GRANTS HAVE STRONG BID FOR RECORD

Ottawa Physician Eldest of Ten Whose Ages Total Seven Hundred and Ten Years

To New York Herald contains the following: Colonel John Peter Grant, a Canadian merchant and traveler, who has just returned from Europe, and now is at the Hotel Somerset, this city, read a cable despatch in the Herald last Sunday that a family named Gardner, in Preston, England, had credit for the longevity record, because one generation of eleven members, six brothers and five sisters, total in their ages nearly 700 years.

Colonel Grant called at the Herald office yesterday and made the statement: "There are ten Grants alive now, seven sisters and three brothers. Our ages total 720 years. We start with my oldest brother, Sir James Grant, of Ottawa, who is eighty-one years old, and run down to Mrs. Van Koughnet, of London, who is our baby. She is only sixty-four years old. The Herald cable despatch says there are Gardners and that they boast a total age of nearly 700 years. There is no nearby about it, and we are only ten."

Here is the list of the living Grants, furnished to the Herald by Colonel Grant: Sir James Grant, already mentioned; Mrs. Schlater, of Montreal, eighty years old; Mrs. Melnich, of Toronto, seventy-nine years old; Mrs. Milley, of Calgary, Canada, seventy-six years old; Mrs. Darnall, of Windsor, Ontario, seventy-four years old; Mrs. McCarty, of Ottawa, seventy-one years old; Mrs. Van Koughnet, of London, Ontario, sixty-four years old; one Grant himself, his twin brother, George Wilberforce Grant, sixty years old, and Mrs. Young, of Denver, Colo., seventy-five years old.

This remarkable family are the children of Dr. James Grant, of Inverness, Scotland, and Jane Ord, of Aberdeen, Scotland. They were married in Scotland and came to this country in 1828, settling in Glenary, about sixty miles north of Montreal.

Colonel Grant says further: "We have had fifty-seven children, forty of whom are living. Fifty-seven grandchildren are also living. I have twenty-five nieces and nephews more than forty years of age. A son of Mrs. Schlater, who died in Montreal last year, was the first death we had in twenty years."

The Herald despatch says that when these Gardners were asked why they were able to live so long they said: "Porridge. Well, if you ask me how we have been able to make such a record, I'll say 'Hard work.' We have all worked hard all our lives, and expect to keep on working. My seven widowed sisters work just as hard now as they did when they were young women."

Sir James Grant, the present head of the family, is a well known physician, and recently returned from England to Canada, after delivering five lectures on "tuberculosis."

It might be added that Sir James Grant is honorary physician to the Governor-General.

NATIONALISTS AND TRUSTS WELL REPRESENTED IN NEW GOVERNMENT

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—At 6 o'clock last night Mr. Borden was still wavering as to his final choice of ministers and the portfolios had not been definitely allotted. At that time Armand Lavergne was spending towards Ottawa from Quebec on a special train, and before the final slate was to be submitted to his excellency, the extreme exponent of the Nationalist views was to be consulted. However, time was pressing and delays only meant more embarrassments. So after 11 o'clock Mr. Borden finally sought his excellency after the latter's return from the theatre to Rideau Hall,

submitted his slate to him for approval, and at 1:30 a.m. this morning the list was handed out to the Conservative press. Mr. Lavergne could not then have effected any change, but it is difficult to see in any case, what more the Nationalists could have asked for or obtained.

Nationalists Land the Plums.
Mr. Monk has been given the chief spending department. Mr. Pelletier, who had the Nationalist backing in preference to Mr. Casgrain, the nominee of Mr. Forget, and the straight Tory influence of Montreal, has

been given the post office department, which has immense patronage and political influence. Mr. Nantel, whose right to cabinet preference is admittedly based only on the Nationalist influence, has been given the inland revenue department. Finally, Mr. Perley, the representative of the Protestant element in Quebec, has been left without a portfolio.

For the first time since confederation Quebec has been left practically without a Protestant minister. The principal comment heard here today in connection with the new ministry is that the Nationalists

have won out handsomely in the first round of the struggle for political influence and prestige in the new administration. The Forget faction is openly disgusted and disgruntled. Mr. Borden wanted Mr. Forget to come in without portfolio but the latter, after he found out yesterday afternoon that the Nationalists were in command of Mr. Borden's Quebec ear left the city, announcing that he had declined a cabinet position. The extensible reason given is that he is financially interested in the securing of a certificate for

La Banque Internationale, the application for which is now pending.

