ATTORNEY-GENERAL SAYS REPORT IN THE STANDARD IS NEITHER FAIR NOR ACCURATE

EIGHT DROWN IN ATTEMPT TO GET ASHORE IN GALE Captain, Wife and Six of Crew of Three-Master ONLY ONE OF ALL SAVED

Seaman Dragged from Charles E. Buckley Through Raging Sea at Long Branch, Both Shoulders and Leg Broken and is Likely to Die

New York, April 16.—The schooner Charles E. Buckley, from Jacksonville, Fla., for New York, near Long Branch, N. J., is a total loss, and Captain Hardy, six wife, and all members of the crew, except one seaman named Atchison, were lost while attempting to launch a lifeboat.

Atchison, who remained on deck, was rescued after midnight, by being virtually lassoed by a line shot across the bow of the schooner from shore. He became entangled in the breeches buoy line and was dragged into the seething sea and to the beach more dead than alive.

Both of his shoulders and one leg were broken. He is not expected to live.

Besides Captain Hardy and his wife, it is believed at least six men, members of the crew, were drowned. The Charles E. Buckley was heavily laden with lumber. She was a three mast schooner of 430 tons. Her home port was Newark, N. J.

The schooner became unmanageable early last night and struck the beach near Sealight. Then the wind caught her and swept her down the coast where she appeared to break in two. Her cargo of lumber kept her afloat though much of it was swept away.

Because of the breakers it was impossible to land the survivors. Several lines fell all night, the schooner, but those on board were helpless or drowned.

Project Gone Into at Meeting Today—Five New Clergymen

A meeting of the Anglican clergy of the city was held in the institute rooms this morning, and plans for holding a mission in all the city churches were discussed. Nothing definite was decided, but it was proposed to hold the mission towards the last of November. The names of several clergymen who might be secured for the services were suggested, but as the meeting was private, no names were given out.

Rev. H. A. Collins is secretary of the movement. At a meeting of the board of missions of the synod last evening, Bishop Richardson reported that five young men could be ready for ordination on Trinity Sunday, and the board would be able to fill all vacancies in the diocese. A rectory is to be built either at Frederick Junction or Hoyt. Rev. G. M. Finn may come here from Saskatchewan to hold a mission in the diocese of Shediac. The salary of Rev. Canon Smithers was increased \$200 in recognition of his work, and Rev. W. R. Hubbard, vicar of the Holy Trinity church, was given a similar increase at a meeting of the board of education.

A meeting of the committee on the constitutional canons of the diocesan synod was held this morning and the matter of the superannuation of the clergy was discussed.

KILLED CAT IN AIR AS IT SPRANG AT THE GAME WARDEN, NEAR VANCEBORO

Quick Action by Nova Scotian Saves Life of Warden Hodgkins

Vanceboro, April 16.—The life of Game Warden E. S. Hodgkins was saved recently in the woods near here by the quickness and unerring aim of William Ryer, proprietor of a set of sporting camps at Hound Brook lake. The two men had been hunting wild cats with dogs and had killed two of the animals. They were standing under a tree when Mr. Ryer chanced to look upward.

Perched on a branch, directly above the game warden, was another cat, as large as any of those that had been killed. The animal was creeping slowly forward, his "his" drawn back over his glittering teeth and the look of a demon on his savage face. Just as Ryer's eye caught the cat, the animal gave a start and leaped full for Warden Hodgkins, still unconscious of his danger. Ryer, shouting a hoarse cry of warning, whipped his .38 calibre Colt revolver from its holster and fired, and the cat was in the air. The bullet struck the animal between the eyes and he dropped on the snow dead.

"It was the closest call I ever had, and I never want another like it," Warden Hodgkins said in telling of the affair.

William Ryer has hunted the animals for fifteen years in Nova Scotia, and has killed many of them, as well as bears, while in its vicinity.

