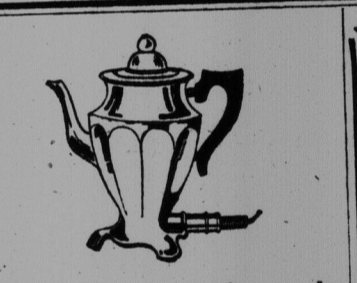

ANTWERP ISOLATED BY THE STRIKE OF SEVERAL SERVICES

Postal, Telephone, Telegraph and Railway Employers Walk Out—Fears That Strike May Spread to Other Belgian Cities.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
Antwerp, May 10.—This city was almost completely isolated today by the strike of the postal, telegraph and telephone employes and the railroad men, which has completely tied up commerce

and is apparently assuming grave proportions. The transportation of coal and coke was stopped by the walkout, and the Red Star liner Zealand was forced to abandon her sailing for New York. Consignments of fish and other provisions from England are being hauled to interior places by river boats and trucks, and perishable produce is being sold on the docks at whatever price it will bring.

Wire communication with other parts of Belgium is cut off. Reports reaching here excited fears that the strike might spread to Brussels and other big centres, and the Government is discussing the militarization of the services affected. The civic union is already being summoned to mobilize workers to take the strikers' places.

Brussels advices on May 8 announced a strike of the railwaymen, who said they were acting in sympathy with the protest of the employes in the Antwerp freight yards. Telephone workers to the number of 8,000 were also on strike, the advices said.

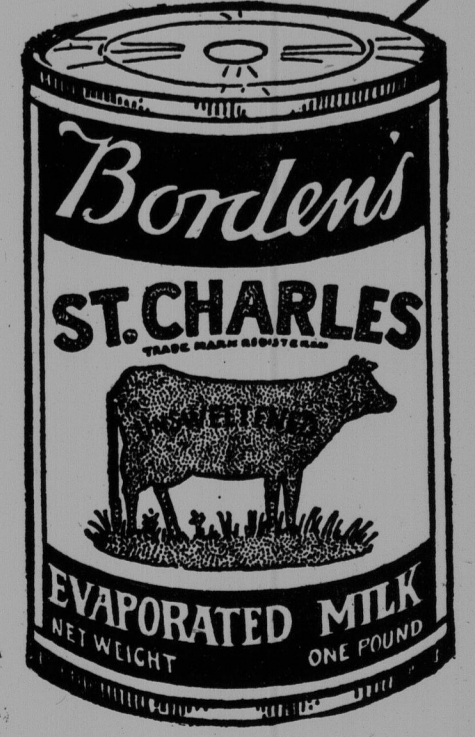

SEES REASON FOR PRIDE IN TRADE OF THE DOMINION

Ontario Manufacturers' President Speaks of Conditions—Says Canadians Returning from U. S.

Toronto, May 11.—Canadians have reason to be well satisfied with the manner in which the country's commerce has been maintained in the face of adverse trade conditions in foreign markets, according to a message by Colonel E. A. Hitch, retiring chairman of the Ontario Division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in an annual meeting here yesterday.

Mr. Hitch said that the country's exports for 1922 were greater than the high mark of 1920, based on quantity instead of price. Indeed from the same basis, Canada's imports showed a falling off from the big years of 1920 and 1921, in the speaker's opinion demonstrated clearly that the country was gradually reaching that state where it would make more and more use of its own resources.

He was particularly pleased to see that the migrating army which swung over to the U. S. some time ago was beginning to appreciate that nothing was gained in the process of migration and that the wanderers were now on their way back to this country.

Further, Canada was proving attractive to immigrants from the old land, but at the same time, care should be taken to direct the immigrants into the proper channels, where they could do the most quickly find reasonable comfort and content.

SMOKE LAURENDE TOBACCO

It Pays In Dollars and Cents To Protect Health of Workers

This Has Been Experience of Laurentide Company, Which Has Established Comprehensive Health Service in Grand Mere Where Its Plants Are.

(Cor. Financial Post.)  
Montreal.—At Grand Mere, Quebec, the Laurentide Company is in the business of making pulp and paper. It is in another important business that does not show in its annual reports: the business of making a community health service.

Grand Mere had no hospital and that is how the health service came into existence. As the Laurentide Company was the largest employer in town, the health of a hospital affected it directly. It might have established an industrial hospital for its own employees, but went further and established a system of looking after the health of the whole town, that has the complete cooperation of every other community force, including local physicians and the town's health board, that was established after the company's plan went into effect.

