




Buy the dried figs which come in bulk, bick them apart carefully, wash them and soak them overnight. The next morning stew them gently without sugar, but with two slices of lemon to a medium-sized lishful. Let them cook until soft and bearder.

PRUNE SOUFFLE.

Remove the pits from a large cupful of stewed prunes and chop fine. Add the whites of three eggs and half a cupful of sugar beaten to a stiff froth. Mix well, turn into a buttered dish and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.

RICE PUDDING WITHOUT EGGS Soak half a cupful of rice over night in a little cold water. Put in a pudding dish with two quarts of milk, half a cupful of sugar, a saltspoonful of salt, a tablespoonful of butter. Grate nutmeg over the top. Bake in a slow oven, stirring frequently until the rice is well cooked and then let it brown. This is very delicious served with a small portion of grape jelly on each plate.

The city of St. John may learn something from Winnipeg in the matter of taking care of neglected children. Canada Monthly for May contains a very interesting article telling in a general way what is done in the western city to look after those children who are not cared for by

those children who are not cared for by their parents.

There is in the first place a Children's Aid Society, which was incorporated under the Children's Protective Act to investigate cases of neglected, abused, dependent or orphan children. The society is empowered, if circumstances warrant, to become the legal guardian of such children and find them foster homes or otherwise anitably place them. Before this action was commission would lose its usefulness. and find them foster homes or otherwise suitably place them. Before this action is taken, however, a statement of the case must be given before a magistrate, who issues an order authorizing the guardianship. If there are parents, and they prove by a period of good conduct that they are more fit to have charge of their children, the latter are returned to them. This society only offers temporary shelter, but during ten years it has cared for more than 1,000 neglected waifs. It will be noted that the society has a law behind it.

This home was opened in a small way twenty-six years ago, but now it is well equipped and the public school board provides and maintains a building in which the children of the home attend school. 



Looking across Pitt River-Coquitlam in the distance.



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