THE CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY MAY NOW BE INCORPORATED

Necessary Amendments to Act Have Received Governor's Assent

The Times is glad to be able to announce that the amendment to the Children's Protection Act, which was asked for, has been enacted by the legislature at Frederick. A letter from Attorney-General Clarke states that the bill passed the house and received the assent of the governor on April 2. The fact does not appear to have been reported in the press at the time, as those interested in the measure in this city had seen no announcement of it and were becoming somewhat anxious.

The letter of Attorney-General Clarke is therefore very welcome news, and paves the way for the incorporation of the Children's Aid Society of the city and county of St. John. The necessary steps will be taken at once.

Will Correct False Story Printed In Local Organ This Morning

Leader of The Government Will Do So In The Legislature

REFLECTIONS ON DUGAL ARE STRONGLY RESENTED

Fleming's Friends Urging Pleas For Sympathy and at Same Time Revelling in Abuse and Falsifying the Record—Shameful Tactics of Government Press

(Special to Times) Frederick, N. B., April 16.—To those who know the facts of the lumber steal, who asked for the money, who collected the money, through whose hands it passed, and in whose hands it remains, the falsehood in this morning's Standard respecting the reason for delay in considering the Dugal charges in the house must appear absurd and ridiculous.

While confessions have been made by principals informally, while truth is coming to the surface as rapidly as possible, while politicians and grafters are pleading for mercy and clemency, the honest and bitterly disappointed Glensay group are still revelling in abuse and denials and using the St. John and provincial press to bolster up such a case of great and lasting infamy.

L. A. Dugal is one of the most courteous of men; he is a French gentleman in the best sense of the word, and although he had to be in Frederick on Tuesday night in order to be here in time for the presentation of his charges when the house reassembled after the Easter recess on Wednesday evening, yet when Attorney-General and Acting Premier Fleming, in the presence of the house, in public session, stood over until the following day, Mr. Dugal consented.

Learning, however, a few minutes later, that his legal adviser, F. B. Carvell, would be unable to be here today, he went to the acting premier and suggested Friday instead of Thursday if they were not to be taken up on Wednesday.

Mr. Clarke readily and courteously agreed, and yet the reporter of the house, who also sends the partisan unofficial reports to the Glensay Standard, and in the following day, in a statement to the Standard, representing it as coming from the government.

"Members of the government announced that they were ready to go to with the debate tomorrow, and Dugal began to spar for time, and when the government consented to have the matter laid over till tomorrow the last part of the word, and Dugal could not be persuaded to agree to this and it was finally decided to continue the debate on Friday.

The acting leader of the government told Mr. Dugal this morning that this statement was neither fair nor accurate, and he would correct it when the house assembled.

But how desperate must be the case of the grafters when they resort to such a falsehood to deceive the public, and how desperate must be the case of the reporter of the house, who sends the partisan unofficial reports to the Glensay Standard, and in the following day, in a statement to the Standard, representing it as coming from the government.

There have been many pleas for sympathy for Premier Fleming, and his family, because of his illness, and for other reasons, and there was some disposition to give him a vote of sympathy, but the public interests would admit, but the methods pursued by the political vandals who hate to see honesty rising, and who are asking for mercy for those who have done such a great wrong.

With these charges untried, it certainly seems the proper thing that all business of the legislature should be suspended until a decision has been made public. The granting of further guarantees to the Valley Railway should be postponed until the confidence of the country, now badly shaken, once more is held by the head of the government.

No harm can be done the project by a few weeks delay now, and if Premier Fleming is found to be innocent of the grave charges made against him, the confidence of the country will be stronger in him than ever.

A COMPLAINT A letter from Frank H. Elliott complaining of treatment the James Elliott Company will be laid before the common council this afternoon. Mr. Elliott says he was given verbal notice by the commissioner of public safety to install a 250 gallon gasoline tank and that the tank arrived at the city several weeks ago and has been held up ever since. He says that he has not been able to get in touch with the commissioner but has heard indirectly that permission for the installation was to be refused. REQ. FOR POSTPONEMENT OF THE DUGAL MOTIONS CAME FROM ATTORNEY-GENERAL

Standard Again Shown Up In Attempt to Mislead—Here is Direct Statement of Facts From Opposition Leader

THE FACTS Frederick, N. B., April 16.—The Standard this morning misrepresents my position regarding the postponement of consideration of my motion in the House of Assembly.

