



### Girl, Trapped In Coupe, Is Drowned

Youthful Driver Manages to Open Door and Escape From Water.

New York, Jan. 3.-Miss Helen May Andrews, 19, of East Orange, N. J., was drowned in Staten Island Sound when a small coupe driven by Galvin W. Huntoon, 20, of East Orange, ran off an open pier near the plant of the New Jersey Dry Dock Company in Elizabeth. Young Huntoon managed to open the door of the coupe, and reach the surface of the water, but the girl could not clamber across the seats and went to the bottom with the car.

Huntoon was sent to the Alexian Brothers Hospital, where he was questioned by detectives. Madison Wis., Jan. 3.—Agricultural co-operation has grown in the last few years with an unusual rapidity.

Among these forces are various monopolies, such as the monopoly of land and other natural resources, which increase the farmer's cost of production and at the same time lower his income by decreasing the purchasing power of the consuming public.


BURIED TODAY