This board of health has been organized as the only one worthy of the Laurentide Health Service. The municipality will have a full-time health officer and laboratory facilities. Health problems concerned with general sanitation, housing, communicable diseases, and the welfare of the school life will be dealt with. The Rockefeller Foundation is co-operating in the expense of providing a hospital for the medical office of health. A number of eminent medical men of McGill University and the Royal Victoria Hospital, of Montreal, act as consultants to the Laurentide Health Service, thus making available expert advice and assistance in medicine, surgery, ophthalmology, and roentgenology. A prominent Montreal dentist is consultant to the oral hygiene clinic.

Co-operation with local physicians is the key-note of the company's work. The company's doctor is a consultant with them rather than an actual practitioner. All local physicians have access to the facilities of the hospital. Private patients of local doctors are received as well as company employees. The hospital is modern in every respect, with graduate nurses. Fees to outside patients are low. Prevention of accidents and sickness is part of the work and there is a safety inspector and a local safety committee. Five members of the staff of the nursing service are engaged in district and child welfare, making 1,200 to 1,500 house visits every month. Associated with the health service is

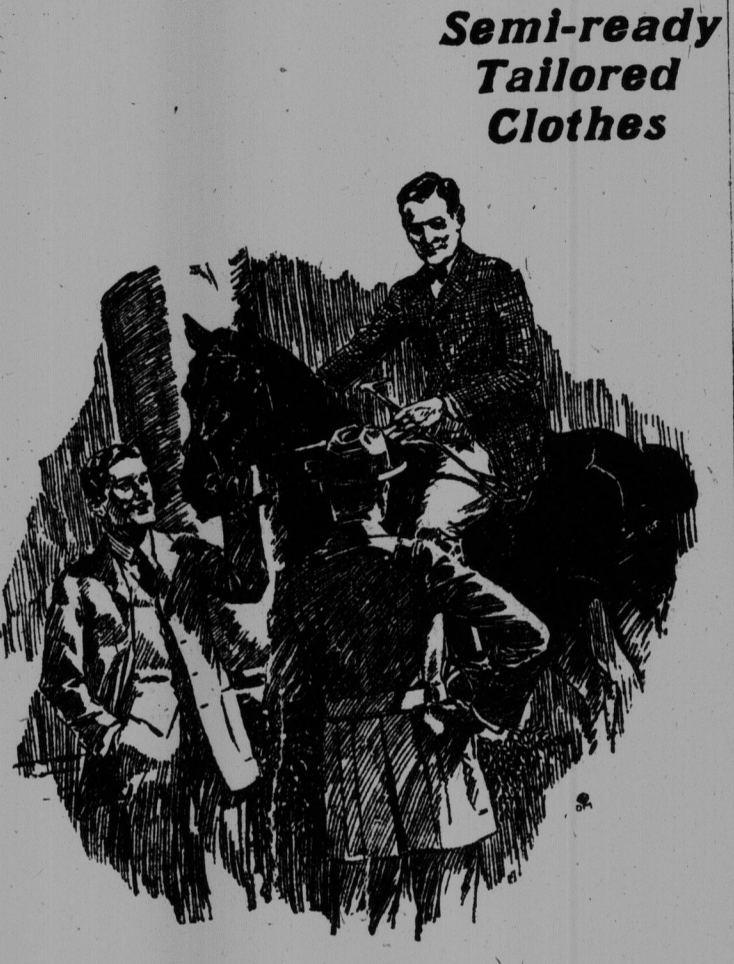

Pity the Poor Lumberman.

The grazed owner of millions of logs opened up with a defence of the lumbermen in a way which would have cheered the heart of E. W. Backus. He did not think that even 15 per cent of Canadian lumbermen made any profit over a long period of years. He knew of hundreds of small operators who had thrived for a while and then gone out of business, broke, or nearly so. Even big lumbermen fate had too often been cruel. He knew of six or seven in one district who had retired from the business either with no net gains or with a positive loss of several hundred thousand dollars. Mr. Booth was sure that public ignorance regarding the lumberman's profits had much to do with the forest fires which were eating up our heritage.

Prospectors' Fires.