Last evening before the house met, the attorney-general, Mr. Clarke, who is leading in the absence of the premier, requested my consent to have my motions stand until Thursday. I consented but, learning a few minutes later that my counsel, F. B. Carvell, could not be present on Thursday, I suggested that the postponement be until Friday.

This was readily accepted by the attorney-general. I am only anxious for a speedy and thorough investigation of the charges.

Here is what the Standard printed— Frederick, April 15.—Mr. Dugal and those responsible for the charges recently made against Premier Fleming showed tonight by their conduct in the legislature that the charges were not substantiated by facts. Mr. Dugal, when he introduced the motion calling for the investigation, evidently did not fully realize the seriousness of the statements made by him, but it was plainly seen tonight that the charges were made solely with the idea of creating a false impression against the government.

Members of the government announced that they were ready to go on with the debate tonight, but Mr. Dugal began to spar for time, and when the government consented to have the matter laid over till tomorrow the leader of the opposition asked that the debate be postponed until Friday. The government endeavored to have the matter considered before that time, but Mr. Dugal did not consent to agree to this and it was finally decided to continue the debate on Friday.

NEW RECORD IN HANDLING TRADES ON ROYAL EDWARD

Royal mail steamer Royal Edward, Captain N. M. Wotton, R. N. B., arrived in port this morning and docked at No. 6 berth about 9 o'clock. The Edward left Bristol and Avonmouth on April 8 and although the passage was not exceptional, she made it in good time. She brought eleven saloon, 198 second cabin and 748 third class passengers, all of whom were landed in good health, and a full cargo of general freight and mails.

The first class passengers were T. G. Brooks, R. Buchanan, H. I. Cole, E. W. Cronhelm, W. H. Hennis, Miss M. Macdonald, L. G. Page, Dr. A. Pellant, L. D. Smith, Miss S. E. Steeves and Miss K. Townsend.

Perhaps the best time this year was made this morning in unloading the mails from the Royal Edward. The mail cargo consisted of 1840 bags and 868 packages, which were taken from the steamer in just an hour. A start was made at 7 o'clock and by 8 o'clock the last bag was out of the steamer. They were placed aboard a special train, which left at 9 o'clock.

After an ordinary passage of twelve days, the C. P. R. liner Lake Manitoba, Captain G. C. Evans, arrived in port this morning from the Admiralty, docking at No. 1 berth, Sand Point, between 5 and 6 o'clock. She brought forty-five second-class and 277 stowage passengers and 40 third class passengers. Although some stormy weather was experienced, there was none of it very severe and the steamer made fairly good time.

WAY CLEAR NOW FOR CITY TO HELP IN THE RELIEF FUND

Cable From Acting Prime Minister in Newfoundland Telling of Disaster and Need of Aid

The following cablegram from St. John's, Nfld., speaks for itself— St. John's, Nfld., April 15, 1914. Mr. J. K. Percay, manager Sovereign Life Assurance Co., Board of Trade Bldg., St. John, N. B.

Seventy-seven men of steamer "Newfoundland" lost their lives on ice floes in storm last April. At same time steamer "Southern Cross" with full load seals disappeared and has not since been heard of though diligent search by two steamers has been made. Vessel evidently foundered with officers and crew of 175 souls, thus 250 persons, all men and bread winners, lost their lives in that storm leaving about 1000 widows and orphans. Subscriptions have been received from many cities in Canada, United States and United Kingdom. A committee of citizens has been appointed here with His Excellency the Administrator as chairman and Hon. R. Watson as treasurer to take up local subscriptions and receive amounts from outside.

