lose Because The Allies Have an Overwhelming Superiority in Ships, in Men and in Money


John Reed, recently returned to New York, after a sojourn with the Russian armies on the eastern war front, and a tour through the Balkan States. Earlier in 1915 he had been with the German armies in the west and was convinced of their invincibility. He was corre-spondent of The World during the Mex-ican revolution. Otherwise Mr. Reed's war correspondence has been done for the Metropolitan Magazine. Observations made during a year of travel in Europe, where I visited Eng-bia, Bulgaria, Turkey, Greece, Russia and Italy—all the belligerents except Austria—have convinced me that Ger-many is already beaten and that the war will be ended by next autumn with the withdrawal of the German armies from the conquered lands. I don't see how there was ever a pos-sibility of Germany's winning the war unless she managed somehow to smash one of the three great allies—France, Russia or England. Any one of these three out of it she could easily have

London, Dec. 30—Two new landings by the Allies in the near east are re-ported today. The British have transferred some troops from Saloniki to Or-fano, a small Greek port sixty miles easo of Saloniki, with the intention of thus checking any possibility of a hostile advance from this quarter. The second landing was made by the French on the Greek island of Gastelorizo, off the southeast coast of Asia Minor, not far from the important seaport of Adalia. An Athens despatch says that the occupation of Adalia is the object of the landing. A railway runs north of Adalia, and the presence there of a strong Allied force would menace the communications of any hostile force operating Allied force would menace the communications of any



These movements indicate that the Allies' positions around Saloniki are now considered secure, and indications are that the campaign around Saloniki will develop into a long drawn out warfare, as on other fronts. Rome reports that the Central Powers have begun a general withdrawal from the entire Macedonian front, owing to the serious Russian campaign in Bessarabia, but this lacks confirmation. In the Entente capitals, however, there is a general opinion that the Russian campaign in Bessarabia, which has been undertaken in the face of unfavorable weather conditions, is likely to have an important bearing on the whole war situation. According to one version, Russia's new move is the forerunner of the impending Roumanian entry into the war on the side of the Eentente. The Pall Mall's Russian correspondent writes: "Russian joint operations with Roumania are on the point of beerinning. Roumania will fight with us, although not for us. Her siding with the Entente is not the result of French or English sympathies, but an endeavor to realize the Roumanian dream of sovereignty over Bukowina and Transylvania. As preparation for Roumania's entry into the war, Russia's aim is to reconquer Bukowina for the benefit of her new ally. This task can be accomplished in a few weeks.