"It accounts for the swarm of prospectors' fires," he exclaimed with sudden energy. "Take for example our Montreal River limit of 1,700 square miles which we bought from the Government a few years ago for \$300,000 in open competition. That of course is not the final payment for ground rent, fire taxes and cutting dues must be added. It was beautiful green bush then, with the trees as close as corn stalks, and I couldn't find the trace of a single fire, over the whole extent. A horde of men seeking non-existent mines have ruined it. Not a single mine has been discovered, but the prospectors have destroyed from one third to one half of that country." ### Copy of Elegy By Gray Brings \$2,800

Spirited Bidding For Book at a New York Auction

New York, May 11.—A copy of the rare first edition of Thomas Gray's "An Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard," brought \$2,800 at a sale in the Anderson galleries of books and autographs from the library of Thomas J. Kogel of American Falls, Idaho, the estate of the late Daniel Paine Griewood of Lenox, Mass., and the estate of the late Grace Wilkes of New York City. After spirited bidding the poem went to Gabriel Wells.

The first issue of the poem was printed in London in 1751. This edition has the word "hidden" instead of "kindred" in the fourth line of the poem.

This was a presentation copy of the author, with an autograph inscription in each of the three volumes, "Grace and Harriet Wilkes, my affectionate friends, London, Charles Dickens, Feath February, 1854."

Twenty-nine mesostichs from pictures painted by John Constable, engraved by David Lucas, were bought for \$100 from the author, with a presentation copy of the first issue of the first edition of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol." On the half-title of volume 1 is the autograph inscription, "David Golden, Esquire, from every friend, Charles Dickens, Nineteenth October, 1842." Mrs. C. Milliser gave \$300 for a French illuminated manuscript of the 18th century, "Horse Ad Usum Romanum."

Why not make a business-like calculation on the price we pay for letting the prospector loose on the country? The showing would make us rub our eyes."

"With fire eliminated would Canada have a self-perpetuating supply for all time to come?" asked the interviewer.

"With the larger limit holders that would undoubtedly be true. The nation has been forced to the edge of a timber dilemma, not by the lumberjack, but by forest fire. The consumer of forest products will pay for all that at his lumber yard. And he will pay through his daily and weekly newspapers.

### Policeman Shoots Brother Officer

Aim Poor While Chasing Speeding Car in Springfield

Springfield, Mass., May 11.—After a wild chase through the city streets, Patrolman Ira E. Klase was shot in the hip and seriously wounded by the poor marksmanship of a brother officer, Patrolman Thomas E. Bracken. The pair were part of a detail sent out to arrest a speeding motorist.

Klase and another officer managed to catch up with the speeder, when the latter took too close a turn on a corner and came to a standstill. The latter took effect in Klase's hip.

After racing half a mile through the heart of the business section, the police patrol came within firing distance of the speeder. At one time the two machines came so near that the police patrol was nearly pushed off the road. The driver, who gave his name as William Monahan, was arrested for speeding.

Officer Klase was taken to a hospital, where the bullet was removed. His condition is not critical.

### PREDICTS COAL AND IRON MINING FIVE MILLS AT SEA

Sydney, N. S., April 14.—(A. P. by Mail).—Engineers in time will be able to take coal and iron ore from under the sea at distances of five miles or more from shore, according to F. W. Gray, the executive of the British Empire Steel Corporation, Workings already extend two and a quarter miles to sea at Sydney mines, and 70 per cent of the coal produced in Nova Scotia comes from beneath the ocean. The cost of bringing deposits to the surface rather than failure of the seams, will place a limit on submarine mining operations. Mr. Gray thinks that the scenes of the largest underground iron mines at Wabana, Newfoundland, are the scenes of the largest underground mining workings in the world. ### CLAIMS AGAINST LAWYER'S ESTATE TAKE ALL BUT \$2

O. B. Thomas' Widow Asks Settlement—Both Figured in Krauss Will Litigation

New York, May 11.—An application to the Surrogate's Court for the judicial settlement of the estate of Oscar B. Thomas, a lawyer, who died suddenly in November, 1921, reveals that he left just \$2 over the claims against his estate.

Mrs. Adeline Thomas, the widow, who made the application as administratrix, placed the value of the estate at \$1,291, consisting of office furniture, a bank balance and some jewelry. Against this she charges of \$889 for funeral expenses and other debts and a claim of Frank A. Munsey for \$530 for office rent at 250 Broadway.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas figured in the litigation over the will of Samuel Krauss, who was vice-president of the Eagle Fenell Company. Upon the death of Mr. Krauss a will was filed by the Thomas couple which left three-fourths of the testator's \$1,000,000 estate to Mrs. Thomas, referred to in the will as "my daughter."

The will was subsequently declared a forgery, and it was proved through court proceedings that Mr. Krauss was a bachelor and had not entered into even a common law marriage with the mother of Mrs. Thomas.