The committee will arrange for disbursing of money in best way possible. Government and people will appreciate any step towards assistance which you may be able to take. Have already received \$100 from Newfoundlanders in St. John, N. B., through Mr. E. H. Tait, J. R. BENNETT, Acting Prime Minister.

Mr. Percay will be glad to receive subscriptions and acknowledge them through the press.

This cablegram was presented this morning to Mayor Frink. The communication, with the request of the committee that the city should make a grant, will be laid before the common council this afternoon.

ACTION AGAINST OWNERS OF WELSH COLLIERY WHERE HUNDREDS LOST LIVES

London, Eng., April 16.—The British government has instituted proceedings against the owners and the managers of the Sanchems Colliery in Wales, where hundreds of miners lost their lives in a mine explosion in last October.

GOODS STOLEN IN TRANSIT ON C. P. R. ARE RECOVERED

Fort William, Ont., April 16.—Goods stolen in transit from C. P. R. cars at Chapsdale, have been recovered to the value of \$25,000. Two men suspected have disappeared.

The stolen goods included heavy articles, even pianos.

WOMAN SHOT IN QUARREL ABOUT ANOTHER WOMAN

Eté, Pa., April 16.—Mrs. Nora McBlain was shot and killed here early today in Maccabee Hall. Her husband and Samuel Stanton were arrested. All were at a party and the shooting was the outcome of a quarrel over another woman.

HUERTA WILL GIVE WAY IS OFFICIAL WORD

Practically Has Promised to Salute American Flag

WASHINGTON GETS MESSAGE Unless Mexican Provisional President Changes Mind The Crisis Will Likely Be Passed Before End of Another Day

Washington, April 16.—General Huerta practically has promised to fire a salute to the American flag, according to official dispatches received here at 11:40 a. m. today.

"The situation is very encouraging," said Secretary Bryan, after he received messages from Charge O'Shaughnessy in which General Huerta's attitude was described as yielding. Unofficially it was said that if the salute was fired, some of the American warships now speeding to Mexican waters, would be turned back.

Word of Huerta's decision virtually to accede to all the American demands, came to the White House as the result of an executive session of the Mexican senate in which Huerta outlined the entire situation.

Unless Huerta changes his mind, the crisis promises to pass over within the next twenty-four hours.

Wilson Criticized London, April 16.—Contrasting the action of President Wilson in coming to terms with the great American bluejackets at Tampico, with what was done when William S. Benton, a British rancher, was killed at Juarez, the Manchester Guardian, one of the chief Liberal newspapers, says today—

"The criticism which we have been called to bring about is apparently to be the punishment for a merely symbolic slight on American dignity."

"Expanding its administration for the ability and the motives of President Wilson, the Guardian says it is impossible to suppress doubts and misgivings on the subject of his administration."

"Why should Villa murder with impunity and General Huerta be chastised with the whip for the strength of the right arm of the United States for a mere breach of international politeness. It would be far easier to bring Villa to a better frame of mind than to teach manners."

ENGLAND AND SWEDEN IN A JOINT ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

London, April 16.—England and Sweden are negotiating for a joint expedition next year to the Antarctic.

The plan contemplates establishment of a scientific station in Graham Land for the exploration of the surrounding area, and an investigation of the southern seas whales.

HAYTI BANKRUPT Kingston, Ja., April 16.—Official despatches from Port Au Prince, say that the Haytian republic is bankrupt.

The German minister is said to have told President Zornow that Germany is prepared to assume an executive part in running the administration of Haiti to get out of the impasse. Government officials are to turn over one-fifth of their salaries to the government.

RECONSTRUCT STANDARD OIL CO. OF CANADA

London, April 16.—At an extraordinary general meeting of the Standard Oil Company of Canada, held yesterday, resolutions for the reconstruction of the company and the registration of a new company under the name of the Coastworth Natural Gas Company Limited, were agreed to. The capital of the new company will be \$28,000.

