The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75.-(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the

proper national colors-(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships, including any vessel under the command of an officer of H

Majesty's navy or full pay, and (b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and

(c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

One barrel salt to five and a half barrels herring-Large Fulls One barrel salt to six barrels herring-Medium Fulls. One barrel salt to six and a half barrels herring-Matt Fulls.

This amount of salt is for dredging and laying on rows only. It does not take into account that put on the herring before gibbing.