Split Predicted.
What compromise, if any, Mr. Borden has reached with the Nationalists on the naval question is still unknown. The best informed opinion is that the whole matter has been conveniently left over for the time being, and an effort will be made later to reach some basis on which the present divergent imperial and anti-imperial elements can agree. At present the question is to be temporized with as long as possible. Politicians here predict a

sure split between the Ontario and Quebec ends of the cabinet sooner or later. The Ontario representation is also causing much comment. The turning down of Andrew Broder in favor of Dr. Reid was explained in yesterday's dispatch, as was also the selection of Col. Sam Hughes for the militia portfolio. The choice of Mr. Crothers for the labor portfolio was also a last hour change. On Saturday Mr. Middleboro was Mr. Borden's choice, though Mr. Crothers had been the favorite at first. The friends of Jos. E. Armstrong, including himself, had also almost succeeded on Saturday in getting him into the cabinet, thus satisfying his long-cherished ambitions. Mr. Crothers was to have been selected with the speaker's chair of the commons. On Sunday the kaleidoscope turned again and Mr. Crothers was summoned. His inclusion gives western Ontario a representative though his special qualifications for the labor portfolio are somewhat hard to see. The desire of Senator Longheed to be left without the worry of administering a portfolio made it possible for Mr. Borden to give Ontario a sixth portfolio, instead of five, as originally intended, and also

BOY LOSES AN EYE BY SHOOTING

Six Year Old Queens County Lad Brought to Hospital Here in Serious Condition, But Recovery Hoped For

As the result of a shocking shooting accident, little Edward Farrell, the six-year-old son of J. W. Farrell of Newcastle Bridge, Queens county is in the General Public Hospital here suffering from a wound which has caused the loss of his right eye and which may terminate fatally. The little chap was playing in front of his home on Monday afternoon when Otty Lockhart, aged fourteen, a son of Magistrate Edwin L. Lockhart, came along with a shot gun. Lockhart, it is alleged, had the weapon pointed towards the child and with the warning "I'm going to shoot you" pulled the trigger. The discharge struck the boy in the head wounding him terribly. The local doctor dressed the injuries and on Tuesday the boy was brought to the hospital by his father.

An examination showed that the eye is destroyed but hopes are entertained for his recovery.

SAYS HE WAS ROBBED OF \$40 AT McADAM

Police Court Prisoner's Story—Evidence in Pond Street Knifing Case

One lone prisoner, John Brennan, faced Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning on the charge of drunkenness. He told the court that he had arrived in the city yesterday morning from the fact that he had been robbed of \$40 at McAdam Junction on Tuesday by two strangers. He was fined \$4 or ten days in jail.

The case against Charles McElmon, charged with stabbing Charles Thompson with a knife and also for attempting to stab Mrs. William Campbell in a house in Pond street was resumed this morning. Near the evidence of four witnesses was taken the case was adjourned until Friday morning at 10 o'clock when Dr. C. M. Pratt will be called to give evidence as to the wounds inflicted.

Charles Thompson, one of the complainants, told of McElmon going to his house on Monday afternoon and of his getting into a row with Mrs. Campbell. The witness had tried to quell the disturbance and McElmon stabbed him twice. Mrs. Campbell and her son told of McElmon breaking in the door of their house, calling them vile names and also attempting to stab them. Mrs. Campbell said she had not struck McElmon on the head with a chair, she would have been stabbed in the face.

Mrs. Thompson, wife of the first witness, was called, but knew practically nothing about the affair.

Mrs. Thompson was asked if he had any questions to ask the witnesses, the prisoner replied that he knew nothing whatever about the occurrence. The witnesses all entered into a recognition to appear at the next sitting of the higher court, and the prisoner was remanded to jail.

One of New Brunswick's Best Known Business Men Passed Away Today

The death of Alexander Burr took place at 6 o'clock this morning at his residence, 38 Pitt street, after an illness of ten weeks. Mr. Burr, who was fifty-two years old, leaves his wife, formerly Miss Catherine Wilkinson, of Chatham, and two sons, F. G. Burr, manager of the Bank of New Brunswick in Hantsport, N. S., and Master Moffatt Burr, at home. He was also survived by one sister, Mrs. Wm. Cassie, of Douglastown, Northumberland County, and three brothers, Andrew in North Carolina, Richard in Michigan, and William, who was last heard from in Seattle.

Mr. Burr was a native of Chatham, N. B., and had lived in St. John for six years. He travelled for The Laurentian White Star Company of Quebec, and was one of the best known and most popular commercial men in the maritime provinces. His death will be sincerely regretted by a wide circle of friends. Mr. Burr was a member of the Commercial Travellers' Association and the Commercial Travellers' Association.