TWENTY-FIVE MILES AHEAD OF "SCOTTY" Nome, Alaska, April 16.—John Jackson, with his eighteen Siberian wolves, early today is leading in the all-Alaska sweepstakes dog race, driving over the snow toward the goal at Nome, more than twenty-four miles ahead of "Scotty" Allen, his nearest competitor. The race probably will be finished tonight.

ATTRACTIVE IN SATIN

Misses and small women 3 yards of 44-inch or 4 yards of 46-inch material will be required for this dress, with 1/2 yard of all over lace 1 1/2 inches wide for the shield and standing collar and 2 yards of ribbon 1/2 inch wide for the waist.

In cutting out the dress, first fold the length of the satin. Now place upon this the collar, front gore of the skirt and front of the waist. These are marked with "TT" perforations and should, therefore, be laid on a lengthwise fold of the material. (On the remaining space the back gore of the skirt, the sleeve, the front and back yoke, the back and cuff are arranged. These are marked with large "O" perforations to show that they are to run along a lengthwise thread of the satin. For the short sleeve, cut off lower part of sleeve on small "o" perforations. Lines are also indicated for round or high neck.

To make the waist turn home in right back, right back edge of yoke and in shield by notches. Gather upper and lower edges of front and back between double "TT" perforations and join yoke, notches and center-backs even. Close under-arm seam as notched. Sew large collar to neck edge, and standing collar to shield as notched. Adjust shield to position, "center" and "corresponding" large "O" perforations even. Sew to lower edge of waist center-backs even, small "o" perforations at under-arm seam.

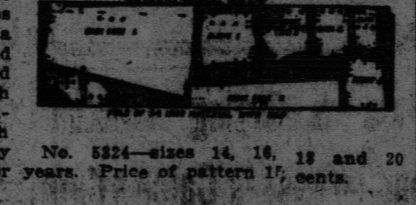
Close the sleeve seam as notched, gather lower edge between double "TT" perforations. Sew sleeve in arm-holes as notched, easing in any fullness.

For the skirt, slash upper front part of back gore on double "o" perforations for opening to pass ribbon through. Adjust trimming piece on front gore, centers and upper edges even; large "O" perforations indicate center-front, small "o" perforations indicate upper back edge. Turn under front edge of back gore on slit perforations, lap to small "o" perforations in front gore, notches even and attach; top extension to double "o" perforations in front. If desired, cut off extension. Close back seam from large "O" perforation to lower edge; finish edges above for placket. Gather upper edge of back gore between double "TT" perforations. Sew to lower edge of waist over stay, centers even, bringing small "o" perforation to under-arm seam.

Buttons may be added if desired.

This graceful model is developed in satin trimmed with a belt of soft ribbon and tiny decorative buttons. The vest is of all over lace.

Some exceedingly dainty dresses are made this spring in soft qualities of satin that parade under awe-inspiring names, yet are more or less similar to charming and lustrous when one sees them. BUDGET DEBATE IN PARLIAMENT

May Continue For a Week or More

SECOND HALF OF SESSION

Speakers Condemn Surrender of Tory Government to the Interests - Conservative Members Flout Western Claims

Ottawa, April 15—With a slim attendance, but a big subject under discussion, parliament opened this afternoon the second half of the session after the Easter adjournment.

There were three speakers, two on the Liberal side—Mr. Carroll, of Cape Breton, and Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, and one on the Conservative side, Oliver Wilcox, of North Essex.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux declared that the speech of the minister of finance in introducing his budget speech marked the complete surrender of the government to the big interests at the expense of the agriculturists and the consumers of Canada.

It was Mr. Wilcox, however, who frankly arrayed the east against the west, and who declared that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party were paying entirely too much attention to the wishes of the western farmers.

Premier Borden said Mr. Wilcox was not going to make the blunder which had cost Sir Wilfrid his job.

"On this side, sympathy with the west," he said, "is not the man from North Essex."

"And that is all," commented Sir Wilfrid.

