HOUSE FLY Dr. Law of Ottawa Will Ask

New Regulations Governing Stables, the Favorite Breeding Places. Life Story of Fly Which Should Arouse All to Vigorous Campaign

(Ottawa Citizen.) An infinitely greater menace to human-ity than any wild or domestic animal is the ordinary, every-day house fly. What has long been regarded as nothing worse than a bothersome pest, in the light of modern science is recognized as a carrier of disease and death. Dr. Law, medical health officer, has sounded the reveille for a warfare on flies, a warfare which de-pends on its success on the householder more than any one else. The favorite breeding ground of flies is the manure pile from stables where horses are kept. In Ottawa, at present, stables may be erected in any part of the city and the regulations covering manure pro-vide that no more than two waggon loads shall be allowed to accumulate in the summer months. Dr. Law is of the opin-ion that this is not near stringent enough. He is now preparing a set of regulations to be submitted to the board of health covering the locations where stables may be erected and the care of manure. In the