"We recognize that they are in a pioneer condition," retorted Mr. Wilcox. "But the most of it is only hollering: 'Wah, wah' when there is no wof."

"We all recognize the condition and it is all right to do something. But I'm not so sure there is a common ground."

"But the fact is," continued Mr. Wilcox, "that when they're frosted out we're willing to buy them more seed; when they're hulled out we're willing to help them build their railways; we're building them elevators; we're doing everything in reason for them, and the pioneer conditions which prevail in western Canada do not begin to compare to the pioneer conditions which prevailed in Ontario when my forefathers settled there."

The whole trouble was, declared Mr. Wilcox, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was "intensely interested, altogether too much interested" in the western farmers.

"He is not usually scared," proceeded the speaker, "but he got scared when the big deputation came down by thousands from the wild and woolly west where the coyotes howl by night and the gophers howl by day, and spread themselves over as many seats as possible in this chamber. And one would think, according to the Liberals, that after September 21, 1911, a great fog had settled upon western Canada."

"Mr. Wilcox incidentally assured his hearers that Liberalism had been 'on the wrong side of every great question since Confederation.'"

"And," finally, added Mr. Wilcox, to clinch his argument, "if there's anything I abhor, it's seeing the Liberals ballyragging the manufacturers with hot air and shaking hands with them on the 'street.'"

It is Commissioner Wignore's idea to do away with the old Carleton water works reservoir on Lancaster Heights, near Tilton's Corner, and to establish a big stand pipe, reservoir and pump in the vicinity of Martello Tower, thus securing the additional advantage of a gravity system in distribution from the reservoir. Thus the pressure all over the Spruce Lake system will be greatly increased and the development of the new areas being opened up for residential purposes will be materially aided.

When the new reservoir is provided it is thought that the old reservoir in Lancaster Heights can be made available for sub-division and possibly the city will secure enough from the sale of the property to defray all the expense of the new plant. With the completion of the new bridge the Loch Lomond and Spruce Lake systems can be united to give a uniform pressure if desired, and the connection can, of course, be shut off at any time.

In addition to the renewals which are mapped out this year, including the West Side and Lower Cove work, besides the Marble Cove sewerage, the commissioner of water and sewerage is likely to be a busy man this year.

CANADA FOR THE ENGLISH

(From the Montreal Star) The Empire Club of Canada, recently passed the following resolution at a regular meeting of members in Toronto: "The Empire Club of Canada, views with satisfaction the formation of a British-Canadian Theatre Organization Company, and believes that the presentation in Canada of the best class of plays by actors who represent British ideals in dramatic art will tend to enlarge our sympathies and elevate our taste, and will assist in bringing us into even closer connection with the aims and inspirations of the mother land."

That this may be attributing to the Theatre Organization Society somewhat extensive powers, yet the feeling that obviously prompted its presentation and adoption of the resolution is thoroughly justified. We have waited a long time for somebody with courage enough and enterprise enough to do what Canadians ought to have done long since—bring out English companies to Canada. Now that we have such an organization, we ought to lend it every possible support in order to enable those responsible for its direction to realize their ideals.

Some ambitious plans are on foot for next season, and the reports which visitors like Martin Harvey and Laurence Irving will, it is to be hoped, take back to England should make those plans much more easy of accomplishment than would otherwise be the case.

Even if at first such an organization as this does not realize all one's expectations, it is infinitely better than nothing at all, and may very easily be developed into a movement of tremendous significance. But Canada must do her share.

FOR PROHIBITION LAW IN MICHIGAN STATE

Temperance Forces Reported Mustering For Bigger Battle

Lansing, Mich., April 16—Persistent reports circulated about the capital that the anti-liquor forces of Michigan have determined to begin their long-threatened fight for state-wide prohibition by attempting to control both branches of the next State Legislature are partly confirmed. No official statement is issued, but a man prominent in more than one local option fight has understood that several prohibition leaders, including several ministers, have agreed to become candidates for the legislature provided they are assured the united support of voters who favor state-wide prohibition.

During the campaign which preceded the recent election, a local option was voted upon in twelve counties, prohibition leaders predicted this might be the last fight of its kind in Michigan and if it was they would devote their future energies to obtaining state-wide and nation-wide prohibition.

EASTER MEETING OF KINGSTON CHURCH

The best attended Easter meeting for many years was held in the school room of the old Loydist church at Kingston on Monday, April 13. The pastor, Rev. E. Gordon Lawrence, presided. The congregation was unusually large and well represented. There were also present five from Long Reach, two from Whitehead and three from Clifton.

The report of the treasurer showed that the voluntary contributions for the year amounted to \$2,228.65, of which \$827.48 was spent on repair and improvement of building.

It was decided to observe the 120th anniversary of the erection of the Kingston church on June 25 next, by a fitting celebration and festival.

HEAVY SENTENCES

Nine months in jail was the sentence imposed by Police Magistrate Ritchie yesterday afternoon on Jeremiah Daley and Charles Patterson, charged with being frequenters of disreputable houses. Each of them was also fined \$50 or three months in jail on a charge of drunkenness. Several other matters came up before the court in the afternoon, including in all eight prisoners. Daniel Fitch, charged with stealing a watch valued at \$8 from Daniel Doherty, Main street, asked to be tried in the police court. The magistrate said that he would wait until Judge Forbes should arrive home, and have him sent up before him. John Mahoney, charged with pocket peddling liquor last Saturday, pleaded not guilty and was remanded until this afternoon. Two prisoners charged with drunkenness, were each fined \$8 or thirty days in jail with hard labor. One other prisoner, charged with drunkenness, gave his age as seventeen years. He was remanded until it could be learned where he procured the liquor. Another prisoner charged with drunkenness said he was nineteen years of age. He was allowed to go. The first of the new liners to arrive up the river this season will be the Calgarian, which is due at Quebec on May 8, while the Alastair will arrive May 22.

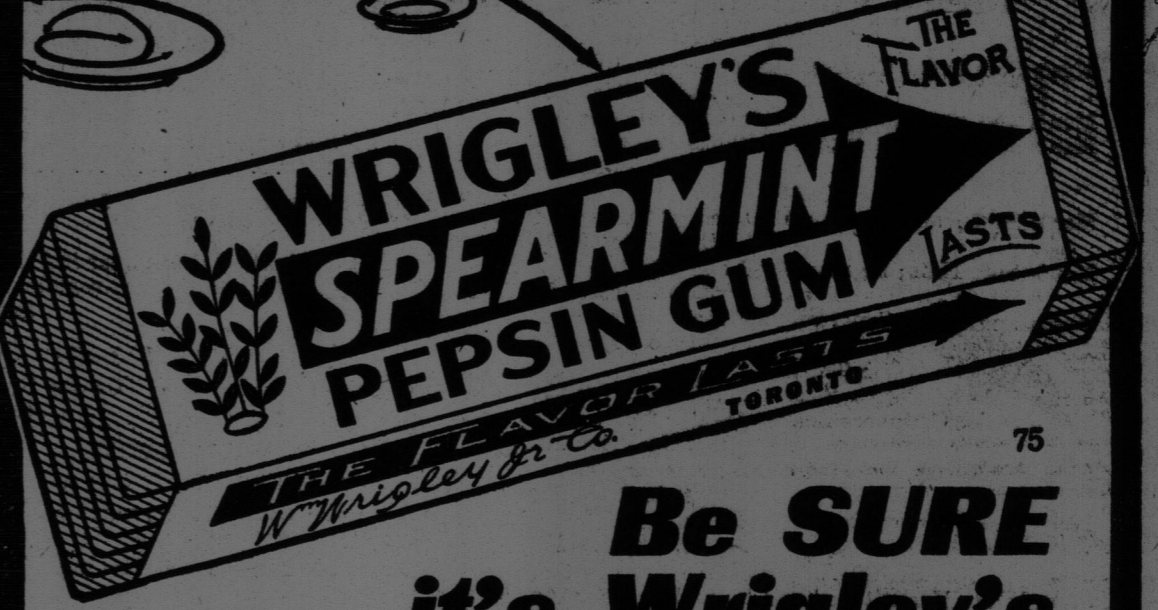

THE DIAMOND RING THAT WAS MISSING AND FOUND

Referring to the article in last evening's Times concerning the finding of Mrs. Stanbury's diamond ring her legal counsel, D. Mullin, K. C., said this morning that although his client had no doubt where she placed the ring because she had a distinct recollection of placing it in the cabinet in the kitchen, yet a thorough search of the whole house had been made the morning after the ring was missed. So thorough was the search, he said, that the paper which covered the bottom of this drawer was removed by Mrs. Stanbury. The ring was certainly not there then. Strange to say some weeks afterwards it was discovered by Mrs. Stanbury when she was casually looking for something in the drawer. It was found concealed in the back part of the drawer under the papers.

NEW ORGAN FOR SAINT DAVID'S

Project is Started But Some Time Must Elapse Before Realization

The music committee of St. David's church is considering a proposal to secure a new organ for the church. While the present instrument is not an old one, it has not been found adequate for the needs of the church and there is a strong sentiment among the members of the congregation in favor of securing a new organ.

The type of instrument suggested is of the most modern kind, capable of meeting all the demands which might be made upon it. The organ would be electrically controlled as well as operated and it has been suggested that the new instrument might be placed in the western end of the church instead of at the side. If this is done the pulpit may be placed in front of the organ with the choir in front of the minister and the organ key boards in front of the choir with the organist facing the choir. With this arrangement the choir would be nearer the congregation and it is believed that it would be of more aid to congregational singing.

Before any action can be taken the committee must submit their recommendations to the trustee board and then to a meeting of the congregation for confirmation, and if their plans are approved it will probably be a year longer before the new organ could be built and installed. In the meantime a large amount has been subscribed voluntarily towards the cost of the instrument.

CANADA MAY WITHDRAW FROM FISHERIES AGREEMENT

Ottawa, April 16.—Canada is likely to withdraw from the International Fisheries agreement. After waiting five years for the United States government to enact congress legislation ratifying the agreement, which has been done, the matter is now before congress, and it had been thought that it would go through this session, but the latest indications are that the chances of its going so are small. The opposition of fishing interests to certain parts of the agreement are proving powerful and such an action is likely to defeat the measure or rather to prevent its being ratified. If nothing is done, Canada will at once withdraw from the treaty.

JUDGMENT IN CHECK CASE

Magistrate Ritchie gave a decision in favor of the plaintiff's in the city court this morning in the case of Tobias and Ferris against M. Booderich, manager for the Dominion Metal Company, who were suing for the recovery of \$44. Judgment was given for the full amount.

The action was brought for the recovery of the amount of a check dated May 18, 1913, signed by the defendant and made payable to the order of Tobias and Ferris for the amount stated.

Millford Ferris, one of the partners, endorsed the check with his own signature and gave it to L. Jacobson in payment of work which he had done for the firm. Mr. Jacobson presented the check at the Bank of British North America, but they refused to pay it on the ground that it was not properly endorsed. Raymond Tobias, the other partner, went to the defendant and told him that he had not already paid the check, forbade him to do so. Mr. Booderich, however, paid the check a few days after, and it was contended that the defendant was liable, as he had paid the check when it was not properly endorsed. J. King Kelly, K.C., who appeared for the defendant, contended that it was not necessary for the check to be endorsed when it was being paid by the makers. Edmund S. Ritchie appeared for the plaintiffs.

New York Writer Dead.

New York, April 16.—George Alfred Townsend, newspaper man and author, who wrote under the name of "Gath," is dead, aged seventy-three years.
